Two members shall be elementary school principals, one of whom is from a rural school district. One member shall have knowledge of the best practices in reading and reading instruction. One member shall be the parent of a child in second or third grade. One member shall have knowledge of and experience in public education in elementary grades. No more than six members shall be from the same political party. A member cannot serve more than two consecutive terms.

No two representatives of any one congressional district shall be of the same political party.

The members of the Board shall be appointed to represent, as nearly as possible, all sections of the state where livestock is a major activity, but at no time shall any two members be residents of the same particular section of the state.

The Venture Capital Authority (VCA) was allocated \$50 million in Colorado Premium Tax Credits (PTCs) by the state legislature. The VCA is receiving cash from insurance companies in exchange for the PTCs and is currently using this cash to invest in a venture capital fund managed by a fund manager. 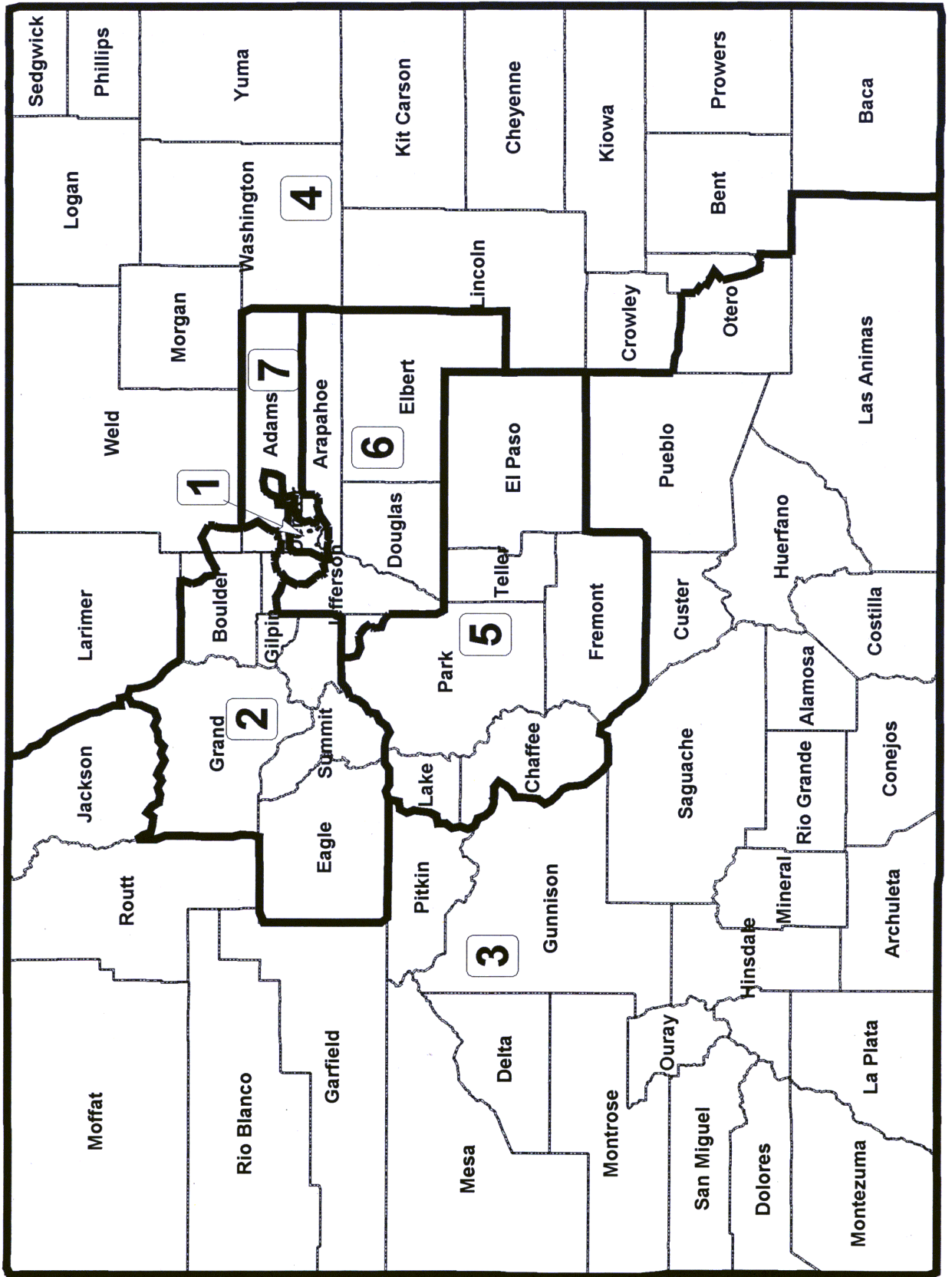

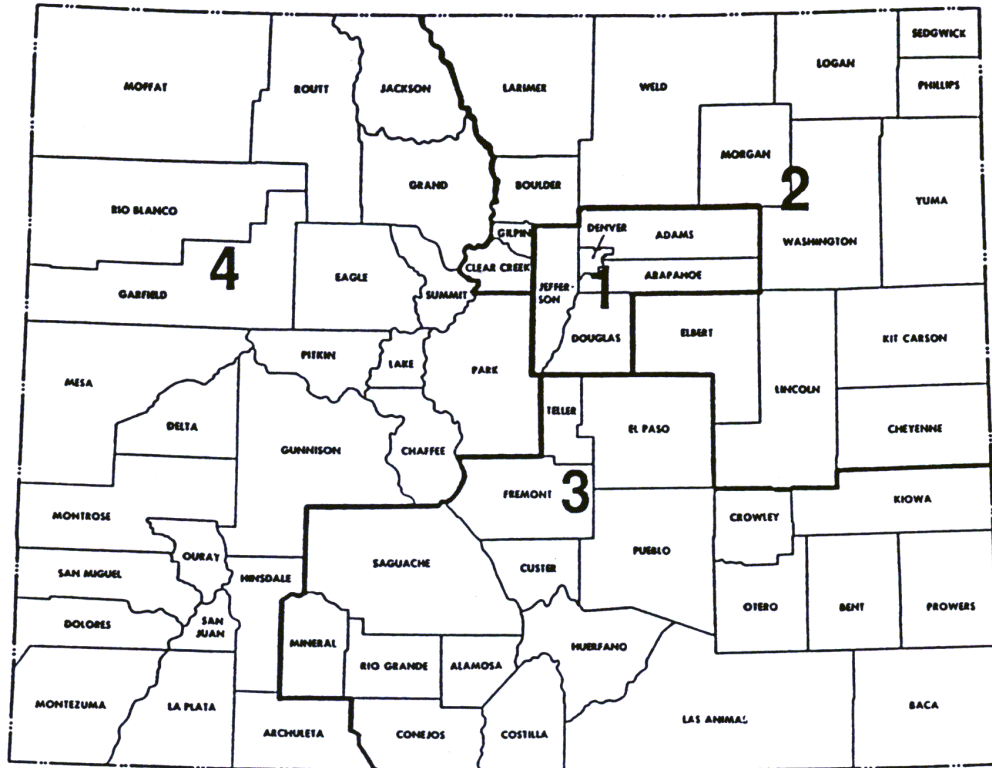

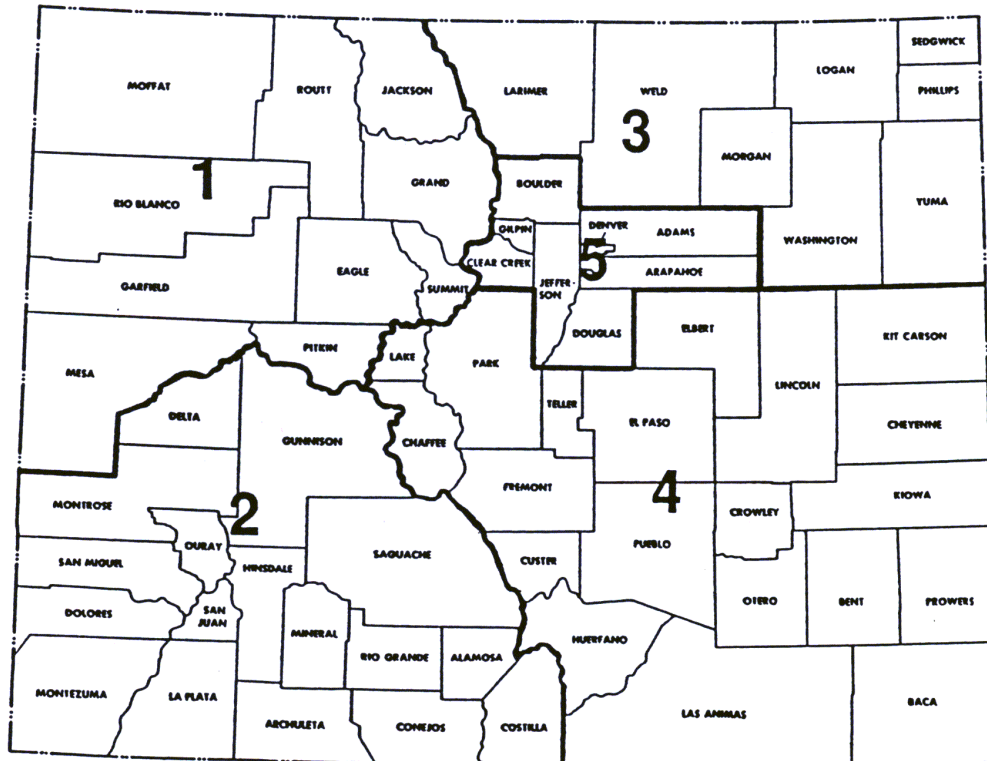
# Colorado Congressional Districts
