

For more than 10 years, the Colorado Children's Campaign has released *KidsCount in Colorado!*—an annual report on the well-being of Colorado's children. The report, supported by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, provides county-by-county data on the status and needs of Colorado's kids, allowing us to see statistical trends, challenges, areas for improvement and areas of success. Our goal is not only to increase public awareness about the status of kids, but to give communities a data-based look at how their children are faring and an opportunity to learn more about other communities' outcomes and strategies for addressing similar challenges. While the data is divided by county, the responsibility and interest in our children's outcomes are shared by us all.

One of the most important indicators of children's overall well-being is their physical health, and as the data reveals, it is also one of our largest statewide challenges. In Colorado, one in six children lacks health insurance. That amounts to nearly 180,000 children–enough to fill Invesco Field at Mile High in Denver two-and-a-half times.

While the numbers are staggering, what the data mean in the lives of these children is even more compelling. Uninsured children are more prone to a wide range of health problems and are less likely to receive routine care from a single provider, to receive childhood immunizations, and to receive necessary dental care. A lack of access to health care for a child can bring a lifetime of problems.

In this year's report, we focus on this critical issue and provide additional information about the current health care landscape, insurance options for kids, and estimated costs of addressing the problem. Like previous editions, this year's report also provides data on a variety of other factors surrounding children's well-being.

We look forward every year to sharing this information with you and also look forward to hearing from you how this report is helpful in your community and ways in which you believe it could be even more useful. We also are especially excited this year to feature original artwork and poetry from children across the state. We hope these images help remind us all why the data are so much more than just numbers.

2007 KidsCount in Colorado! INTRODUCTION

Colorado prospers on many levels, including the education level and income of the overall state population. In 2005, Colorado ranked third in the nation, with over one-third of people 25 years and over having completed a bachelor's degree. That same year, the state ranked 12th with a median family income of over \$62,000. For many children, Colorado is an excellent place to grow up.

Unfortunately, wealth, academic achievement and access to excellent and consistent health care are not enjoyed by all of the children in our state. In fact, education, health and socioeconomic status are often intertwined, exacerbating cycles of advantage or disadvantage in all areas. Poverty is often associated with poor health and lower educational attainment, but poor health and lower education levels also result in lower income potential in the future. Thus, measuring child well-being in all areas is extremely important. *KidsCount in Colorado!* strives to provide the best available state- and county-level data as a tool for communities to measure and track the education, health and general well-being of their children. Both knowing where our children stand across these indicators and identifying trends inform policy debates and community discussions.

Among the most significant trends in our state is the steady increase in population from year to year. In 2005, Colorado was home to approximately 4.7 million people, nearly 1.2 million of which were children. Over the past 10 years, the total population in the state has grown by over 900,000 people, which is nearly the population of Denver and Colorado Springs combined. During this same time, the total child population (under 18) increased by 200,000 (or more than twice the size of Boulder) and the under 5 population increased by almost 68,000. Such increases result in larger populations eligible for public services. For example, PK-12 public school enrollment increased by 124,000 students.

According to projections by the Colorado State Demographer, the population will continue to grow in the upcoming years. The forecast for 2015 is 5.7 million for the total population, including 1.4 million children. While this is not a positive or negative trend in and of itself, it is certainly important to keep in mind as Colorado plans for the future.

As the data included in this book demonstrate, there remain large percentages of children in our state living in poverty, failing to achieve academically, and lacking access to quality health care and insurance. The following section of this book provides an overview of major areas of concern for our children—health, early childhood, K-12 education and poverty. Included is a special section focusing on health insurance coverage for children in our state, including the major types of coverage and the estimated costs of extending health insurance coverage to all children in Colorado. The remainder of this databook gives state- and county-level indicators, providing a picture of the population, family economics, health, vulnerable families and education of children across the state. Definitions for these indicators begin on page 82.

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Promoting good mental and physical health is essential for the overall well-being of our state's children. Health problems can make it difficult for children to succeed academically and grow into skilled adults. Many health problems present in childhood can continue into adulthood, underscoring the importance of a healthy start in life. Beginning with prenatal care and continuing throughout the childhood years, there are a number of health indicators that can be examined to measure and track the health of Colorado's children. Below are some of the trends over the past 10 years.

TRENDS

Women Smoking During Pregnancy Decreasing


 The percent of women smoking during pregnancy decreased four percentage points from 1995 to 2005, from 11.9 percent to 7.5 percent of births. Continuing to reduce this statistic is important for the health of children. Smoking during pregnancy increases the risk of low birth weight births, premature births and miscarriages.¹

Early Prenatal Care Decreases Slightly

 In 2005, 78.6 percent of mothers received prenatal care in the first trimester. Although this does not reflect a significant decrease since 1995, when the rate was 79.2 percent, Colorado continues to lag behind national figures. Nationally, 84 percent of women have received early prenatal care each year from 2002 through 2004.

Low Birth Weight Births Slightly Up

• In 2005, 9.3 percent of babies born in Colorado weighed less than five pounds, eight ounces (2,500 grams) at birth. This reflects an increase of less than one percentage point over the past 10 years, but Colorado's low birth weight statistics are already slightly worse than national statistics. The national rate is generally just under eight percent.



Childhood Immunizations Up Significantly

 In 2005, Colorado's childhood immunization rate reached 83.4 percent, up from 77.1 percent in 2004. In 2005, Colorado moved up to 16th in state childhood immunization rankings, up from 44th place the year before and 50th place in 2002 and 2003. Childhood immunizations are an important safeguard for children's health. Immunizations protect children by decreasing their vulnerability to illnesses like pertussis (whooping cough) and measles. Preventing the onset of these diseases is a simple and cost-effective way to ensure the continued health of Colorado's children.

Teen Deaths Due to Injuries Decreasing

• Over the past 10 years, the rate of teen deaths due to injury has decreased by one-third. In 1995, Colorado had a rate of 64.6 deaths due to injury per 100,000 teens ages 15 through 19. In 2005, the rate was 43.9. This equates to 72 lives saved, when comparing the two rates with 2005 population estimates.






HEALTH CARE INSURANCE AND ACCESS

Health insurance and access to quality health care are two important, and related, indicators for ensuring the health of our state's children. Health insurance coverage means that a child is insured and has a set policy that describes the duration and scope of services that he or she can receive. Access, however, includes both insurance coverage and the child's or family's physical, geographical, financial and systemic ability to get those services. Access can mean not only that a child is insured, but that the child and family understand the services they are entitled to through their policy; that a doctor who accepts the family's insurance is available within a reasonable distance or that the family has transportation to reach the doctor; or that the family can afford the co-pays for visits, prescriptions or other recommended treatments that their insurance policy requires. Coverage and access form the foundation of health care for all Colorado kids.

Access is a major concern, particularly for rural communities and families covered by public health insurance. Rural Coloradans often face significant barriers to health care. For example, there are some counties in Colorado that do not have a hospital.





COLORADO'S COMMUNITY, MIGRANT, SCHOOL BASED & HOMELESS HEALTH CENTERS

Community health centers are important resources for providing health care to lowincome families, particularly in rural communities. Some of these are school-based health centers, some provide services for the homeless and/or migrant farm workers. These community health centers are limited across the state and residents of some counties must seek care in neighboring counties.

In addition to accessibility concerns, financial costs are a major barrier to consistent medical care for children. The next section of this report will detail the types of health insurance for children in our state, including the rates of coverage and costs of extending coverage to all children.

COLORADO CHILDREN AND HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAÇE

Health insurance coverage for children is emerging as an important issue for political debate, both in Colorado and on a national level.²

THE CURRENT LANDSCAPE

The Uninsured:

In Colorado, nearly 180,000 children under 19, or 14 percent, lack health insurance.³ Nationally, 12 percent of children are uninsured.⁴

Colorado's uninsured children cost local, state and federal governments and the private sector an estimated \$79 million annually. This cost-shifting includes an estimated \$50 million paid by the private sector and \$29 million paid by government.⁵

In addition to the high financial costs of uninsurance, there are significant health risks for the uninsured. Uninsured children are more prone to a wide range of health problems. A lack of health insurance coverage makes children less likely to receive routine care from a single provider, to receive childhood immunizations, and to receive necessary dental care. Often, necessary care is delayed when children are uninsured, which can lead to more severe illnesses over time. A lack of access to quality health care during childhood can result in a lifetime of physical, emotional, behavioral and mental health problems.

Below are a few statistics associated with a lack of insurance for children:

- Uninsured children are more than seven times as likely to have delayed medical care.
- Uninsured children are more than twice as likely to go without necessary eyeglasses.
- Uninsured children are more than three times as likely to lack necessary dental care.
- In 2003, only one-third of uninsured children in Colorado received both medical and preventive dental care visits.⁶
- In 2003, only one-quarter of uninsured children in Colorado received health care that met the definition of a medical home.⁷

³ It is difficult to estimate accurate numbers of uninsured children. The data currently available do not provide an exact number of children uninsured. The 180,000 uninsured children figure is an estimate based on 2002-04 data from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The CPS, however, has been shown to undercount Medicaid recipients when compared with state administrative records, which would result in an overestimation of the number of uninsured children. Other discrepancies exist because of differences in the way CPS and the State of Colorado count Medicaid enrollees. The State of Colorado counts Medicaid enrollee for the year, whereas the CPS counts total number of children enrolled at any point during the year.

TYPES OF INSURANCE

Private Insurance:

The majority of Colorado's children are covered by private insurance, most of which is employer based, available through a parent's employer.

- Between 2003 and 2005, an average of 789,000 children or 64 percent of children ages 0 through 18 were covered by employer-based private insurance. An additional 86,000 children were covered by the direct purchase of private insurance.⁸
- In 2001, over 80,000 children, or at least two-thirds of Colorado's uninsured children, did not have access to employer-sponsored insurance coverage.
- An additional 12,000 children had access to employer-sponsored insurance, but chose not to enroll because it was too expensive.
- There has been a significant drop in the percentage of employers offering health benefits in recent years. From 2000 to 2005, employers offering such benefits dropped from 69 percent to 60 percent.⁹

Medicaid:

Medicaid is a joint program of the federal and state governments, which provides health insurance coverage for children in very low-income families. Children up to the age of 6 who are in families with incomes below 133 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) are currently eligible for Medicaid. Children 6 through 18 years old in families with incomes below 100 percent of the FPL are also eligible for Medicaid. In 2007, the federal poverty level for a family of four is an income of \$20,650 per year.

During fiscal year 2005-06, 213,600 children were enrolled in Medicaid in Colorado. $^{\rm 10}$

Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+):

CHP+ is a federal- and state-funded program that covers children in low-income families who make slightly more money than would qualify them for Medicaid. Children under 19 years old with family incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level (\$41,300 annually for a family of four in 2007), who do not otherwise qualify for Medicaid, are eligible for CHP+.

During the 2005-06 fiscal year, 46,755 children in Colorado were covered by CHP+.

Other Coverage:

An additional six percent, or an average of 74,000 children from 2003 through 2005, were covered through other insurance, such as Medicare and military coverage.


RETENTION/ENROLLMENT

Children insured by Medicaid and CHP+ must actively re-enroll at least once each year. For CHP+, redetermination is once per year. For children insured by Medicaid, however, renewal could be more frequent; changes in a child's or family's circumstances (such as age or income) result in the need for an enrollee to be re-evaluated for eligibility.

Many children enrolled in Medicaid and CHP+ often lose coverage at their designated re-enrollment time. For example, in 2000, 42 percent of enrolled children lost coverage at re-enrollment because their parents either failed to respond to re-enrollment efforts or failed to comply with re-enrollment procedures. (It is not known how many of these children were still eligible.)

Maintaining consistent and ongoing coverage is important to the health of a child and has been shown to be cost-effective for the health care system. Research has found that the costs of covering CHP+ and Medicaid recipients decrease the longer they are enrolled, while retention of enrollees eliminates the administrative costs of re-determination each time a family's circumstances change.





Two-thirds of uninsured children in Colorado are already eligible for public programs, but not enrolled:

- More than 65,000 children are eligible for Medicaid, but not enrolled.
- More than 57,000 children are eligible for, but not enrolled in CHP+.
- This is a total of more than 122,000 children currently eligible for one of the two programs, but not enrolled.

COSTS

In FY 2005-06, the state of Colorado spent close to \$216 million covering children enrolled in CHP+ and Medicaid, which was matched by \$236 million by the federal government.

Covering the remaining 180,000 uninsured children would cost up to an additional \$228.5 million per year. This total includes the costs of enrolling those children already eligible for Medicaid or CHP+ and raising eligibility thresholds to include the remaining uninsured children in Medicaid or a CHP+ buy-in program, which essentially would allow a family to pay for a portion of insurance obtained through the CHP+ program. This is a high estimate based on current law that assumes no federal match for children over 200 percent FPL and no federal match for CHP+ children eligible, but not currently enrolled. If the CHP+ program is funded fully at the federal level, however, Colorado could raise its CHP+ eligibility threshold, and the total cost of covering all kids would be significantly lower as our state could receive a 2:1 match on funds spent to cover many of these kids.

EARLY CHILDHOO

Early childhood, defined as the years from birth through 8 years old, is a critical time in human development. In fact, researchers now agree that 85 percent of brain development occurs during the first three years of life." These early years are the foundation upon which a child's success or failure in school and life is built. Ensuring that all children have the opportunity for high-quality early childhood experiences can make a lasting and meaningful difference in achievement throughout their lives.

OUALITY EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION

A critical component of an early childhood experience is the quality of care and education children receive both in their homes, child care settings, and the early grades. Children are active learners and the more involved they are in their own learning, with the support of their adult partners, the better they learn. High-quality early care and education for children from infancy through the early grades includes such things as:

- Small class sizes:
- · Low teacher-child ratios; and
- Teachers and caregivers with training in early childhood education.

The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) provides recommended teacher-to-child ratios and maximum class sizes, which are considered the benchmarks for best practices. The younger the child, the smaller the class size and ratio should be. For example, NAEYC recommends that an infant classroom in a child care center should have no more than four babies to one adult, whereas a preschool classroom should have no more than 10 children to one adult. In Colorado, child care licensing rules and regulations are established by the Department of Human Services, which sets class size, ratio and teacher qualifications for child care centers and family child care homes. Although the age categories for state regulations and NAEYC recommendations do not match up perfectly, it is easy to see that for most age groups, Colorado state child care regulations do not meet NAEYC recommendations. Unfortunately, it is not known exactly how many child care centers in Colorado actually meet the NAEYC standards-just that they are not required to do so under state regulations.

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Comparing Colorado Child Care Regulations

WHERE COLORADO STANDS

Recently, the National Association of Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies (NACCRRA) released state rankings, based on child care center standards and oversight systems.^{*} Colorado ranked 44th for standards, I7th for oversight and 40th overall out of the 50 states, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense. The following were among the state's weaknesses addressed in the report:

- Staff-to-child ratios do not meet NAEYC standards.
- Group size requirements do not meet NAEYC standards.
- Child care center directors are not required to have a bachelor's degree or higher. In Colorado, center directors are not even required to have an associate's degree or Child Development Associate credential.
- Teachers are not required to have an associate's degree.
 In Colorado, teachers in child care centers are not even required to have a high school diploma or GED.
- Programs are not required to address any of the six developmental domains recommended by NACCRRA: social, physical, language/literacy, cognitive/intellectual, emotional and cultural.

High-quality early care and education is especially important for children who are at risk of falling behind in school due to family circumstances such as poverty. Often, children from low-income homes struggle in school and have difficulty achieving at the level of their higher-income peers. Two years of full-day, full-year high-quality early childhood education such as preschool and kindergarten have been shown to improve minority student performance.¹² Other studies have demonstrated that high-quality preschool can have a lifelong positive effect on children's lives, particularly for low-income children.¹³

COLORADO PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM (CPKP)

Currently, state-funded preschool and full-day kindergarten is limited in Colorado. Through the Colorado Preschool and Kindergarten Program (CPKP), the state funds 14,360 slots, including 15 percent, or 2,154, for full-day kindergarten in the 2006-07 school year. To qualify for this program, children must meet one or more risk factors, including eligibility for the federal free and reduced lunch program, the need for language development, drug or alcohol abuse in the family, homelessness, or parents or guardians with less than a high school education.

A study completed in 2005 by three researchers at the University of Northern Colorado reviewed longitudinal records of four cohorts of children who had participated in the Colorado Preschool Program (CPP), which was the program's original name before kindergarten was added. The first cohort attended preschool through CPP in the 1989-1990 school year. At the time of the study, these children had progressed one year past high school. The researchers found that CPP children were less likely to be placed in special education or retained in a grade than their peers and were more likely to graduate from high school.¹⁴


FULL DAY KINDERGARTEN INCREASING

A little over 28 percent of Colorado kindergarteners in public schools attend full-day programs. A small percentage of these programs is funded through CPKP. The rest are funded through other sources such as Title I, local school district general funds and parent tuition. While the percentage of kindergarteners enrolled in a full-day program has doubled since 2001, from 14 percent to 28 percent, Colorado continues to lag far behind the national rate, which was 65 percent in 2003.¹⁵ Furthermore, the range of participation rates across counties is expansive—from 10 counties with zero percent to seven counties with 100 percent full-day kindergarten.

Results of empirical research on the effects of full- versus half-day kindergarten reveal that children who attend full-day kindergarten show significantly stronger academic gains in reading and math over the course of the kindergarten year than their counterparts in half-day kindergarten. Specifically:

- Children in full-day kindergarten programs gain 12.8 percent more than children in half-day programs on reading assessments between fall and spring.
- Children in full-day kindergarten programs gain 10.3 percent more than children in half-day programs on math assessments between fall and spring.¹⁶

The map below shows the percentage of children enrolled in public full-day kindergarten programs by county. When evaluating this data, it is also important to consider the percentage of children eligible to receive free and reduced price lunch in a given county, as full-day kindergarten is a strategy for helping low-income children achieve at comparable levels to their higher-income peers.


K-12 EDUCATION

Children across age levels in Colorado public schools face many challenges. As mentioned above, access to full-day kindergarten remains limited and under funded, despite some recent increases. The number of English language learners continues to increase, prompting state-policy concerns about schools focusing on meeting their academic needs. Despite the highly educated workforce of our state, high school graduation rates are low statewide, particularly so in some counties. Below are some of the characteristics and recent trends in K-12 education in Colorado, information that can help make changes that will improve children's learning in public schools throughout the state.

TRENDS

English Language Learners Increasing in Public Schools

- Both the number and rate of English language learners enrolled in Colorado public schools have increased over the past five years.
- The percentage of public school students characterized as English language learners was 12.8 percent in 2005, an increase from 8.4 percent in 2000, with the number of students nearly doubling from 60,852 in 2000 to 114,857 in 2005.
- In some communities, the percentage is significantly higher. For example, more than one-third of students in Denver and Eagle counties are designated as English language learners.



Low Public School Graduation Rates

- Nearly one in three students do not graduate in Colorado, inhibiting their earning potential and hampering state revenues.
- The 2005 high school graduation rate for public school students in Colorado was 69.8 percent.


Standardized Test Scores Remain Low

Standardized test score results, as measured by the Colorado Student Assessment Program (CSAP), are disturbing—especially in certain subjects and grades, and for poor and minority students. Most secondary students in the state are not proficient on math scores, for example, and a slim majority of elementary students are proficient on writing scores.

- Fewer than half (45 percent) of 8th graders scored proficient or advanced on the 2006 math CSAP. The problem is even more pronounced for minority students, with 29 percent of Native Americans, 22 percent of black, and 22 percent of Hispanic students scoring proficient or advanced on the test.
- The state fares better in certain subjects and grades. For example, 71 percent of 3rd graders scored proficient or above on the 2006 math CSAP. Two-thirds of 8th grade students scored proficient or above on the 2006 reading CSAP, but that percentage drops to 47 percent for black students and 41 percent for Hispanic students.

CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION

A major area of concern in K-12 education is the current system for funding the construction, renovation and maintenance of school buildings. The extent of the problem, however, is not well-documented. In fact, Colorado has never done a capital needs assessment for K-12 education. It is unknown exactly how many school buildings are currently in the state. The statistics that are available, however, are striking.¹⁷ A 2004 study by the Donnell-Kay Foundation estimates that the total public school capital construction need in the state is between \$5.7 billion and \$10 billion.

Almost half of all school districts cannot, under the current system of school bonds paid for by local property taxes, raise enough money to build even one new school. These 87 school districts are educating about 20,000 children in Colorado. An additional 22 school districts, educating over 200,000 children, have already used up most of their legally allowed bonding capacity.

The challenges in keeping up with capital construction span both large, urban districts and small, rural districts. Jefferson County School District, for example, has a backlog of \$1 billion of capital needs. Falcon School District, in suburban El Paso County just east of Colorado Springs, is one of the fastest growing districts in the state. The district is currently at their bonding limit, which—at one point—forced 2,400 students, or nearly a quarter of the district's enrollment, to be housed in 100 portable classrooms. The Miami-Yoder School District, located in rural El Paso County, only has one school, originally built in 1914, to serve its 379 pupil enrollment. With over \$6 million in capital improvement needs and 45 percent of its students in portable classrooms, the district also buses 12th graders 80 miles round trip to attend classes at the closest community college.

Equity issues are also a serious concern. Capital construction funding is based entirely on property values, resulting in a vast disparity in bonding capacity across districts. For example, the Aspen School District, in Pitkin County, has a bonding capacity of nearly \$215,000 per student, which is nearly 8,000 percent more than the \$2,700 bonding capacity of Sanford School District in Conejos County in the San Luis Valley.

This is clearly an important area to consider in examining school finance in the state of Colorado, an area in need of solid data and appropriate policy recommendations.

POVERTY

Poverty is one of the major challenges faced by Colorado's children, and is often an underlying cause or contributing factor of many of the other issues addressed in this report. Problems such as poor health, substandard academic performance, inadequate early childhood opportunities, and a lack of health insurance, among many other risk factors, are more prevalent among children living in poverty.

Eligibility for many social services is determined by comparing a family's income with the Federal Poverty Guidelines for a given year. The United States Department of Health and Human Services publishes annual poverty guidelines in the *Federal Register*. These poverty guidelines take into account the number of people in a family. For example, in 2007, the federal poverty guideline, which is often referred to as the federal poverty level (FPL), is \$20,650 for a family of four.

Since many social services, such as free and reduced lunch, Medicaid and CHP+, base eligibility on a particular ratio of family income to the federal poverty guidelines, two charts are included below to assist with interpretation of some of the data in the following county data tables.¹⁸



Child Population (number)

Population by age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs.

Children as a Percentage of Total Population (percent)

Population by age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign. This statistic shows the proportion of a county that is less than 18 years of age.

Young Child Population (number)

Number of children less than 5 years of age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs.

School-Aged Population (number)

Number of children 5 through 17 years of age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs.

Live Births (number)

Live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicate one or two live births in the county.

VULNERABLE FAMILIES

Births to Single Women (percent)

Births to unmarried women per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates fewer than three births to single women in the county.

Births to Women with Less than 12 Years Education (percent)

Births to women who have less than 12 years education per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates fewer than three births to moms with less than 12 years education in the county.

Teen Births (rate per 1,000 female teens 15-17)

Live births to girls ages 15 through 17 per 1,000 female teens of that age (age-specific fertility rate) provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates fewer than three teen births in the county.

Three Risk Factor Births (percent)

Births to unmarried women under 25 years of age with less than 12 years education per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates fewer than three births in this category in the county.

2005 Out-Of-Home Placements (rate per 1,000)

Number of children removed from their homes by the Department of Human Services per 1,000 children under age 18 provided by the Child Welfare Services Division, Colorado Department of Human Services. Rate calculated by the Colorado Children's Campaign. Out-of-home placements include family foster care, specialized group homes, residential child care facilities, independent living situations, foster care with relatives, residential treatment centers, and both emergency and non-emergency placements in receiving or shelters.

FY 2005-06 Child Abuse and Neglect (rate per 1,000)

Unique substantiated cases of maltreatment of children younger than 18 (including physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, and/or neglect) in 2005 per 1,000 children less than 18 years of age in a county provided by the Division of Child Welfare, Colorado Department of Human Services. Note: This indicator differs from KidsCount reports prior to 2004 to be consistent with the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's Maternal and Child Health County Data Sets. Beginning with 2003 data, the numerator is the number of children for whom maltreatment was substantiated.

FY 2005-06 Students Served by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Program (percent)

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Program serves homeless children and youth, which they define as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence...; and includes (i) children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; or are awaiting foster care placement; (ii) children and youths who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings... (iii) children who qualify as homeless for the purposes of this subtitle because the children are living in circumstances described in clauses (i) through (iii)." Please note that this indicator is derived only from school or school district records. This does not represent the total number of homeless situations are difficult to identify for many reasons. High mobility, fear of stigmas, and invisibility of populations not living in shelters or accessing other service agencies are examples of reported identification barriers. While the data above are based on continual district efforts in identifying students who are homeless, the complexity regarding identification challenges would indicate the actual numbers of students who are homeless in Colorado school districts and counties are most likely higher than those reported.

2000 Households Below Self-Sufficiency Standard (percent)

Percent of households below Self-Sufficiency Standard provided by the Colorado Fiscal Policy Institute. The Colorado Fiscal Policy Institute has analyzed 2000 Census data to compare household composition and location with the Self-Sufficiency Standard for Colorado to determine whether each sample household has adequate income to meet their most basic needs without any public or private assistance or supports. The Self-Sufficiency Standard for Colorado describes the income required by Colorado's working families to pay for the basic needs of housing, food, child care, health care, transportation, miscellaneous costs and taxes, on a county-by-county basis. The Standard is calculated for every Colorado county and 70 different family types. The data presented are the percent of households in each county with income below the Standard associated with that family type and location.

CHILD AND MATERNAL HEALTH

Low Birth Weight Births (percent)

Babies born weighing 5.5 pounds or less (less than 2500 grams) per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two low birth weight births in the county.

Early Prenatal Care (percent)

Births in which prenatal care was initiated in the first trimester of pregnancy per 100 live births with known start of prenatal care provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two births to mothers receiving early prenatal care in the county.

Women Smoking During Pregnancy (percent)

Births in which women reported smoking during pregnancy on infant's birth certificate per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Please note that these data are most likely underreported on birth certificates across the state due to mothers knowing they shouldn't smoke during pregnancy. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two births to women smoking during pregnancy in the county.

Infant Mortality (rate per 1,000)

Deaths during the first year of life per 1,000 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two infant deaths in the county.



Child Deaths (rate per 100,000)

Deaths per 100,000 children ages I through 14 in Colorado provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. The data include deaths from natural causes (such as illness or congenital defects) and injury (including motor vehicle deaths, homicides and suicides). Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two child deaths in the county. Note: This indicator differs from KidsCount reports prior to 2001 to be more consistent with the *Colorado Vital Statistics* series of reports.

Teen Deaths Due to Injuries (rate per 100,000)

Deaths due to intentional and unintentional injuries per 100,000 teens ages 15 through 19 in Colorado provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. The data include deaths due to homicide, suicide and accidents. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two teen deaths in the county.

FY 2005-06 Children (0-18) Enrolled in CHP+ (percent)

Number of children ages 0 through 18 enrolled in Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+) during fiscal year 2005-06 provided by the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Finance. Data for counties with fewer than 30 clients are not reported, which is indicated by low number of events (LNE). Rate calculated by the Colorado Children's Campaign. Children under 19 years old with family incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL), who do not qualify for Medicaid, are eligible for CHP+. The statistic reported is the percentage of the population ages 0 through 18 who were enrolled in CHP+ at any point during FY 05-06. Important Note: The numbers used to calculate this rate include a unique count of all clients who had eligibility at any time over the course of the year. The Child Health Plan Plus numbers reported in this table do not match official budget numbers. Official budget numbers reflect an average monthly caseload over the course of a year. The official budget numbers are lower than the numbers reported in this table. The official budget numbers are fairly a stable monthly average, while this table reports every individual served at any point during the year.

FY 2005-06 Children (0-18) Enrolled in Medicaid (percent)

Number of children ages 0 through 18 enrolled in Medicaid during fiscal year 2005-06 provided by the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Finance. Data for counties with fewer than 30 clients are not reported, which is indicated by low number of events (LNE). Rate calculated by the Colorado Children's Campaign. Children up to the age of 6 who are in families with incomes below 133 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) are eligible for Medicaid. Children ages 6 through 18 years old in families with incomes below 100 percent of the FPL are also eligible for Medicaid. The statistic reported is the percentage of the population under 19 who were enrolled in Medicaid at any point during FY 05-06. Important Note: The numbers used to calculate this rate include a unique count of all clients who had eligibility at any time over the course of the year. The Medicaid numbers reported in this table do not match official budget numbers. Official budget numbers reflect an average monthly caseload over the course of a year. The official budget numbers are lower than the numbers reported in this table. The official budget numbers are fairly a stable monthly average, while this table reports every individual served at any point during the year.

2000 Children (Under 18) Uninsured (percent)

Percent of children under age 18 uninsured provided by the U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Health Insurance Estimates. Please note that the data are rather old and the confidence intervals are quite wide. The 90 percent confidence intervals range from plus or minus one percentage point for the state to over three percentage points for some counties. However, we believe this is currently the best available data on children's uninsurance rates at the county level. Community Health Centers (number)

The total number of community, migrant, school based and homeless health centers in each county provided by the Colorado Community Health Network.

K-12 Pupil Enrollment (number)

Number of children enrolled in public schools provided by the Colorado Department of Education.

Kindergarteners in Full-Day Program (percent)

Number of students enrolled in full-day kindergarten programs divided by the number of students enrolled in all public kindergarten programs provided by the Colorado Department of Education. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign.

English Language Learners (percent)

Number of students classified as English Language Learners divided by total enrollment provided by the Colorado Department of Education. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign.

High School Graduation Rate (percent)

Percent of 2001 9th graders who graduated in 2005. The rate is calculated by dividing the number of 2005 graduates by the October 1, 2001 9th grade pupil count and adjusting for change in total student population. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign using data from the Colorado Department of Education. Hinsdale and San Juan counties are too small to provide an accurate measure of the graduation rate. Broomfield does not have a graduation rate because the Colorado Department of Education does not provide pupil counts for the county of Broomfield. Districts in Baca and Las Animas counties have experienced extremely large growth, preventing an accurate measure of the graduation rate. For some smaller counties, original graduation rate calculations exceeded 100 percent due to limitations in the source data. Graduation rates for these counties (Cheyenne, Gilpin, Grand, Kiowa and Lincoln) are reported as 100 percent. Important Note: This year's high school graduation data accounts for changes in population. As a result, it is not directly comparable to last year's graduation rates. Adjusting for population is considered to provide a more accurate picture of graduation rates. This method assumes that growth in a district's pupil count is equal across all school levels. If counties experience more growth in the lower grades, the calculated graduation rate could be significantly lower than the actual rate. Also, if counties have a large 9th grade enrollment bubble (e.g., Denver), the calculated graduation rate could be lower than the actual rate.


