






There are 15 majestic 14ers, amidst countless other peaks rimming this valley. It's all an invitation to play.





Winters in Buena Vista and Salida are unique! The valley floor typically does not hold snow, allowing for hiking, biking and fishing year-round but the mountains get 300+ inches.











Do Colorado Right

More than ever before, travelers are invested in taking care of the places they visit. We've made that easy to do in Colorado with this basic guidance—the Care for Colorado Leave No Trace Principles.



Know Before You Go

- Our state and federal agencies manage 42 percent of Colorado's majestic landscape, and our cities and counties maintain even more. Learn about and respect the spaces we all share.
- Stay back from the pack. Find your way to less-visited and offpeak destinations to minimize down time and maximize your connection with special places.
- Bring along reusable water bottles or hotdrink tumblers to limit waste and stay hydrated in our dry climate.

Stick To Trails

 With thousands of trails and campsites, there's no need to venture beyond.
 By sticking to these areas and camping at least 200 feet from lakes, rivers and streams, you're helping natural areas stay natural. Even though shortcuts can be tempting, please don't take them. A few extra strides on the path will protect plants and the homes of the true locals.

Keep Wildlife Wild

- Colorado is home to tens of thousands of furry, scaly and feathered creatures. To keep them — and you safe, don't approach them.
- Feeding wild animals could alter their natural behaviors, exposing them to predators or even euthanasia.
- Keep your furry buddies leashed when enjoying dog-friendly trails, and pack out their waste all the way to a trash can.

Trash the Trash

 Pack it in, pack it out. Or pick it up to leave a place better than you found it.
 Put litter, even crumbs, peels and cores in your nearest waste/recycling bin. Wash yourself, your dog or whatever else needs cleaning at least 200 feet from waterways, and use biodegradable soap. A bubble bath is no treat for fish.

Leave It As You Find It

- Leave plants, rocks and historical items as you find them so others experience the joy of discovery.
- Any of our 2,000 different species of wildflowers will live forever in a photo. Snap away, but only with a camera.
- Colorado is beautiful all on its own. Building structures or campsites on public land isn't cool. Keep it pristine for everyone to enjoy.
- Treat all living things with respect. Carving or hacking plants and trees may kill or disfigure them.

Be Careful With Fire

- Colorado's low humidity has perks, but can create dry, dangerous conditions.
 Keep campfires small and manageable to avoid sparking wildfires.
- When putting out a fire, water it until you can handle the embers. Never let a fire burn unattended.
- Use care when smoking in Colorado's dry climate. Always put cigarettes out completely, and don't leave your butts behind.
- Always check for local fire restrictions.

Share Our Trails & Parks

- Chances are you're not out in nature to people-watch, so try out the lesserknown paths and sites.
- Silence your cellphone before stepping into nature, and speak softly without using the speaker function.
- Be considerate when passing others on the trails and yield to the uphill hiker and biker — they need the momentum.
- Listen to nature. Keep your voice and music soft so all can enjoy the peace of Colorado.







Ski Resorts



If the Rocky Mountains are Colorado's defining geographic feature, skiing and snowboarding must be its signature winter activities. Colorado is the No. 1 destination for skiing and riding in the country.

Home to such a diversity of ski areas and resorts, Colorado offers some of the most epic trails and thrilling rides you'll find in the world. From easy greens to black diamonds, there's plenty of ways to max out your snow fun — no matter your skill and experience level.

Find more to explore in Colorado, where 28 ski resorts offer something for everyone.



1. Arapahoe Basin

Known for having one of the longest ski seasons in North America (mid-October to early June), A-Basin also boasts North America's highest elevation terrain park, the sustainable Snow Plume Refuge with il Rifugio bistro and panoramic views.

2. Aspen Highlands

When new snow at Aspen Highlands reaches mammoth proportions, you're in for an epic day of Colorado's signature light-and-dry powder. Insiders at the ski area recommend studying the trail map to find hidden gems that drop into gladed, untouched expert areas.

3. Aspen Mountain

While Aspen is known throughout the world as a posh winter playground, more skiers are discovering the mountain's challenging double blacks and chutes and amazing-view dining — all steps from downtown Aspen.

4. Beaver Creek

BC charms with heated moving walkways, a first-tracks program for early risers, a white-carpet club and acres of corduroy. The McCoy Park expansion brings two new lifts, 17 new trails and 250 more skiable acres.

5. Breckenridge

Breck is beloved for its variety of terrain across five peaks. The resort was one of the first to allow snowboarding, and its terrain parks are first rate. The super chair on Peak 7 has visitors anxious to try new, wide-open terrain.

6. Buttermilk

With a reputation as a great venue for beginner skiers and snowboarders, Buttermilk's wide, rolling trails are ideal for those just getting their snow legs. For two decades, it has been the home of ESPN's Winter X Games.

7. Cooper

Cooper's soft, all-natural snow and sweeping runs follow some of the same trails near Leadville used for training by WWII's 10th Mountain Division soldiers. It's popular for those looking for a low-stress ski holiday and often still has fresh powder days after a storm.

8. Copper Mountain

Mother Nature arranged Copper's slopes so that beginner, intermediate and expert runs are clustered with like-leveled terrain, ensuring beginners won't make a surprise trip down a too-steep run. New family-friendly adventure zones sweeten the deal.

9. Crested Butte Mountain


Crested Butte has it all: wideopen green and blue trails, expert bowls, plenty of unexplored lines and uncrowded slopes. Make time to explore one of the state's most colorful and beloved ski towns.

10. Echo Mountain

The closest to Denver, Echo Mountain near Idaho Springs is an affordable option with six trails on 60 acres of mostly intermediate terrain. For those who can't get there in daylight, the slopes are open til 9pm for skiing under the stars (and lights).

11. Eldora Mountain

Proximity to Boulder and Denver is one reason Eldora is known as a "locals' mountain." Terrain to keep the whole family busy doesn't hurt, and neither does nearly 40 kilometers of cross-country and snowshoe trails steps from the downhill ski area.



12. Granby Ranch

Fun lesson programs, an easy pace and affordable prices make this a long-time family ski area. There's no better place to wind down at the end of the day than the fire pit, where the hot cocoa flows.

13. Hesperus

West of Durango, Hesperus has been a great option in the southwest since 1962, and it's the region's largest night-skiing operation. Hesperus' unassuming, small-ski-area ambiance makes its 26 trails and 60 acres an idyllic winter escape.

14. Howelsen Hill

Open since 1915 in Steamboat Springs, Howelsen is the state's oldest ski area, has the largest natural ski-jumping complex in North America and has long been a training ground for Olympic skiers. It's also one of a few resorts to offer night skiing.

15. Kendall Mountain

Situated in Silverton, this mountain is loved by locals for its family-friendly ambiance. The ski area has four groomed trails, a small terrain park and tree skiing. Off-the-slope activities include ice skating, snowshoeing and cross-country skiing.

16. Keystone

Keystone boasts three peaks full of bowls, steeps, trails, cat skiing and one of the longest ski days — watch the sun set at 11,000 feet. The resort's Kids Ski Free program is a showstopper, along with snow tubing, ice skating and sleigh rides.

17. Loveland

Loveland loves to brag about its average 422 inches of snow each season, more than any other Front Range ski area, and it offers excellent early-season conditions each year. Another thing to boast about is free snowcat skiing in the Dry Gulch area.

18. Monarch Mountain

Perched atop the Continental Divide, Monarch is a top spot for fresh powder. A close-in parking lot, roomy slopes and laid-back attitudes make it a hit with families. Ride to the top of the Panorama Lift for 360-degree views of the divide.

19. Powderhorn Mountain

This resort near Grand Junction in Mesa has one of the most unique views in ski country. Located on the Grand Mesa, the largest flattop mountain in the world, skiers and riders will see something more like the Grand Canyon than the typical alpine view.

20. Purgatory

Purgatory's unintimidating slopes, free kids season passes, mountain coaster and Pinkerton starter terrain park make it a hit with families in Durango. Within its boundaries are 101 trails, five terrain parks and 35,000 acres of snowcat playland.

21. Silverton Mountain

Silverton's motto is "All thrills, no frills" — and it's not kidding. Colorado's highest and steepest ski mountain serves up ungroomed, no-easy-way-down expert terrain. Guided and heli-skiing are top ways to take advantage of the terrain (reservations required).

22. Snowmass

At 4,406 feet, "Snowmassive" has one of the highest vertical rises and some of the longest runs of any ski area in the country — miles of peaceful schussing before you have to think about a lift line. A new base village offers ice skating, chic lodging and après-ski hot spots.



24. Sunlight Mountain

Affordability and a mix of terrain are Sunlight's hallmarks. Hundreds of acres of mild greens, intermediates and black-diamond extremes satisfy all abilities. Proximity to Glenwood's hot springs lets you reward ski muscles' big day with a long soak.

25. Telluride

26. Vail

Vail sets the standard for North American ski resorts. With seven back bowls, 195 trails and a staggering 5,317 skiable acres, it's one of the nation's largest resorts. And don't forget luxury accommodations, shopping, dining and tons of off-slope activities.

27. Winter Park

Find diverse terrain, deep snow, topnotch lodging and dining, and a new high-speed gondola that gets skiers onto the powder quicker than ever. Hop on the Winter Park Express train at Denver's Union Station, which runs right to the Winter Park base area.

28. Wolf Creek

Famous for the most snow of any Colorado resort, Pagosa Springs' Wolf Creek sees an astounding annual average of 430 natural inches for powder floaters. Feel-good bonus: It's the country's first ski destination to run entirely on renewable energy.

Scenic Drives

These leafy routes get you close to gorgeous fall foliage.

Dallas Divide Head west from Ridgway on CO 62 over the Dallas Divide to Telluride. Unimpeded views of the Sneffels Range line the route with an apron of aspens.

Kebler Pass Drive west out of Crested Butte on County Road 12. The ruddy colors of the Ruby Range make for a radiant contrast with the golden aspens below.

Grand Junction to Grand Mesa Go east on I-70 along the Colorado River to see glowing cottonwoods. At CO 65, go east and then south to the Grand Mesa for brilliant aspens. Cottonwood Pass Down Cottonwood Pass Road west of Buena Vista, enter an aspen-laden valley to see the fickleness of fall — one slope gold, another still a shade of summer green.

CO 17 From Antonito, drive up the serene Conejos River Valley, where pinyon trees give way to aspens. Some of the oldest and tallest aspens in the state can be seen near La Manga Pass.

Poudre Canyon Take CO 14 west of Fort Collins to the top of Cameron Pass, a low forested saddle on the way to Rocky Mountain National Park. Views stretch down into the North Park basin near Walden.

Frontier Pathways Head west out of Pueblo on CO 96. The route climbs into the Wet Mountain Valley, passing aspens blazing with color along the way.

Highway of Legends The La Veta to Trinidad route on CO 12 begs to be photographed as it wraps around the Spanish Peaks amid tracts of pine, scrub oak and aspen.

Take a Ride

Get out of the car to see our oranges, yellows and reds up close.

Ballooning Hundreds of feet up in the crisp Colorado air, the colors unfold below in a seemingly unending canvas of yellow and gold.




With 42 percent of our 100,000 square miles made up of public lands, it's easy to find an adventure in our 43 state parks, four national parks, nine national monuments and other public lands.

FRAME PHOTOS THROUGH MCINNIS CANYONS NATIONAL CONSERVATION AREA ARCHES.

North America's second-largest concentration of natural arches can be found near Grand Junction. There are no paved roads, but 4x4 trails and a rugged hike can lead prepared adventurers to red-rock arches, spires and rock bridges.

Public Land



WATCH FOR WILDLIFE IN THE **MOUNT ZIRKEL WILDERNESS. It**

may seem as though this remote area near Clark would lure only the most experienced trekkers. But gradual rises in elevation make it a good first-time (albeit well-prepared) backpacking or snowshoeing adventure, with almost guaranteed moose and elk sightings.

SOAK UP THE PROFOUND QUIET OF THE SNOWY BLACK CANYON OF THE GUNNISON NATIONAL

PARK. When the snow falls each winter, unplowed South Rim Road becomes a track for snowshoers and cross-country skiers who make their way across pristine powder to a canyon overlook east of Montrose.

FEEL TRUE HIGH-DESERT ENCHANTMENT AT JOHN MARTIN RESERVOIR STATE

PARK. In winter, watch snow geese migrate in formation and glide into the water. Summer months are ideal for sunrises over the dew-covered plains near Las Animas.

SPY WILDLIFE ALONG THE **RIVER'S EDGE IN BROWNS** PARK NATIONAL WILDLIFE

REFUGE. About as northwest as you can get and still be in Colorado, Browns Park sits in a valley 60 miles west of Maybell. Solitude-seeking hunters, fishers,

photographers and campers commune on lands once home to Fort Davy Crockett.

GAZE AT A SEA OF SWAYING SHORTGRASS IN PAWNEE NATIONAL GRASSLAND. Two

300-foot-high mesas visible from miles around, dubbed the "sentinels of the plains" by author James Michener, are the companions of pronghorn, covotes, kit foxes, hawks and falcons, located west of Sterling.

FOLLOW THE LOST CREEK WILDERNESS. Lost Creek's

red-rock formations near Bailey aren't as dramatic as those at better-known spots, but there are a whole lot more of them. Many of the domes, knobs and spires have eroded in such a way that creeks seem to disappear between their hidden crevices hence the name. Visit Colorado. com/Wilderness to find others.

ENJOY THE QUIET CHARMS OF THE FLAT TOPS WILDERNESS.

Some of the state's least-traveled roads wind through 200,000 acres of lush river valleys, alpine tundra and sheer cliffs between Yampa, Meeker, Glenwood Springs, Hayden and Craig. Peep the views at Trappers Lake, Dunckley Pass and Devils Causeway. Visit Colorado.com/ Wilderness to find others.

TAKE IN A SUNSET IN BROWNS **CANYON NATIONAL MONUMENT.**

Watch as the changing light of day alters the hues of the canyon walls and rock formations, often compared to cathedral spires, along the monument's many backcountry trails near Buena Vista, Explore on horseback, or opt for snowshoeing and crosscounty skiing in the winter.

RAFT THE TUMBLING RAPIDS OF THE CACHE LA POUDRE

RIVER. Colorado's only nationally designated Wild and Scenic River carves down Poudre Canyon through narrow sections flanked by alpine mountainsides and natural rock cliffs west of Fort Collins. The triumph of paddling over a rapid named Devil's Staircase is second only to the views and the chance to spot bighorn sheep and deer scampering along its rocky hills.

FEEL THE FIRST LINE TUG OF A WALLEYE AT NORTH STERLING STATE PARK. Fishers relish

lazy summer days perched on the shore, surrounded by wide-open short-grass prairie near Sterling. One of the state's warm-water fisheries, North Sterling sends anglers back to their campsites with more than fish tales — walleye, catfish, largemouth bass, rainbow trout, bluegill, northern pike and yellow perch are on the menu.

NAVIGATE COLORADO

Colorado is the eighth-largest state in the U.S., measuring 380 miles east to west and 280 miles north to south. Yes, that's more than 100,000 total square miles to explore. Luckily, with so much to see and do, Colorado is very easy to navigate. The itineraries starting on page 84 will give you ideas for exploring each corner of the state — and everywhere in between. Turn to page 32 for a map of Colorado State Parks and national parks.








Adaptable Access to Public Lands

Many national parks and monuments provide wheelchair-accessible touring information (including special ones for exploring the Great Sand Dunes). Colorado National Monument and Mesa Verde National Park both offer accessible campsites, picnic areas and trails, and audio and/or visual tours. Colorado Parks & Wildlife (cpw.state.co.us) offers the Columbine Pass, which provides reduced park-entrance fees to Colorado residents with different abilities. The parks have accessible fishing locations across the state and offer people with disabilities hunting accommodations and services. Requests can also be made for sign-language interpretation and assistive-listening equipment. Wheelchair-accessible trails across the state can be found using the Colorado Trail Explorer app at trails.colorado.gov. Find other ideas at Colorado.com/Adaptive.

1. Go Spotting

STATE BIRD: lark bunting. Found on the eastern plains and up to 8,000 feet in elevation. Good opportunities include the shade trees in town in Kit Carson as well as from the Big Sandy Creek bridge, Terry Ranch (north of La Junta), Pawnee National Grassland (near Grover).

NATIONAL MAMMAL: American bison. The continent's largest mammal is an important part of Colorado's tribal and frontier past. Some ideas: Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge (Denver), Genesee Park right off I-70 (Golden), Soapstone Prairie Natural Area (near Fort Collins).

2. Follow a Birding Trail

Colorado is home to 450 different avian species, many of which are found in the ecosystems east of the Rockies. Lone falcons share the sky with droves of

Family Fishin'

Lathrop State Park

Nestled in the shadow of the Spanish Peaks in Walsenburg, this park offers a gentle climate and a youth fishing pond for kids 15 and under — as well as two lakes for all ages.

Corn Lake

Just outside Grand Junction, the lake is stocked with rainbow trout and offers a bike trail and picnic tables, as well as hiking, wildlife watching and educational activities in the nearby Colorado River Wildlife Area.

Akron Pond

This northeastern site keeps things cool with shady areas, sheltered picnic tables and regularly stocked trout in the summer months, as well as good-sized bass and catfish so everyone comes away a winner.

Gypsum Ponds

Close to I-70 and the town of Gypsum, the ponds are easy to access and stocked with rainbow and cutthroat trout. You might also see deer, great blue herons, owls, bald eagles and redtail hawks.

Pa-Co-Chu-Puk Ponds at Ridgway State Park

The park's two rainbow-troutstocked ponds are close to a fish-cleaning station. There's also a swim beach and summer programs for kids, including archery, hawk quests and more.

From the mule deer and legendary elk that roam the Rockies to the whitetails that graze the plains, Colorado's big-game and small-game species can be found across the state's mix of sprawling terrain. A popular choice for hunters seeking a unique experience, Colorado's biggame seasons typically kick off in August and continue through January. It's hard to resist the excitement - and golden aspens - found during the early months of bow and muzzleloading seasons, but waiting for the arrival of cooler temperatures and white blankets of snow can give hunters the upper hand in achieving a successful hunt.

Colorado accommodates most types and styles of take, whether you're going primitive with the longbow, modern with a centerfire rifle or splitting the difference with a muzzleloader. Be sure to bring along a shotgun or fishing



Once roamed by mighty dinosaurs, then formed by native people, westward exploration and expansion, historic sites and landmarks are waiting to be discovered.

Give your inner history buff a real treat as you glean fascinating knowledge from museums, heritage sites, historic trails, walking tours and more.

See the Wild West and beyond to experience the state's veritable melting pot of cultures and traditions.





Treasures at the **Top of the Rockies**



At the top of the Rockies, treasure seekers will find two gems all year round: the genuine and historic mountain towns of Leadville and Twin Lakes. Up here you can experience the spirit of the Silver Rush and outdoor adventure amid majestic beauty that is simply on another level.



Majestic Beauty

Perched at 10,152 feet, Leadville is North America's highest city and offers majestic mountain views. Twin Lakes is rich with blue waters.

Explore Native American Sites

It's impossible to fully understand Colorado's origins without learning about and honoring the Native Americans who were the first inhabitants

of this land. Follow this route to visit several sites showcasing Native American history and culture dating back thousands of years.

In the southwest corner of Colorado, begin your journey at Canvons of the Ancients Visitor Center & Museum in Dolores to get the information you need for a visit to Canyons of the Ancients National Monument. This outdoor museum has more than 6.000 documented archaeological sites, some of which are from the 12th century. To the south in Towaoc is Ute Mountain Tribal Park, offering an in-depth tour experience in which Ute tribal members interpret tribal culture, pictographs, cliff dwellings and artifacts. (Note that you must be accompanied by a Ute guide to enter.)

Next, travel to Mesa Verde National Park to see surface and cliff dwellings once inhabited by Ancestral Puebloans. East of Durango, stop at the Southern Ute Cultural Center and Museum in Ignacio, a stunning and symbolic building celebrating the living history of Colorado's longest continuous residents with exhibitions, rare artifacts and recorded stories. Now press farther east toward Pagosa Springs to see Chimney Rock National Monument, a protected archaeological site and sacred place that continues to hold special significance for today's Native American peoples. Take a guided walking tour to view architectural structures including pit houses, kivas and great houses.

At the Ute Indian Museum in Montrose the past connects with contemporary Ute life and culture through dioramas, rotating exhibits, hands-on programs and events. End the tour in Delta at Fort Uncompangre, a site where Ute Indians and trappers once traded.

Get Immersed in Hispanic & Latinx Influence

Colorado's Hispanic and Latinx heritage dates back to 1598, and its influence is prominent throughout the state.

A bustling spot for fur and trapping traders in the 1840s, El Pueblo Trading Post was founded on the then U.S.-Mexican border. See its borderlands tales and tribulations come to life at El Pueblo History Museum and the Pueblo Heritage Museum. Then travel forward six years to when the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo ended the Mexican-American War, surrendering property to the U.S. Terms were supposed to guarantee the rights of Mexican settlers, though they were not respected at the time land-grant disputes weren't resolved until 2018 when rights were restored to descendants of these settlers. This era is preserved at the restored Trujillo Homesteads National Historic Landmark near Mosca.

After dedicating their church on the feast day of Saint Louis in 1851, Hispanic farmers who had established La Plaza Media renamed it San Luis in honor of its new patron saint. Today it's the oldest continuously inhabited town in Colorado and a place where you can feel the history all around you. Visit Plaza de San Luis de la Culebra Historic District and iconic Shrine of the Stations of the Cross and nearby Capilla de Viejo San Acacio.

Post Civil War, 25 percent of New Mexico's Hispano population moved to Colorado and established towns. See what life was like for these families at the Trinidad History Museum's 1873 adobe Baca House.

Head north along the Front Range to Fort Collins, where in 1904 Mexican workers were recruited to farm the sugarbeet industry by the Great Western Sugar Company and a flourishing Hispanic community formed. At Museo de las Tres Colonias in Fort Collins, you'll find details of their homes. religion, work, celebrations and social-justice efforts.

In the 1960s and 70s, the Chicano movement for human rights and equality stemmed from many factors, including poor working conditions and discrimination, leading to an empowered embracing of Chicano culture and heritage. See the art and dialogue that started in this era at Museo de las Americas in Denver.

Find more ways to celebrate the state's Hispanic and Latinx past and present, including eats and drinks, events and other tours at Colorado.com/LatinxHistory.

Tour Gold Rush Towns

The promise of gold drew more than 100.000 fortuneseekers to Colorado in the mid-1800s.

This influx of explorers, prospectors, fur trappers and other immigrants led to the foundation of many cities, including Denver and several smaller towns - only some of which survived.

Today you can walk in the early settlers' footsteps along the Colorado Gold Trail, a scenic tour of historic Gold Rush towns that exist to this day. Towns to explore include Boulder, Black Hawk, Central City, Idaho Springs, Breckenridge, Fairplay, Alma, Como and Leadville. Each place has its own individual character and story of survival, and each is worth a visit to learn about its unique legacy.

The Colorado Gold Trail also encompasses a variety of fascinating tours where you

can get a firsthand look at how mining equipment worked, spot gold veins and learn about Colorado's notorious mining characters. The Cripple Creek & Victor Gold Mine Tour provides a historical overview of the Gold Rush, as well as a tour of the modern gold mine. If you take the Georgetown Loop Railroad, opt for a tour down into an 1870s mining tunnel to see veins of silver. On the Country Boy Mine Tour, take a pic with a burro, pan for gold, go on a hayride and see a mineshaft cut 1,000 feet below Breckenridge.

Don't despair if you can't make it to the mountains while you're here. The Denver Museum of Nature & Science boasts a replica mineshaft complete with precious stones and stalactites hanging from the ceilings. Find more experiences at Colorado. com/GoldRushTowns.

Peek Into the Wild West

One of the top ways to appreciate Colorado's heritage is to experience a bit of the Wild West yourself. It's been a long time since cowboys and miners ruled the roost, but you can still get a taste of the frontier lifestyle.


For every Gold Rush town that survived, there's a oncebooming settlement that went bust, leaving just a ghost of itself behind. Exploring these ghost towns gives you an amazing glimpse into the era. The Aspen Historical Society hosts tours of the ghost town of Independence, which sits near 11,000 feet on Independence Pass and was abandoned

by miners in 1899, as well as Ashcroft's restored remains of a saloon, post office and hotel. Southeast of Walden, Teller City was a silver-mining camp that boomed in the early 1880s but was busted by 1902. You can take a three-quarter-mile loop trail through the scattered cabin remains and artifacts. Colorado.com/GhostTowns

Colorado is home to a variety of museums that provide immersive Wild West learning experiences. History Colorado Center in Denver has an incredible collection of artifacts dating back to Colorado's earliest days, as well as diverse rotating exhibitions. At the Fort Garland Museum and Cultural Center, visitors can explore life in an 1800s Army fort, including five original adobe buildings. Bent's Old Fort National Historic Site near La Junta features a reconstructed 1840s adobe trading post where historians recreate the past with tours, demonstrations and special events. Colorado.com/Museums

Another great way to partake in Wild West culture is to dress the part. Cowboy boots are always in style here, and there are lots of places you can get your own pair, along with other Western-apparel staples. In Steamboat Springs, stop by F.M. Light & Sons, a familyowned outfitter that's been in business since 1905. Or shop at historic Goodman's Department Store in Pagosa Springs, established in 1899. If you're in the market for a classic Western shirt, Rockmount Ranch Wear in Denver is a must. They invented the snap-button style and have dressed the likes of Willie Nelson and Chrissy Teigen. Colorado.com/WesternWear

Your adventure won't be complete until you belly up to the bar of a saloon. Several different establishments have

operated out of the Minturn Saloon in the Vail Valley over the decades, but the current iteration has been open since 1976. Tuck into a plate of ribs and wash it down with a tasty margarita. The Buckhorn Exchange in Denver owns the first liquor license issued in Colorado after Prohibition and is a National Historic Landmark. Enjoy a stiff pour and a steak in a museumlike setting adorned with memorabilia and taxidermy. Colorado.com/HistoricSaloons

Find Black History & Heritage

Colorado's past often calls to mind images of splashy Spaghetti Westerns filled with wind-burned, blonde cowboys galloping across the dusty plains. But there's more to the picture than that.

Colorado not only boasts a rich history of Black civic engagement and entrepreneurship; it's also home to numerous communities of color that round out the real picture of the state.

At the Black American West Museum & Heritage Center in Denver (reopening soon; call first), learn about Colorado's many early Black cowboys including the famous Bill Pickett — and the tremendous role they played in America's big Western expansion. Then take a Five Points Walking Tour to step into monumental footprints left by jazz legends and the local artists' community in this historical neighborhood.

Cultural Heritag

North of Denver near Greeley, Dearfield ghost town was a once-booming community of 300 Black homesteaders who settled here in the early 1900s. Efforts to restore its buildings are underway. Still farther north, stop into Fort Collins' Hattie McDaniel House. The childhood home of this actress, singersongwriter and comedian isn't gone with the wind (she played Mammy in that film) - it's a standing memorial to her life and work. Elsewhere along the Front Range, a walking tour of Boulder's Little Rectangle turns up clues about the city's 1870s Black settlers in the former homes of some of its residents.

Heading west, at the Barney Ford House in Breckenridge, learn about "the Baron of Colorado." This formerly enslaved man was an entrepreneur and prominent businessman in addition to pioneering efforts for civil rights in the late 1800s.

And swinging southward, at what is now the Fort Garland Museum & Cultural Center, Black troops known as Buffalo Soldiers were stationed and served in innumerable ways in the late 1870s — from preventing conflict between the Native Americans and the white prospectors to guarding and repairing the post, and they even acted as its fire department.

Discover a Colorado Taste of Asia

Colorado's Asian American and Pacific Islander population represent a vast diversity of heritages and experiences.

Here's how to immerse yourself in the culture, history and flavors of Korea, Japan, Vietnam and beyond.

During World War II, more than 10,000 Japanese Americans were unjustly incarcerated at Amache, also called the Granada Relocation Center, near Granada in southeast Colorado. Uncover one of the darkest periods in American history at Amache — now the Amache National Historic Site by touring the reconstructed buildings and exhibits.

Designed by Japanese architect Shigeru Ban, The Aspen Art Museum is an eye-catching sight. Admire the mesmerizing, wovenlattice exterior before venturing inside to view its contemporary exhibits.

Tour the Denver Art Museum's Asian Art collection which comprises 7,000 masterpieces representing 6,000 years of history — to see beautiful court robes and accessories from China's Qing Dynasty and ornately carved wooden figurines of Hindu gods from the 1800s.

In Denver's River North (RiNo) neighborhood, reserve a table at Hop Alley, where chef Tommy Lee serves modern interpretations of wok-fired Cantonese and Sichuan classics. Or snag a table at nearby Sushi-Rama, where rolls arrive at your table via

conveyor belt. Meanwhile, must-stop destinations along bustling Federal Boulevard include Vinh Xuong Bakery, where the banh mi sandwiches get five-star reviews. Nearby Aurora's South Havana Street has the largest concentration of Korean-owned businesses in the state. Start your journey at Seoul Korean BBQ and Hot Pot, where you can cook your own ingredients on tabletop grills or in vessels of bubbling broth, or The Pork Let, where Korean-Japanese fare is the draw.

Trek to the Drala Mountain Center in Red Feather Lakes to marvel at the majestic Great Stupa at Dharmakaya. The 108-foot Buddhist symbol was built in 1988 to promote harmony, prosperity, longevity, good health and peace.

Take part in the tradition of drinking tea at Boulder Dushanbe Teahouse, where you can sip a robust variety imported from across the world in a building constructed of stunning tiles crafted by hand in Dushanbe, Tajikistan.



Colorado's scenic and historic railroads combine three of the top aspects of vacationing here — history, fantastic landscapes and plenty of outdoor fun for the whole family - and each has its own distinct character and charm. Nearly all of Colorado's trains offer seasonal trips, like winter-holiday excursions and fall-color or spring-wildflower rides, as well as gourmet lunch rides, wine-and-dinner trains and murder-mystery events.

Be transported back to the age of steam and visit landscapes inaccessible by car.

Scenic & Historic Trains



The Manitou & Pikes **Peak Cog Railway**

The world's highest cog railway takes you to its dynamic new visitor center on the summit of Pikes Peak above Manitou Springs — that's 14,115 feet!

Cripple Creek & Victor Narrow Gauge Railroad

This 45-minute ride is perfect for kids. Ride the century-old steam train from Cripple Creek past mines and gorgeous scenery to an abandoned mining camp.

Georgetown Loop Railroad

This stunner was one of our first tourist attractions when it debuted in 1884. Its state-of-the-art narrowgauge tracks made it an engineering marvel of the day.

Royal Gorge Route Railroad

Take this classic train for a one-of-a-kind view through the Royal Gorge beside the Arkansas River in Cañon City.

Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad

This National Historic Landmark chugs from Antonito to Chama, New Mexico, with a stop for lunch atop a mountain in Osier.

Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad

This full-day trip travels from Durango up into the mountains to the old mining town of Silverton through miles and miles of pristine wilderness.

Whitewater Rafting



Each spring, gravity and sunshine draw our winter snow down from the mountains for some of the country's most amazing whitewater-rafting adventures.

Arkansas River

Taylor River

Views of the jagged Collegiate Peaks range oversee three sections of varying difficulty on the scenic and narrow Taylor River, which is also popular with anglers.

Typical departures: Gunnison. Crested Butte

Clear Creek

Clear Creek is right off I-70 the closest whitewater to Denver. Once on the river. however, the interstate goes unnoticed as paddlers drop through the steep and narrow bed, perfect for those looking for a Class IV day or a quick splash.

Typical departure: Idaho Springs

Animas River

Trips on the lower Animas can be packaged with the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad and zipline tours. The upper Animas has Class IV and V rapids considered among the toughest commercially rafted waters in the country.

Typical departure: Durango

Cache La **Poudre River**

This river propels boaters on runs that provide challenges for intermediate or advanced abilities. It's also as unique an experience as you can have on Colorado waters — it's the state's only federally designated National Wild and Scenic River.

Typical departure: Fort Collins

Yampa/Green River

Winding through Dinosaur National Monument, this typically multiday run floats past fossils and archaeological sites, Fremont Indian rock carvings, geological formations and sandy spots beloved by overnight campers

Typical departures: Steamboat Springs, Craig, Maybell

Creede

Luxuriate amid the lush beauty of a national forest in an Adirondack-style cottage. Ranch life here means astonishing mountain scenes by horseback, locally sourced meals and a private hot-springs bathhouse.







Colorado Gold Towns

In 1859, a prospector panned nearly \$1,000 of gold dust from a gulch 40 miles west of Denver in what became known as "The Richest Square Mile on Earth." The hills surrounding Central City and Black Hawk yielded tons of the precious metal, and fortuneseekers arrived in droves.

A century and a half later, visitors still come here looking for "gold." Colorado has several gaming venues, ranging from enticing resorts with something for everyone (and lots of eat-play-stay options) to intimate gaming parlors.

Central City and Black Hawk visitors tempt Lady Luck at limited-stakes blackjack, craps, roulette, poker tables, video machines and sports betting in 20-plus casinos. Farther south, Cripple Creek, another

mining-turned-gambling town, is tucked in the mountains an hour from Colorado Springs with nine casinos.

In all three towns, a variety of casinos are within convenient walking distance.

Each destination offers fine dining, luxurious hotels, historic mine tours and, most importantly, authentic slices of history. You can stroll downtown Black Hawk past 100-year-old storefronts, catch a performance at the 140-year-old Central City Opera House or visit the Cripple Creek Heritage Center.



Four Corners Region

Both of Colorado's Native American gaming areas are found in the state's historyrich southwest corner.

Table games, slots and yearround events lure the lucky to the Sky Ute Casino Resort in Ignacio and the Ute Mountain Casino Hotel in Towaoc. Nearby heritage sites such as Mesa Verde National Park, Chimney Rock and Canyons of the Ancients national monuments, and the Trail of the Ancients scenic and historic byway beckon gamers on a break.

It's easy to stay here awhile; Sky Ute has a hotel on site, as well as three dining options and big-name entertainment that includes boxing and mixed martial arts.

Ute Mountain also has a full vacation experience, with a number of events. The ongrounds hotel, RV sites and full-service restaurants make it a destination unto itself.





Use Great Mapping

Head to local visitor centers to get directions to excellent biking spots. Durango, Telluride, Steamboat Springs, Pagosa Springs, Fruita and Crested Butte are all places with trail networks so vast and varied that a map is a downright necessity. For much more, download the COTREX (Colorado Trail Explorer) app.

Bike the Byways

Consider the 26 long-distance Bike the Byways rides. Start at Denver's South Platte River Trail and work your way to the Lariat Loop before tackling mountain rides like Top of the Rockies in Leadville and finishing off with the bluffs and buttes of Dinosaur Diamond north of Grand Junction. dtdapps.coloradodot.info/bike

Ride Our Events

Look for large events like Ride the Rockies (June), the Leadville Trail 100 MTB (Aug.), the Triple Bypass (Aug.), as well as dozens of smaller events. Longtime races like the Elephant Rock in Castle Rock (June). Emerald Mountain Epic in Steamboat (Aug.), Breck Epic (Aug.), the Fort Collins Tour de Fat (Sept.) and Salida Bike Fest (Sept.) are joined by newer events like the Grand Junction Grand Enduro (May), The Broadmoor Cycle to the Summit (Aug.), Venus de Miles in Lyons (Aug.), SBT GRVL (Aug.) in Steamboat Springs and The Rad Dirt Fest in Trinidad (Oct.), Colorado.com/Events

Explore Town Connects

For starters try the Boulderto-Golden or Boulder-to-Westminster routes, Wolcott to Steamboat Springs, Las Animas to Lamar, Aspen to Glenwood Springs, or Fort Collins to Mishawaka Amphitheatre, Summit County paths connect Dillon, Breck, Copper, Frisco, Keystone and more. There's also the Grand Junction to Palisade "fruit loop," which winds through rows of peach trees and grapevines. Then consider tackling the Palisade Plunge, which connects the town with the top of the Grand Mesa along 32 miles of sweet, advanced, backcountry singletrack.

Gravel riding is basically riding bikes on dirt roads. The main attraction for many cyclists is the minimal car traffic and the sense of freedom and adventure. Dedicated gravel bikes are a thing, but are not required — some riders prefer standard road bikes, others mountain bikes. Hundreds of miles of dirt roads make Colorado this trend's hottest spot.

23 Free Things to Do

Save now to splurge later — these activities around the state are completely free.



1. Wildflower Viewing

Crested Butte is known as the "Wildflower Capital of the World." Visit in summertime to see the surrounding alpine valleys outrageously in bloom.

2. Pueblo Riverwalk

With more than 50 pieces of public art on this 1-mile expanse of downtown, the path is a striking place to stretch your legs.

3. Alpine Lakes

Colorado boasts dozens of pristine lakes above treeline. Hike American Lakes Trail near Walden for a true alpine experience — the views are worth the climb.

4. Ghost Towning

Uptop ghost town is found at the top of La Veta Pass. Walk among several remaining buildings, including an 1877 railroad depot where a chapel, tavern and dance hall tell the stories of this Sangre de Cristo mountain hideaway.

5. Yampa River Tubing

Bring your own inflatable inner tube to float atop the refreshing waters of Yampa River, which passes right through downtown Steamboat Springs.

6. Dispersed Camping

Rough it for real by spending the night at a dispersed campsite in the beautiful White River National Forest near Homestake Reservoir and the town of Red Cliff. Learn how to do so responsibly at Colorado.com/CampingBasics.

7. Honeyville

See honeybees hard at work inside a glass-encased beehive and taste free samples of regional honey products at this small shop north of Durango.

8. Montrose Botanic Gardens

Behind gilded gates exists a greenthumb sanctuary of native plants, succulents and brightly colored flowers.

9. Liquid Arts[™] Tours

Hundreds of breweries, wineries, distilleries and cideries pepper Colorado's towns, most offering free tours that show how the magic is made. Visit Colorado.com/LiquidArts for ideas.

10. Aurora's Wheel Park

Grab a skateboard, bike or skates to wheel around the 10-foot bowl, street-skating features, BMX track, inline-hockey rink and more.

11. Rocky Ford Museum

Peruse exhibits about the area's history dating back to 1878, including its geology, archaeology and the everyday life of people in the Arkansas Valley.

12. Sandhill Crane Migration

Each spring, sandhill cranes migrate in magnificent fashion through the San Luis Valley. Catch a glimpse at the Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge.

13. Cross a Rainbow Bridge

Fort Morgan's historic Rainbow Bridge is an engineering marvel built in 1923 and still standing strong. Venture across for great views of the Platte River.



14. Emily Warner Field Aviation Museum

See where President Eisenhower landed when visiting nearby Fraser and check out the cufflinks owned by renowned aviator Howard Hughes in Granby.

15. Frisco Historic Park & Museum

Find out what life was like for Colorado's 19th-century miners. Explore the schoolhouse museum, jail, cabins, a chapel and more.

16. Hiwan Homestead Museum

Take a free guided tour of the Hiwan Homestead, a 25-room log lodge turned museum near Evergreen. Don't miss the Native American art scattered around the home.

17. Picture Canyon

Marvel at Native American rock art, pioneer homesteads and craggy geologic formations at this historic gem near Campo.

18. Fremont Ridge Site

Located along the Rangely Rock Art Tour, Fremont is home to panels of petroglyphs, resembling carrot men, that can be seen on an easy out-and-back hike.

19. Cano's Castle

Four glimmering towers, made of mostly beer cans, rise into the sky off Antonito's main street, making the fortification an oddity right in town.

20. Loveland Museum

This jewel houses 30,000 objects, many by local artists, and showcases Loveland's history through displays that include Sweetheart City USA.

21. Silver Cliff Cemetery


This 1880s cemetery-with-a-stunning-mountain-view, known for its "unexplained dancing blue lights, seen on occasion," is also the resting place for many miners of that rough era.

22. City of Murals Tour

Walk around Main Street in Delta to see murals and sculptures created by local artists that celebrate the heritage of the community.

23. Limon Heritage Museum & Railroad Park Complex

A visit to the plains wouldn't be complete without popping into the white-sided 1894 pioneer schoolhouse, an excellent example of frontier education.

Star Party



If you're looking for an amazing place to stargaze, Colorado provides plenty of locations to choose from. Whether you lie under the heavens of the San Luis Valley, or get a little closer to the stars on the peak of a stately mountain, there is nothing like seeing constellations speckled across a clear Colorado sky. This route connects several areas known for their night skies and incredible stargazing opportunities. It also highlights night-sky events and encourages the conservation and preservation of all of Colorado's natural and cultural resources.

Some of the world's darkest skies offer outstanding stargazing.



Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve

Align your visit with a moonless night to observe millions of stars thanks to the park's high elevation and low light pollution.

Crestone

For a mystical experience, head north to Crestone, which has become a spiritual haven in recent years. Several in-town spots make for excellent star seeing.

Creede

Surrounded by 900 square miles of Western wilderness and open sky, drives like Pool Table Road and the Bachelor Loop Historic Tour have excellent viewing.

Lake City

Located in the most remote county in the lower 48 states, Lake City is the ideal place for watching the night sky and leaving civilization behind.

Gunnison

The town is a base for access to dark areas such as Hartman Rocks Recreation Area, Curecanti National Recreation Area and Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park.

Westcliffe & Silver Cliff

Between the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and the Wet Mountains, these towns' latitudes make for dramatic views. Visit the Smokey Jack Observatory in Bluff Park to experience some of the most powerful telescopes in the world.


Ridgway



Day in Denver



Denver is an outdoorsy city known for its world-class cultural attractions, thriving craft breweries, chef-driven dining and red-hot music scene, all within easy reach of the Rocky Mountains.

Morning

The airport-to-downtown rail line makes it easy to explore without a car: Fly into Denver International Airport, hop the train to Union Station, then explore downtown by foot, free 16th Street MallRide, pedicabs, and several bike- and scooter-shares. First, tour the Union Station, a destination unto itself and a gathering place with shops and places to grab a bite. Next, bike or scoot the city's 850 miles of paved and off-road trails. Sip a cup of coffee in Larimer Square, in the heart of LoDo ("Lower Downtown"), and make your way to the History Colorado Center. Denver Public Library. Denver Art Museum and the Kirkland Museum of Fine & Decorative Art. All conveniently gathered near each other.

Afternoon

Next stop: Cherry Creek, the region's largest shopping district, includes Cherry Creek North's wide array of only-in-Denver shops. Or hit up Meow Wolf Denver's interactive art experience.

You don't need a reservation at any of the city's many quality food

halls — Central Market, Milk Market, Edgewater Public Market and Number 38, to name just a few.

Evening

In the spring and summer, it's the Colorado Rockies and the Colorado Rapids; September to January, the Denver Broncos; and from October to June, the Denver Nuggets and Colorado Avalanche.

The only thing that brings out more Denver passion than sports is beer. Sample some along the Denver Beer Trail and at faves like Raíces, Great Divide and Novel Strand. Or tap into the growing craft distillery scene; stop in for a taste at Stranahan's Colorado Whiskey, Leopold Bros., Ironton or Mythology. For crafty cocktails on the down-low, check out the Green Russell, Retrograde, B&G, Run for the Roses and Millers & Rossi speakeasies.



A Weekend in Denver With the Kids



The Mile High City has nearly endless ways to entertain your little travelers — and many that will entertain you as well.

Day 1

Have close encounters with sharks, sea turtles, stingrays and even Sumatran tigers at Downtown Aquarium. Nearby is the Children's Museum of Denver at Marsico Campus, an imaginative journey for newborns through age 8 with a 3½-story climber, a 6-foot bubble, Adventure Forest and much more.

Denver has many green spaces, some with really amazing amenities for kids — like Paco Sánchez, Central, City, Ruby Hill and Washington parks. These oases have vibrant flower beds, boat and bike rentals, skate areas and more.

End the day on 16th Street Mall, a milelong promenade and one of the city's

most visited attractions. It's a great spot for dinner, with plenty of kid-pleasing choices. Every block boasts a landmark or public art to keep them stimulated.

Day 2

Go where the wild things are: the Denver Zoo. This City Park institution takes visitors on a globe-trotting safari. The stingray and shark habitat, *Stingray Cove*, allows visitors to interact with safe-to-touch species. Pack a picnic lunch and spread out in the park and check out its new playground.

Museum options include the Denver Museum of Nature & Science, also in City Park, to see enormous dinosaur skeletons, watch an IMAX feature or see the Space Odyssey, Egyptian Mummies and North American Indian Cultures exhibits.

Or head west to the city of Golden's Colorado Railroad Museum to see more than 100 locomotives, cabooses and HO model railroad attractions.

The Denver Art Museum is one of the nation's best for kids programs - and it's always free for kids under 18 (as is the History Colorado Center).

Dinner calls for a trip to Casa Bonita. This longtime, quirky spot, which just got a facelift, is an indoor amusement park with cliff divers, mariachi bands, puppet shows, magicians and more. Other popular family spots include Steve's Snappin' Dogs, Sam's No. 3, Punch Bowl Social (bowling, table games and arcade), Ace Eat Serve (Southeast Asian food and pingpong hall) and Sweet Sweetz.

MORE IDEAS FOR FAMILIES

Water World One of the biggest water parks in the nation features acres of refreshing summertime fun. With nearly 50 rides and adventures, there's something for all ages.

Butterfly Pavilion 1,600 free-flying butterflies make their home at this oneof-a-kind spot in nearby Westminster, fluttering around visitors in a recreation of a tropical rainforest.


The Wild Animal Sanctuary This rescue/ educational facility 30 miles outside of Denver is home to more than 650 lions, tigers, bears and wolves. They roam the massive refuge while you walk above them on the Mile Into The Wild walkway.

Dinosaur Ridge Compare footprint sizes with giant prehistoric beasts on a nature walk in Morrison. You'll encounter more than 100 fossilized dino tracks, including stegosaurus, apatosaurus and allosaurus.

Wings Over the Rockies Air & **Space Museum And Exploration** of Flight Visit two locations packed with iconic aircraft, space vehicles, aerospace-heritage artifacts, flight simulators and immersive exhibits.

Elitch Gardens Theme & Water Park Mind-blowing rides for those taller than 48 inches, plenty of slower ones for those who aren't, a water park, a summer concert series. dive-in" movies and Meow Wolf's Kaleidoscope ride make the nation's only downtown theme park a must visit.

Black American West Museum & Heritage Center Nearly a third of the pioneers who helped settle Colorado in the late 1800s were Black. Learn the stories of these miners, ranchers, teachers, blacksmiths and lawmen who were a major part of the Wild West. (Reopening soon; call first.)



2 Days of Denver Arts & Culture



Day 1

Explore street art in neighborhoods like RiNo, LoHi, South Broadway, Westwood and East Colfax. These and others are emerging with their own character, art walks, hipster flea markets, craft-coffee bars, small music venues and only-in-Denver boutiques. Visit Colorado.com/ArtHoods.

Experiential-art fans rejoice! Meow Wolf, the wildly popular immersive experience that debuted in Santa Fe, has opened a Denver outpost called Convergence Station.

The jagged edges of the Denver Art Museum jut over 13th Avenue, housing Western art, contemporary masterworks and blockbuster traveling shows. Of special note is the indigenous arts of North America collection, representing the artistic works of nearly every U.S. tribe. Stay for lunch at The Ponti, a new restaurant collaboration with celebrated chef Jennifer Jasinski.

Visit the Kirkland Museum of Fine & Decorative Art in the former studio of Vance Kirkland, one of Colorado's most distinguished painters, now located in the art-rich Golden Triangle area. Across the street, the Clyfford Still Museum is dedicated to the legacy of one of the most important painters of the 20th century.

If you've got an inclination toward vinyl and being cool, head over to Twist & Shout, a famed indie music store selling new and used music on East Colfax near popular theaters like the Ogden and Bluebird. Another option for the cool kids is the Mission Ballroom in the RiNo district — an intimate concert space with plenty of bike parking.

Take the afternoon to explore a hub of Denver's creative community, the Art District on Santa Fe, where murals, studios, galleries and creative businesses make it a Certified Colorado Creative District. Stop in at the Museo de las Americas, highlighting traditional and contemporary Latino art and culture.

Day 2


Start the morning at Tattered Cover's historic LoDo location. Called "a bibliophile's paradise" by *The New York Times*, this multilevel bookstore, housed in a lovingly restored historic building, holds thousands of volumes on every topic under the sun with a notable selection of Denverand Colorado-centric books.

Just around the corner sits the Museum of Contemporary Art Denver, a structure whose sleekness contrasts with the classic red brick typical to LoDo. Galleries showcase a series of exhibits devoted to innovation and creativity. At the serene rooftop cafe and bar, relax and reflect on what you've seen.

See a show at the Denver Performing Arts Complex. The Denver Center Theatre Company is the region's largest, staging new works, Broadway tours and more. Opera Colorado, the Colorado Symphony Orchestra and the Colorado Ballet also grace the center's stages. For less traditional fare, visionary performance venues like Curious Theatre Company and The Bug Theatre can be counted on for something original.







Denver Day Trips



Use Denver as an easy hub for exploring the state and the outdoors just beyond the city limits.

Evergreen

Acres of forest and open space surround this vibrant downtown, lined with galleries, boutiques, day spas, patio cafes and bistros. The foothills community boasts miles of year-round hiking and biking trails (pick up a trail map at the visitor center), plus Evergreen Lake is packed with ice skaters each winter and hosts a summer concert series, boaters and fishers.

For a bit of history on the area, Hiwan Heritage Park holds an 1893 log lodge that's now a museum with original and historic furnishings as well as Native American artwork.

Drive: 40 minutes

Lakewood

RTD Commuter Rail-connected Lakewood is a solid home base between Denver and the mountains. The Lakewood Cultural Center hosts performances and events in pedestrianfriendly Belmar, which is home to shops and restaurants. (Colorado Mills is also a hub for retail action.) 40 West Arts is the city's Certified Colorado Creative District. Two ways to experience it: The new 40W ArtLine, a 4-mile walking/bike path with interactive art and murals along the way; and First Fridays gallery openings, artist lectures and more.

There are lots of ways to get outside, too. Stroll through Kendrick Lake Park's garden or hit the trails of William F. Hayden Park on Green Mountain. Spend a day at Bear Creek Lake Park boating, fishing, swimming and paddleboarding. Meander the 5-mile Discover Alameda bike/walk path's loops, ponds and birding spots.

Drive: 15 minutes

Central City & Black Hawk

Home to 24-hour casinos, top-notch opera and gorgeous scenery, these two historic mining towns have burst to life recently. See page 124 for more.

Drive: 45 minutes

Arvada

Historic Old Town is the way to get a taste of this hip suburb — and you can take the RTD Commuter Rail G Line straight there from Denver's Union Station. The walkable section of town is packed with restaurants, breweries and boutiques. North of this area, the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities hosts summer concerts at its outdoor amphitheater where you can grab a blanket and soak up the sounds in the grass. Elsewhere, there are 150 miles of biking/hiking trails, 4,000 acres of parks and Two Ponds National Wildlife Refuge.

Drive: 20 minutes



Rocky Mountain National Park

One of the nation's top outdoor destinations, this natural wonder boasts 350 miles of trails, unparalleled wildlife sightings and the Trail Ridge Road scenic drive. A seasonal Bustang route runs from Denver to the park. See page 107 for more.

Drive: 1 hour, 40 minutes

Castle Rock

The Outlets at Castle Rock and upscale Promenade at Castle Rock are big draws, along with The Barn's antique and specialty shops, 44 miles of trails and the year-round Edge Ziplines & Adventures (where you scale a 50foot climbing wall, zip for 2 miles and take on a ninja course). There's also the pedestrian-friendly downtown, galleries, golf courses, bistros, coffee houses, a new green space along the South Platte River, and Ecclesia Market — a food hall in a former church. Castle Rock has year-round hiking and biking trails and spectacular views from on top of The Rock — the historic namesake for the community. Stop into the visitor center for ideas on exploring the area and beyond.

Drive: 35 minutes

Littleton

This tree-lined downtown combines the sophistication of a relaxed urban center packed with local eats and unique boutiques with small-town charm. And, of course, there's plenty of craft wineries, distilleries and breweries, including nearby Breckenridge Brewery's massive campus with tours and the Farm House Restaurant. The Littleton Museum is an 1860s homestead with living-history exhibits and a children's interactive gallery. To get to Littleton, bike the Platte River Trail or take the RTD light rail.

Drive: 23 minutes

Boulder

With 200 miles of trails, a laid-back vibe and Pearl Street Mall, it's easy to see why visitors fall in love with Boulder. See page 158 for more.

Drive: 30 minutes



The Armory Performing Arts Center hosts theater, dance and music events throughout the year. There's a free walking tour of the downtown historic district, which highlights several architectural styles from the late 1800s and early 1900s.

Drive: 25 minutes



Colorado Springs

Iconic Pikes Peak is Colorado Springs' showpiece, which features dozens of attractions, including the famed Garden of the Gods. See page 106 for more.

Drive: 1 hour, 30 minutes

Summit County

A popular snow-sports destination in winter, this region attracts visitors year-round with quintessential mountain towns and scenic vistas. See page 130 for more.

Aurora: Where the Great Plains Meet the Rockies



Day 1

You can taste the histories and traditions of Aurora's cultures at numerous restaurants — savoring Polish pierogis, fruit-filled Cuban pastries, Burmese curries or fragrant Ivorian jollof rice.

Continue your heritage immersion at the Aurora History Museum; their biennial Mosaic of Cultures exhibit celebrates the city's many different communities. And there's always something exciting happening at The People's Building — an art space with a lineup of musicals, lectures, art shows and live music.

Or take the self-guided Colfax Canvas Mural Tour, a "collaboration of culture and creativity" in the Aurora Cultural Arts District. Get maps and audio guides at colfaxcanvas.com.

Day 2

Fill your belly at Mango House, a food hall with international menus that also serves as a refugee resource center. Or hit up Airhouse Adventure Park for Xtreme Dodgeball, interactive trampoline games, a gravity-fueled coaster and more.

For ample activities under one roof, Stanley Marketplace is the place to be. At this former aviation center, take sewing or cooking classes, sample international dishes, shop for kids' books and STEM crafts or enjoy craft beers. It's also home to a virtual-reality arcade and LuBird's Light Playground — an inclusive playground for children of all abilities.

Day 3

With wind-tousled prairie grasses and views of snowy peaks, getting outside is a must. Cherry Creek State Park boasts 35 miles of trails — perfect for biking, walking or snowshoeing — along with camping, horseback riding and water activities at one of the city's three reservoirs. Search for wildlife like mule

deer, great horned owls, kestrels and red-tailed hawks at Morrison Nature Center. At nearby Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge, you might spot bison, burrowing owls and migrating bald eagles.

Or find birdies and eagles of a different sort at Aurora's 10 golf courses. If you prefer your mountain views with a side of retail therapy, hit the brand-name shops and boutiques of Southlands.





Taking It Easy in Pikes Peak Country



In Colorado Springs and Manitou Springs, you'll dive into a concentration of Wild West and Victorian-era history, a delightful medley of niche museums and arts attractions, and easy access to outdoor recreation for every level of exertion and experience — all within a half-hour's drive.



Day 1

Start in downtown: Head to Tejon Street for window-shopping and latte sipping. Then spend time at one of the area's museums, such as the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center, the Ent Center for the Arts or the new U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Museum, which has been named "the most accessible museum in the world" by Architectural Digest.

Choose to lunch at the Ivywild School, a community market featuring Bristol Brewing Co., Lazo Empanadas and more. Find another food hub in Lincoln Center, home to tasty tenants like Goat Patch Brewing and Nightingale Bread.

Next, catch a show at the U.S. Air Force Academy Planetarium or tour the Colorado Springs Pioneer Museum to explore the region's roots and the characters who made it wild. For a taste of the arts, seek out more than 50 pieces of permanent public art, esteemed cultural institutions. and events and festivals in the city's Certified Colorado Creative District. The PikeRide bike-share program makes it easy to get around on two wheels.

ROM TOP: THE BROADMOOR; VISIT COLORADO SPRINGS



Day 2

Start your day at Cheyenne Mountain State Park, where the new Dixon Trail takes you to the top of Cheyenne Mountain (work those calves!). Or explore Garden of the Gods on foot, on horse, by Segway or via vintage scooter. A new seasonal shuttle whisks visitors to the main part of the park.

Dominating the skyline is Pikes Peak. Reach the summit by car, foot, bike or newly restored Manitou & Pikes Peak Cog Railway. Stop into the new Summit House for inspiring overlooks, an outdoor dining terrace and one of their


famous doughnuts. Explore in the peak's shadow at the South Slope Recreation Area, with hiking and biking trails, fishing and bighorn-sheep viewing.

Before dinner, check out historic Manitou Springs' galleries and restaurants. The town is a Certified Colorado Creative District and named one of the 10 Coolest Small Towns in the country by Budget Travel magazine. North of town, Rainbow Falls Historic Site — a series of small waterfalls along Fountain Creek — is a favored stop for hikers and picnickers. Two shuttles run around town during the summer. Check at the visitor center for details, as well as other tips for exploring this area.




Start this day with a visit to Cheyenne Mountain Zoo. Feed giraffes and parakeets, walk among the wallabies and check out the Encounter Africa exhibit. Or head to Cave of the Winds Mountain Park for a new via ferrata climbing adventure, and The Broadmoor Seven Falls, where a 181-foot waterfall cascades down granite steps. Celebrate early at The North Pole, Home of Santa's Workshop, where it's Christmas all year and a zipline whirls around the park.

There's also the ProRodeo Hall of Fame & Museum of the American Cowboy, where you'll see exhibits on famous cowboys, and the National Museum of World War II Aviation, the only U.S. museum of its kind.



Get sidetracked in Woodland Park to investigate the Rocky Mountain Dinosaur Resource Center or take a guided UTV tour of Pike National Forest with Great Outdoors Adventures. Head farther on to Divide to visit Mueller State Park, which happens to have amazing Pikes Peak views. Old Colorado City is another spot for strolling visitors looking for shops, patio dining, art galleries, events and more.

In the evening, consider some Wild West fun at Flying W Ranch. Saddle up for a chuckwagon dinner accompanied by the Flying W Wranglers' cowboy songs. Or, for a delicious extravagance, consider a true farm-to-table experience with A Grazing Life, featuring menus by top chefs from the region.

Get Outside in Colorado Springs



After you've soaked up all the historic attractions and museums that you can, discover why Colorado Springs is one of the state's major places to play.

Hiking

If you're looking for a gentle stroll or a brag-worthy test of calf-and-quad endurance, you'll find it's easy to get on a trail. Take in geological marvels on the gentle pathways at Red Rock Open Space. Bear Creek Dog Park has amenities for you and your furry pal, Cheyenne Mountain State Park has 21 different trails to choose from, and the Pikes Peak Greenway Trail rolls along for 16 miles and connects to two other long-distance trails around the city. For alpine feats, there's no beating the famed Manitou Incline it's a 2,800-step ascent along old tracks originally built for a cable car (take advantage of the summer shuttle to the incline, cog rail and Barr Trail). Visit trailsandopenspaces.org for more options.

Biking

Colorado Springs is incredibly bicycle friendly. Whether you BYOB or need all the gear to get on the trails, outfitters can get you set up and show you key routes. Follow a historic rail trail through Cheyenne Canyon, take the gentle and shady Black Forest Section 16 trail, get Pikes Peak views along the Palmer Park Loop right in town or challenge yourself on a technical ride at Ute Valley Park.

Golfing

All that thin air makes for shots that soar at more than a dozen courses in the area, all with amazing clubhouse views to accompany post-round relaxation. The Broadmoor hosts two world-class championship courses and Pine Creek Golf Club winds through a valley of grassland, creeks and links layouts.

Rafting

Just a short drive from the Arkansas River, one of the country's most popular whitewater-rafting destinations, more than a dozen outfitters can find you just the amount of thrills you're after.

Horseback Riding

Explore the area's canyons, parks and trails while communing with nature and your new best friend. Ranches and stables around town have several ways to make you feel like a real cowpoke. Rides through Garden of the Gods and inside Pike National Forest are two close-to-town options.

Other Options

Balloon rides, ziplining, ATV and Jeep tours, rock-climbing adventures, Segway spins, wildlife-watching excursions, kayaking or stand-up paddling, fishing, hunting and more can be had at the drop of a hat from trusted guides sensitive to your comfort level.

Close to Paradise: Estes Park



Despite being one of the most popular parks in the country, Rocky Mountain National Park still offers countless moments of solitude and awe.

Morning

Spend time exploring Estes Park's main street and the natural glories of the Colorado Rockies.

From late May to early Oct., timed-entry permits are required at recreation.gov. A new seasonal Bustang route will take you to Estes Park and the national park from downtown Denver. And seasonal shuttles in town can help with parking and getting around.

Take a drive on Trail Ridge Road, a rollercoaster route that crosses the Continental Divide and offers photo ops as you climb past subalpine forests and wind-swept tundra. Or

enjoy a family wildflower hike to Gem Lake. For more challenge, try the Mills Lake trek for Longs Peak views.

Stop at Moraine Park for prime wildlife watching. More than 3,000 elk and 800 bighorn sheep live here. Estes Park and the national park are also superior birding spots, with more than 315 species — grab your binoculars for a self-guided exploration of Matthews-Reeser Bird Sanctuary right in town.

At the Open Air Adventure Park, rope bridges, aerial tightropes and swinging logs challenge folks, and the new Mountain Mustang alpine coaster offers thin-air thrills. There's also a new via ferrata course at Kent Mountain Adventure Center, along with climbing instruction and guided hikes.

Afternoon

Downtown Estes is the gateway into the park, but it's also a destination unto itself. Stop by The Barrel, a seasonal

Winter Fun From ice climbing, backcountry split-boarding and backcountry skiing to more relaxed activities like snowshoeing, Estes Park loves winter. It's easy to get there year-round and offers an alternative to the bustling ski resorts. New snowshoe tours pair with yummy side activities like fondue and whiskey tastings. Connect with Estes Park Mountain Shop, Femme Trek and Kent **Mountain Adventure Center** for guidance and gear.

alfresco beer garden, and windowshop along Elkhorn Avenue, with several new boutiques and eateries.

Stop for coffee and sit along the Riverwalk. Take the path east for a tranquil walk around Lake Estes; stop at the marina to rent pontoon boats, paddleboards or kayaks. Estes Park Mountain Shop rents e-bikes, as well. Then, grab a tasting at a handful of breweries and distilleries.

Evening


Wind down with dinner at the storied Stanley Hotel, an elegant 113-year-old, white-pillared landmark. Guided ghost tours reveal how Stephen King was inspired to write *The Shining* while staying in room 217.

Check out the farm-to-table cuisine from Seasoned – An American Bistro, Bird & Jim's artisan approach and 15 flavors of moonshine at Estes Park Distilling.



Relax in lovely **Lyons** on your way to Estes. With galleries and public art on nearly every corner and plenty of craft beer, it's worth a respite. Tubers and kayakers roll through the whitewater park and you can show off at the Dirt Jump Bike Track. Summer concerts send tunes into the mountain air while visitors soak up the relaxed scene.

Lyons Quilting has more than 6,500 bolts for sale. Spirit Hound Distillers, Moxie Bread and Lyons Dairy Bar are musts for tasty treats and hanging out. The Redstone Museum offers mountain-town history in an 1881 schoolhouse as well as a historic walking tour. Winter's ice rink means simple cold-weather pleasure.







Spirit of the Southwest



Spending just a few days in Durango, Silverton and Pagosa Springs will give you a taste of the glories of true Southwest living, inspiring ancient monuments and plenty of ways to get the heart racing.

Day 1

In Durango, historical buildings housing art galleries, eateries and breweries line Main Avenue. Cyclists zip through town and the toot-toot of the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad sounds.

Durango was named one of *Outside Magazine*'s best adventure hubs for its access to skiing, whitewater, fishing, hiking, byways and mountain-bike trails. Visit the welcome center to find out how to access it all.

The train has been operating continuously for nearly 140 years, and a ride on its rails is a must. The tracks roll through parts of the San Juan National Forest that are impenetrable by car. There's a stop (and combo packages available) at Soaring Tree Top

Adventures, an ecotour on 27 ziplines that zooms over the Animas River and through aspens and ponderosas.


Or stay on the train to visit Silverton, a storybook mining village with well-preserved splendor. The entire town is a designated National Historic Landmark and an archetypal example of a mining town that reinvented itself after the ore disappeared.

There are shops and restaurants to explore, as well as historical sites, including the Mayflower Mill, Old Hundred Gold Mine and Silverton Museum and Jail. If you extend your stay here, you have plenty of options for enjoying the surrounding San Juans, including rafting, horseback riding, epic day hikes up to the waterfalls

of Cunningham Gulch and the ghost towns of Eureka and Howardsville. Thanks to a wealth of historical and scenic 4x4 roads, the area is incredibly popular for Jeep and ATV tours. Summer and fall offer glimpses into seldom-accessed fields of wildflowers and autumn color. Hundreds of miles of groomed trails await in the winter.

Back in Durango, make plans for excellent eats at the town's 11th Street Station food-truck park, Moose & Squirrel and EsoTerra Ciderworks. Or head out to James Ranch Grill's "table on the farm," with a menu that couldn't be more locally sourced.

Just 40 minutes away, consider visiting Vallecito Lake. It's one of the state's largest and most spectacular, with plenty of fishing, boating, hiking, Jeeping, snowmobiling and other activities. The Vallecito Creek Trail hike is located near beautiful Vallecito Reservoir and is great for all ages.





Ignacio is a ranching community bordered by the La Plata Mountains. The Southern Ute Tribe, a descendant of two of the seven original Ute tribes that inhabited Colorado, is headquartered just north of Ignacio, but its reservation spans more than 680,000 acres. The modern Sky Ute Casino Resort's gaming halls, hotel rooms and restaurants are popular with visitors.

Recreational spots include Navaio State Park, which provides ample opportunity to enjoy water activities like jet skiing, house boating and fishing, as well as the reservation's top trout-fishing hole, Lake Capote.



East of Durango, Pagosa Springs offers record-holding deep mineral waters, used by The Springs Resort and Spa (known for a luxurious yet family-friendly feel), as well as Overlook Hot Springs and Healing Waters Resort & Spa.

West of town, find Chimney Rock National Monument's rock formations and Ancestral Puebloan history. Self-quided tours show you the most important spots, and night-sky programs will take your breath away.

Seek out Pagosa's San Juan River with rafting, kayaking, tubing and fishing. There are also ATV tours, 2.5 million acres of wilderness and national forest. 650 miles of trails, the Wolf Creek Pass drive, waterfall and wildflower hikes, and camping. Williams Creek Reservoir is popular with fishers, mountain bikers and picnickers. There's also miles of singletrack in the Turkey Springs Recreation Area and the Dakota Springs trail system. Pop into the visitor center for trail maps and download the Visit Pagosa Springs app for walking tours, scavenger hunts and visitor info.

In town, there's an urban singletrack trail system, a climbing/ bouldering park and skatepark, not to mention craft breweries, a handful of great restaurants and year-round horse-drawn carriage tours.





Play in the Collegiate Peaks



Make the easy trek to central Colorado for a getaway in the Arkansas River-side mountain towns of Salida and Buena Vista. Hot springs, dramatic peaks and unbeatable recreation await.

Morning

Travel along the Collegiate Peaks scenic byway, a 57-mile route along the Collegiate Peaks Wilderness and the Sawatch Range from Salida north to Buena Vista and beyond. This stretch contains the nation's greatest concentration of peaks higher than 14,000 feet — "fourteeners," in local parlance.

Next, visit an aerial adventure park: With swinging bridges, tightrope walks, ziplines, via ferratas and other soaring-through-the-pines challenges, Captain Zipline, Browns Canyon Adventure Park and AVA Rafting & Zipline all deliver adventure with a side of stunning scenery and deep breaths of crisp mountain air.

Buena Vista is a popular access point for rafting, kayaking, fishing, hiking and backpacking adventures along the Arkansas River, including Browns Canyon National Monument, 102 miles of Gold Medal fishing and the Buena Vista Whitewater Park. Rafting outfitters offer half- to multiday trips.

Give it a go at one of the area's signature sports: mountain biking. Rent or BYO-bike and hit the dirt on top-notch trails, like the Monarch Crest, Alpine Tunnel and Salida Mountain Trails or the downtown Buena Vista Pumptrack. Stop into the Buena Vista & Salida Chamber of Commerce to pick up a map of all the area's recreational opportunities.

Afternoon

Rejuvenate at Mount Princeton Hot Springs Resort, Cottonwood Hot Springs Inn & Spa or Salida Hot Springs Aquatic Center. Or head to the top of Monarch Pass: In summer, the Monarch Crest Scenic Tramway will carry you 12,000 feet in elevation for views of the surrounding peaks and nearby Monarch Mountain ski area.

Buena Vista and Salida are only a scenic, 30-minute drive apart, so plan to traipse back and forth.


Winter Fun

Monarch Mountain ski area is just a short drive from Salida, and the area's deep snow is a playground for snowshoers and snowmobilers. The valley floor is often dry in the winter, perfect for rock climbing, a round of golf, hiking and biking year-round. These towns are serious about mountain biking, and winter doesn't stop them: All you need is fatter tires. Several shops rent out fat bikes.



Evening

Take a distillery or winery tour — there are close to 100 breweries, distilleries, wineries, galleries and eateries. Stroll through downtown Salida, one of the state's Certified Creative Districts, with dozens of artist-owned galleries and shops. Kids get a kick out of feeding the fish at the Mount Shavano Fish Hatchery. Delicious restaurants and shops pepper both historic downtowns, and Buena Vista has a vibrant music scene. If you're still looking for fun, consider the vintage Comanche Drive In Theatre for a nightcap.



Escape to Nature in the Roaring Fork Valley



Book stays in Glenwood Springs, Carbondale, **Basalt, Snowmass** and Aspen — the **Roaring Fork River** flows through a valley that has always been a favored playscape in these mountain towns.

Day 1

Start the day with a mountain-bike ride in the Red Mountain's trail system for sweet views, climbs and downhill action minutes from the walkable downtown of Glenwood Springs (there's also a free bus in town). Hikers head to many trails that leave right from town. Hanging Lake, a National Natural Landmark, is in Glenwood Canyon. The Hanging Lake Trail hike requires a reservation year-round. Find more information at visitglenwood.com/hanginglake.

Next, wash aches away in the Colorado River-side Iron Mountain Hot Springs' soaking pools, Yampah Spa's steam baths and Glenwood Hot Springs, home to the world's largest hot-springs pool and several new water features.

Get your bearings from Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park's gondola, which lifts you off the valley floor to the top of Iron Mountain. The caverns' new Defiance Coaster and more provide maximum thrills. For a blast

of another sort, hook up with a rafting outfitter for a Colorado River ride through Glenwood Canyon. Then dine alfresco along Seventh Avenue, browse downtown's shops and stay the night.

Day 2

In the bike- and walkable Certified Colorado Creative District of Carbondale, great restaurants, arts events, galleries and workshops can be had all over town. Travel along the Rio Grande ARTway for more art, gardens and Mount Sopris views. The (free!) Powers Art Center focuses on contemporary and pop art. It's also recognized as an agefriendly community by AARP.

One of "The Top 10 Adventure Towns in the U.S.," outdoor pursuits include biking (hit the trails at Prince Creek and Red






Hill), kayaking, paddleboarding and flyfishing. In winter, excellent cross-country skiing can be found at Spring Gulch.

Farther on, the town of Basalt at the confluence of the Roaring Fork and Fryingpan rivers is known for Gold Medal fishing. Kayaking in the whitewater park, SUPing on Ruedi Reservoir, plus hiking and biking are other draws. There are also shops, galleries and cafes, and The Arts Campus at Willits' concerts and shows.

Eating local is the norm in both towns, with farm-to-table dinners and several restaurants' menus informed by seasonally available ingredients grown nearby.





Marble is 40 miles south of Carbondale. Hit up Marble Hub to get questions answered and sip some coffee. Get into the backcountry on horseback with OutWest Guides or visit the Crystal ghost town and 1893 Crystal Mill on a tour with Crystal River Jeep Tours or RPS Rentals. Tour Mill Site Park's ghostly ruins, mountain bike Coal Basin Trail, and hang around after dark — the town recently joined the International Dark-Sky Association. End the day at Slow Groovin' BBQ with scratch-made goodness.

Redstone is 16 miles from Carbondale. Seek out trail rides, pack trips and biggame hunts from Avalanche Outfitters; hook up and gear up for primo fishing at Crystal Fly Shops; scale the geography at Boulders Open Space; and hike, mountain bike and cross-country ski throughout the valley. Winter also brings ice climbing at Ice Pillars and skating on Redstone Park Pond.



Days 3 & 4

It's time to explore Aspen and Snowmass. They're just 20 minutes apart, so it's easy to go back and forth. Aspen maintains a character that is 100 percent Colorado and family friendly. Enhance mornings with a downtown jaunt to survey the famous stores. Hit up the Saturday Market for its farmfresh produce and local products, or cruise the area with a bike rental from WE-Cycle Stations in Aspen and Basalt.

Savor afternoon scenery. Try your hand at the Gold Butte Climbing Area, with routes for all levels near Aspen. The Snowmass Bike Park has 25 miles of mountain-biking bliss. The area has recently received a gold-level rating from the International Mountain Biking Association. The paved Rio Grande Trail starts in Aspen and follows the river. Those with littles in tow can hike Grottos Trail, an easy route that leads to ice caves and waterfalls.

Make a reservation (May to early October only) and follow the crowds to Maroon Bells, or ride an e-bike there in the morning to avoid them. Pics of the peaks are one of our most famous scenes. Independence Pass offers recreational opportunities from hiking and biking to climbing. Take a tour of Independence Ghost Town with the Aspen Historical Society to hear its tales.

Decrease the heart rate with mountaintop yoga at Aspen Mountain, or hook up with the Aspen Center for Environmental Studies for sunset hikes, birding outings, naturalist guides and (in winter) snowshoe treks. The Collective Snowmass hosts movies under the stars, comedy and music series, and more.

This area has a world-class dining scene. Chefs at restaurants like Matsuhisa, Aurum, Kenichi and Element 47 craft menus around whatever produce is in season.



Mountains of San Juan Splendor Await



The San Juan Mountains encompass rolling hills of ranch country, plunging canyons and peaks so jagged it seems they were carved yesterday. Find these scenes and more in Montrose, Ouray, Ridgway and Telluride.

Day 1

The Gunnison River took thousands of years to carve Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park near Montrose. For a look at its wonders, start at the Elk Creek Visitor Center on Blue Mesa Reservoir, Colorado's largest body of water. Winds captured by buttes make for prime sailing conditions, anglers find deep water filled with kokanee salmon and mackinaw trout, and boaters roam more than 41,000 acres. On the Morrow Point Boat Tour, float on a pontoon to the foot of the cliffs. Landlubbers stick to the 4-mile Curecanti Creek Trail, which passes through forests as it drops below the canyon's rim.

In the park itself, the astonishingly steep walls expose black metamorphic rock and are so sheer that hiking into the canyon is an ambitious undertaking.

Instead, take a relatively flat walk from the South Rim Visitor Center. Peer across the chasm to Colorado's tallest cliff, Painted Wall.

As a basecamp for exploring the area, Montrose is a gateway to biking, hiking, rafting, hunting and fishing. You'll be charmed by the town's Old West feel yet surprised by modern eateries, breweries and shops. Visit the Water Sports Park on the Uncompangre River for kayaking, tubing and swimming. West of Montrose, explore the Dominguez-Escalante National Conservation Area's red-rock canyons. In town, the Ute Indian Museum connects the past with contemporary Ute life and culture, and the Museum of the Mountain West offers an authentic peek at the Wild West.

Day 2

Ouray sits in a narrow valley with the towering San Juan Mountains. That's one reason it's considered ground zero for Jeep touring. An extensive and scenic network of old mining roads is another. Many Victorian-era structures have been restored to retain the town's original charm. Check out nearby Ridgway Area Trails' 40 miles of mountain-bike and hiking trails. Ouray's Western Slope Rides shuttles get you to a hiking trailhead, backcountry mountain biking, ice-climbing expeditions and more. Stop first to pick up picnic provisions at the locally focused Ouray Meat & Cheese Market.

In the winter, the town lives up to its Ice-Climbing Capital nickname when the Ouray Ice Park opens more than 200 routes to spiked adventurers. Summer climbers stop for Basecamp Bouldering, a drop-in climbing gym with programs for all ages.

Summer Fun AT SKI RESORTS Up the free gondola to Mountain Village. vou'll find the Telluride Adventure Center, with activities including a canopy tour, bike park, bungee trampoline and more.

Afterward, enjoy a restorative experience in the enormous Ouray Hot Springs Pool. Ouray is also a stop along the Colorado Spirits Trail and SW Colorado Crafted Beverages Tour, so watch for locally distilled spirits and brews.

Stop at True Grit Cafe in Ridgway, built to honor the original "True Grit" movie starring John Wayne, filmed here in 1969, for a burger. Ridgway is a Certified Colorado Creative District and a stop along the Colorado Creative Corridor, home to artisans, fests, studios, fiber-arts makers, galleries and concerts. Weehawken Creative Arts has classes and workshops in dance, photography, fine arts and more.

The town is a jumping-off point to splendid views of Mount Sneffels and the Dallas Divide — one of our most photographed alpine scenes. Star seekers will want to know the town is an International Dark-Sky Community. It's also home base to the San Juan Hut System, which connects epic mountain biking, hiking and backcountry skiing/snowshoeing trails with a network of isolated mountain huts.

It's easy to fall for Telluride's Victorianera homes and beautiful box canyon. Millennia after the Ute Indians settled in the craggy San Juans, prospectors struck gold and silver here. By 1896, the town had 10,000 residents and its very own hospital — now the beautifully renovated Telluride Historical Museum. Start here for an overview of Telluride's evolution from gritty mining town to 1970s hippie haven to today's ski hub. Then mosey 12 blocks along Colorado Avenue, which comprise a National Historic Landmark District.

Telluride truly celebrates local, where all shops, restaurants and hotels are independently owned and Colorado minded. And there's no need for a car between the Galloping Goose bus in town and the gondola to Mountain Village, getting around is a snap!

Pick up the serene River Trail, which turns into the Idarado Legacy Trail at the town park. In the summer, the park bustles with music festivals. From here, take the 2.5-mile path to the base of Bridal Veil Falls — Colorado's highest


Winter Fun Telluride Ski Resort boasts mountains of fun, while downtown's shops and cafes buzz with après skiers, shoppers and a festive atmosphere. The region's San Juan Mountains lure folks out of town for world-class snowmobiling and snowshoeing.

free-falling waterfall. Or get a bird's-eye view of the densely forested San Miguel River Valley during a ride on the gondola, a 13-minute journey from downtown to Mountain Village's shops, restaurants and activities, including Canopy Adventure Tours, with guided ziplining and rappelling.

Back downtown, see why Telluride is one of the top creative districts at the Sheridan Opera House for a concert or ski film. The ornate theater was once a colorful and airy venue for men who spent their days mining underground. Go gallery to gallery on the Telluride Art Walk. Local art shops stay open late and offer free refreshments on the first Thursdays of most months, or you can pick up a self-guided map any time.

You'll also find plenty of excellent places for a meal in this foodie-friendly enclave. Still have steam left? Telluride Sleighs and Wagons offers horse-drawn sleighs year-round to the historic Aldasoro family ranch, where a gourmet dinner is served.

Make a Break for the High Country



Chase Gold Rush lore, modern-day prospectors and railroad rides just 40 minutes west of Denver in the towns of Idaho Springs, Georgetown, Silver Plume, Black Hawk and Central City.

Days 1 & 2

Start early with a drive up the highest paved highway in North America. During the summer (weather permitting, reservations required), the Mount Evans scenic byway starts in Idaho Springs and climbs to top-of-the-world views. Or hook up with a rafting outfitter several run this stretch of Clear Creek.

Swing down to Idaho Springs, where an 1859 discovery ushered in the Colorado Gold Rush. That heritage lives on through well-preserved buildings and at the Visitor Center & Heritage Museum, with an exhibit on transportation history in a Colorado mining town. You can also pick up maps and tips for exploring the area.

Head to walkable downtown for places to eat, craft beers and spirits, and cute boutiques. Take time to soak in the pools and geo-thermal caves at Indian Hot Springs.

There are plenty of places to grab a thrill ride, including Lawson Adventure Park & Resort and the Sky Trek aerial park at Colorado Adventure Center. Speaking of mines, the ARGO Mill & Tunnel has tours and gold panning year-round.

Journey west to Georgetown to visit Victorian-era homes and silverboom relics at the Hamill House and Hotel de Paris museums, as well as exhibits at the Georgetown

Heritage Center. Venture 1,000 feet underground on a tour of Capital Prize Mine, and break for an afternoon bite — the town's main street also has antique, craft and coffee shops.

Board the Georgetown Loop Railroad for a narrow-gauge train ride to Silver Plume and back for views of the Clear Creek Valley and an optional walking tour into an 1870s mine tunnel. Bread Bar in Silver Plume, housed in an 1800s-era bakery, serves up cocktails named after famous local characters.

Day 3

Step into a mini Western-style Las Vegas for some action in "the richest square mile on earth." The former mining hamlets of Black Hawk and Central City are just 1 mile apart and are lined with bustling, grand casinos as well as mom-and-pop gaming saloons and 19th-century storefronts.

Another option is the Central City Opera House, a 1878 jewel-box theater built by Welsh and Cornish miners still hosting performances each summer (part of the Colorado Historic Opera Houses Circuit). History hounds will



love the original Gold Rush maps and documents found in Black Hawk's City Hall Annex and the new Gregory Street Plaza, a pedestrian-friendly retail area.

There's also the new Maryland Mountain Quartz Valley Open Space Park, a trail system for hikers and bikers that passes by mining-era relics.

You can easily head over to Golden Gate Canyon State Park or hop on the Peak to Peak scenic byway toward Estes Park, both kaleidoscopic journeys amid spring wildflowers and fall foliage.



Small but mighty Echo Mountain Resort in Idaho Springs is the closest ski area to Denver and one of the few that offers night skiing. You can also book a backcountryskiing excursion with Jones Pass Guides in Empire, who will whisk you to all of the fluffiest powder via snowcat.





Hot Springs, Moose & Western Living



With vast ranches, aspen-draped mountains and oxbow rivers, the Steamboat Springs and Walden/ North Park area make for a serene escape, and there's also plenty of adventure for those who seek it.

Days 1 & 2


Start at one of Steamboat Springs' thermal-water attractions — Old Town or Strawberry Park Hot Springs. Follow your soak with a gondola ride to the top of Mount Werner for a patio brunch or lunch with a splendid view; or head to Steamboat Zipline Adventures on Rabbit Ears Pass, where wilderness and valley views fight for attention. The Yampa River Core Trail runs the length of town and is a great place to bike or walk to downtown, parks and the river.

Nearby, Stagecoach State Park's boating, Jet Skiing and rainbow trout await. As you drive through the region, look for signs that share the cultural heritage of the area (go to nwcoloradoheritagetravel.org for maps and more info).

Kids could spend days exploring the ropes course, mini golf and mountain coaster at Steamboat Resort's The Land Up Adventure Zone, as well as hiking and mountain-biking trails. Intown options include the more than 50 gardens at the free Yampa River Botanic Park and the Tread of Pioneers Museum to explore the ways of the Native Americans, miners, ranchers, skiers and outlaws in this once-Wild West town.

Steamboat is also a big biking destination. Hit the trails at the Steamboat Bike Park and more than 50 miles of singletrack on Emerald Mountain, or there are new off-roading trails off Buffalo Pass. End the afternoon at a brewery or the Steamboat

To Steamboat's west, stop into the quiet ranching town of **Hayden**, popular with hunters and anglers as an easy home base. Hayden is near the Medicine Bow and Routt national forests and the Mount Zirkel and Sarvis Creek wilderness areas. Backpacking, hiking and biking ops are nearly everywhere in these protected spaces, and rafters and campers enjoy a handful of state parks. Get to know cowboys and cowgirls, homesteaders and coal miners at Hayden Heritage Center in the historical 1918 Moffat Railroad Depot.


South of Steamboat, stop in the tiny town of Yampa for a bite at the Antlers Cafe & Bar. From there, you can hop on the Flat Tops scenic byway for amazing scenery, hunting, fishing and horseback riding, as well as snowmobiling and cross-country skiing.

Whiskey Company, the only craft distillery in the area. Delicious dining is found in the historical downtown.

On summer weekends, cross the Yampa River to the Romick Rodeo Arena and cheer on the cowboys of the Pro Rodeo Series, preceded by barbecue and country music. Or, since Steamboat is a Certified Colorado Creative District, stroll through galleries or pick up the First Friday Artwalk.

Get a taste of Rocky Mountain hospitality at one of the area's dude ranches, where you can fill your days with cattle drives, fly-fishing, horseback riding, cowboy cuisine and more.

Days 3 & 4

Northeast of Steamboat is an area called North Park, known as the Moose Capital of Colorado, where sightings are common. The Moose Visitor Center at State Forest State Park is an excellent first stop, or pop into the River Rock Cafe on Main Street in Walden for tips.

Step back in time at Walden's North Park Pioneer Museum, housed in an 1883 cabin packed to the rafters with Old West relics, plan a leafpeeping excursion in the fall or hit the area's gravel-riding trails.

Elusive and enchanting birds like the greater sage-grouse, boreal owls and fox sparrows frequent the Colorado Birding Trail, Walden Lake and Cowdrey Lake State Wildlife Area. Make more feathered friends at Arapaho National Wildlife Refuge.

Other popular sights include Teller City and Coalmont ghost towns, wildlife refuges, rodeos, OHV trails in North Sand Hills' sand dunes and the Cache la Poudre – North Park scenic byway.

Around 65 percent of North Park is public land, so you'll find uncrowded lakes, rivers, mountains, prairies and the other towns of Rand, Gould and Cowdrey.

Flying High in the Royal Gorge Region



The 10-mile-long **Royal Gorge sports** the nation's highest suspension bridge, dangling 1,000plus feet above the crashing Arkansas River, but that's not the only reason to visit Cañon City and nearby Florence.

Adventurers are drawn to the region for epic rock climbing, mountain biking, ziplining, fishing and river rafting, as well as a scene rich in geology, archaeology and history.

For unmatched views of the area and the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, hike or bike along four restored train trestles on the new mile-long Point Alta Vista Trail. Or, find incredible fishing on the Arkansas' Gold Medal trout waters. Since the region is more temperate than other parts of Colorado, the weather is comfortable for many activities year-round.

Towering above the Arkansas is the famous Royal Gorge Bridge. Navigate the rapids beneath on a guided whitewater-raft trip, slide along sky-high cables with Royal Gorge Zipline Tours or find thrills at the Royal Gorge Bridge & Park's attractions, including the world's longest single-span aerial gondola.

Families looking to make memories can take a fun, scenic excursion on the Royal Gorge Route Railroad, while the Royal Gorge Dinosaur Experience delights kids of all ages with interactive displays, hands-on exhibits and fossils.

Walkable downtown Cañon City has shops, a public-art program and locally loved eateries like Nirvana Culinary Paradise and Fremont Provisions. Or savor the region's apples and other bounties at farmers' markets.

Legends of gold rushers, agriculture pioneers and even dinosaurs proliferate in the region. The self-guided Fremont County Heritage Tours and the Skyline Drive dinosaur tour can help you dig in.

Treasure hunters beeline to Florence, a lovely nearby town with extensive antique shopping, art galleries and specialty shops.

Set Up a Summit County Family Retreat



"Colorado's Playground" is an easy trip from Denver. Hugged by three mountain ranges, there are activities to satisfy anyone itching to get out and lose themselves in Breckenridge, Silverthorne, Frisco, Dillon, Keystone and Copper Mountain — all close enough to move easily between by car, bike or bus.



Days 1 & 2

Start with a trip down to the water — the Blue River Trail provides access to the river's Gold Medal, trout-filled waters and a scenic walk- or bikeway. Parallel to the trail, more than 50 stores at the Outlets at Silverthorne, including J. Crew, Banana Republic, Columbia and Coach, are the place to score some deals. Grab items for a picnic and head for Maryland Creek Park for amazing views.

Tackle one of Keystone's championship golf courses or bring the family to Keystone Resort for the bike park, scenic chairlift ride, summer snowtubing, horseback riding, mountaintop yoga and more. Then head out for a spell on Lake Dillon, where you can rent canoes, kayaks, pontoon boats and paddleboats and explore the dozen or so islands sprinkled


throughout. The Frisco Bay Marina has all you'll need, including new Sail the Summit charters and sunset cruises.

Hop on land at the Peninsula Recreation Area for new singletrack trails, disc golf, and loads of picnic sites to spread out with wares from one of Main Street's tempting delis, breweries, distilleries and chef-owned eateries in Frisco. You'll also find several maker spaces: art studios, a glass-blowing shop, a millinery and more.

The Frisco Adventure Park has expanded its offerings of a bike park and disc golf to include a mammoth skate park, a bouldering area for kids and additional trails for biking,



running, hiking and cross-country skiing. Silverthorne Recreation Center wears kids out with four pools, water slides and an aquatic climbing wall.

Bring a blanket to the Dillon Amphitheater for a lakeside evening concert. Throughout the summer, the pavilion hosts performances, concerts and dance nights. The Lake Dillon Theatre Company has a new home at the Silverthorne Performing Arts Center if you're up for more mountain culture.

The Friday Dillon Farmers Market is a must for delicious fare and entertainment — and one of the most stunning backdrops in the world.

Or head over to Copper Mountain, where a scenic chairlift can take you to a mountaintop restaurant or to a downhill mountain-bike course or rugged hike. Run the kids blissfully ragged on the zipline, mountain bikes, a mountain coaster, bumper boats, yoga, guided hikes and more.





Day 3

Go car-free in walkable, public-transitfriendly Breckenridge, which boasts a vibrant local food and beverage scene. Grab breakfast at one of the more than 70 independently owned restaurants. Then, hop on your mountain bike and hit the trails; many are converted wagon routes and mining paths. If you prefer pavement, the Ten Mile Recreational Pathway is named for the adjacent mountain range; the 24-mile paved path connects to the 55-mile Summit County Recreational Path.

Or race down the slopes on the Gold Runner Coaster alpine track or Alpineer Challenge Course and up the Gold Summit Climbing Wall, part of the Epic Discovery program at Breckenridge Ski Resort. An expansive network of hiking and mountain-bike trails is also

accessible right from town. Enrich the mind and soothe the soul with a nature hike led by Summit Nature Guides.

In the afternoon, visit downtown Breckenridge, where boutiques tempt with everything from designer cupcakes to designer jeans as well as imported olive oils and cigars in a 200-structure historic district. Breck is one of the state's emerging art towns and a Certified Colorado Creative District, hosting makers' nights, performances and a number of studios, galleries and shops holding cool workshops.

New restaurants and breweries join longtime standards, including Broken Compass Brewery's new Main Street taproom, Mimo Fancy Tapas and The Carlin.



Majestic Mountain Towns



Gunnison is the quintessential Western rodeo town. Crested Butte is its freespirited neighbor. Both are packed with adventure and spectacular scenery.

Day 1

Start west of Gunnison at Blue Mesa Reservoir and Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park. See our largest body of water peppered with boaters, anglers and parasailers. Another place outdoors lovers flock is Hartman Rocks Recreation Area, a paradise of desert mountain biking, hiking, rock climbing, horseback riding, trail running and Nordic skiing and snowshoeing. New mountain-bike trails open every year, and more than a third of the state's gravel-riding trails are found in this area.

Wander Gunnison's easy downtown. Stop into the main drag's local cafes and pop into boutiques. Take in the Pioneer Museum's mineral exhibit; then visit the new Buckel Family Wine for a nightcap.


View twinkling skies up close at the Gunnison Valley Observatory, open summer Fridays and Saturdays. For more starry action, Black Canyon is an International Dark-Sky Park.

Day 2

Mosey 30 miles north to the granite peaks of Crested Butte, known as an adventure-sports hub and the Wildflower Capital of Colorado. The area is awash in lupine, columbine and Indian paintbrush in summer — take a hike to see fields of purple, gold and fuchsia.

At Crested Butte Mountain Resort, take the chairlift to access a web of mountain-biking trails or zipline, disc golf and rock climb. Continue outdoor exploits with a raft or fishing trip on the Taylor River. Fishing, hiking and SUP-ing are top activities at Lake Irwin.

Blocks of Victorian-era buildings form one of our most distinctive towns. There's a festival of some sort nearly every summer weekend. Take in a performance at the Center for the Arts, one of the reasons the town is a Certified Colorado Creative District.



Crazy About Longmont



Along the Front Range between Boulder and Loveland, Longmont is a stop-worthy destination for great brews and views, distinct local arts and access to the outdoors. You'll find three golf courses, three National Historic Districts, beautiful parks and a Certified Colorado Creative District in Longmont. Stop by the downtown Visitors Center for trail maps, brochures and the Crazy Good Craft pass for craft-beverage fans. Then, survey the work of local artists in galleries and coffee shops — which are especially bustling during second Fridays events.

Make your way to the Longmont Museum for exhibits on the region's history. Or head to the Dickens Farm Nature Area along St. Vrain Creek, with biking trails, an accessible nature-themed playground and a nine-drop whitewater park for tubers.

The area's brewery scene is noteworthy. If you want to easily sample beers across the city, the hop-on/hop-off BrewHop Trolley transports adult-beverage lovers to a dozen venues every weekend. For a twist, visit St. Vrain Cidery or one of the town's craft-spirits distilleries.

Time for a snack! The Art of Cheese offers courses covering everything curdy. For more cheesiness, try culinary

experiences at Cheese Importers and Haystack Mountain Creamery.


Heartier options range from casual hangouts to upscale bistros. Savor local flavor on Wonder Tours' food tours. Stroll off that meal with a downtown-, women- or Latino-history tour, which you can download at longmontcolorado.gov/virtualtours.

The Dougherty Museum — open weekends, June to Aug. — has an impressive collection of antique autos, farm equipment and more. Meanwhile, the Agricultural Heritage Center stars cool interactive exhibits and a 1909 farmhouse with period furnishings.

For thrills, Mile-Hi Skydiving Center offers sky-high views of Longs Peak. There's also the Warrior Playground, an obstacle course and training facility styled after those on "American Ninja Warrior."

For a more relaxing excursion, consider stand-up paddleboarding on Union Reservoir or McIntosh Lake or cycling along the St. Vrain Greenway — the crown jewel in the city's trail system that links scenic parks along St. Vrain Creek.

Get Inspired to Linger Longer



Adventure and restful solitude rule days and nights in the towns of Delta, Cedaredge, Crawford, Paonia, Hotchkiss and Orchard City where lush farms, artful nooks and ancient canyons await discovery.

Sublime and active pursuits merge in Delta County, where an organic-food-and-wine region meets easy access to spectacular canyonlands for hiking and biking, including Escalante Canyon and Big and Little Dominguez canyons.

Start with the West Elks Wine Trail, which meanders past 15 wineries. As you go, savor treats from restaurants that highlight local produce and meats, including Root & Vine Market in Paonia and 133 BRGR in Hotchkiss. Head to Paonia's Town Park on summer Tuesdays for the Arbol Farmers Market's fresh local eats and live music.

Paonia, Hotchkiss and Crawford form a Certified Colorado Creative District, where artsy folk mix with the mesas. Delta's historic Main Street is lined with colorful murals.

For history, Fort Uncompangre brings an 1820s fur-trading post to life, and

the Delta County Museum's big draw is a collection of dinosaur discoveries from the nearby Dry Mesa quarry site. Follow signs to the Eagle Rock Shelter Access from Hwy. 92, where the earliest humans known to inhabit North America found shelter on a ledge above the Gunnison River.

Sweitzer Lake State Park is ideal for boating, birding and moonlight paddling, as are Paonia and Crawford state parks. Western Slope SUP can get you set up on the area's calm waters. Gunnison Gorge National Conservation Area is popular with hikers, backpackers and trout fishers on the Gunnison River's Gold Medal waters.

Mountain bikers find uncrowded paradise on the challenging Sidewinder mountain-bike trail, the County Line trail system, Escalante Rim Loop and the North Rim Entrance to Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park. There's also miles of singletrack and a skills and pump track in Delta's Confluence Park.

Antique shops in Delta and the old-school Tru Vu Drive In Theater should scratch an itch for nostalgic pursuits. Other must-see spots include the charming Cirque Boutique, Creamery Arts Center, Azura Cellars and Gallery, Paonia United Brewing Co., The Storm Cellar and Delicious Orchards & Big B's Cidery.

For a truly unique adventure, visit Western Culture Farmstead & Creamery to sample small-batch goat cheese, tour the farm and meet the goats themselves.

Stop into the Delta Area Chamber of Commerce for maps and advice about all the area has to offer.

Playing & Pampering



Luxury resorts, worldfamous golf, family attractions, events and stunning vistas make Vail, Beaver Creek, Avon, Minturn and Eagle ideal for pleasure-seekers.

Days 1 & 2

Savor sun-drenched mountain mornings in the Vail Valley, where plenty of options draw you outside. Vail Mountain has oodles of summer fun at Epic Discovery, where visitors tackle ropes courses, an alpine coaster, mini golf and more.

Or grab a round at several Eagle County golf courses to see your ball fly farther in the thin, alpine air. There's also the nearby West Avon Preserve trail system, with winding trails for all difficulty levels. Trailhead parking in the area fills up quickly, so hop the free bus to hike and bike. Learn more at discovervail.com/hike.

Lunch at one of Vail's many fabulous restaurants. Then indulge in a spa day or stroll Vail Village and nearby Beaver Creek for world-class shopping — from glitzy jewelry and couture clothing to T-shirts and artwork.

Animal-centric adventures are plentiful, too: Goat Yoga at Vail Stables combines the bliss of yoga with the adorable energy of baby goats. Paragon Guides' Take a Llama to Lunch hikes pair you with a llama and guide you into evergreen forests and aspen groves. And Sage Outdoor Adventures offers fly-fishing trips on private waters.

Be sure to check for special summertime events such as the Hot Summer Nights Concert Series, the Bravo! Music Festival and the Vail Dance Festival, which brings dancers from all over the world to a gorgeous outdoor stage.

Choose another valley town for today's adventures. Avon's a treat with meandering trails and Nottingham Park, home to the state's largest Fourth of July celebration, paddleboats, SUPs, fishing and picnic spots. Summers on Nottingham Lake bring the heat with sunset SUP races. Walking Mountains Science Center provides a special place for learning and discovery through guided hikes, camps and other family activities.

Eagle is growing in popularity as a home base in the valley. Town Park is a hub of activity, with yoga, a playground, cottonwood-shaded picnic areas and summer concerts. The Eagle Pool & Ice Rink is another hot spot and the gateway to main trailheads for mountain bikers, runners and hikers.

Eagle River Park has whitewater waves and holes for surfing, kayaking, rafting and tubing, as well as a beach area.

Check out Minturn's galleries, antique shops and the Minturn Market, with crafts, prepared foods, farms, live music and more. The town's Everkrisp Trail delights outdoors lovers and connects to 222 miles of Forest Service trails for hiking, biking, Nordic skiing and snowshoeing. Grab trail maps at Town Hall.

Gypsum has a shooting range, fishing ponds, a championship golf course and the Dry Lake Motocross Park. For OHVers, the Middle Middle rockcrawling trail boasts large boulders, undercut ledges and waterfall climbs.

Red Cliff is a jumping-off point for mountain biking, cross-country skiing, wildflower hikes and more. Edwards' Riverwalk shopping district has a variety of mountain boutiques. Wolcott is home to Zip Adventures — six separate lines and the Canyon Plunge free-fall ride.

Year-round, the 10th Mountain Division Huts provide backcountry stopovers for snowshoers, skiers and hikers. Book early — these huts fill up fast.



Winter Fun

Vail and Beaver Creek are two of the most famous ski destinations in the state. Vail is famed for its back bowls and expansive terrain. Beaver Creek has McCoy Park's terrain, lifts and learning area. Both towns have easy access to off-slope attractions, from snowmobiling and snowtubing to mountaintop dining and sleigh rides.







Bikes, Art & Beer Lead to Bliss



Cruise between Fort Collins, Loveland and Greeley, where bike trails, breweries, farm-to-table menus, museums and artful spaces converge with natural beauty, plentiful recreation and the Poudre River.

Day 1

In Fort Collins, you'll find almost 300 miles of bike trails and lanes, and 70 percent of all the state's craftbeer production. So whether you ride a cruiser, fixie or just a plain old bike, hop on and get pedaling!

Start the day at one of Historic Old Town's artisan coffee shops, and then explore bookstores, shops and galleries while you sip.

Kids in tow? Head to the Fort Collins Museum of Discovery, focusing on the history of science and the science of history. Across town, Inspiration Playground lets those with and without disabilities play independently on the same equipment. Stop at The Butterfly House at The Gardens on Spring Creek for fluttery delights.

For lunch, grab a sweet or savory Czech-inspired pastry at the Colorado Kolache Company. Or head back to Old Town to sample everything from wings and tacos to pulledpork waffles at The Exchange.

The city's 20-plus breweries offer a wide variety of styles and flavors — pick up a tasting journal from the Downtown Visitor Center. Odell Brewing and New Belgium pair delicious pours with sprawling beer gardens, but for a full-bodied beer experience, you should also hit smaller breweries like The Gilded Goat and Horse & Dragon.

If water's more your style, visit
Horsetooth Reservoir — its 6.5-mile lake
and red cliffs are loved by hikers, bikers
and paddlers. Or raft down Class III and
IV rapids on the nationally designated
Wild and Scenic Cache la Poudre.



Located northwest of Fort Collins, the rustic mountain village of **Red Feather Lakes** is far from energetic city life and popular with campers and boaters. Surrounded by the 612,000-acre Roosevelt National Forest, the area is a yearround outdoor playground that offers beautiful scenery, diverse wildlife, hiking trails and cozy mountain retreats.

Windsor is a growing community between Loveland, Fort Collins and Greeley. A peaceful place to explore the plains is the town's Frank State Wildlife Area, along a portion of the Poudre River Trail. For local flavors, check out Chimney Park Restaurant, Chapmans Produce fruit and veggie store, and Hearth Restaurant and Pub.

In the evening, whether you're after thought-provoking pieces or lively entertainment, numerous performance venues are sure to scratch any creative itches. For starry night skies, Red Mountain Open Space, Soapstone Prairie and Coyote Ridge natural areas are a few places to spot far-away galaxies. The Northern Colorado Astronomical Society also hosts public events.

Day 2

Drive 30 minutes south to arts-obsessed Loveland. Wander Benson Sculpture Garden's nearly 200 sculptures. Then head downtown, where charming blocks showcase historical buildings, shops and restaurants. Check out The Foundry, a three-block, mixed-use haven with events, a movie theater and more. Or, stop by the Loveland Visitors Center for information on the Sweetheart City's many breweries.

Speaking of sweethearts ... loved ones can lock in their affections on two 10-foot-tall LOVE sculptures. Buy an engraved lock at the visitors center, and then step outside or head to Lake Loveland to lock your love on the grids.

Hikers seek out The Keyhole rock formation at Devil's Backbone Open Space, an impressive geologic landmark. Boaters, fishers, paddleboarders and other water lovers will find plenty to do in the area at picturesque Carter Lake, as well as Boyd Lake State Park, Lou Hagler Reservoir and others. You can also make an easy 35-mile day trip to Rocky Mountain National Park and settle back in Loveland for the evening.

Day 3

Like any good college town, Greeley has a fine selection of coffeehouses to kick your day off right. Hit historical hot spots to learn about Greeley's past. The 1870 Meeker Home Museum and the Greeley History Museum — where you can see the famous serpentine dress of local legend Rattlesnake Kate — are sure to please.


Greeley's culinary offerings grow every year, including breweries, distilleries and on-trend restaurants. 477 Distilling, Daruma Japanese Restaurant and Birrieria Doña Maria are just a few examples.

Stop by the Colorado Model Railroad Museum, which features more than 1,100 railroad-related artifacts. There's also the Centennial Village Museum, a living-history odyssey with original homes, lush gardens and walking paths that provide a look at local life from the 1870s to early 1930s.

Or take a swing along the Poudre River Trail, with mountain views, easy hiking trails and river access, fishing and wildlife viewing. The Poudre Learning Center has a fishing club, garden tours, bike trails and more.

You'll find more than 160 pieces of public art sprinkled around Greeley, as well as lovely parks — including Homestead Park and Open Spaces — that feature lakes, small streams, bridges, waterfalls and islands.

Every summer Friday brings live music on the Ninth Street Plaza for Friday Fest, with face painting, bubbles artistry, sidewalk chalk and more.



Feel the Magic of the Wild Frontier



Once a rough-and-tumble mining town inhabited by cowboys, gold-seekers and ruffians like Wild Bill Hickok, modernday Pueblo is a sunny playground on the banks of the Arkansas River.

Morning

Begin in the colorful Union Avenue Historic District, once home to trading posts, gambling saloons and brothels. Today, it's one of three areas that make up Pueblo's Creative Corridor — hubs of museums, live music, galleries and more. The creatives of Pueblo Arts Alliance host an array of events, including their monthly First Friday Art Walk.

Stroll the Historic Arkansas Riverwalk, a 32-acre waterfront plaza connecting walking and biking trails to a nature center and even Lake Pueblo State Park. Near the riverwalk is Neon Alley, an outdoor museum of vintage signs and new creations.

For a more active morning, gravel bikers will find plenty of sweet trails, ranging from 2 to 170-plus miles. Download the *Pueblo Gravel Adventure Guide* from visitpueblo.org for more. Gravel Locos, a free cycling event with four unique routes, made its Pueblo debut in 2022.

Afternoon


Traveling with kids? Mosey over to the award-winning Buell Children's Museum, adored for its hands-on arts, science and history exhibits. There's also Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum, a World War II-era Army air base with vintage aircraft; the El Pueblo History Museum, a recreated 1840s adobe trading post; Pueblo Railway Museum, a railyard hosting train rides and family-friendly events; and the Rosemount Museum, a 37-room 1893 mansion.

Evening

Watch the city melt into shades of gold and red on a sunset boat ride. In Old Town, sample the town's de facto mascot: the chile pepper. Try a Pueblo Slopper, a burger smothered in pork green chili, cheese and onions. Take the Pueblo Chile Farm Tour on Hwy. 50 to soak in the aromas, colors and hard work of local farmers (Aug.—Sept.). Roadside markets also offer sausage, cheese, honey and more.

A Grand Time in Grand County



In this mountainous county — home to Winter Park, Grand Lake, Granby, Kremmling, Fraser and Hot Sulphur Springs — hot springs, outdoor adventure and Rocky Mountain National Park are just the tip of the must-do list.

Day 1

Start at Winter Park Resort, a longrunning ski resort that doubles as a summer playground. Ride a gondola to the mountaintop to mountain bike down ramps, jumps and exciting terrain. There's also an alpine slide, a climbing wall, mini golf, a ropes course, guided hikes and more. Head downtown for places to wet your whistle and stroll the art trail.

Hop on the 10-mile Fraser River Trail via foot, bike or cross-country skis. The trail ends at Headwaters River Journey, where exhibits explore the wonders of conservation and preservation. Or book an aerial-park outing with Winter Park Adventure Quest in Fraser. Meanwhile, Snow Mountain Ranch has a grin-inducing summer tubing hill and other family activities.

A handful of breweries and lunch spots make Fraser an excellent stop for a break, including Vicious Cycle Brewing Company, whose sours, lagers and IPAs will brighten up any day. The town is also a perfectly located home base for outdoor adventure (and is known for its lift-served winter snow-tubing hill).

In laid-back Grand Lake, note the town's Western character in historical boardwalks and hitching posts. As Colorado's deepest and largest natural lake, Grand Lake itself attracts funseekers looking to boat, ride the Rocky Mountain Amphicar, water ski, SUP, fish, sail or relax on the beach.

As the western entrance to Rocky Mountain National Park, Grand Lake has quiet, best-kept-secret vibes and is an excellent spot for viewing moose and other wildlife year-round. (Note: the park requires timed-entry reservations.)

Cap your evening in one of the state's Certified Creative Districts with a musical at Grand Lake's Rocky Mountain Repertory Theatre.

Day 2

As the Colorado River carves its way from the Continental Divide to the Pacific, it treats Grand County visitors to some of the greatest rafting and Gold Medal fishing around. Jagged red canyons and lush valleys provide ideal backdrops for mellow floats; outfitters can be found throughout the county.

Granby offers Western hospitality, and a main street of antique shops and restaurants. For a true taste of town, savor a hearty meal at The Cafe at Fitch Ranch Meats & Markets, owned and supplied by a local family of ranchers.

You'll also find ample access to the outdoors, including boating and fishing on Lake Granby. Back on dry land, golfers can watch their shots fly farther through our thin air at four mountain golf courses.



Winter Fun

Winter Park Resort's diverse terrain, adventure-concierge service and Winter Park Express Amtrak route from Denver make it a top destination. Nearby Granby Ranch is a long-time family spot, and Bluebird Backcountry offers lessons, guided experiences and more.

All these towns offer fun beyond the slopes, with snowshoeing and Nordic skiing, snow tubing, sleigh and dogsled rides, and snowmobiling.



Day 3

An outdoor paradise, Kremmling has some of the state's finest fishing and elk-hunting grounds, plus more than 300 miles of off-roading trails. Head to Rusty Spurr Ranch for horseback rides; hike to Radium Hot Springs on the Colorado River; and journey to the top of Kremmling Cliffs for panoramic views and Muddy Creek fishing access. Retreat to Hot Sulphur Springs to soak in mineral-rich pools at the town's namesake resort and spa. Then peek into the Pioneer Village Museum, relax for a spell at Dari Delite cafe and while away the day with fishing, trails, disc golf, picnic areas and a walking bridge over the Colorado River.



Cruising **Elevation**




Tour Leadville's 70 blocks of Victorianera buildings and shops, all part of a National Historic Landmark District. Many buildings date to the late 1800s, including the recently renovated Delaware Hotel and Tabor Opera House, a stop on the new Colorado Historic Opera House Circuit.

Downtown is walkable and full of places to chill and eat.

Catch a ride on the Leadville, Colorado & Southern Railroad — in 2021 their winter train returned for the first time since 1937! And don't miss the National Mining Hall of Fame and Museum and the Matchless Mine Tour.

Leadville sits along the electric-vehiclefriendly Top of the Rockies scenic byway, and the town's paved Mineral Belt Trail offers year-round recreation for bikers, hikers, snowshoers and Nordic skiers. More than 100 miles of the Arkansas River, starting at nearby Lake Fork, are Gold Medal fishing waters brimming with trout. Local outfitters can gear you up and point you to top spots.

Twenty miles from town is historical Twin Lakes, where you'll find world-class fishing and boating, B&Bs and cabins, and some spectacular scenery. Twin Lakes is close to the trailhead of Mount Elbert (our tallest peak) and is the eastern gateway to Independence Pass (Aspen is on the other side), one of the state's highest paved roads. Driving the pass is particularly lovely in fall.



Leadville is the country's highest incorporated city — one of the reasons it and its neighboring town, Twin Lakes, are tops with those wanting to get close to the sky.

Silver Thread Byway



A cruise on the electric-vehicle-friendly Silver Thread byway is a must. The 117-mile route connects welcoming towns that embrace their Western roots (and offer plenty of access to outdoor adventure), ending at beautiful Blue Mesa Reservoir west of Gunnison.

Start in South Fork, where showstopping views await. Drop a line in the Rio Grande's 20 miles of Gold Medal waters for primo trout fishing or rent an e-bike before enjoying an elk burger or chocolate shake at South Fork Malt Shoppe. With rugged peaks, alpine lakes and dense woodlands, Weminuche Wilderness also draws adventure-seekers.

Creede boasts a small-town ambiance and remnants of a silver-boomtown past, including Last Chance Mine. At the Creede Historical Museum and Underground Mining Museum,

peek into the lives of the miners and entrepreneurs who shaped the town.

Many natural marvels lie between Creede and Lake City, including majestic North Clear Creek Falls and sapphire-blue Lake San Cristobal. Another special spot west of Lake City is American Basin: a high-alpine backcountry awash in late summer wildflowers.

Lake City lays claim to an impressive collection of 1870s buildings, several nearby ghost towns (like Carson, Animas Forks and Capitol City) and panoramas of the San Juan Mountains. For anglers, campers or hikers, it's prime headquarters for fresh-air exploits. You can also pick up a ghost tour at the Hinsdale County Museum and see a show at the old-timey Mountaineer Theatre.

Pursue untamed wilderness, mining history and iconic outdoor activities in South Fork, Creede and Lake City.




Winter Fun

Lake City has 100-plus miles of groomed trails for snowmobiling, snowshoeing and fat biking, not to mention a stellar ice park and local ski hill. South Fork has an outdoor ice rink and local clubs organizing weekly snowmobiling and snowshoeing outings. And Creede's wilderness is ideal for snowmobile tours.



Ancient Adventures



One of the richest archaeological zones in the U.S. is hidden amid some of the grandest natural landscapes in the Southwest. Visit Mesa Verde Country — Cortez, Mancos and Dolores — for aweinspiring adventures.

Day 1

Make your home base in Cortez, an hour from Mesa Verde National Park. Whether you stay at a yurt, cabin or guest ranch, Cortez has excellent dining and shopping opportunities. Check out the new Zu Gallery for artist exhibits, workshops and a social spot serving Colorado-crafted libations. But save in-town exploits for later - you have a national park to explore. Stop by the Colorado Welcome Center for travel tips from locals on the way.

Head to the "green table" of Mesa Verde National Park, home to 4,700plus archaeological sites, 600 of which are cliff dwellings. Pick up maps and brochures, see exhibits and buy tour tickets at the Visitor and Research Center. Only one cliff dwelling (Step House) is open for

self-guided exploration, so if you want to enter the famed Cliff Palace, you must take a guided tour.

For an overview of the full park, drive the 6-mile Mesa Top Loop Road while listening to the audio tour (available on nps.gov/meve).

Mesa Verde is also an International Dark-Sky Park, so don't miss the chance to view staggeringly starry skies on clear nights.

Day 2

Travel the 116-mile Trail of the Ancients. America's only National Scenic Byway dedicated solely to archaeology. From Cortez, wind past Mesa Verde to Ute



The San Juan Skyway is a 236-mile scenic-byway loop called the "most beautiful drive in America" for good reason. The road traverses southwestern Colorado's rich landscape, starting in Cortez and passing through the idyllic mountain towns of Mancos, Durango, Silverton, Ouray, Ridgway, Telluride, Rico and Dolores. In the fall, the skyway is lined with golden aspens.

The state's most southwestern town,
Towaoc, is the headquarters of the Ute
Mountain Ute Indian Reservation. Take
an interpretive journey of Ute Mountain
Tribal Park with a Ute guide. The tribe
also operates Ute Mountain Casino
Hotel, which includes an RV park,
campground, travel center and restaurant.

Mountain Tribal Park in Towaoc, where Ute guides help you explore the culture, architecture and art of the Ute and Ancestral Puebloan people. From here, pass Four Corners Monument on your way to Hovenweep National Monument's round and square towers, some of which you can reach via a short hike.

Next up is Canyons of the Ancients National Monument. Stop first at the Visitor Center and Museum to learn about the monument and cultures native to the region. Then head to Lowry Pueblo, an ancient structure with 40 rooms and eight circular kivas.

The area's high-desert canyons, mesas and 600 miles of singletrack, slick-rock and old-growth-forest trails make Cortez a hub for mountain bikers. East of town on Hwy. 160, Phil's World is a fast, fun and well-maintained singletrack trail, and the Geer Open Space has 10 additional miles of intermediate biking.

Or head to Mancos, a Certified Colorado Creative District whose community traces its roots back to the ranching, farming and timber industries of the 1870s. Today Mancos boasts little shops brimming with unique gifts and wonderful art. Local artisans craft everything from beer and rum to leather goods and Western hats. Learn the art of typesetting at Mancos Common Press, a community art space full of vintage and antique printing presses. Or take workshops in blacksmithing, mosaics, pottery, leatherworking and more at the Mancos School of the West.

Taste the region's flavors on a Colorado wine tour. Cortez is home to two wineries: Sutcliffe Vineyards, recognized among the country's top wine producers by *Food & Wine Magazine*, and Yellow Car Country Wines, which has a patio with amazing views.

If ATVs are more your thing, the Dolores Ranger District can direct you to the good routes, including the Aspen Loop Trail, a multipurpose, 39-mile loop through old logging roads, streams and aspen groves.

Also in Dolores, fishers will find a haven on McPhee Reservoir, Colorado's second-largest body of water, with 50 miles of shoreline in pinyon, juniper and sagebrush country. Doc's Marina offers boats and kayak rentals, snacks, ice and tackle.



Wine & Wondrous Adventure Country



Grand Junction. Palisade and Fruita are the heart of wine country and an area "on the rise" thanks to farm stands. vineyards and excellent local-centric dining, according to Food & Wine Magazine.

Day 1

The world's largest flat-topped mountain, Grand Mesa is a 10,000-foothigh plateau topped by forest and 300 lakes. Mountain-bike trails lace the area, including the new Palisade Plunge — an advanced 32-mile high-speed singletrack ride.

The Colorado River is accessible to kayaks, canoes, rafts and paddleboards. Riverfront Trail's Monument View section runs 28 miles along the river from Fruita to Grand Junction. The Las Colonias Park section hosts events, tiny-home rentals and open space for hiking and disc golf, plus nearby Edgewater Brewery.

The Palisade Fruit & Wine Byway is another way to see the area, routing through orchards, lavender gardens, vineyards, fruit stands and river views. Look up to spy the Bookcliffs, named for their shape. For dinner, the agricultural bounty doesn't disappoint: Expect seasonal menus and notes of hyperlocally sourced peaches, cherries, plums and more - not to mention wine, beer and cocktails.

Day 2

Start your morning in downtown Grand Junction, where outdoor seating lets you bask in the morning air over brunch.

Those looking to get their heart rates up have options: Jet Boat Colorado's fast Colorado River rides; Get Air Trampoline Park's trampoline and cave climb; Imondi Wake Zone's cable wakeboarding and agua park; and Grand Junction Adventure's river tours and stand-up paddleboard lessons.

There's also Colorado Parks & Wildlife's Cameo Shooting and Education Complex, designed for competitions and as a place where kids can learn the safe use of firearms.

West of Grand Junction, the stunning red-rock canyonlands of Colorado National Monument will fill your photo library. Drive the 23-mile Rim Rock Drive or take a ranger-led tour. In the summer, hook up with Western






Colorado Astronomy Club to see the Milky Way above the canyons.

For a tour of the world's second largest concentration of natural rock arches, Rattlesnake Canyon within the McInnis Canyons National Conservation Area is a special spot for those willing to earn it - it's reached via rough 4x4 drive and a moderate hike.

Serious mountain bikers should add an extra day to explore the trails around Fruita, arguably the top network of singletrack in Colorado. Thirty-two new mountain-bike trails are under construction in the North Fruita Desert, so even more ridable terrain is coming soon. Rock crawlers can find vast and varied terrain there, too. The town is popular with ATVers who love desert trails. Numerous outfitters can set you up with maps and info on the area.

In summer, cheer on the riders at the Rimrock Rodeo or jam out at Civic Center Park downtown.



The Real South Park



The South Park basin towns of Fairplay, Como, Bailey and Alma boast local color gained from wonderfully diverse landscapes, fondly preserved historical sites, and mining and ranching heritage.

South Park is a National Heritage Area tucked in a river valley flanked by 14,000-foot peaks. It has a wealth of natural assets, including mineral deposits, unique geological formations and 100-plus rare or endangered plant and animal species.

Fairplay, established during the Pikes Peak Gold Rush, is now the Trout Fishing Capital of Colorado, with 50-plus miles of Gold Medal streams. Explore via horseback or ATV for maximum fresh-air fulfillment. Find your way to the Windy Ridge Bristlecone Pine Scenic Area, an unusual stand of ancient, wind-sculpted pines.

Get a feel for life in the 1880s at South Park City, where 40 authentic, artifact-filled buildings have been transported from nearby mining communities. On Fairplay's Main and Front streets, historical storefronts house eateries, galleries and shops.

Find more Colorado history in Como, a tiny community with several 1800s-era buildings, like the Como Depot once an integral stop on the Denver, South Park and Pacific Railroad. The Mountain Man Gallery exhibits works by local and regional artists, and hikers love to trek along Black Powder Pass Trail atop Boreas Pass for amazing views of the surrounding valleys.

At 10,578 feet, Alma is the highest incorporated town in the U.S. Highlights include 13,185-foot Mosquito Pass (one of Colorado's highest, and recommended only on foot or via OHV); the nearby ghost town of Buckskin Joe; and Alma Cemetery, where you can investigate stories of fortunes lost and found.

For canyon views, stop in Bailey to stretch your legs in McGraw Memorial Park. Pop into Aspen Peak Cellars for local wines and a charcuterie lunch and hike into the Lost Creek Wilderness to camp along Goose Creek Trail.

Some Things Can Only Be Found in Boulder



Breathtaking views of the Flatirons and Rocky Mountains, a laid-back vibe and celebrated culinary offerings are just a few reasons that make Boulder one of Colorado's most beloved cities nestled between the mountains and reality.

Morning

Playfully referred to as the People's Republic of Boulder, it's characterized by research centers, the University of Colorado, artsy folks, world-class restaurants and hyper-athletic citizens. Start on Pearl Street Mall, the city's main hub, which is lined with historical buildings housing shops and restaurants. For a quintessential experience, drop into The Tune Up, a place to rent or shop for bikes, get coffee and hear live music. Or hook up with JD's Joyrides to view Boulder's vibrant Mural Trail from an e-bike.

Saturdays and Wednesdays, April—mid-November, stroll Boulder Farmers Market; their sell-what-you-grow policy lures in area chefs, so you may taste some of those market veggies at dinner. You can also explore the Boulder County Farm Trail, featuring numerous farms and other places

where you can pick berries, pet animals, picnic in barns or take classes.

Afternoon

Discover the hiking trails in National Historic Landmark Chautauqua Park, with options to suit every skill level and up-close views of the Flatirons — the slanting sandstone slabs that are Boulder's most recognizable landmark. Pro tip: On summer weekends, snag the free shuttle to Chautauqua or Eldorado Canyon State Park from several Boulder locations

There's also the Museum of Boulder, which hosts traveling exhibitions from nationally recognized museums. Or check the schedule for Creative Nations, a new collective for Indigenous artists that hosts artist talks, markets, performances and more at the Dairy Arts Center.

Evening

Dinner on the town is a must, given that Boulder is known for its divine foodiness. Pearl Street boasts an array of options, including Provençal-inspired Mateo, Ash'Kara's contemporary Israeli cuisine and Spanish-style tapas at Gemini. Rayback Collective is a food-truck park/beer garden/live-music venue drawing those in the know east of downtown. For

more hot places to eat and explore, visit bouldercoloradousa.com.

After, taste the local suds at a brewery — there are nearly 20 (not counting cideries, distilleries, wineries and Redstone Meadery — makers of sweet honey wines). Pick up a Boulder Beer Trail brochure at area visitor centers or catch a ride on the Colorado Brewery Bus.





Winter Fun

While not a traditional ski town, Boulder's proximity to skiing at nearby Eldora Mountain Resort, plus affordable winter lodging and downtown vibes make it a primo cold-season destination. Downhillers can schuss Eldora's slopes in the morning and head back to town for a hike or bike ride in the afternoon. Boulder is also becoming a destination for fat biking. Eldora's Nordic Center offers lessons and trails designed specifically for cross-country skiing, skate skiing and snowshoeing.






Boulder is close to Rocky Mountain National Park (1 hour), Eldorado Canyon State Park (15 minutes) and Golden Gate Canyon State Park (45 minutes).

The teeny town of **Nederland** (30 minutes) is a stop on the way to the Indian Peaks and James Peak wilderness areas, as well as shopping and dining along the Peak to Peak scenic byway. The Wild Bear Mountain Ecology Center's nature programs, trails and workshops help you enjoy the area's spectacular scenery, and Barker Meadow Reservoir picnic spots and trails are also popular ways to get outside.



On a mountain trail, over a meal with a view, or in the pool with your kids. Whatever happy adventures look like to you, you'll uncover them here, at the foot of the Flatirons, just 30 minutes from Denver.





Get a hands-on look at the Gold Rush era with a mine tour of Mollie Kathleen, where you'll don a hard hat and descend 1,000 feet to see a vein of gold and ride in a mine cart.

Hop on the historical Cripple Creek & Victor Narrow Gauge Railroad (May-Oct.) through the gold-mining district. Visits to the Cripple Creek Heritage Center and the Cripple Creek District Museum are forays into the past, as is the Gold Camp Historical Trolley Tour.

Hikers head for the trails in the Gold Camp, as well, taking in views and old mining structures along the way.

Stroll Bennett Avenue's nostalgic pathway, shops, restaurants like Gold Camp Cafe and more. Join today's

Follow the path to Cripple Creek, which came to life when the hills beckoned fortune-seekers.

fortune-seekers at betting tables in nine casinos. Then, take your winnings to the historic Butte Theater for a drama-filled treat, and snap pics of the town's resident donkey herd.

The drive from Cripple Creek to Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument — a 35-million-year-old lake bed filled with insects, leaves and huge redwoods frozen in time - is a beautiful leg of the Gold Belt Tour, a National Scenic Byway.

If you happen to be staying in Colorado Springs, Pueblo or Woodland Park. the Ramblin Express shuttle runs up to Cripple Creek each day.



Golden is set in an area of outstanding natural beauty just 12 miles from Denver, Lookout Mountain looms above town and offers you panoramic views in every direction.

Morning

See famous frontier scout and showman Buffalo Bill Cody's story come to life. He was buried at Lookout Mountain in 1917. Learn more about him at a museum near the gravesite. The drive to the gravesite begins in historic downtown Golden on the electric-vehiclefriendly Lariat Loop scenic byway.

The Colorado Railroad Museum has a half-mile circle of track on which they run steam locomotives and the famous Galloping Goose, a 1928 Pierce-Arrow limousine put on train wheels with a bus welded to the back. And the Bradford Washburn American Mountaineering Museum is the first and only in the nation dedicated to mountaineering history.

Bike or hike the paved Clear Creek Trail, which follows the creek from

the mountains through Golden to Denver; or tube and kayak a humanmade whitewater course with rapids and gentle falls. The free, creekside Golden History Museum has 1800s cabins, a one-room schoolhouse and items from eras past.

Afternoon

South Table Mountain and North Table Mountain are landmark mesas rising above town with commanding views of the area. Triceratops Trail, an easy path to dinosaur fossils, is popular with families.

Of course, you'll stop into Golden's highest-profile attraction: Coors Brewery. Marvel at a room of giant copper kettles and watch thousands of cans and bottles whirl around you. Or savor the craft-beer scene at the town's numerous local breweries. While many don't serve food, you can bring your own snacks in or order from the food trucks parked outside.

Find something for everyone at Tributary Food Hall or The Golden Mill. Delights range from charcuterie and gelato to a self-pour tap wall stocked with Colorado beers, cocktails and non-alcoholic beverages.

Evening

Catch a concert at (or just hike around) Red Rocks Park & Amphitheatre in nearby Morrison. The natural amphitheater was listed on the nation's top bucket list for outdoor concerts by Rolling Stone Magazine.

Go Slow: Highway of Legends



Near the southern border, where the Sangre de Cristo Mountains intersect the grassland of the high plains, find the frontier towns of Trinidad, Walsenburg, La Veta and Cuchara.

Day 1

Start at the Trinidad Municipal Golf Course, a nine-holer with Sangre de Cristo views. Trinidad Lake State Park and the Wormhole Loop network of trails are home to miles of multiuse routes that weave through the hills nearby. At Fishers Peak, one of our newest state parks, picnic or stroll meadows and forests via two new paths, including Challenge Trail for its pleasing mesa views.

Wander the brick-lined streets of Old Trinidad for one of the largest collections of Victorian-era houses in the West. You'll find a trove of artists' galleries, and Main Street LIVE theater performances. These factors and more led to the Corazón de Trinidad being named a Certified Colorado Creative District. The Art Cartopia Museum shows just how creative folks can get here, especially when inspired by the town's annual ArtoCade (artcar parade) held each September.

Day 2


The Trinidad History Museum houses the meticulously preserved Baca House, an 1870 two-story adobe that combines Hispanic construction with British design. The Santa Fe Trail Museum exhibits evoke frontier life from the trail days to the 1920s.

End your visit with a drive along the Highway of Legends, a state and National Scenic Byway. From Trinidad, the byway continues west to Cokedale, where a strip of old coke ovens (used to mix and heat coal) lines the road, resembling something out of ancient Rome.

The byway heads north alongside the Sangre de Cristos, affording spectacular views of those mountains to the west as well as the monstrous volcanic walls (or dikes) that jut from the Spanish Peaks to the east. It also passes through the San Isabel National Forest and three cute towns. Cuchara has

stunning Sangre views (especially from the Cuchara Mountain Park trails and disc-golf course; in winter, it opens to snowshoeing and cross-country skiing). For summer splendor, pull off Cuchara Pass at the Farley Wildflower Overlook and behold a color-filled meadow. Scope out Walsenburg's antique shops, mining museum, water park, visitor center and Lathrop State Park. And peek into La Veta's art galleries and the 1862 adobe Francisco Fort Museum. Check out Uptop ghost town on Old La Veta Pass — a haunt of star gazers.

For an audio tour of the Highway of Legends and walking tours of Walsenburg, La Veta and Cuchara, check out the TravelStorys app, which describes the geology and history of the locations you'll see, as well as the legends of those who passed through in days of yore.



Golden Hours in the San Luis Valley



The Rio Grande snakes through a valley ringed by mountains and peppered with hidden lakes, waterfalls and picture-perfect landscapes. Explore intriguing, tucked-away towns like Alamosa, San Luis, Monte Vista, Saguache and Crestone.

Day 1

Leap into the valley's deep roots in the state's oldest town: San Luis, which dates back to 1540. La Vega, a plot of land on the edge of town, is where settlers first established a communal way of life in the late 1800s before Colorado was even a state. Visit the Shrine of the Stations of the Cross for a taste of the area's vibrant arts scene. Gripping bronze sculptures depict Christ's judgment, crucifixion and resurrection along a path that leads to an adobe chapel.

Continue north to Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve's visitor center to learn how North America's tallest dunes came to nestle against the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. Then, play on Colorado's most unique "beach" — Medano Creek; and check out Zapata Falls, a cool respite in summer and a giant ice sculpture in winter. Book a flightseeing trip with Rugged Air Tours to see the park's dunes from the heavens.

Detour to Hwy. 17 and check out two unusual spots: the Colorado Gators Reptile Park in Mosca, where you can see and handle alligators and other scaly critters; and the UFO Watchtower in Hooper, a quirky roadside attraction, to learn of the valley's surprising number of UFO sightings. Book a glamping tent at Rustic Rook Resort to roast s'mores while you scan the skies for clues.

Day 2

To the south, the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad is an 1880s train that travels from historic depots in Antonito, Colorado, to Chama, New Mexico.

From Antonito, hop on the Los Caminos Antiguos scenic byway to discover 16th-century Spanish influences through adobe missions, museums, galleries and authentic cuisine. Back in Alamosa, stop by the Colorado Welcome Center for directions to hiking/biking trails within the city and along the Rio Grande.

Photographers will find Monte Vista National Wildlife Refuge a worthy detour for shots of avocets, killdeer, herons and other wildlife. March's Monte Vista Crane Festival celebrates the 20,000 migrating sandhill cranes.

Those who love rock climbing, biking, hiking and hunting should spend a day in Saguache, a small community north of Alamosa surrounded by the Sangres to the east and San Juans to the west. Check out the Saguache County Museum, a former jail that houses local lore and memorabilia.

Not far is Penitente Canyon, whose 100-foot walls are beloved by climbers. As you hike the trails, try to spy one of Colorado's rarest plants, the neoparrya, scaling the cliff walls.


Nestled into the base of the Sangres, tiny Crestone is a unique blend of spiritual New-Agers who frequent the Hindu temple and Zen center, along with artists, adventurers and birders.



Fort Garland was originally established to protect early settlers in the valley. The structure now houses the Fort Garland Museum & Cultural Center, where visitors can view adobe buildings. Hispanic art and a re-creation of famed frontiersman Kit Carson's quarters while he served as commander until 1867. In the 1870s, "... many Black soldiers eagerly responded to the government's call for troops to help create permanent settlements in the West," according to a History Colorado exhibit there. "Segregated black units were formed and over 10,000 Black soldiers moved west to help create a new way of life they hoped their people would be able to share."

The enclave of **Del Norte** is situated beside the Rio Grande, which has Gold Medal waters for anglers, particularly those who like float fishing. Other natural wonders include the Natural Arch and Elephant Rocks, where volcanic ash welded together to create rock formations more than 28 million years ago.

Sargents is another little town that's popular with outdoors lovers. South of Alamosa and Del Norte, **Conejos** reflects the culture of Old Mexico and boasts fantastic fly-fishing opportunities.



Take a ride on the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railroad, or explore the back country with miles of fishable streams and creeks, hiking trails and abundant wildlife. Unique lodging choices are yours to call home. *Come stay awhile*.

Starry-Eyed Adventures



This peaceful valley, sandwiched between the Wet and Sangre de Cristo mountains, is home to 200 miles of trails and 54 alpine lakes — and Westcliffe and Silver Cliff were the first Colorado communities recognized by the International Dark-Sky Association.

Day 1

Start at Westcliffe's new Main Street Welcome Center for stargazing tips. Then, fuel your day with smothered-in-goodness burritos, followed by Dark Skies ice-cream sundaes at nearby Stage Stop.

Next, head to Planet Walk — a free solar-system exhibit boasting a scale of 4 billion to one. Each planetary sign contains a handy QR code that'll connect you to audio guides about our vast universe.

Celebrate the night with an oldfashioned Amish wagon ride from Sunset Ranch for star-strewn delights along quiet country roads. Gaze toward the glittering heavens as horses placidly clop-clop along.

Day 2

Soak in the area's rugged grandeur on a portion of the nearly 30-mile Rainbow Trail for fantastic sights like Mount Ouray and, if you're lucky, colorful cactus blooms. Then order goodies like bacon-wrapped venison fillets at The Historic Alpine Lodge in Westcliffe, or tangy barbecue tacos at Tacos el Tapatio in Silver Cliff.

After the sun sets, delve into the cosmos with a guide at a Smokey Jack Observatory star party — you'll see shimmering constellations, glimmering planets and, of course, the infinite depths of the Milky Way through the observatory's telescope.

Day 3

Hop on the 104-mile Frontier Pathways scenic byway to motor along the winding Sangre de Cristos, through the San Isabel National Forest, then by Hardscrabble Canyon and Lake Isabel, an ideal spot for fishing, hiking and picnicking.

Go along Hwy. 165 to Bishop Castle, a quirky fortress Jim Bishop has been building on his own for more than 40 years.

Rest Awhile in Cowboy Country



Literally millions of acres of pristine public land and free-flowing rivers soothe travelweary eyes. This corner of the state includes Dinosaur, Maybell, Craig, Meeker and Rangely — and endless routes leading to wild beauty still home to cowboys and gals.

Day 1

Spend a day at Dinosaur National Monument, an active research area brimming with fossils and artifacts. The little-known Yampa Bench Road offers five-star monument views. Visit the Gates of Lodore, accessible by trail or raft, for tranguility and sheer wow-factor.

Drive east to Maybell for a day excursion or camping trip, where Cross Mountain Canyon walls surround the Yampa River. At Sand Wash Basin, marvel at hundreds of wild mustangs (tours are available).

North of Dinosaur is Browns Park National Wildlife Refuge. This highdesert valley hosts 300-plus native and migratory species, like pronghorn, bighorn sheep and moose.

Day 2

West of Maybell in Craig, find one of the nation's best collections of qunfighter and cowboy memorabilia at

the Museum of Northwest Colorado, as well as lots of places for good grub.

The horseshoe-shaped, juniperrimmed Cedar Mountain offers 880 acres for mountain biking, horseback riding and cross-country skiing. On the 3.5-mile Stearns Trail — great for many abilities — you'll see mule deer, marmot, foxes and coyotes.


Wrestle with your crappie, pike and rainbow trout dinner at Elkhead Reservoir State Park. It's also a water- and Jet-Skiing paradise, and 11 miles of trails greet recreators.

Day 3 & 4

Meeker and Rangely are prime jumping-off points for exploring some of our finest wilderness areas along the 250-mile Wagon Wheel OHV trail system. Visitors can ride through OHV-friendly Meeker to stretch their legs on a self-guided history tour of the downtown area, followed by a pint at Smoking River Brewing Company. The town is also a hub for the electricvehicle-friendly Flat Tops Trail scenic byway (loved for autumn leaf peeping).


Press east to Rangely for a museum with rare cars and motorcycles from the early 1900s; The TANK Center for Sonic Arts, an acoustically perfect steel-water-tank-turned concert hall; and more opportunities for wilderness exploration. The area is also home to numerous hiking and biking trails and ample free camping on surrounding Bureau of Land Management lands — perfect for celestial stargazers.

Petroglyphs and pictographs decorate the sandstone walls of the Canyon Pintado National Historic District south of town. Prehistoric peoples began occupying the region as long as 11,000 years ago, and the canyon contains Fremont culture archaeology sites.





Pawnee Pioneer **Trails**



Morning

Stop into the Logan County Visitor Information Center in Sterling for travel tips; then wander the town's parks to see the "City of the Living Trees" and historical buildings adorned with murals of the area's heritage.

Get a look at life on the range at the Overland Trail Museum, dedicated to the branch of the 1860s Oregon Trail. Walk the Overland Trail Recreation Area for wildlife watching or fishing; or drive through Chimney Canyons to see stunning mesas, bluffs and buttes. Then pop into Parts & Labor Brewing Company for a taste of the local craft.

Afternoon

North Sterling State Park is a serene juxtaposition of high plains and bluffs. Fish the stocked lake for rainbow trout, set up camp and search for soaring bald eagles.

Spend time on the birding trails north and south of Brush; or follow the tracks of Native Americans and frontiersmen along the Pawnee Pioneer Trail to Pawnee National Grassland. Trek to the Pawnee Buttes to snap pics of the sandstone formations and look for burrowing owls.

Evening

Migrate to Fort Morgan to stroll downtown. Explore farming, ranching and military roots at Fort Morgan Museum. For fast-paced fun, I-76 Speedway is packed with excitement April through October.

Late summer and fall are chock full of fairs and concerts in all three towns, and nearby Jackson Lake State Park is a designated International Dark-Sky Park.

All Trails Lead to the Heart of Limon



Morning

This small town began as a work camp for the Chicago and Rock Island rail line in 1888. Today, Colorado's "Hub City" sits at the junction of five major highways, gracefully merging farmlands and prairie as far as the eye can see.

Start your exploration of the hub by browsing downtown Limon's gift boutiques and antique shops for a handcrafted souvenir. Follow the marked pedestrian trail to the Doug Kissel Fishing Pond just south of Main Street. The fishing hole is stocked with trout and home to bass, crappie, catfish and bluegill.

Navigate to the eight Off the Beaten Trail geocaches — treasure boxes detailing hidden, historic gems that are maintained on a regular basis. Visit ourjourney.info for details.

Afternoon

Back in Limon, step behind Town Hall into high-plains history. The Limon Heritage Museum & Railroad Park

captures the area's past through photos, unusual displays and tales of settlers thriving in a tough landscape. Walk through a one-room schoolhouse and prairie kitchen, and get a close-up look at a Cheyenne dwelling.

Carefully restored by Limon Heritage Society volunteers, the adjacent 1910 Limon Depot houses a permanent *Trains on the Plains* exhibit, circa-1970 railroad office and a working scale model of Limon's 1940s rail yard.

Evening

See a show at Limon's historic Lincoln Theatre, which has operated continuously since 1938. It's one of only two working theaters in the nation that are built backward (movie-goers enter next to the screen instead of at the back). The independent theater has undergone today's digital transition and shows everything from first-run blockbusters to indie flicks and documentaries.

With a slower pace, Limon is a welcome respite for travelers.



Lincoln County is right on the Kingbird Trail and home to more than 50 different avian species. Bird lovers will be especially drawn to Karval, where the scenic Karval Reservoir State Wildlife Area is prime for viewing rock wren, golden eagle and scaled quail. The area is also home to the rare mountain plover. Colorado.com/Birding

Following the Santa Fe Trail



The past meets the future in this relaxed area along the Santa Fe Trail in Lamar, Las Animas and La Junta. Today, you can explore the path once taken by folk heroes like "Wild" Bill Hickok, Zebulon Pike and frontiersman Kit Carson.

Day 1

Start at the Colorado Welcome Center in Lamar, an attraction itself featuring a train engine, 100-year-old windmill and water tank. Then head over to the Great Plains Reservoirs, seven glassy lakes for boating and fishing. At North Gateway Park, take a leisurely spin around the ponds via SUP or paddleboat.

Twenty minutes west of town, visit the newly designated Amache National Historic Site, a World War II internment camp that housed 7,000 Japanese people, most of whom were American citizens at the time.

Check out the Big Timbers Museum's collection of wagons, fire engines and cars. Or take a ranger tour of the Sand Creek Massacre National Historic Site to pay tribute to the Native Americans whose lives were taken in this tragic event. The site will soon expand to include parcels of land where Cheyenne and Arapaho families were camped and other artifacts.

Grab dinner in Lamar's historic district and stroll the paved Lamar Loop Trail. Catch a movie at the Lamar Theater, an art deco wonder built in the 1940s.

Day 2


Head west on the Santa Fe Trail.
Stop to fish, Jet Ski and SUP at John Martin Reservoir, "the sapphire of the plains," before continuing on to Las Animas and the Boggsville Historic Site. Built in the 1860s, it housed some 20 structures including frontiersman Kit Carson's last home. Continue on to Bent's Old Fort National Historic Site, a re-created trading post. For years, the original was a commercial, social, military and cultural hub for Native American, European and Hispanic trappers and traders.

Detour south to the Picketwire Canyonlands in the Comanche National Grassland to marvel at Native American rock art, early Spanish settlements and North America's largest dinosaur tracksite via hike, bike or horseback. You can arrange a guided auto tour through the U.S. Forest Service. On the way to your last stop of La Junta, turn off into Vogel Canyon, where a river meanders through the landscape and affords glimpses of petroglyphs and the remains of an 1870s stagecoach stop.

Native Americans, Spanish explorers, trappers, gold-seekers, immigrants and settlers, farmers and ranchers all contributed to La Junta's modernday colorful mix of cultures. The Otero Museum is dedicated to documenting life in early La Junta, and The Picketwire Players have kept folks entertained with revivals and other productions for 30-plus years.

As you rove, watch for farm stands and markets, typically July to October. Arkansas Valley farmers grow corn, watermelons, cantaloupes and much more, making the area famous for its fresh vegetables and melons.

Gateway to Colorado



Tucked in the state's northeast corner, Julesburg holds history at a crossroads for explorers, farmers and gold-seekers. Hit up the Colorado Welcome Center for maps, brochures and tales of how Julesburg was burned to the ground in the 1860s. After the town was rebuilt, the Union Pacific Railroad moved in. The population soared to 4,000 and Julesburg sprouted saloons and dance halls — and some interesting characters.

At Fort Sedgwick Museum, artifacts tell of this gritty era when gamblers, cowboys and railroad workers ruled what many referred to as the most wicked city in the West. The Union Pacific Railroad Depot Museum also reveals relics from this time.

Walk part of the 19-mile South Platte River Trail, peppered with Pony Express Walking through this quiet town, it's hard to believe Julesburg was once the most wicked city in the West.

stops and pioneer landmarks. Bring your binoculars: Sightings of warblers, vireos and other birds are highly likely.

The two harvest seasons — July for wheat and October for corn and sugar beets — promote excellent hunting conditions as well. Stop by the Julesburg Family Market for a hunting license and directions, or to enjoy the abundant wildlife found along the river and among the fields. Many visitors also come for excellent tailwater fly-fishing on the South Platte throughout the year.

Join the race fans flocking to the Julesburg Drag Strip, a launch pad for hot rods that dates back to the late 1950s when the Platte Valley Customs Club started the local tradition.



Essence of the **Eastern Plains**



Peaceful expanses, unique historical sites, one-of-a-kind birding and other rustic experiences make for a relaxing day in Burlington and Wray.

Morning

Here you'll find rural living, easternplains heritage and many of the farms that bring food to your table.

Begin in Wray, where peculiar greater prairie chickens dance in search of mates each spring. The ritual is such a spectacle that viewing tours are offered in March and April.

The Wray Museum features an extensive Paleo-Indian exhibit that displays one of the largest and oldest Stone Age bison kill sites.

Afternoon

Drive south to Burlington's Old Town Museum to find 21 clapboard buildings filled with authentic artifacts from the early 1900s. Visit Memorial Day to Labor Day weekends, when things are in full swing: Check out the new exhibit showcasing the culture of Native Americans who lived on the

plains; then catch a high-noon gunfight and enjoy Wild West dinner theater.

At Pioneer Park, stroll an outdoor exhibit that highlights the plants and animals of the region.

Evening

Grab a quarter and head over to the Kit Carson County Fairgrounds to ride a National Historic Landmark. Out of the nearly 4,000 wooden carousels carved in America between 1885 and the 1930s, the fully restored 1905 Kit Carson County Carousel is one of just a handful still spinning. Those visiting the last week in July can take in the century-plus-old Kit Carson County Fair and Rodeo.

Or book a weekend of prairie pampering in nearby Stratton, where The Claremont Inn & Winery will spoil you just the right amount.



The Southwest Chief goes from Chicago to Los Angeles, with Colorado stops in Lamar, La Junta and Trinidad.

Amtrak's Winter Park Express ferries skiers and boarders from Denver's Union Station right to Winter Park Resort in just two hours.

Plan ahead by using GoI70's travel forecast for predictions on the shortest drive times and ways to avoid heavy traffic. Or book an electric vehicle for your group via the Turo app.

Road Conditions & Winter Driving

Visit cotrip.org (or call 511 when in Colorado) for current road conditions.

Colorado is often a winter wonderland, but at times snow and ice can make driving conditions tricky, especially if you're not used to slick conditions.

Suggestions for safe winter driving:

- Maintain a much slower speed, accelerate at a slower rate and remember that four-wheel drive does not mean four-wheel stop.
- Don't use cruise control when traveling in winter conditions.
- Keep your gas tank more than half full and stow jumper cables, snow scrapers, windshield-wiper fluid and extra blankets in your car.

On portions of I-70 from September to May, all drivers must have winter-appropriate tires or traction equipment that are adequate for snowy and icy conditions. Failure to do so could result in a fine. Find out if you're winter-ready at Colorado.com/Traction and codot.gov/travel/winter-driving.



Packing: Dressing in easily removable layers ensures you're always comfortable - adding or removing them as temperatures change. Our diversity of elevations means temperatures can shift quickly.

Here are some basics to help you stay comfortable:

- · Winter: Warm, water-resistant coat or parka, hat, gloves, long underwear, snow pants and water-resistant boots
- · Spring/Autumn: T-shirts, rain jacket, fleece jacket, jeans and shorts
- · Summer: Light jacket, shorts, jeans, hiking pants, swimsuit and warm clothing for camping and mountain visits

Altitude: Denver is the Mile High City, and many popular destinations are at even higher altitudes. Staying hydrated and adjusting for a day or two before embarking on a strenuous adventure is the best way to make sure being high up doesn't get you down.

Alcohol: It has more impact at altitude, so take it easy until you get your mountain legs.

Cell Coverage: You won't have trouble staying connected when you're in a town; but when you head out on a trail, river, slope or back road, that could change. Let others know where you are headed and when you expect to be back.

Sparse Services: If you spot a sign saying "No gas or services for the next 56 miles," believe it.

Hikes, Roadtrips & Other Excursions: Pack more food, water and coldweather wear than you expect to need so you won't be caught unprepared.



COLORADO NAT'L MONUMENT

Just a few miles from Downtown Grand Junction, Colorado's secret national park towers over the area. A geological wonder, the Monument is a favorite for sunrise and sunset views. Journey up Rim Rock Drive, pausing at convenient pullouts and majestic overlooks. Stop at Upper Ute Canyon View for the most amazing echo you've ever heard. At night, the clear desert sky shows off the magnificent Milky Way and shooting stars.

BOOK CLIFFS

To the north of Grand Junction stands the longest continuous cliff face on the planet. The picturesque Book Cliffs stand tall and extend to the western horizon into Utah. Climb Mount Garfield to reveal a grand overlook. Plan to visit the Little Book Cliffs Wild Horse Range to view the protected bands of wild mustangs who freely roam here.




ARCHES

The McInnis Canyons National Conservation
Area is full of remote canyons that slice through
colorful sandstone layers to form cliffs, pinnacles,
alcoves and arches. Rattlesnake Canyon hosts
a collection of 35 natural arches, forming the
world's second largest concentration outside of
Arches National Park. All without the crowds!



CRAFT BEVERAGE

Known as Colorado's Wine Country, Grand Junction is home to 30 wineries and tasting rooms. Stroll through the vineyards or kick back and enjoy live music. Local breweries, distilleries, cideries, and meaderies round out the refreshing libations.



Grand Junction's historic Downtown is a designated park and pedestrian-friendly zone with over 115 outdoor sculptures and murals that frame the wide sidewalks. Peruse the many galleries, boutiques, cafes and restaurants. Buy a piece of art, create a custom-scented candle, wander antique stores or relax on the patio and enjoy an après microbrew.

FARM-FRESH FARE

From the famous Palisade Peach harvest to pick-your-own cherry and apple orchards, the agricultural character of the Grand Junction area is thriving. Taste farm-to-fork cuisine and pair with award-winning craft beverages. Here, the gifts from the land are always in season.





HIT THE TRAIL

The GJ area is expansive, with over 1.5 million acres of public land - that's 76% of the county and an area larger than Rhode Island and Delaware combined! From OHV'ing in the dense forest of the Grand Mesa to hiking serpentine desert canyons of Colorado Nat'l. Monument, thousands of miles of uncrowded trails await. For some truly inspiring views, hike the Crag Crest Trail or OHV through Rabbit Valley down to the Colorado River.

A SPORTSMAN'S PARADISE

Between the Colorado and Gunnison Rivers and the 300 alpine lakes on the Grand Mesa, plentiful water beckons anglers. When hunting season arrives, the Grand Mesa, Uncompahgre, and Gunnison National Forests are prime destinations for big game. Trophy elk, pronghorn, deer, moose, desert bighorn sheep and other game abound, including a huge population of winter waterfowl.



WINTER FUN

The Grand Mesa averages 250 inches of light, dry powder each year and has some of the best glade skiing in the state. Powderhorn Mountain Resort is affordable and a short 45-minute drive from Grand Junction. The Mesa also offers backcountry skiing and 31 miles of groomed trails for Nordic and skate skiing. If speed is more your thing, the Grand Mesa provides access to over 180 miles of backcountry snowmobiling trails to shred.


GET WET

Whether your idea of fun is a refreshing float down the Colorado on SUPs right through town, or an exhilarating whitewater run through nearby Westwater Canyon, area rivers serve up plenty of places to float leisurely and safely on countless sunny days. Playboaters can hop into the standing waves at Las Colonias River Park near the confluence of the Colorado and Gunnison Rivers, hence the name Grand Junction.



PEDAL PLEASERS

Grand Junction is a utopia for cyclists. Rim Rock Drive, through the Colorado National Monument, is an iconic ride with sweeping views of the canyon country. Mountain bikers dive into the technical twists and turns on Lunch Loops, a local favorite. The Palisade Plunge expert-only singletrack is a 32-mile, adrenaline-fest that drops 6,000 feet from the top of the Grand Mesa to the high-desert floor.

ANCIENT ARTIFACTS & DINOSAURS

Bring your inner paleontologist out and step back 600 million years in time at Dominguez-Escalante National Conservation Area. The rugged canyon contains important geological, cultural and historical relics such as Native American petroglyphs. If fossils are more your thing, Rabbit Valley has an interpretive trail through a working fossil quarry, where the remains of 140-million-year-old dinosaurs can be viewed.

TEE TIMES

If your idea of a great day on the links includes immaculately groomed greens and red-rock canyons rising in the distance, you'll love playing golf in Grand Junction. Tiara Rado and Redlands Mesa (rated the No. 1 course in Colorado by Golfweek) afford golfers stunning vistas of Colorado National Monument. Breathtaking views of the sandstone Book Cliffs and other surrounding mountain ranges can be found at Chipeta and Lincoln Park golf courses.

WILDLIFE WONDERS

The diverse ecosystems of the area are home to a variety of Colorado fauna. Bighorn sheep, elk, deer, lynx and moose ply the high country. Just across the Colorado River from Downtown, the Riverfront Trail traverses a 1.5-mile paved Audubon section providing delightful opportunities to spot over 200 bird species, including blue heron, osprey, hawks and eagles.
