Utility Bill Payments For Limited Income Households.

Helped more than 110,000 households pay their energy bill last year

Energy Efficiency Measures For Affordable Housing.

Funded the installation of energy assistance measures in more than 1,000 affordable housing units last year.

Kathy R., who received a new energy-efficient furnace: "The kind of help I needed was just too much to ask family or friends who have already given so much. With the bills piling up, I was feeling really hopeless. If I can't keep my house, where would I go?"

Conservation Education And Outreach.

The New Reality Of Colorado's Energy Affordability: It Takes A Full Spectrum Of Programs To Help All Coloradans Afford Home Energy.


Energy Assistance = Utility Bill Payments + Energy Efficiency Measures + Conservation Education + Advocacy

Across the state, costs for home energy, health care, child care and housing are climbing. As a result, many Colorado households are struggling to cover their basic living expenses.

Energy Outreach Colorado was established in 1989 to raise funds for energy assistance for low-income families. Today, the growing problem of energy not being affordable for many households is requiring more comprehensive solutions.

To that end, Energy Outreach Colorado is working with more than 100 partner agencies in Colorado to provide a variety of programs to help families remain safe, healthy and warm in their homes. These include utility bill payments, energy efficiency upgrades for affordable housing and non-profit residential facilities, home energy savings kits, energy conservation programs for schools and community outreach organizations, and advocating for progressive energy policies that keep energy prices affordable and new energy programs accessible for the thousands of Colorado families that we serve.

Home energy prices are volatile and steadily increasing. Government energy assistance funding is not enough. Low-income families are paying more out of their pocket for energy costs every year.




Percent Of Gas And Electric Bill Covered By LEAP

A low-income family's energy burden – the portion of their income that is spent on home energy costs – is increasing dramatically as energy costs are rising. On average, low-income families in Colorado are spending 20 cents out of every dollar they earn on energy, leaving less money for food, shelter and healthcare. The most vulnerable families are spending half of their very limited income on home energy.

Advocacy For Affordable Energy Policies To Support Safe, Healthy And Affordable Housing.


Regulatory Activities at the Colorado Public Utilities Commission

- Saved Colorado ratepayers up to \$12 million through an Xcel Energy rate case intervention.
- Participated in rule-making proceedings seeking protection for low-income consumers.
- Generated energy assistance funding to be included in agreements for utility mergers and decommissioning of a nuclear power plant.
- Reduced proposed residential late fees and targeted the funds toward energy assistance programs.

Legislative Activities

- Secured unclaimed utility deposits and refunds for energy assistance.
- Oversaw passage of the Low Income Energy Assistance Act, a voluntary donation program through utility companies serving Colorado.
- Increased legal options available to the Colorado Public Utilities Commission to assist low-income consumers through rate structures or rule making.
- Increased state and federal funding for energy assistance and energy efficiency programs.

Energy Outreach Colorado is proud that we have been able to spend an average of 95 cents from each dollar raised for programs to assist Colorado families in need.



The Impact of Unaffordable Energy Costs

Many limited income households take perilous actions in order to pay their energy bills, including:

- Skipping meals
- Forgoing medications or medical care
- Suffering from excessive cold or heat
- Using unsafe methods for heat, such as a kitchen oven or space heater
- Abandoning a home

Several well-regarded community indicators point to the increasing need for energy assistance.



Statewide Homeless Count

A study was conducted in the summer of 2006 by the Graduate School of Public Affairs, University of Colorado at the Denver and Health Sciences Center.

When asked why families with children were homeless: 58% stated abuse violence in the home **56% stated utility costs (the 2nd highest response)** 33% stated lost job

Also, in families without children, 44% indicated utility costs contributed to their homelessness.

Mile High United Way – 211 Reports

Calls to the 211 emergency assistance referral program offered by Mile High United Way in the Denver metro area indicate that requests for utility assistance are second only to requests for rental assistance. The number of requests for utility assistance are increasing each year.

Colorado Needs More Energy Assistance Funding

Through increased fund-raising efforts, Energy Outreach Colorado is committing more funding to address these impacts. However, more funding is needed to meet the overall need for energy assistance in the state.

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
Recommendations

To address the increasing energy assistance needs of low-income Colorado families, Energy Outreach Colorado requests the support of the entire community. Some solutions we are working on to address this problem include:

- Additional funding for all energy assistance programs, both from the federal government and in Colorado. Current government and independent programs are not sufficient to meet the growing demands and critical impacts.
- Colorado needs a permanent source of energy assistance funding so that the average benefit for clients can be more consistent from year to year.
- One in five Colorado families is currently eligible for assistance but only one third of those families apply for assistance. Additional outreach about the availability of the programs is needed.

Conclusions

- Colorado's geographic diversity requires availability of energy assistance on a year round basis. It must cover all fuel types, including bulk fuels.
- Energy assistance can prevent or at least postpone other family hardships, reducing • demands on other social services.
- Long term prevention of the problem (efficiency and conservation) is effective and timely. We need to combine utility bill payments, efficiency upgrades and education whenever we can.
- Progressive energy policies will provide much needed relief in the struggle to keep the lights and heat on in the homes of low-income citizens.
