One member of the commission shall be appointed from the following categories: livestock producers, agricultural or produce growers, sportsmen or outfitters, sportsmen or sportswomen, wildlife organizations and county commissioners. No more than five of the members shall be from the same political party. Members are limited to two consecutive terms.

Among the Commission’s other duties are to study the existence and nature of discrimination and form plans for eliminating it through education, independently and in cooperation with other groups whose purposes are consistent with the commission’s, to recommend policies to the Governor and the General Assembly concerning illegal discrimination, to intervene in inter-group tensions and offer informal mediation, and to promote good will among various racial, religious, and ethnic groups in the state.

Two members shall represent the business community, at least one representing small business. Two members shall represent state or local government entities and three shall be members from the community at large. The membership of the Commission shall at all times be comprised of at least four members of groups of people who have been or who might have been discriminated against as defined in C.R.S. 24-34-402 and no more than four members may be from the same political party.

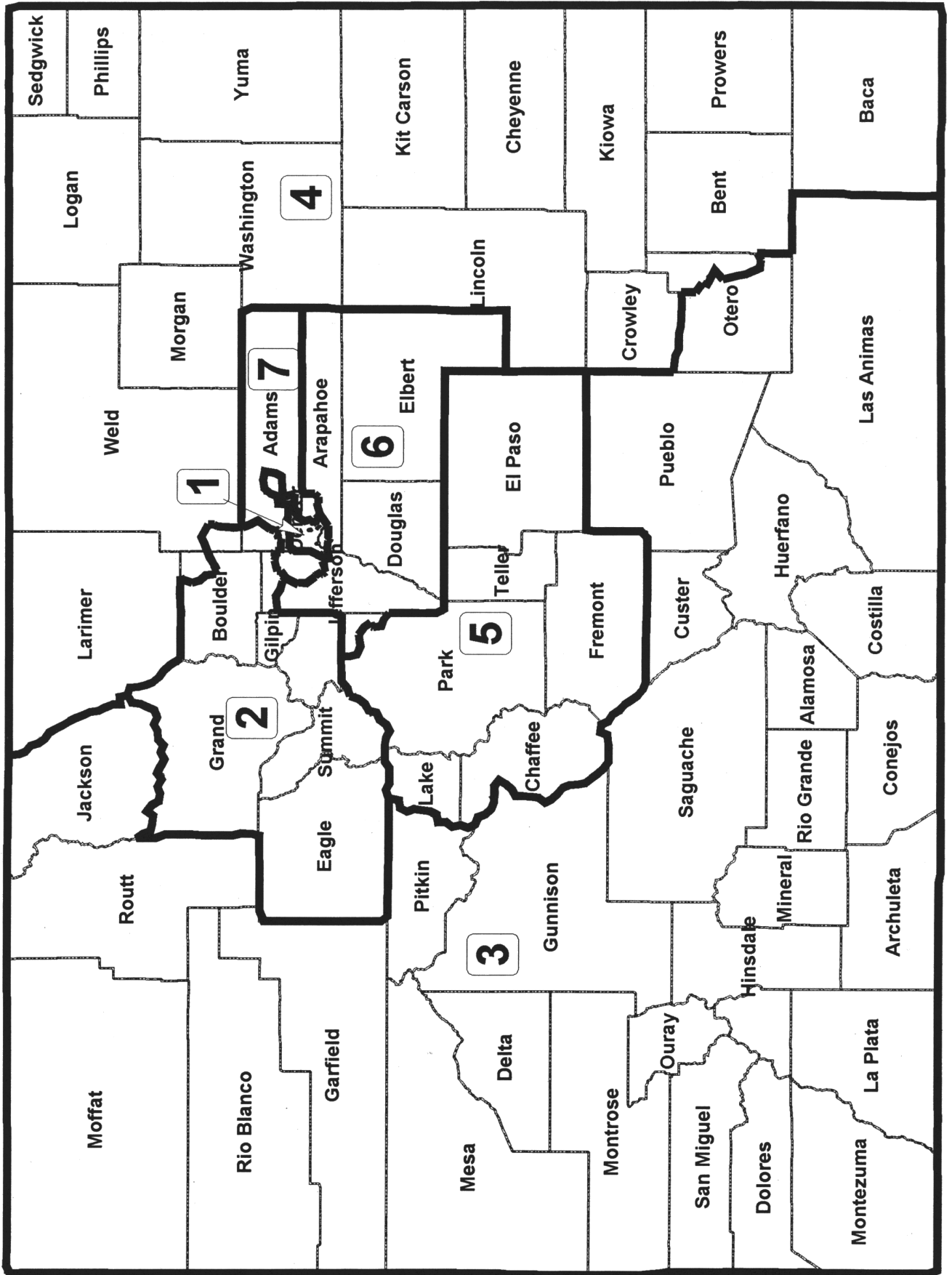

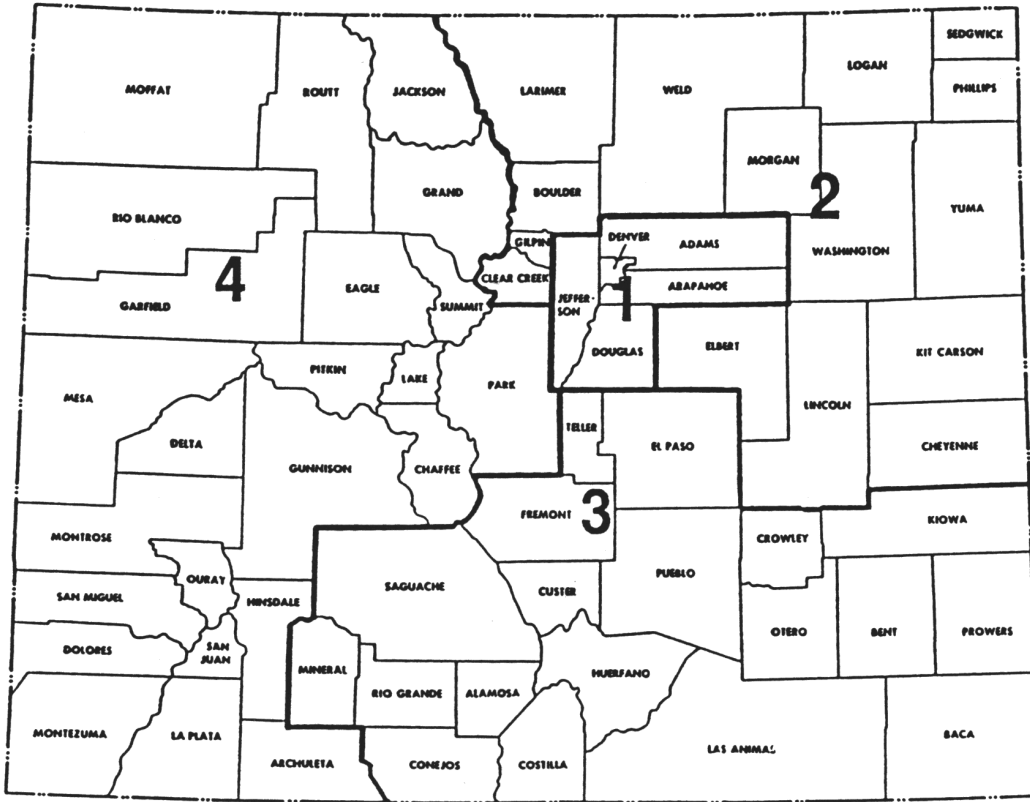

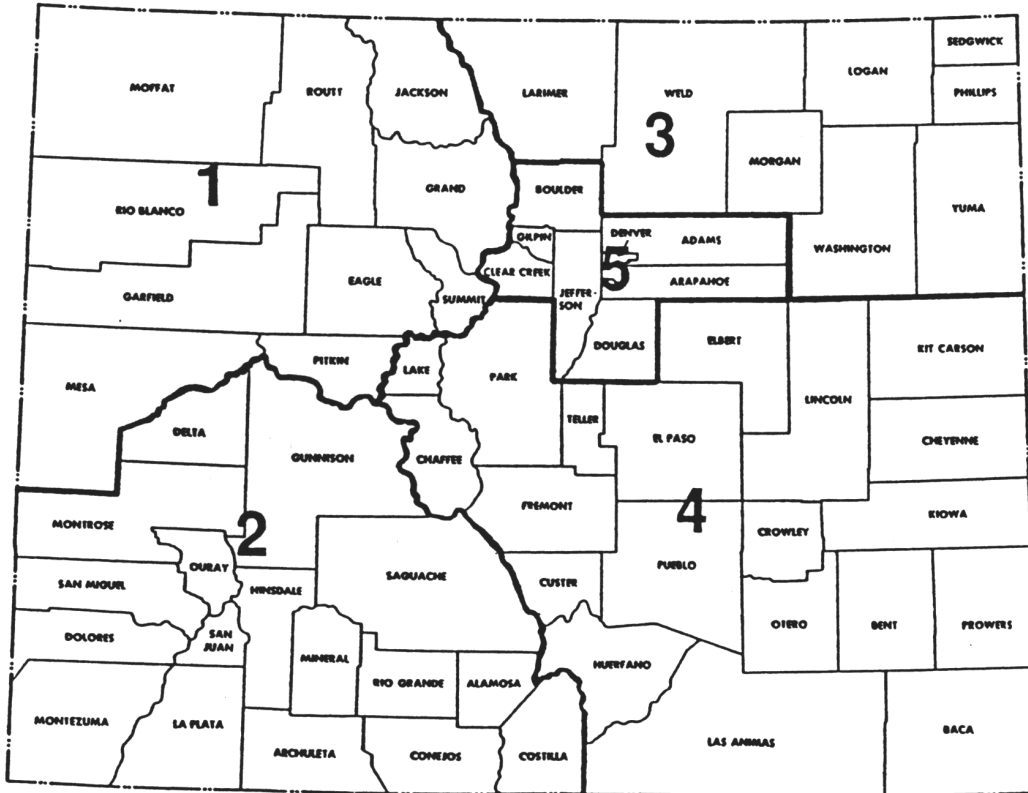
Colorado Congressional Districts



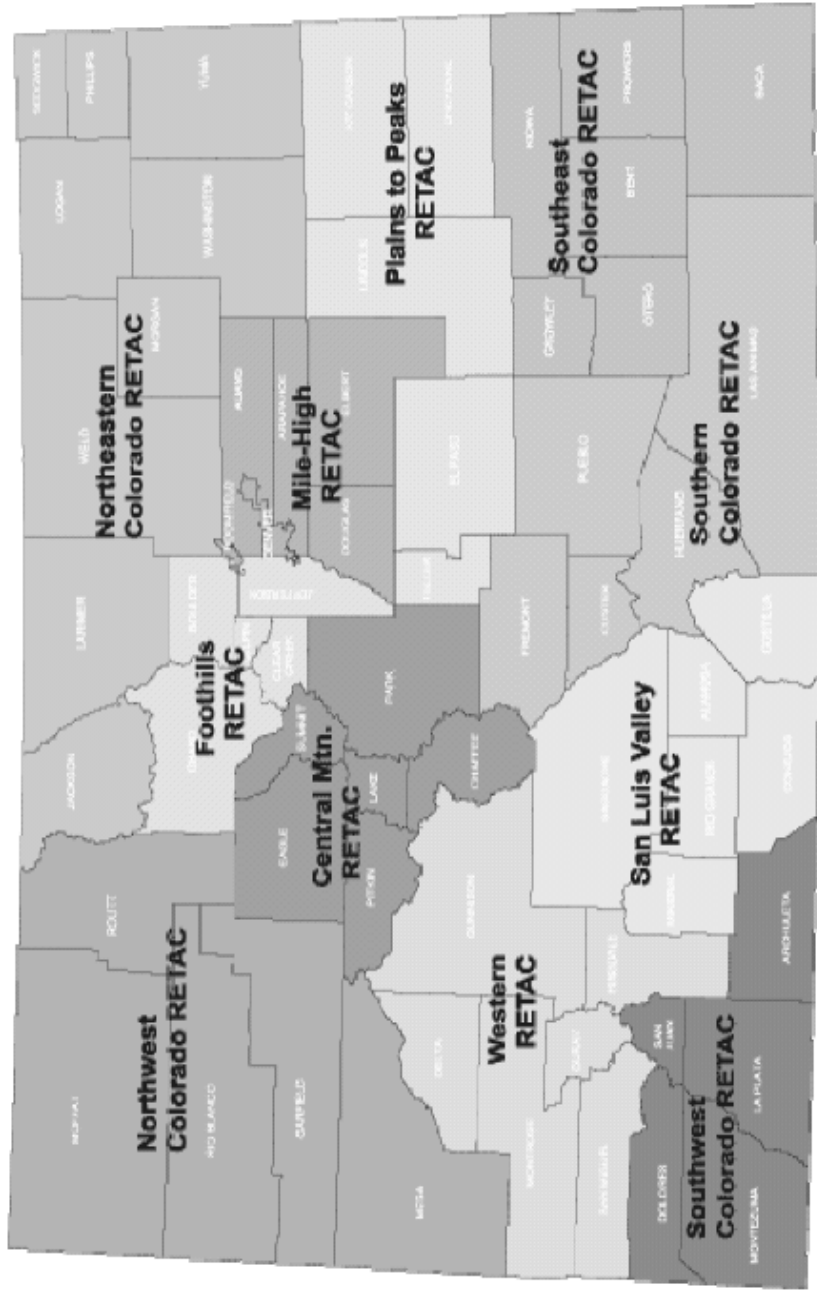
Agriculture Districts of Colorado
