47 Small Loan Act—Requires licenses for those who loan under \$300.00 on which charges are to exceed 12% per annum, but exempts banks, building and loan associations, credit unions, pawnbrokers and commercial loans to dealers holding personal property for resale; \$50.00 initial fee provided and graduated additional fee; violations are subject to a maximum penalty of \$300.00 fine and 30 days imprisononment or both, and in addition licenses can be revoked or suspended; bank commissioner charged with administration of act, and he must examine licensees at least once a year, and can make regulations and orders; maximum rate of charge on loans is 3½% per month, to and including loans of \$150.00, and thereafter 21/2% per month to and including loans of \$300.00; methods for computing charges are prescribed, as well as for payments, receipts, etc.; borrowers secured by tangible property can be required to insure same; specific provisions as to wage purchases limit assignment of earnings to 10%; aggrieved persons can appeal from commissioner's orders or act to the district court.

127 Conveyances of Lots by Cities and Towns— Amends present statutes to provide that certain defective conveyances of unclaimed real estate made by city or town authorities prior to January 18, 1943, if made to associations or corporations, are validated by this act.

The statute incorporates the loan requirements of the Federal Housing Act and abolishes the initial loan service charge. Directors can fix, each six months, the rate of dividend for limited certificate holders, provided 30 days notice is first given of any decrease. Certain ration requirements are made between permanent stock and share investments. Salaries of personnel of department are fixed.

Income Taxes-Amends present statutes pri-291 marily by providing for a moratorium for members of the armed forces until one year after the termination of the present war; provides further for an exemption of \$200 in respect to the imposition of the present surtax of 2% imposed upon intangibles, and changes the method of imposing the surtax on estates, trusts and partnerships; revises the methods of collection of the tax and gives the state the power to distrain on personal property; makes numerous minor technical changes and clarifies ambiguous sections of the present law; substantive changes, however, apply only to taxable years commencing after December 31, 1942.

293 Unemployment Compensation — Amends existing statutes mainly to clarify procedure. The measure for the duration of benefits, the basis for defining employers and for determining their rate of tax, and the administrative set-up are all treated by this act. An unemployment compensation fund is established from contributions, interest, fines and penalties, and other sources, which fund is placed under the custody and administration of the state treasurer, subject to the control of the department. An advisory council, to be appointed by the governor from certain personnel, is created, which is to assist in formulating policies and approve expenditures from the Unemployment Revenue Fund. Inductees taken into military service between January 1, 1940, and July 1, 1943, may file a claim for benefits under the act.

300 Sales Tax—Provides mainly for a limitation of three years within which any action to collect delinquent sales taxes may be taken, from the date the same have become due and payable, except in the case of false or fradulent returns with intent to evade the tax, action may be begun at any time.
