## EXECUTIVE ORDER

### CONTINUING THE SUSPENSION OF STATUTES, RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF HIRING AND FISCAL PROCEDURES RELATING TO DISASTER RECOVERY ACTION

WHEREAS, a disaster emergency situation exists in the counties of Moffat, Pitkin, Routt, Rio Blanco, Mesa, Garfield, Montrose, Delta, Gunnison, San Miguel, Ouray, and Eagle under proclamations dated May 18, 23, 25, June 20, 27, July 13, 23, 25, and August 27, 1984; and *orig & ext*

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has declared a disaster for said counties; and

WHEREAS, strict compliance with State regulatory statutes, orders, rules and regulations would prevent, hinder or delay necessary action in coping with this disaster emergency; and

WHEREAS, the suspension of said statutes, orders, rules and regulations is necessary for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the general public; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to expeditiously utilize all available resources of the State as are reasonably required to cope with the disaster emergency and those of the Federal government for which the State is eligible as a result of this disaster emergency; and

WHEREAS, the resources provided under the President's declaration require expeditious handling by State officials with special expertise concerning State and Federal disaster emergency regulatory procedures; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Disaster Emergency Services has developed procedures for managing State and Federal resources in times of disaster emergency,

NOW, THEREFORE, to implement my proclamations of May 18, 23, 25; June 20, 27; July 13, 23, 25 and August 27, 1984, I, Richard D. Lamm, Governor of the State of Colorado, under powers vested in me under C.R.S. 24-33.5-704 and 24-33.5-1102 of the Disaster Emergency Act and all other enabling provisions, do hereby continue the suspension of the operation of orders, statutes, rules and
