Each large print book is mailed out in its own mail pouch. We would like patrons to return books in individual pouches and not double up books. Unfortunately patrons have been putting multiple books in pouches and then keeping the extras. We have now run out of mail pouches both large and small. If you receive large print books, please look around your living space and find any unused pouches and send them back to the library. We desperately need them. At one point we had 8,000 pouches. Now we are down to no reserves and use whatever comes back in the mail. This will compromise service, as books will have to wait for pouches to be returned.

Mailroom News— Including Notes in Mail Container

Patrons include notes in mailing containers and machine boxes when returning mail. Although the mailroom staff are supposed to open every box and container, some are missed. We suggest that if you have a note to send that you put it in an envelope and mail it to the library. That way your note will not be missed and will go straight to the reader advisors.

Resources of Interest— Movie Theaters Make Movie-going Accessible

(from Sarah Anderson and Braille and Talking Book Library Sacramento)

Regal and Cinemark theater locations now offer technology that assists blind and low-vision movie-goers (as well as deaf and hard-of-hearing patrons). Currently, all Regal theater locations nationwide and all Cinemark theaters in California offer this technology. Cinemark plans to have these features in all theaters nationwide by mid-2013.

At the theaters, movie-goers can borrow special headsets to hear descriptive narration (DN) tracks. DN tracks are a second audio track with special narration describing the action on the screen during natural breaks in the film dialog. Patrons may also borrow special devices (lightweight eyewear at Regal or an OLED display at Cinemark) to enable direct viewing of closed captioned (CC) text. DN and CC can only be accessed by use of this special equipment and is not audible or visible to other movie-goers. This means that DN and CC are available for all show times throughout the day (for those movie titles that offer DN/CC).

To find movie titles that offer DN/CC:

Call your local theater directly to ensure a movie has DN/CC.

- Fandango.com—movie titles will be noted with "Accessibility Devices."
- CaptionFish.com—all movie times/theaters listed have DN/CC.

- Cinemark.com/closed-caption-list—a "quick look" text list of all current movie titles playing at Cinemark that have DN/CC.
- Cinemark.com—Visit the "Theaters" tab to find your local theater. Movie titles will be noted with an image "Descriptive Narration" or "Closed Caption." Also, a section titled "Caption/Description" has a text list of current movie titles with DN/CC at your local theater.
- Regmovies.com—First find your local theater's webpage.
 Individual movie times are followed by "(CC)." According to a staff member at Regal, about 90% of the movies listed with "(CC)" also offer a descriptive narration track.

Volunteer News— From Voluntold to Volunteer

Volunteering at CTBL often brings out the best in people. They may have come to volunteer because someone else—a teacher, a parent, a judge—told them to. This is sometimes called being "voluntold". This is a potential volunteer who comes bearing papers to be filled out: contracts, schedules, and timesheets. They usually don't know anything about talking books or what it means to be print-disabled. They just want to get through with their requirements.

We are glad to have them. We give them a tour of our facility and quickly explain what we do at the Talking Book Library; we answer their questions and concerns. Soon they are introduced to the staff and to the volunteers they will work with and we make them part of our team. Then we give them a job. It may be rewinding cassette books or checking digital books for problems. Maybe they will label cartridges and catalogs or do a shelf-check for missing volumes of Braille. Pretty soon they have finished Day One and carefully mark it on their forms.

A few days later when we check in with them, something has changed. They have made new friends and really feel that they are a part of the CTBL team. They have learned about a service that is available to members of their own family who can no longer read. They know their efforts are valued and their required service is being fulfilled. There is genuine excitement in their voice when they say, "I never knew about this and I think it is so wonderful. When I finish my required time, I want to come back and be a Volunteer." We call it a great success when they do!
