Sir—In compliance with the statutes of the state of Colorado, I respectfully submit herewith the eleventh biennial report of the auditor of state for the fiscal years 1897 and 1898.

The most important feature in the financial affairs of the state for the biennial period is that, notwithstanding the conceded fact that the state has been exceedingly prosperous in all its industries, silver mining alone excepted, the valuation of taxable property as returned by the assessors, instead of showing a large increase over the years 1895 and 1896, as was estimated by my able predecessor, shows a decrease of over seventeen and a half millions of dollars.

As the appropriations made by the eleventh general assembly were largely based upon the reasonable estimates of Auditor Parks, the present auditor has been able to draw the

warrants to cover the appropriations only because of the most rigid economy which has been practiced by all the departments of the state government, and because of unexpectedly large receipts from several sources, notably from the office of the secretary of state, which collected \$51,767.50 more than estimated; the insurance department, which collected \$16,881.46 more than estimated, and receipts from "all other sources," \$13,613.01 in excess of the estimates, or a total of \$82,291.97 in excess of the estimated receipts from those three sources. While it appears that these unusual receipts have enabled the general revenue to meet all appropriations for the fiscal years 1897 and 1898, and the press of the state and the general public may have inferred from that fact that the finances of the state are in a flourishing condition, the fact is, that never before in the history of the state were they in so unsatisfactory a condition as they are at the present time. The causes which have led up to this state of affairs are many and are here stated:

The state Constitution limits the amount that may be levied for state purposes in any one year to four mills on the dollar of the taxable property of the state. From these four mills the statutes have diverted into continuing appropriations the following amounts:

Capitol building, 15-30 of a mill; maintenance of the following state institutions: State University, Agricultural College, School of Mines, Insane Asylum, and Mute and Blind Institute, 6-30 of a mill each; Normal School, 5-30 of a mill; stock inspection, 2-30 of a mill; or a total of 1 22-30 mills, which leaves but 2 8-30 mills subject to appropriation by the general assembly for general state purposes.

From the date of the admission of Colorado as a state up to the year 1891 there was a limit fixed by the statutes on the amount that might be levied "for ordinary county revenue." The statute reads as follows:

"There shall be levied and assessed upon taxable real and personal property within this state in each year the following taxes: * * * for ordinary county revenue, including the support of the poor, not more than ten mills on the dollar; for the support of schools, not less than two, nor more than five mills on the dollar; for road purposes, not more than five mills on the dollar. * * * " (Section 2245 (6), pages 742-3, G. L.)

The general assembly of 1891 enacted the following statute: "There shall be levied upon the taxable real and personal property within this state in each year the following taxes * * * for the support of schools not less than two nor more than five mills on the dollar; for ordinary county revenue such rate as will be sufficient to defray the ordinary county.

ary county expenses; for the support of the poor not more than three mills on the dollar; for road purposes not more than seven mills on the dollar; for unforeseen contingencies and casualties not more than three mills on the dollar." (L., 1891, pages 289-90.)

Thus it will be seen that while the "limit" remained as to the number of mills that might be levied for state purposes, the limit was removed as to "ordinary county revenue," and the counties were allowed to raise an additional three mills "for unforeseen contingencies and casualties."

It is evident that the framers of the Constitution intended that the general assembly should have control of the finances of the state, but the result shows that when the statute of '91 was passed, the general assembly abdicated its authority and

delegated it to the county assessors.

The full effect of the repeal of that clause of the General Statutes which fixed a limit on the amount that might be levied "for ordinary county revenue," does not seem to have been at first fully appreciated by the county assessors, or they may have been unwilling to evade the plain mandate of the law, to assess property at its "full cash value," but the enormous reductions in assessments made in some counties seem to have soon convinced the other counties that they must pursue the same course or pay an undue share of the state taxes, and from that time to the present there appears to have been a mad scramble to deprive the state and its educational and charitable institutions of their just proportion of the revenues. This has been accomplished by reducing the assessments throughout the state on an average to less than 30 per cent. of the cash value of property, according to my estimate, and increasing the levies for "ordinary county revenue" to an extent theretofore unheard of in the history of the state. It can not be claimed that the provisions of the Constitution and statutes are not explicit and mandatory upon this subject. They read as follows:

Constitution, section 3, article X.: "All taxes shall be uniform * * * and shall be levied and collected under general laws which shall prescribe such regulations as shall secure a just valuation for taxation for all property * * *."

G. S., 1883, section 2817: "All taxable property shall be listed and valued each year and shall be listed at its full cash value."

G. S., 1883, section 2830: "* * * The term 'full cash value' means the amount at which the property would be appraised if taken in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor."

With the foregoing provisions as a plain guide to the faithful discharge of their duties, and notwithstanding the large in-

crease in population and rapid accumulation of wealth in the last few years, which are the pride of every citizen of the state, the valuation of the taxable property of the state as returned by the assessors, has fallen off from \$238,722,417.05 in 1893 to \$192,324,080 in 1898—a net reduction of \$46,398,337.05. Assuming that the value of the taxable property of the state is no greater than in 1893, this indicates a loss to the general revenue of the state of \$104,793.16, and to each of the educational and charitable institutions of the state of over \$9,000 annually.

The manner in which the state and its institutions have managed to survive the loss of this great amount of necessary revenue is as follows:

The general assembly, recognizing that there was not sufficient general revenue in sight to meet all the necessary demands upon it, has felt compelled to cut down the appropriations for the several state institutions to such an extent that they have been seriously crippled in their usefulness, and in several instances have been compelled to appeal to the governor of the state to relieve them by authorizing the issuance of "additional indebtedness" as provided for by law. In other instances debts incurred for the necessary food and other supplies for inmates of penal and charitable institutions were furnished by merchants and the bills were presented and settled out of the appropriations of subsequent years. The State Reformatory is an example of this method of running on credit. When the present warden took charge he found that over one-third of the appropriation for two years had been exhausted in less than six months, a considerable part of it for old bills carried over.

The State Insane Asylum is a striking example of the necessity for larger appropriations for its proper support. There was a deficit in '95 and '96 of \$32,818.52 which the eleventh general assembly provided for by appropriation out of the excess revenues of 1895 and 1896. The institution began the biennial period of '97 and '98 with a special appropriation for maintenance of \$30,000.00 and its 1/5 mill tax, which had only theretofore been regarded as available when collected, and which was collected and paid to the amount of \$29,957.52. It developed early that these sums would be very far from adequate to meet the necessary expenses of said institution and that the credit system, with the consequent higher cost of supplies, appeared to be the only resource. After a careful examination of the law I took the ground that the asylum might anticipate its revenues in the same manner as the state, and this opinion being confirmed by the at-

torney general, I have drawn interest bearing warrants for that institution in settlement of approved vouchers to the extent of all the anticipated revenues for 1897 and 1898. It is to be hoped that the twelfth general assembly will take notice of this fact when making its appropriation for the asylum maintenance because their receipts from revenue collected in the coming years will be very small.

Another manner in which the state has, in common parlance, been "running behind," is shown in its failure to meet current obligations imposed by the statutes. The law of 1885, section 12, provides that when infected stock are killed by order of the veterinary board the Auditor shall draw his warrant, upon presentation of the proper voucher, in payment for the same. There are now on file in the Auditor's office claims of this character to the amount of \$2,420.50 for which the general assembly has made no appropriation.

An act approved April 8, 1893, provides for payment of bounties for the destruction of coyotes, wolves and mountain lions; but as the tenth general assembly failed to make sufficient appropriation for '95 and '96 and the eleventh general assembly made no appropriation whatever for the purpose, there are now on file in this office claims to the amount of \$11,618.00 and probably over \$8,000.00 not yet presented. It appears that both of these classes of claims are lawful and just, but the Auditor is prohibited from issuing warrants by the wise provision of the Constitution contained in article 5, section 33, which reads as follows:

"No money shall be paid out of the treasury except upon appropriations made by law, and on warrants drawn by the proper officer in pursuance thereof."

The following is the law which provides for the issuance of certificates of indebtedness:

"In all cases where the laws recognize a claim for money against the state, and no appropriation shall have been made by law to pay the same, the auditor shall audit and adjust the same, and when the said claim shall have been approved by the governor and attorney general, he shall give the claimant a certificate to the amount thereof, under his official seal if demanded, and shall report the same to the general assembly, with as little delay as possible, giving a statement in tabular form of the number, date of issue, and the amount of each certificate, and for what purpose issued.

* * * " (Mills, pages 1149 and 1150, section 1829.)

It seems to be the intent of the foregoing law that each general assembly should provide for the redemption of such certificates as had been issued in the last previous biennial period.

This was done previous to 1895. But neither the tenth nor eleventh general assemblies made any appropriation for such purpose, and there are now outstanding certificates of indebtedness to the amount of \$42,452.61, which should be provided for by the twelfth general assembly.

There are also quite a number of just claims against the state the amount of which it is difficult to estimate which extend back over a period of six or eight years, mostly for services rendered by state officials whose claims have never been adjusted because the law was not, at the time they were presented, as well understood as it has been since the supreme court rendered its decision in the Hegwer case. Until the general assembly makes an appropriation for this purpose no warrants can be drawn for the settlement of these claims for the reason that the revenues have been exhausted for the years in which the several indebtednesses were incurred.

The deficits which the twelfth general assembly should provide for are as follows:

Since the admission of the state into the Union there has been appropriated by the general assembly, from the internal improvement funds, for the construction of buildings and for other purposes at the various state institutions, the sum of \$262,584.96. By a decision of the supreme court rendered May 3, 1897, which is reported in 24 Colorado, page 247, such appropriations were declared illegal. Hereafter the general revenue will have to furnish the means for all such necessary improvements.

The urgent needs of the State University, the Insane Asylum, the Reformatory and other state institutions, are set forth in their reports. It is hoped that some means will be found to meet their reasonable requirements without overburdening the taxpayers of the state.

In considering the imperative demands which will be made upon the general revenue for the next two years it should not be overlooked that in '99 \$60,000.00 will have to be taken from said revenue to provide for the first installment of a sinking fund to pay off the first issue of \$300,000.00 of capitol building bonds which mature in 1905.

A careful consideration of the estimates of expenditures for the fiscal years 1899 and 1900, which will be found on pages 14, 15, taken in connection with the deficiencies existing, and the urgent needs for increased facilities for the different state institutions, will show that notwithstanding any savings that can be made in the way of reduction of salaries or the discharge of superfluous officers and employés in the legislature, in the executive and judicial departments of the state government, in the state institutions, or any savings that may be made in any other manner, will not obviate the necessity for providing some means by which the state may be able to get its share of the revenues derived from taxation.

In my judgment there is a reasonable and practicable method of compelling the assessors to increase the valuation of taxable property of the state to that extent which will permit the general assembly to provide for all just demands against the general revenue.

I recommend that a law be placed on the statute books fixing such a limit on the amounts that may be raised "for ordinary county revenue" as will necessitate the assessment of property at its "actual cash value," as now required by law. Such a law should divide the counties into as many classes as are necessary and determine the class to which each belongs, taking into consideration the number of mills on the dollar which have been assessed each year for, say, the last five years, "for ordinary county revenue" in each county of the state.

I will be able to furnish the necessary statistics on this subject by the time the twelfth general assembly convenes.

The following opinion of the supreme court of Colorado was unknown to me until after my biennial report had been in other respects completed. It can be found in the 53 Pacific Reporter, pages 1056, 1057 and 1058:

"It is not our province to legislate, but the startling disclosures which the governor's communication contains justify us in saying that one effectual remedy * * * the general assembly may furnish. A law containing suitable provisions for its enforcement might be passed restricting the boards of county commissioners to a low mill levy in providing for the support of county, municipal, and district government for public schools.

If the county assessors shall still refuse to perform their plain duty, as the communication claims they now do, but persist in violating their oath by assessing property at less than its full cash value, the county commissioners would be obliged to increase their valuation of taxable property in order to meet local expenses, and thus the state would get the benefit of the increased valuation for state purposes."

The suggestion is offered that the twelfth general assembly submit to the supreme court these two questions: First, whether the salaries and expenses pertaining to the office of state superintendent of public instruction may not legally be paid out of the income from the public school fund, which, if done, would be a saving of \$13,000.00 annually to the general revenue. Second, whether all that part of the salaries and expenses connected with the office of the state land board, which are now paid out of the general revenue, may not be pro rated and paid out of the income from the various public lands under the control of said board. If this can be done it will save to the general revenue \$14,500.00 annually.

The eleventh general assembly provided in the general appropriation bill for an auditing board, consisting of the governor, attorney general and auditor, to have "the control and direction" of the contingent fund. Said board has saved to the state several thousand dollars, and I recommend the establishment by general law of a similar board, and that no favoritism be shown, but that all the expenses of whatever nature, aside from salaries fixed by law, of every department and bureau of the state government, be put under its control.

I call attention to the recent decision of Judge Riner in re horizontal reduction of assessment. In 1896, the board of county commissioners of Arapahoe county made what is generally termed a horizontal reduction of 50 per cent. on the assessment for said county as returned by the assessor for that year. Said reduction amounted to \$81,937,080.00 on which the state tax of 4 mills would have yielded to the state \$64,800.00 more than was actually received. Other county boards have also made horizontal reductions, notably Pitkin and El Paso counties. According to Judge Riner's decision all such reductions were illegal and the state could recover large sums by instituting suits for that purpose. I have refrained from instituting such suits for the reason that in the case of Arapahoe especially, the payment of the tax illegally withheld would work a great hardship upon the taxpayers of said county, inasmuch as if compelled to pay the amount of the tax upon the base of the original assessment, it is very patent that they would pay far beyond their rightful

share of the taxes for state purposes. In other words, while the state probably has a technical or legal claim against said county, it does not appear to me that it has as equitable claim as compared with the assessments made in other counties. The passage of the law herein before mentioned, fixing a limit on levies for "ordinary county revenue," would obviate such difficulties.

A decent respect for the opinions of the press and the public will require the twelfth general assembly to make careful investigation as to the number and compensation of officers and employés of the general assembly and all other departments of the state government and the state institutions, with the view of reducing expenses wherever it can be done without injury to the public service. That something can and should be done in that direction, is beyond question. But a careful and wise consideration of the subject will reveal the fact that there is but a small fragment of the waste and extravagance that has been charged. It is to be hoped that any law which may be passed upon the subject at the coming session may not be open to criticism made upon the bill before the eleventh, to wit: that it was "a bill to dispense with the services of half of the women employés of the state and reduce the salaries of the balance."

One of the wise sayings of the humorist, Josh Billings, is that he "never hearn tell of any feller that hankered after some biled crow two times." I have never heard of any man who wanted to fill the office of auditor of state for a second term. Leaving out of consideration other reasons, the pay is contemptible compared with the compensation of all other state officials. As my predecessors have repeatedly called the attention of the general assembly to this question of the auditor's salary, it is perhaps useless to say more upon the subject, but I venture to quote what Auditors Parks and Goodykoontz say concerning it:

(Parks.) "The salary of auditor should be increased in proportion to the dignity and responsibility of the office. It is one of the curiosities of legislation that the deputy auditor receives the same salary as the principal, while the deputy superintendent of insurance receives a greater salary; yet the auditor in both cases is the responsible head of the department."

(Goodykoontz.) "No state official is burdened with more real responsibility nor obliged to bear more unmerited abuse and blame, nor driven with more onerous and exacting duties, nor forced to keep a closer or severer guard over delicate and conflicting interests, than the auditor of state. None of the elective officers of the state are so poorly remunerated. In importance, responsibility and official demands, no state office

ranks higher. The present salary of the auditor is \$2,500.00. It should be raised to at least \$4,000.00 and I would so recommend to the next general assembly."

I recommend as a measure of protection to the financial interests of the state that the general assembly provide by law for periodical examinations of the accounts of all state officials who collect fees or moneys belonging to the state. It is an anomalous thing that the auditor's and treasurer's accounts, each of which is a check upon the other, should require examination, and vet the accounts of the secretary of state, which show collections of state moneys for the last biennial period of nearly \$132,000, should not be inspected at all. The accounts of the state boiler inspector is another striking example. He collects about \$5,000 a year and yet there is absolutely no check on his accounts. A dishonest inspector might misappropriate almost any share of the receipts of his office and escape detection. I do not wish it to be understood as reflecting upon the integrity of either of the above mentioned state officials, now in office. I believe they have discharged their duties with fidelity and integrity.

The attention of the general assembly is respectfully called to the sixteenth annual report of the deputy superintendent of insurance and especially to his recommendation as to a general revision of the insurance laws of the state.

In retiring from public life as I gladly do in the near future, I feel that I can in no other way do so worthy an act for the public good as by doing whatever is in my power to bring to the knowledge of the general assembly and the public the great wrong that is being done to the good name of the state and the rank injustice that is being done to the state's creditors by the failure to provide for the payment of the long past due indebtedness represented by the outstanding warrants of 1887, 1888 and 1889.

It is the one blot upon the proud escutcheon of our glorious commonwealth.

Twice constitutional amendments providing for the funding of this just debt have been presented to the electors of the state for their ratification and each time the amendments were defeated. In each instance only a minority of the electors voted either for or against the proposition. It is reasonable to presume that the small vote cast was partly due to neglect or indifference and partly to want of sufficient information upon the questions presented to satisfy the electors that they could vote intelligently.

But it is believed that the facts are becoming better understood, that partisan feeling will no longer be arrayed against so equitable a measure, and that the powerful influence of the public press will be arrayed in its support. The two false issues so sedulously put before the minds of the voters, that those warrants represent the extravagance of the seventh general assembly and that they are "excess warrants," have disappeared under the light of the facts, and it is hoped that no citizen will again attempt to revive them. I earnestly ask the candid consideration of all who have the welfare and good name of the state at heart to the following significant fact: that every living governor or ex-governor of the state, as well as every prominent state official for several years, and every judge and exjudge of the higher courts of the state, is in favor of providing for the payment of these warrants. I go further and say, that I believe that any unprejudiced citizen of the state who will take the necessary pains to investigate will take the same stand.

In conclusion, I gratefully acknowledge the many courtesies for which I am indebted to your excellency and other state officials and heartily commend the fidelity and ability of my subordinates as follows:
