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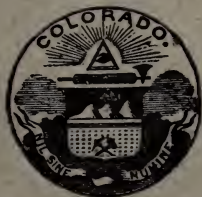

That it is the sense of this Assembly that the President of the United States, the Secretary of State and the Congress of the United States be permitted to carry out the foreign policy of the United States unhampered by unwarranted interference of any newspaper, group of newspapers; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That this body express its utmost confidence in the wisdom, integrity and ability of the President of the United States, the Secretary of State and the Congress of the United States, to properly conduct the foreign affairs of the United States.



Senate Concurrent Resolutions

S. C. R. No. 1, by Senators Fairfield, Toll, Quiat and Wheeler:

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 30 of article V of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended so as to read as follows:

“SECTION 30. The salaries of the Governor, the Governor’s secretary, the judges of the supreme and district courts of the state, shall be fixed by legislative enactment; provided, that the salaries of said officers heretofore fixed by the Constitution shall continue in force until otherwise provided for by legislative enactment.

“No law shall extend the term of any public officer, or increase or decrease his salary, after his election or appointment, as fixed by legislative enactment.”

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box a ticket whereon shall be printed the words: “For the amendment to section 30 of article V restoring to the legislature the power to fix the salaries of the Governor and his secretary and the judges of the supreme and district courts as it now fixes the salaries of all other state officers,” and “Against the amendment to section 30 of article V restoring to the legislature the power to fix the salaries of the Governor and his secretary and the judges of the supreme and district courts as it now fixes the salaries of all other state officers,” and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the results determined in the manner provided by the laws of the state of Colorado for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 2, by Senators Fairfield and King:

SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE

STATE OF COLORADO AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION ONE (1) OF ARTICLE NINE (9) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF COLORADO.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 1 of article IX of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 1. Supervision of Schools—Board of Education—The general supervision of the public schools of the state shall be vested in a Board of Education to consist of nine members to be appointed by the Governor, subject to the approval of the Senate. The Governor elected in 1928 shall appoint three members of said board for terms of eight years, two members for terms of six years, two members for terms of four years, and two members for terms of two years. Their successors shall be thereafter appointed by the Governor, with the approval of the Senate, for terms of eight years.

The board so appointed shall perform all the duties assigned to the *ex-officio* Board of Education under the terms of the Constitution or statutes of Colorado prevailing previous to the time of the adoption of this amendment. In addition, on the expiration of the term of office, death, or resignation of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction elected in 1928, said board shall appoint a Commissioner of Education, prescribe the duties, salary and term of service of said Commissioner, provided that the said Commissioner of Education shall perform the duties of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction prescribed in the Constitution and statutes of Colorado previous to the adoption of this amendment. The additional duties of the State Board of Education shall be prescribed by law.

Members of the State Board of Education shall serve without pay except that they shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses while performing their duties as members of said board.

“SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box a ticket whereon shall be printed the words: ‘For the amendment to section 1 of article IX, relating to the

supervision of schools, and the State Board of Education,' and 'Against the amendment to section 1 of article IX, relating to the supervision of schools and the State Board of Education,' and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross opposite one, or the other of said groups of words.

"SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption or the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the results determined in the manner provided by the laws of the state of Colorado for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress."

S. C. R. No. 3, by Senators Fairfield and King—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado amendments to sections one (1), four (4), six (6) and twenty (20) of article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, by the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendments to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 1 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Officers—Terms of Office—Residence.—The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, state treasurer and attorney-general, each of whom shall hold his office for the term of two years, beginning on the second Tuesday of January next after his election; PROVIDED, That the terms of office of those chosen at the first election held under this constitution shall begin on the day appointed for the first meeting of the general assembly. The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant-governor, shall, during their terms of office, reside at the seat of government, where they shall keep the public records, books and papers. They shall perform such duties as are prescribed by this constitution or by law."

SECTION 2. Section 4 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. Qualification of State Officers.—No person shall be eligible to the office of governor or lieutenant-governor unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, nor to the office of auditor of state, secretary of state or state treasurer, unless he

shall have attained the age of twenty-five years, nor to the office of attorney-general unless he shall have attained the age of twenty-five years, and be a licensed attorney of the supreme court of the state or of the territory of Colorado in good standing. At the first election under this constitution any person being a qualified elector at the time of the adoption of this constitution, and having the qualifications above herein prescribed for any one of said offices shall be eligible thereto; but thereafter no person shall be eligible to any one of said offices unless, in addition to the qualifications above prescribed therefor, he shall be a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided within the limits of the state two years next preceding his election."

SECTION 3. Section 6 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. Appointment of Officers—Vacancy.—The governor shall nominate, and by and with the consent of the senate, appoint all officers whose offices are established by this constitution, or which may be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for, and may remove any such officer for incompetency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. If during the recess of the senate a vacancy occur in any such office, the governor shall appoint some fit person to discharge the duties thereof until the next meeting of the senate, when he shall nominate some person to fill such office. If the office of auditor of state, state treasurer, secretary of state or attorney-general shall be vacated by death, resignation or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be provided by law. The senate in deliberating upon executive nominations may sit with closed doors, but in acting upon nominations they shall sit with open doors, and the vote shall be taken by ayes and noes, which shall be entered upon the journal."

SECTION 4. Section 20 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 20. State Librarian.—The Commissioner of Education shall be ex-officio State Librarian."

SECTION 5. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box his ticket whereon shall be printed the words, "For the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and "Against the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and shall indicate his choice by

placing a cross opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

Any elector not voting as aforesaid may express his approval or rejection of any one or more of said sections herein referred to, by designating any section so approved or rejected by number in the order in which it appears in this act. The official ballot shall be so prepared as to afford the electors the opportunity to express their choice as herein provided.

SECTION 6. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said amendments and each of them shall be canvassed and the results determined by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 3, by Senators Fairfield and King—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado amendments to sections one (1), four (4), six (6) and twenty (20) of article four (4) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendments to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 1 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

“Section 1. Officers—Terms of Office—Residence.—The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, state treasurer and attorney-general, each of whom shall hold his office for the term of two years, beginning on the second Tuesday of January next after his election; PROVIDED, That the terms of office of those chosen at the first election held under this constitution shall begin on the day appointed for the first meeting of the general assembly. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box his ticket whereon shall be printed the words "for the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and "against the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state

officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

Any elector not voting as aforesaid may express his approval or rejection of any one or more of said sections herein referred to, by designating any section so approved or rejected by number in the order in which it appears in this act. The official ballot shall be so prepared as to afford the electors the opportunity to express their choice as herein provided.

SECTION 6. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said amendments and each of them shall be canvassed and the results determined by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 4, by Senator Bogdon—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section seven (7) of article four (4) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution of the state of Colorado, to-wit:

That section 7 of article 4 of the Constitution of the state of Colorado be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 7. That the governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after convictions, for all offenses except treason and except in case of impeachment. No such pardon or commutation shall be made unless a petition therefor is filed with the Governor, setting forth the reason for granting the same. Upon the filing of such petition, the Governor shall fix the time and place when a hearing on said petition will be had, and give thirty (30) days' public notice thereof in a newspaper published in the county where applicant was convicted, or, if no newspaper is published in said county, then by posting said notice in at least six (6) public places in said county at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of said hearing. A copy of said notice shall be served upon the judge (if a resident of Colorado) and also upon the district attorney (if a resident of Colorado) trying said applicant, at least fifteen (15) days before the date of said hearing. The hearing shall be public and

any person interested may present evidence for or against the granting of said application. No application shall be granted unless the evidence presented establishes that it will be to the best interests of all concerned to grant said application. The Governor shall in every case where he exercises this power send to the General Assembly at its first session thereafter a transcript of all proceedings in respect to any such pardon or commutation."

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box his ballot, whereon shall be printed the words:

"For the amendment to section seven (7) of article four (4) of the Constitution relating to reprieves, commutations and pardons."

and the words:

"Against the amendment to section seven (7) of article four (4) of the Constitution relating to reprieves, commutations and pardons."

and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of said amendment by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said group of words on his ballot.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 5, by Senator Bogdon—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section fourteenth (14) of article two (II) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 14 of article II of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 14. That private property shall not be taken for private use unless by consent of the owner, except for private ways of necessity, and except for reservoirs, drains, flumes or

ditches on or across the lands of others, for agricultural, mining, milling, domestic or sanitary purposes; *Provided*, that a use for or incidental to city planning, regional planning, platting control, subdivision control, control of mapped streets or highways, zoning or other improvement shall not be considered as private, and the power of excess condemnation in aid thereof is conferred on the state and all counties, towns and cities with power to sell, lease or dispose of, with restrictions as to use, any excess or remaining land or property acquired not needed for the improvement or to devote the same or any part thereof to other public use."

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box his ballot, whereon shall be printed the words:

"For the amendment to Section Fourteen (14) of Article Two (II) of the Constitution relating to the power of eminent domain."

and the words:

"Against the amendment to Section Fourteen (14) of Article Two (II) of the Constitution relating to the power of eminent domain."

and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of said amendment by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said group of words on his ballot.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 6, by Senators Callen and Hunter—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section thirteen (13) of article twelve (12) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section thirteen (13) of article twelve (XII) of the Consti-

tution of the state of Colorado shall be amended so as to read as follows:

Section 13. Civil Service—Apply Merit System.—Appointments and employments in and promotions to offices and places of trust and employment in the classified civil service of the state shall be made according to merit and fitness, to be ascertained by competitive tests of competence, the person ascertained to be the most fit and of the highest excellence to be first appointed. All appointees shall be qualified electors of the state of Colorado, except as to those offices or positions held by the civil service commission to require special training and technical qualifications, in which cases competitive tests need not be limited to qualified electors and may be held without the state.

The classified civil service of the state shall comprise all appointive public officers and employees and the places which they hold, except the following: Judges of courts of record and one stenographer of each judge, one clerk for each court of record, persons appointed to perform judicial functions, receivers, jurors, members of boards or commissions appointed by the Governor and serving without pay, members of the state industrial commission, of the public utilities commission and of the state civil service commission, persons appointed or employed as heads of departments and their first deputies or first assistants, and who, in the performance of their duties, are clothed with any discretionary power or whose acts affect any administrative policy, the Governor's private secretary and three confidential employees of his office, appointees to fill vacancies in the elective offices, one deputy of each elective officer, the position involving the duties incident at present to the position of that of deputy of the secretary of state, known as deputy commissioner of labor and the incumbent thereof, officers and teachers in educational institutions not reformatory or charitable in character, all attorneys at law serving as such, and the officers and employees of the General Assembly.

Persons in the classified service shall hold their respective positions during efficient service and shall be graded and compensated according to standards of efficient service which shall be the same for all persons having like duties. They shall be removed or disciplined only upon written charges, which may be filed by the head of a department or by any citizen of the state, for failure to comply with such standards, or for the good of the service, to be finally and promptly determined by the commission upon inquiry and after an opportunity to be heard. No person shall be discharged for a political or a religious reason. In cases of emergency, or for employment of an essentially temporary character, the commission may authorize temporary employment without a competitive test.

Laws shall be made to enforce the provisions of this section and to establish a state civil service commission to consist of three members who shall be appointed for overlapping terms by the Governor alone and who shall be persons of known devotion to the merit system. The first three commissioners appointed hereunder shall hold for two, four and six years respectively. Thereafter the term of a commissioner shall be for six years, except where an appointment is made to fill an unexpired term. A salary of not less than \$2,500 per annum shall be paid to each commissioner. The making and enforcement of rules to carry out the purposes of this amendment and of the laws enacted in pursuance hereof, the alteration and rescission of such rules, the conduct of all competitive tests, the determination of all removal or disciplinary cases, the standardization of all positions, the determination of standards of efficient service and the determination of the grades of all positions in the classified service shall be paid until a certificate is furnished by the commission that the appointment has been made according to law.

Adequate appropriations shall be made to carry out the purposes of this section and in the absence of such adequate appropriations the salaries and expenses of the commission shall be paid as are the salaries and expenses of the executive officers of the state government.

All persons holding positions in the classified service as herein defined when this section takes effect shall retain their positions until removed under the provisions of the laws enacted in pursuance hereof.

This section shall be self-executing.

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box his ballot, whereon shall be printed the words:

"For the amendment to section 13 of article XII of the Constitution relating to civil service,"
and the words:

"Against the amendment to section 13 of article XII of the Constitution relating to civil service."

and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of said amendment by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said group of words on his ballot.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

S. C. R. No. 7, by Senator Sanders—Concurrent Resolution ratifying the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the

United States providing that Congress shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

WHEREAS, the Sixty-eighth Congress of the United States of America, at its first session, in both houses, by a constitutional majority of two-thirds thereof, has made the following proposition to amend the Constitution of the United States of America in the following words, to-wit:

**"JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO
THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.**

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), that the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution:

'ARTICLE

'Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Section 2. The power of the several States is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of state laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.' "

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, By the General Assembly of the state of Colorado, That the said proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America, be and the same is hereby ratified by the General Assembly of the state of Colorado.

RESOLVED, That certified copies of the foregoing preamble and resolution be forwarded by the Governor of the state of Colorado to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State of the United States, the President of the Senate of the United States and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States.

Senate Joint Memorials

S. J. M. No. 1, by Senators Bannister, Hunter and Wheeler.

WHEREAS, it is reported certain individuals and corporations are engaged in disseminating propaganda with the aim of bringing about armed intervention by the United States in Mexico for the protection of their own interests, in spite of the fact that such intervention might lead to war, and

WHEREAS, the people of Colorado are unalterably opposed to any war unless the honor of the United States has become involved or the safety of the nation has been imperiled, and

WHEREAS, there appears in the present international situation no excuse for aggressive acts or unwarranted statements by officials of the government of the United States which might lead to a break in relations between this country and Mexico, therefore,

Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring:

That from the information we have at hand any dispute between the United States and Mexico should be settled by arbitration rather than war and that entrance into war at this time be averted unless the safety and honor of the nation are involved.

Be It Further Resolved, that copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, and President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

S. J. M. No. 2, by Senators Headlee, Warren, Abbey and Nelson.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled:

Your Memorialist, the General Assembly of the state of Colorado, respectfully represents to your honorable body that what is known as the San Luis valley on the Rio Grande, in which is located some two million acres of irrigable, productive agricultural land in the state of Colorado, has been greatly damaged and retarded in its growth and development to the detriment of the peoples of the San Luis valley and the commonwealth of the state of Colorado, in this, to-wit:

That for and on account of the action taken by the Congress of the United States and different departments of the govern-

ment of the United States, and particularly on request of the Honorable Secretary of State, contrary to the advice of the Attorney General of the United States, in the year 1896 an embargo was placed upon the construction of reservoirs on the upper Rio Grande in the state of Colorado.

That by reason and on account of such embargo, the peoples of the San Luis valley were prevented from constructing reservoirs whereby they could scientifically and economically administer the distribution of irrigation waters from the Rio Grande river in that territory.

That as a direct result of the prohibition, illegally and unjustly placed upon the people of the San Luis valley as aforesaid, a large amount of irrigation water was applied to lands in the springtime when the river was in flood for a number of years, during which period these people were prohibited from the construction of reservoirs to properly regulate their supply of water, in an attempt to secure a sufficient amount of ground storage to supply their crops during periods of drouth. This excessive use of water in the springtime resulted in the seeping of a large area of land aggregating several hundreds of thousands of acres theretofore very productive; a total loss of its productivity resulting, and a direct loss to the land-owners and entrymen on the public domain in that locality variously estimated at from \$187,000,000 to \$200,000,000, in addition to the loss of homes and improvements erected at the cost of a lifetime of toil by the owners of such lands, and the desolation of a thriving and productive community, occupied by several thousands of happy, industrious, satisfied and contented people, all citizens of the United States of America.

That in the year 1925, the embargo against the construction of reservoirs in the upper Rio Grande in Colorado was removed and was then found by the then secretary of the interior to have been illegally initiated and imposed.

That by the drainage of said lands and the construction of reservoirs now permitted, whereby the application of water in the future may be properly and scientifically regulated, said lands, now desolate and unproductive, may be reclaimed and again made productive; but before such reclamation can be provided for it is necessary that an outlet for the excess waters so applied to such lands which caused the seepage thereof, be provided for from what is known as the San Luis lakes to the Rio Grande, a distance of about twenty-two miles.

That the action of the governmental agencies of the United States in imposing such an embargo whereby the peoples of the San Luis valley were prohibited from exercising rights unques-

tionably exercised and enjoyed by all other citizens, was unjust and discriminatory, and, as now found by the Secretary of the Interior, illegal.

That the people of the San Luis valley have never been recompensed in any particular for the great loss occasioned to them by these unwarranted and unjust acts of the United States Government, notwithstanding the fact that the peoples of Southern New Mexico and Western Texas on the Rio Grande river, under what is known as the Elephant Butte Dam, have been heretofore compensated by a direct appropriation of Congress in the amount of \$1,000,000 to compensate them for 60,000 acre feet of water ceded to the Republic of Mexico, which as a matter of fact, on account of the embargo heretofore mentioned, was charged directly to the San Luis valley in Colorado.

That the 60,000 acre feet of water, heretofore ceded to Mexico by the United States, can be replaced in the Rio Grande by the construction of the outlet contemplated; 2,000 square miles can be added to the drainage area of the Rio Grande and the flow of the river be materially augmented, thereby furnishing an additional supply of water for the use of the people in New Mexico and Texas.

Therefore, in order to recoup in a very small part the immense loss occasioned to the people of the San Luis valley and the state of Colorado, and in order to enable them insofar as may be possible to recoup the loss occasioned by the desolation of their farms and homes by the reclamation thereof, and in all justice and fairness to the people so discriminated against, your honorable body is respectfully requested to take such action as may be necessary to provide an outlet from the San Luis lakes to the Rio Grande in order that these unfortunate people sacrificed upon the altar of what was then no doubt considered to be the good of the nation, be permitted to drain their lands and relieve the condition brought about by the imposition and maintenance for the last thirty years of an embargo illegally initiated and imposed.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the General Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of the Constitution:

SECTION 2. A new article shall be added to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, designated Article XXIV—Old Age Pensions. It shall read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby established a system of old age pensions for all resident citizens of the state of Colorado, more than sixty years of age, except the following:

(a) Persons who have not been legal residents of the state of Colorado for ten continuous years after January 1, 1918.

(b) Persons under conviction of crime.

(c) Inmates of public institutions of the state of Colorado or of the United States.

Section 2. The old age pensions provided for in this article shall be sufficient to insure each eligible person an income from all sources of not less than thirty dollars (\$30) per month, except that in the case of married couples each person shall receive four-fifths of the amount payable to an unmarried person of the same circumstances.

Section 3. Personal property and improvements on land shall be exempt from taxation for old age pensions and all revenue for such pensions shall be raised regardless of any limitation on the tax rates by a special tax levy on the assessed value of land, and the total proceeds of said levy shall be paid into a separate fund and used exclusively for the payment of old age pensions and all expenses incident thereto.

Section 4. All claims for old age pension shall be filed in the county court of the county in which claimant resides. Due notice of filing of each claim shall be given to the public and any citizen may show cause why any particular pension claim should not be allowed. Courts having jurisdiction shall then decide how much, if any, pension each claimant is entitled to; but after the court's award is made no deduction shall be made from any pension on account of money thereafter earned by pensioner. All

decisions of the county courts relating to pensions shall be subject to review by the supreme court.

Section 5. The State Board of Equalization shall pay the pensions provided for in this article out of the fund provided for in this article and all details as to the assessment, levy and collection of taxes for the payment of said pensions that are not adequately provided for in the general laws of the state, and all details as to payment of said pensions and making proof thereof that are not adequately provided for in this article shall be fixed and established by rules made by said board, which rules shall be published three times, a week apart, in a newspaper in each county in this state, said newspaper to be selected by said board, and if there be a county in which no newspaper is published said publication shall be made by posting a copy of said rules on the front door of the court house of such county, and after the publication of said rules as herein directed they shall be as binding and effective as though embodied in this article.

Section 6. This article shall be self-executing and it shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption by the people of the state of Colorado.

Section 7. No other provision of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be held to interfere with the enforcement of this article.

House Concurrent Resolutions

H. C. R. No. 1, by Mrs. Pettee—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section twenty-three (23) of article two (II) of the state constitution relating to jurors.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring therein:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section Twenty-three (23) of Article Two (II) of the Constitution of the State of Colorado shall be amended so as to read as follows:

SECTION 23. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate in criminal cases; women shall be equally eligible with men to serve on grand and petit juries; a jury in civil cases in all courts, or in criminal cases in courts not of record, may consist of less than twelve (12) persons, as may be prescribed by law. Hereafter a grand jury shall consist of twelve persons, and nine (9) of whom concurring may find an indictment; Provided, the General Assembly may change, regulate or abolish the grand jury system.

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box his ballot, whereon shall be printed the words:

"For the amendment to Section Twenty-three (23) of Article Two (II) of the Constitution relating to jurors."
and the words:

"Against the amendment to Section Twenty-three (23) of Article Two (II) of the Constitution relating to jurors."
and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of said amendment by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said group of words on his ballot.

SECTION THREE. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the State for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

Also, H. C. R. No. 3, by Messrs. Sabin, King, Rudolph Johnson, Martinez and Kettering.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 30 of article V of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 30. The salaries of the Governor, the Governor's secretary, and the judges of the supreme and district courts of the state shall be fixed by legislative enactment; provided, that the salaries of said officers heretofore fixed by the Constitution shall continue in force until otherwise provided for by legislative enactment.

"No law shall extend the term of any public officer, or increase or decrease his salary, after his election or appointment, as fixed by legislative enactment."

Referred to Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

H. C. R. No. 4, by Messrs. Coonradt, Works, Rudolph Johnson and E. C. Johnson—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section sixteen (16) of article two (II) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the Senate concurring therein:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of

Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section sixteen (16) of article two (II) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 16. That in criminal prosecutions the accused shall have the right to appear and defend in person and by counsel; to demand the nature and cause of the accusation; to meet the witnesses against him face to face; to have process to compel the attendance of witnesses in his behalf, and a speedy public trial by an impartial jury of the county or district in which the offense is alleged to have been committed; *provided, however*, that the defendant, if he so desires, may waive a jury and be tried by the court."

Referred to Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

RESOLUTIONS

The following House Concurrent Resolution No. 5 was introduced, read and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments January 14, 1927:

H. C. R. No. 5, by Messrs. R. T. Cline and William G. Stewart—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to article twelve (12) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado by striking therefrom and repealing section thirteen (13) of said article twelve (12).

BE IT RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the question of whether or not article twelve (12) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended by striking therefrom and repealing section thirteen (13) thereof.

SECTION 2. There shall be printed on all ballots used at said general election, in the usual place for constitutional amendments, the words, "For the amendment of article twelve (12) of the Constitution by striking therefrom and repealing section thirteen (13) thereof relating to the classified civil service," and the words, "Against the amendment of article twelve (12) of the Constitution by striking therefrom and repealing section thirteen (13) thereof relating to the classified civil service," and any elector voting at said election who desires to vote for or against said amendment shall indicate his choice by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said groups of words on his ballot before depositing the same in the ballot box.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

The following House Concurrent Resolution No. 6 was introduced, and referred as indicated below :

H. C. R. No. 6, by Mrs. Fry and Mr. Cowan.

RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring, that a joint committee of the Senate and House, to consist of two Senators and three Representatives, be appointed by the Governor of Colorado to serve without pay, except actual expenses, to study the problems concerning a Teachers' Retirement Fund Law. Said committee shall report its conclusions to the Twenty-seventh General Assembly in whatever form the committee may choose.

Referred to Committee on Education January 17, 1927.

The following H. C. R. No. 7 was introduced, read and referred to Committee on Federal Relations :

H. C. R. No. 7, by Messrs. Leach, Evans, Talbot, Hoefnagels and Dillon.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RATIFYING THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES PROVIDING THAT CONGRESS SHALL HAVE POWER TO LIMIT, REGULATE AND PROHIBIT THE LABOR OF PERSONS UNDER EIGHTEEN YEARS OF AGE.

WHEREAS, The Sixty-eighth Congress of the United States of America, at its first session, in both houses, by a constitutional majority of two-thirds thereof, has made the following proposition to amend the Constitution of the United States of America in the following words, to-wit:

“JOINT RESOLUTION

“Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

“Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution :

"ARTICLE

"Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

"Section 2. The power of the several states is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of state laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress."

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, By the General Assembly of the State of Colorado, That the said proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America be and the same is hereby ratified by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado.

RESOLVED, That certified copies of the foregoing preamble and resolution be forwarded by the Governor of the state of Colorado to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State of the United States, the President of the Senate of the United States and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States.

Introduced January 17, 1927.

The following House Concurrent Resolution was introduced, read, and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments:

H. C. R. No. 8, by Mr. Johnson (Boulder)—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado amendments to sections one (1), four (4), six (6) and twenty (20) of article four (4) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendments to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 1 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Officers—Terms of Office—Residence.—The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, state treasurer and attorney-general, each of whom shall hold his office for the term of two years, beginning on the second Tuesday of January next after his election; PROVIDED, That the terms of office of those chosen at the first election held under this constitution shall

begin on the day appointed for the first meeting of the general assembly. The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant-governor, shall, during their term of office, reside at the seat of government, where they shall keep the public records, books and papers. They shall perform such duties as are prescribed by this constitution or by law."

SECTION 2. Section 4 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. Qualification of State Officers.—No person shall be eligible to the office of governor or lieutenant-governor unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, nor to the office of auditor of state, secretary of state or state treasurer, unless he shall have attained the age of twenty-five years, nor to the office of attorney-general unless he shall have attained the age of twenty-five years, and be a licensed attorney of the supreme court of the state or of the territory of Colorado in good standing. At the first election under this constitution any person being a qualified elector at the time of the adoption of this constitution, and having the qualifications herein prescribed for any one of said offices shall be eligible thereto; but thereafter no person shall be eligible to any one of said offices unless, in addition to the qualifications above prescribed therefor, he shall be a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided within the limits of the state two years next preceding his election."

SECTION 3. Section 6 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. Appointment of Officers—Vacancy.—The governor shall nominate, and by and with the consent of the Senate, appoint all officers whose offices are established by this constitution, or which may be created by law, and whose appointment or election is not otherwise provided for, and may remove any such officer for incompetency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. If during the recess of the Senate a vacancy occur in any such office, the Governor shall appoint some fit person to discharge the duties thereof until the next meeting of the Senate, when he shall nominate some person to fill such office. If the office of auditor of state, state treasurer, secretary of state or attorney-general shall be vacated by death, resignation or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the governor to fill the same by appointment, and the appointee shall hold his office until his successor shall be elected and qualified in such manner as may be provided by law. The senate in deliberating upon executive nominations may sit with closed doors, but in acting upon nominations they shall sit with open doors, and the vote shall be taken by ayes and noes, which shall be entered upon the Journal."

SECTION 4. Section 20 of article IV of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 20. State Librarian.—The Commissioner of Education shall be ex-officio State Librarian."

SECTION 5. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box his ticket whereon shall be printed the words "For the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and "Against the amendments to sections 1, 4, 6 and 20 of article IV, relating to state officers and abolishing the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction as an elective office," and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

Any elector not voting as aforesaid may express his approval or rejection of any one or more of said sections herein referred to, by designating any section so approved or rejected by number in the order in which it appears in this act. The official ballot shall be so prepared as to afford the electors the opportunity to express their choice as herein provided.

SECTION 6. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said amendments and each of them shall be canvassed and the results determined by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

Introduced January 18, 1927.

Also the following House Concurrent Resolution was introduced, read and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments January 18, 1927:

H. C. R. No. 9, by Rudolph Johnson (Boulder)—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section one (1) of article nine (9) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 1 of article IX of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Supervision of Schools—Board of Education.—The general supervision of the public schools of the state shall

be vested in a board of education to consist of nine members to be appointed by the governor, subject to the approval of the Senate. The governor elected in 1928 shall appoint three members of said board for terms of eight years, two members for terms of six years, two members for terms of four years, and two members for terms of two years. Their successors shall be thereafter appointed by the governor, with the approval of the Senate, for terms of eight years.

The board so appointed shall perform all the duties assigned to the ex-officio board of education under the terms of the Constitution or statutes of Colorado prevailing previous to the time of the adoption of this amendment. In addition, on the expiration of the term of office, death, or resignation of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction elected in 1928, said board shall appoint a Commissioner of Education, prescribe the duties, salary, and term of service of said commissioner, provided that the said Commissioner of Education shall perform the duties of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction prescribed in the Constitution and statutes of Colorado previous to the adoption of this amendment. The additional duties of the State Board of Education shall be prescribed by law.

Members of the State Board of Education shall serve without pay except that they shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses while performing their duties as members of said board.

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box a ticket whereon shall be printed the words: "For the amendment to Section 1 of Article IX., relating to the supervision of schools, and the State Board of Education", and "Against the amendment to Section 1, Article IX., relating to the supervision of schools, and the State Board of Education", and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption or the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the results determined in the manner provided by the laws of the state of Colorado for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

Referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

The following House Concurrent Resolution was introduced, read, and referred to Committee on Constitutional Amendments:

H. C. R. No. 10, by Messrs. Talbot, Dunlap and Hill (by request)—House Concurrent Resolution submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section seven (7) of article eleven of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, at the next general election for members of the assembly, for their approval or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall be valid as a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 7 of article XI of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 7. No debt by loan in any form shall be contracted by any school district for the purpose of erecting and furnishing school buildings, or purchasing grounds, unless the proposition to create such debt shall first be submitted to such qualified electors of the district as shall have paid a school tax on real estate therein, in the year next preceding such election, and a majority of those voting thereon shall vote in favor of incurring such debt."

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desirous of voting for or against said amendment, shall deposit in the ballot box a ticket whereon shall be printed the words: "For the amendment to section 7 of article XI of the Constitution requiring that voters at elections on the question of creating a bonded indebtedness in school districts shall have paid a school tax on real estate therein," and "Against the amendment to section 7 of article XI of the Constitution requiring that voters at elections on the question of creating a bonded indebtedness in school districts shall have paid a school tax on real estate therein", and shall indicate his choice by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption or the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the results determined in the manner provided by the laws of the state of Colorado for the canvass of votes for representatives in Congress.

January 18, 1927.

The following House Concurrent Resolution was introduced, read and referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments.

H. C. R. No. 11, by Messrs. Hill and Works—Submitting to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado an amendment to section fourteen (14) of article two (II) of the Constitution of the state of Colorado.

Be It Resolved, By the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state of Colorado, for their approval or rejection, at the next general election of members of the General Assembly, the following amendment to the Constitution of the state of Colorado, which, when ratified by a majority of those voting thereon, shall become a part of said Constitution, to-wit:

Section 14 of article II of the Constitution of the state of Colorado shall be amended to read as follows:

"Section 14. That private property shall not be taken for private use unless by consent of the owner, except for private ways of necessity, and except for reservoirs, drains, flumes, or ditches on or across the lands of others, for agricultural, mining, milling, domestic or sanitary purposes: *Provided*, That a use for or incidental to city planning, regional planning, platting control, subdivision control, control of mapped streets or highways, zoning or other improvement shall not be considered as private, and the power of excess condemnation in aid thereof is conferred on the state and all counties, towns and cities with power to sell, lease or dispose of, with restrictions as to use, any excess or remaining land or property acquired not needed for the improvement or to devote the same or any part thereof to other public use."

SECTION 2. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for or against said amendment shall deposit in the ballot box his ballot whereon shall be printed the words:

"For the amendment to section fourteen (14) of article two (II) of the Constitution relating to the power of eminent domain," and the words:

"Against the amendment to section fourteen (14) of article two (II) of the Constitution relating to the power of eminent domain,"

and shall indicate his approval or disapproval of said amendment by placing a cross (X) opposite one or the other of said group of words on his ballot.

SECTION 3. The votes cast for the adoption and the votes cast for the rejection of said amendment shall be canvassed and the result determined in the manner prescribed by the laws of the state for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.

January 19, 1927.

H. J. R. No. 1, by Mrs. Long—Resolved by the House of Representatives the Senate concurring therein that a committee of three members of the House and two members of the Senate be appointed to arrange for the inauguration of Governor-elect William H. Adams and other incoming state officials.

Mrs. Long moved the suspension of rules and that H. J. R. No. 1 be adopted.

Submitted January 5.

Motion duly seconded. Carried January 5.

H. J. R. No. 2, by Mr. Levis—

Resolved, That the Senate and House meet in joint session at 2 P. M., on Thursday, January 6, 1927, for the purpose of canvassing the vote for State officials.

Mr. Beggs moved suspension of the rules and that H. J. R. No. 2 be adopted.

Motion duly seconded, put to a vote and carried, and resolution declared adopted. January 6, 1927.

H. J. R. No. 3, by Mr. Beggs.

WHEREAS, The ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps of the state of Colorado, auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, through their legislative committee, Mrs. Dora C. Newell, chairman, tender a bronze tablet to the state of Colorado, inscribed thereon, "General John A. Logan's General Order No. 11, dated 5th day of May, 1868, establishing May 30th as Memorial Day; sacred to the memory of the comrades of the Civil War, 1861-1865," said tablet to be a companion to the "Lincoln" tablet erected by the above named patriotic organization and accepted by the Twenty-fourth General Assembly of the state of Colorado, and received by Governor W. E. Sweet on behalf of the state, and placed at the west entrance of the capitol building.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, By the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein:

That said bronze tablet inscribed with the said order of General John A. Logan as commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, so tendered by the Woman's Relief Corps of Colorado be and the same is hereby accepted and that when presented to the Governor of the state, he is hereby authorized to accept the same, and the said tablet be placed at the west entrance of the capitol building. January 18, 1927.

That this General Assembly favors the prompt enactment of a statute by the Congress of the United States establishing a Federal Department of Education and making the head of such department a member of the president's cabinet, and this General Assembly believes that such a department would materially advance the educational interests of the United States, and the United States senators and members of the United States House of Representatives representing the state of Colorado in the Congress of the United States are hereby earnestly requested and urged to exert their efforts to secure the passage of such legislation by the Congress, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the Senate of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, and to the Senators and Representatives of the State of Colorado in Congress. Introduced January 14, 1927.

Referred to Committee on Federal Relations January 14, 1927.

H. J. M. No. 2, by Messrs. Hill, Moffatt, Cowan and Dillon.

WHEREAS, Certain individuals and corporations are engaged in disseminating propaganda with the aim of bringing about armed intervention by the United States in Mexico for the protection of their own interests, in spite of the fact that such intervention might lead to war, and

WHEREAS, the people of Colorado are unalterably opposed to any war unless the honor of the United States has become involved or the safety of the nation has been imperiled, and

WHEREAS, there appears in the present international situation no excuse for aggressive acts or unwarranted statements by officials of the government of the United States which might lead to a break in relations between this country and Mexico;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly, the Senate concurring, that with the information we have at hand that any dispute between the United States and Mexico should be settled by arbitration rather than war and that entrance into a war at this time be averted unless the safety and honor of the nation is involved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
