Highlighting Patrons in Good Standing

If you are wondering when you will be called about the new digital talking book system, please remember that only patrons in good standing are receiving the new system first. That means patrons with fewer than five overdue books, or patrons who have checked out books in the last year.

For the last three years we have sent out overdue reminders to patrons to encourage them to send back overdue material. These notices serve two purposes; first as a reminder and second as a mechanism to clean up patron records. We understand that, at times, books have been sent back and either never make it to the library or were not checked in properly. If you believe this is the case, call the library and have a reader advisor check your patron record.

One issue that has come up with the digital books on cartridge is that many boxes are coming back to the library empty. Please make sure there is a cartridge in the correct box when you are returning digital books. When cartridges show up without their box or mail card we do not know which patron has returned it. This will result in incorrect information in the patron record and cause overdue reminders to be sent.

We would also like to remind patrons that to stay in active status, you must check out at least one book a year from either the library or download a book from BARD or Unabridged.

From the Director

The technology transition to the digital talking book gives us the opportunity to make changes at the library to our systems and processes. For example, we have moved to a random shelving system in the stacks area for the books. This enables us better inventory control and ensure that patrons get the books they requested and not some random book pulled off the shelf by mistake.

In the Reader Advisor section about service options below, you will see that patrons receiving digital books are put on turnaround service. This is going to be the permanent option for receiving digital books. It will mean that once a patron hits their limit on the number of books they can check out, they will need to send a book back to the library to get a new book. This will help control inventory and encourage patrons to return books when they are finished with them. But don't worry, you will always have enough books to read.

Outreach

Reader Advisors— Service Options and Book Selection

Are you getting too many books delivered? Maybe you're not getting enough. CTBL has many different ways for you to have books sent to you. A good option to make sure you have enough books is to use our turnaround service. With turnaround service you will decide on a maximum number of books for you to have checked out at one time. As an example, let's use three books. The computer will send you one book a night until you reach your maximum of three. You will not receive any more books until we receive one of your books back. Then you will automatically be sent another book to always keep your total number of books checked out at three. This will keep you in a constant supply of books without having too many on hand. Due to the limited number of digital titles, all patrons receiving digital players are automatically set-up on turnaround service with a maximum of three books. This number will be raised as we receive more books into the collection.

Maybe you're getting enough books, but don't like the titles you are receiving. With most service options, you can decide if you want the computer to pick your books based on subjects you provide, if you want to create a request list of books you would like to receive, or if you'd like to use a combination of both options.

We want you to be completely satisfied with your service and will work with you to ensure you are getting exactly what you want. Please call the library and talk to a Reader Advisor if you feel you need to make adjustments to your account.

Tech Talk—New Digital Players

CTBL's online catalog has been modified so patrons are now able to search for and order digital books. There will be many digital book titles listed with "download only" in the availability column. These items are available for download from the BARD web site hosted by the National Library Service.

To find items with available copies in the library follow the steps below on the Basic Search page:

- Step 1. Enter a subject, title or author's name in the text box next to Search For
- **Step 2**. Go to the Search Options section
 - a. Select "Titles with Available Copies" next to Availability
 - b. Select "Digital Books" next to Media.
- Step 3. Click the Submit Search button

If you just want to look at all the digital books in a certain category, don't follow Steps 2 and 3. In the list that is generated, you will know you can place a request on a book if the availability column says either "copies available" or "checked out". Due to the limited number of digital books, items in this category are not available for rush service.
