REPORT OF THE CURATOR

To the President and Other Directors of the State Historical and Natural History Society of Colorado.

Gentlemen: As Curator of our Society, I submit herein, for your information and consideration, a summarized statement of the various results of the Society's activities in the biennial term that began on December 1, 1914, and ended on November 30, 1916.

The additions that have been made to the Society's collections during the term are not only worthy, large in number and varied in character, but include many acquisitions that are of exceptional value to our organization. As usual, a large portion of these accessions are gifts to the Society.

A distinguishing event during the biennial term was that of establishing the Society in a permanent home in the State's new Museum Building. As mentioned in the report for the biennial term that ended on November 30, 1914, all of the Society's collections that occupied rooms in the eastern section of the basement of the State Capitol were removed into the Museum Building in the last month of that term. This was done at the request of the Board of Capitol Managers; and it was anticipated that the quarters which had been assigned to the Society would be ready within a short time for the installation of our collections. However, there were some unavoidable delays in the work of completing and placing the exhibit-cases and other furniture for the new building. Therefore it was not until late in the spring of 1915 that the work of arranging the collections in their proper abiding-places was begun; and on September 2nd the Society's exhibit rooms were opened to the public.

A part of the additions that were made to the Society's collections during the biennial term here under consideration, are in number, and for the present purposes are classified, as set forth in the following statement:

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As indicated above, the number of newspapers and other publications that the Society was receiving in the beginning of the biennial term was thirty-nine less at the end of the two years. This reduction was due to economy by publishers, to consolidations of newspapers, and to suspensions of publication; and nearly half of the reduction was among publications issued beyond the bounds of Colorado.

The additions to the Society's natural history collections during the term are described in the following paragraphs:

Five hundred species of botanical specimens illustrating the flora of Denver and its immediate vicinity. These accessions were purchased by the Society in the last half of the last month of the biennial term, and could not be duly classified before the end of the term.

Lizard.—A young specimen of the Blue-spotted Skink (*Eumeces guttulatus*), found near Kit Carson, Colorado, by Mr. W. H. Henderson, of Kit Carson, and by him given to the Society.

A tooth of a mammoth, found in a gravel-pit near Riverside Cemetery, adjoining Denver, and at a depth of about fifteen feet, by William Griffith, of Denver. Purchased from the finder by the Society. The tooth is an exceptionally large one.

A biography of James Bridger, a noted frontiersman of the old-time Far West. By General Grenville M. Dodge, of Council Bluffs, Iowa. "A Journey That Took Seven Months From Atehison, Kansas, to Denver, Colorado." Given to the Society by Mrs. Flora Stevens, of Kansas City, Missonri.

Fay, Recorder, and later transferred to Samuel Tickle. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand of Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A mining-claim receipt for Claim No. 45 West, in Summit County, Colorado Territory. Issued to Samuel Tickle by D. K. Thos, Recorder, on April 11, 1862. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand by Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A receipt of record of mining claim No. 43 North, on Putnam Quartz Lode in Independent Mining District, Colorado Territory,

dated July 26, 1861. Issued to J. S. Adair by C. Griswold, Recorder. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand of Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A bill of sale, or deed of transfer, of certain mining-claims in Jackson and Montgomery Districts, Colorado Territory. Issued to Samuel Tickle by A. Arbour, on March 10, 1862. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand of Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A mining-claim certificate issued to Samuel Tickle, showing ownership of Claim No. 23, on the Pendleton Lode, south from discovery, in Montgomery Mining District, Colorado Territory, December 6, 1861. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand by Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A mining-claim certificate issued to Albert Arbour, showing ownership of Claim No. 24, on the Pendleton Lode, south from discovery, in Montgomery Mining District, Colorado Territory, December 6, 1861. Transferred, on April 25, 1862, by A. Arbour to Samuel Tickle. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand of Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A letter, dated July 15, 1863, at Denver, from C. L. Burns, of Denver, to Samuel Tickle, then of Gold Run, Colorado Territory. Given to the Society by Mr. Samuel Tickle, of Choctaw, Oklahoma, by the hand of Mr. Hugh R. Steele, of Denver.

A deed, dated August 20, 1860, from W. S. Foster to Gustaves Niemer, to a town lot in Block 19, in the "City" of Highland (a part of pioneer Denver). Given to the Society by Mr. Bismarck Niemer, of Michigan City, Indiana.

A collection of 152 manuscripts. These officially had come into the possession of the late Major Scott J. Anthony, of the First Regiment of Colorado Volunteers in our Civil War, while he was in command of Fort Lyon, a frontier military post (the site of which is in our Bent County), in 1862 and later. The documents consist of many official letters, military orders, vouchers, receipts, requisitions and reports in relation to ordnance and ordnance stores, various other reports, invoices of stores, and other records of the routine of such an establishment. The names of many officers, private soldiers, and civilians appear in the collection. Given to the Society by Mrs. Scott J. Anthony, of Denver.

Data in relation to the pioneer University Schools at Golden City, Colorado (Jarvis Hall, Matthews Hall, and School of Mines). Prepared, and given to the Society, by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A broad variety of accessions (355 in all) were made to the Society's collection of historical pictures during the biennial term, as indicated in the following summary:

A photographic enlargement from a lithograph purporting to be of a view of Fort Laramie, a famous trading-post, as it appeared in 1836. The post was situated near the confluence of the North

Platte and Laramie rivers, in the north-central part of the present Laramie County, Wyoming. The establishment was bought by the United States and converted into a military post in 1849. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of Fort Laramie, a United States military post, as it appeared in 1871. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of Fort Laramie, a United States military post, as it appeared in 1889. The United States sold and abandoned the post a few years later. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph, made in 1904, of a view of the abandoned hospital-building which had been a part of Fort Laramie. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a rough wood-engraving purporting to be of a view of the trading-post, called "The Pueblo," built in 1843, on the site of our city of Pueblo. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a rough wood-engraving purporting to be a view of the trading post, called "The Pueblo," built in 1843, on the site of our city of Pueblo. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of emigrants and their wagon-train crossing the North Platte River in the "booming" times of the Oregon Trail, on which they were traveling. The location of the crossing is near the central part of the present Keith County, Nebraska. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a lithograph of a view of Fort Bridger, a trading-post, on the Black Fork of the Green River, and of which the site is in the far-southwestern section of the present State of Wyoming. The post was built by James Bridger in 1843. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a lithograph of a view of Salt Lake City, as it appeared in 1846. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of La Bonte Stage Station of the Overland Stage Company, which was in the south-central section of the area of the present State of Wyoming. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of the Deer Creek Station of the Overland Stage Company, which was in the south-central section of the area of the present State of

Wyoming. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a rough wood-engraving of a view of a station of the Pony Express (from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Cal., 1860-61), in the south-central section of the area of the present State of Wyoming. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a depiction of a party of Indians attacking an Overland Stage Coach. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving from a drawing of the burning of old Julesburg by Indians, on February 2, 1865, early in the prolonged Indian War in the central region of the Great Plains, which broke out in the autumn of 1864. Old Julesburg stood on the south bank of the South Platte River, opposite the site of our present Julesburg. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of the site of old Fort Sedgwick, in our Sedgwick County, and which stood a short distance westerly of old Julesburg. This fort was an emergency post in the prolonged Indian War, which broke out in the autumn of 1864. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from an engraving of a drawing of the ground plan of old Fort Sedgwick. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of the site of Fort Cottonwood, near the confluence of the North Platte and South Platte rivers. It was an emergency post in the prolonged Indian War. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of Charles MacDonald's ranch-house and trading-post, built in 1863, and which was situated adjacent to Fort Cottonwood. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. MacDonald's establishment figured prominently in the prolonged Indian War.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving of a view of Fort Mitchell, built in the autumn of 1864, at Scott's Bluff, which is in the present Scott's Bluff County, in the western border of Nebraska. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. Fort Mitchell was an emergency post in the prolonged Indian War.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of Fort Caspar, built in the autumn of 1864, on the North Platte River, two miles above the site of the present town of Casper, in Natrona County, Wyoming. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. Fort Caspar also was an emergency post in the prolonged Indian War.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of old Fort Reno (originally "Fort Connor"), built in 1865, on the Powder River, in the southwestern quarter of the present Johnson County, Wyoming. The original of this is in the Society's historical collections. Fort Reno was erected in consequence of the outbreak of the prolonged Indian War.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of Fort Fetterman, built in the summer of 1867, on the North Platte River, at the site of the hamlet of Fetterman, in the west-central section of Converse County, Wyoming. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. Fort Fetterman was another emergency post in the prolonged Indian War.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving of a view of the home of "Jim" Baker (a noted frontiersman and trapper) in the closing years of his life. Its site is at the Wyoming village of Dixon, which is near the northeastern corner of our Moffat County. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a reproduction from an old wood-engraving which is said to be the earliest published depiction of the American buffalo. The name of the artist is not known, but doubtless he was a Spaniard. The photograph is from a print owned by the Curator.

A photographic enlargement from a reproduction from an old wood-engraving of the buffalo of Gomara, 1554. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a reproduction from an old wood-engraving of the buffalo of Thevet, 1558. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a reproduction from an old wood-engraving of the buffalo of De Bry, 1595. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of the monument at the grave of James Bridger, in Mount Washington Cemetery, at Kansas City, Missouri. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. Bridger possessed great ability.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving from a portrait of Kit Carson, and which appears to be a representation of him in or about the year 1843. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a recent wash-drawing portrait of Kit Carson, and which appears to be a representation of him as in or about the year 1843. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving from a portrait of Ceran St. Vrain, who, for many years, was prominently engaged in the fur-trade in the Pike's Peak country. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. Our village of St. Vrain, in Weld County, is at the site of the trading-post of St. Vrain, which was built by this man and the Bent Brothers, and named for him.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving from a portrait of Dr. A. Wislizenus, a man of scientific attainments, who made a tour from St. Louis, Missouri, into the Rocky Mountain country, in the year 1839; and in his journey he traversed the eastern part of the area of our State. A print from the photo-engraving from his portrait is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving from a depiction of John C. Fremont addressing some Indian chieftains at Fort Laramie on July 1, 1842, when he was on his first expedition into the Rocky Mountain country. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraving from a daguerreotype of Captain John W. Gunnison, of the United States Army. Captain Gunnison was the commander of an expedition, in 1853, to locate a route for a Pacific Railway between the 37th and 38th parallels, and traversing, from east to west, the central part of the area of Colorado. While engaged in this work, he and several of his assistants were killed by Indians, near Sevier Lake, in Utah, on October 26, 1853. Our Gunnison River, Gunnison County, and Gunnison City, were named for him. A print from the photo-engraving from his portrait is among the Society's historical collections.

Six photographic enlargements from photographs of a like number of pioneers who were actively identified with the founding of the City of Denver, in 1858, viz: Adnah French, Frank M. Cobb,

General William Larimer, E. P. Stout, Andrew Sagendorf, and Roswell Hutchins. The originals of these photographs are among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of John Denver Stout, who was the first boy born in Denver of white parents. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of John C. Moore, who was Denver's first Mayor. He served from December, 1859, to October, 1860, inclusive, under a makeshift city-government "authorized" by the provisional territorial-government of the "Territory of Jefferson." The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of the Rev. Joseph P. Machebeauf, who was the first Catholic Bishop at Denver, and who came to the city in October, 1860. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of the Rev. J. B. Raverdy, a pioneer Catholic priest in Denver, and who came to the city in October, 1860. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of Benjamin Holladay, who was the general manager and chief owner of the Holladay Overland Mail & Express Company, which operated, in the period of our Civil War, from Atchison, Kansas, to the Pacific Coast, by way of Denver and Salt Lake City. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a print from a negative from a wood-engraved portrait of "Wild Bill," otherwise William Hickox, a typical "bad man" who flourished for a decade or so after our Civil War. The negative from the wood-engraving is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a print from a wood-engraved portrait of Major T. T. Thornburgh, of the United States Army, and who was killed in an engagement with Colorado Ute Indians in their uprising in 1879. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photo-engraved portrait of G. Nordenskiöld, a Swedish savant, who, in the year 1892, explored many of the buildings of "Cliff Dwellers" in the far-south-western section of our State. One of the results of his investigations is his fine book entitled *The Cliff Dwellers of the Mesa Verde*, in Colorado. No better treatment of the subject of his large volume yet has been produced. The original of this photograph is among the Society's historical collections.

A framed half-length life-size portrait of the late Rev. Myron W. Reed, a noted Denver clergyman. Given to the Society by Mrs. C. H. Pierce, of Denver.

A large photograph of a gathering of the officers of Colorado's militia forces that had been mustered into the United States service early in the summer of 1916, together with several civilians. The picture was made in the following August, on the rifle range near our city of Golden. Given to the Society by Tishler & Langer, of Denver.

A photograph of Prof. George L. Cannon and of his brother, Wilbur F. Cannon, both of Denver, and which was made in the year 1876. Given to the Society by Prof. Cannon.

Twenty-seven wood-engravings of views and scenes in Denver and elsewhere in the Pike's Peak country in our pioneer times. Fifteen of the engravings were used to illustrate articles on the "Pike's Peak Gold Excitement," published in Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper, New York, in April, May, June, and August, 1859; one of a view of our Gregory Gulch, drawn by Albert D. Richardson, in May, 1859; three which were used to illustrate articles published in Harper's Weekly, New York, in May, and in August, 1859; three which were used to illustrate articles published in Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper in March, April, and August, 1860; and five which were used to illustrate articles published in Harper's Weekly in January, March, and October, 1866. The pictures were purchased by the Society from a collector located in Arlington, Massachusetts. From these engravings, photographic enlargements were made better to adapt the views and scenes to the purpose of exhibiting.

A photograph of a view near the head of Wanamacker Creek, in our Saguache County, and which is believed by some to be the place where John C. Fremont's ill-fated expedition, of 1848, came to its tragic end. Given to the Society by Mr. A. B. Hardin, of Denver.

A photographic enlargement from a print from a photo-engraving of a view of the Catholic Church—"Our Lady of Guadalupe"—in our town of Conejos, built in 1858, and which is said to be the oldest church-building in Colorado. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph, made in 1863, of a view at the intersection of Fifteenth and Blake streets, in Denver, after a heavy fall of snow. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph, made in 1865, of a view at the intersection of Fifteenth and Market streets, in Denver. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. In 1865, Market street bore the name of Holladay street.

A photographic enlargement from a card-photograph, made in 1866, of a view of the southward side of Denver's Larimer street, between Fifteenth and Fourteenth streets. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph, made in 1867, of the town of South Boulder, in our Boulder County. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a print from a photo-negative of a view in the business part of Cheyenne, Wyoming, in 1868. The negative is among the Society's historical collections.

Two photographic enlargements from stereoscopic photographs, made in 1869, of differing views in California Gulch, near the site of our present city of Leadville. The original of these are among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of a drawing of the ruins of Jarvis Hall and of Matthews Hall (Episcopalian Schools), at our city of Golden, and which were burned in 1878. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a photograph of a view of an incident in the "Chinese Riot" in Denver, in 1880. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photograph of a view of a part of Leadville, made in or about the year 1884. Given to the Society by Miss Henrietta Bromwell, of Denver.

A photograph of a view of the greater part of Denver, made in or about the year 1884, from "North Denver." Given to the Society by Miss Henrietta Bromwell, of Denver.

A photograph of a view of Dean's Station, in the Platte Canon, and which was made in or about the year 1884. Given to the Society by Miss Henrietta Bromwell, of Denver.

A photograph of a view, made about the year 1900, of the buildings and grounds of our State Agricultural College, at Fort Collins. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

Two photographs of differing views in our city of Delta, made in or about the year 1905. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

A photograph of a view of our city of Fort Morgan, made in the year 1908. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

A photograph of a view of the business part of our town of Julesburg, made in the year 1908. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

Two photographs of differing farm-views in our Otero County, made on June 6, 1910. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

Two photographs of differing farm-views in our Otero County, made in or about the year 1910. Given to the Society by Mr. David H. Bellrose, of Denver.

A photograph of a view, made in the morning of May 14, 1912, at the intersection of Sixteenth Avenue and Clarkson Street,

in Denver, at the cessation of a snowfall of six inches. The picture was made and given to the Society by Miss Edith W. Smith, of Denver.

Two photo-films of differing views of the monument at the grave of General James W. Denver, in Sugar Grove Cemetery, at Wilmington, Ohio. The photographs were made in August, 1916, by Miss Edith W. Smith, of Denver, and by her given to the Society.

A photographic copy of a photograph (six by eight inches) of the oil portrait of Pocahontas and of her son, Thomas Rolfe, in Heachem Hall, the ancestral home of the Rolfe family in England. Copied from one of the original photographs owned by the Curator of the Society.

A photograph of Dr. Charles Alexander Eastman (Ohiyesa, the Winner), a Santee Sioux Indian. Dr. Eastman, a highly-accomplished man, is the foremost living representative of his race.

One hundred and twenty photographs of Indian people of the Great Plains and the Rocky Mountain country. In this collection the following-named tribes are represented: Apache, Arapahoe, Arikara, Cheyenne, Comanche, Crow, Jicarilla (Athapasean), Kansa, Kiowa, Mandan, Navajo, Nez Perce, Omaha, Oto, Pueblo, Shoshoni, Sioux, Ute, and Wichita. In frequent instances a given photograph portrays more than one person. The collection was made by the Society.

Nineteen photographic enlargements from lithographs and photo-engravings of views of buildings of the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico. These are, viz.: the remains of the ancient Pueblo of Zuni, as they appeared in 1853; the modern Pueblo of Zuni; the terraces of Zuni; another view of the terraces of Zuni; the court of Zuni; an interior part of Zuni; a view of the Pueblo of Acoma; the Hopi Pueblo of Oraibe; the Hopi Pueblo of Wal-pi; the Pueblo of Taos; the Pueblo of Santa Clara; the Pueblo of San Juan; the Pueblo of San Felipe; the Pueblo of Nambe; the Pueblo of Jemez; the Pueblo of Cochiti; the Pueblo of San Ildefonso; and the Pueblo of Sia.

Forty-six photographic enlargements, from photographs of views and of objects in the part of the southwestern section of our State that once was occupied by the "Cliff Dwellers." These pictures, many of which are large ones, were prepared from the Society's resources further to illustrate the "Cliff Dweller" division of our ethnological collections.

Twelve photographs of skulls of "Cliff Dwellers," printed from negatives made from examples in the Society's ethnological collections, for, and under the personal direction of, Dr. M. H. Cryer, of the University of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia. With Dr. Cryer's kindly approval, the photographers, Tishler & Langer, of Denver, prepared these photographs (which will be useful for study purposes) and gave them to the Society.

Two photographic enlargements from photographs of two groups of petroglyphs on a bluff on Rock Creek, in our Rio Grande County, and about eight miles southwest of the town of Monte Vista. The originals of these are owned by Mr. L. A. Norland, of La Jara, Colorado, and who permitted the Society to make these enlargements from them.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving from a chronological and historical record kept by Sioux Indians, and showing, by symbols, the principal event of each year from 1799 to 1870, inclusive. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections. In this document the Indians recorded the huge host of meteors that fell in November, 1833, as the foremost occurrence of that year.

Four photographic enlargements from wood-engravings from pietographs recording early achievements in the career of Sitting Bull, a great leader of the Sioux. In the first record "he kills a white man;" in the second "he kills an Indian enemy;" in the third "he steals a drove of horses;" and in the fourth "he storms a Crow Indian encampment and takes thirty scalps." The originals of these are among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving from a pietograph, made by Big Baek, a Cheyenne, of General R. S. Mackenzie's fight with Cheyenne Indians in the Big Horn Mountains, on November 25, 1876. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A colored lithograph (eighteen by twenty-six inches) of an attempt to depict General George A. Custer's "last stand" in his disastrous battle with a great host of Indians, on June 25, 1876, on the Little Big Horn River, in a locality which is in the southeastern section of the present State of Montana. The picture was purchased by the Society.

Three photographic enlargements—two from wood-engravings and one from a photograph—of views of villages or encampments of Indians in the old-time "Far West." The originals of these are among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting a great council held at North Platte, Nebraska, between Generals Sherman, Harney, Terry, and Augur, and a number of Sioux, Arapahoe, and Cheyenne chieftains. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting a successful war-party of Sioux Indians dancing the "Scalp Dance" in celebration of a victory. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting the "Great Medicine Dance" of men of the Sioux, and which was an exhausting trial of physical suffering and endurance. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting another endurance-dance of men of the Sioux, and in which extreme torture was self-inflicted by each of the dancers. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting the stealthiness of Indians in a night attack on an encampment of a wagon-train. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting an attack on an Overland Stage-coach by Indians of the Great Plains. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

A photographic enlargement from a wood-engraving depicting a method of the Indians of the Great Plains of disposing their dead, by placing the bodies upon branches of trees. The original of this is among the Society's historical collections.

Two photographic enlargements from wood-engravings depicting the fatal tortures inflicted by Indians of the Great Plains on officers and troopers of the United States Army. The originals of these are among the Society's historical collections.

Three photographic enlargements from wood-engravings depicting engagements between Indians of the Great Plains and detachments of the United States Army, in the prolonged Indian War, which broke out in the autumn of 1864. The originals of these are among the Society's historical collections.

A goodly number of additions to the Society's collection of historical objects were received during the term, and of which some description follows here:

The regimental flag of the First Regiment of Colorado Volunteer Infantry in our war with Spain. Given to the Society by the organization of Spanish-American War Veterans of Colorado. The flag had hard service in the Philippine Islands, and is much tattered.

The regimental banner of the First Regiment of Colorado Volunteer Infantry in our war with Spain. Given to the Society by the organization of Spanish-American War Veterans of Colorado. The banner was with the regiment throughout the latter's service, and is in fair condition.

An X-ray tube, of a very early form, used by Dr. G. H. Stover, of Denver, in New York City in February, 1897, and in Denver in July, 1897. Given to the Society by Dr. Stover.

A piece of cotton sheeting, from the first bolt of the first fabric made in the Overland Cotton Mills, at Denver, and which was obtained and preserved by Hon. Henry R. Wolcott, of Denver. Given to the Society by Mrs. J. F. Vaile, of Denver.

A portion (in a phial) of the first beet-sugar commercially manufactured in Colorado, and which was made in a newly-built

factory, at Grand Junction, on November 19, 1899. Given to the Society by Mr. Ralph Voorhees, of Denver.

Eleven ox-shoes (recorded as a unit), which were picked up from time to time, eastward from Denver, on the pioneer "Cut-off Road" to the South Platte River, by the donor. Given to the Society by Mr. E. A. Glaseock, of Denver.

A silk political-badge, of the presidential campaign of 1856. "Fremont ad Dayton." "Free Speech, a Free Press, Freemen, Freedom, and Fremont." Given to the Society by Dr. L. E. George, of Denver.

A Colt revolver, found in the year 1900 on the site of the White River Indian Agency, which is in our Rio Blanco County. Given to the Society by General U. S. Hollister, of Denver.

A military coat and a military cap which were parts of the uniform worn by the donor when, as a student, he was a member of the Jarvis Hall Cadets, of the University Schools at Golden, Colorado, in 1875-76. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A large bronze medal awarded to the donor at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, at St. Louis, in 1904, for the excellence of his Wealthy Apples exhibited at the Exposition, and which were grown in our Larimer County. Given to the Society by Mr. William A. Moon, of Fort Collins, Colorado.

A large silver medal awarded to the donor, at the National Irrigation Exposition at Pueblo, Colorado, in 1910, in recognition of the excellence of his services as a juror in judging exhibits of Colorado fruit at the Exposition. Given to the Society by Mr. William A. Moon, of Fort Collins, Colorado.

A delegate's badge worn at the Thirty-ninth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Denver, in 1905. Given to the Society by General U. S. Hollister, of Denver.

A McKinley political-badge, of the presidential campaign of 1894, and which bears a portrait of Mr. McKinley. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A membership badge of the First International Gold Mining Convention, at Denver, in 1897. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A membership badge of the Reception Committee of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, which met in Denver in 1901. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

Nine badges (recorded as a unit), of a like number of societies in affiliation with the American Association for the Advancement of Science when the latter met in Denver, in 1901. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A guest's ticket to the Democratic National Convention which was held in Denver, in July, 1908. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A cast-iron boot-jack, which was brought into our city of Idaho Springs in 1869, by the father of the donor. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A pair of iron boot-hooks, which was brought into our city of Idaho Springs in 1869, by the father of the donor. Given to the Society by Prof. George L. Cannon, of Denver.

A metate, found by the donor near our city of Longmont in 1881, and which, when discovered, was partly buried, in unplowed ground. Given to the Society by Mr. J. B. Adams, of Denver.

An iron arrow-head, found by the donor about ten miles west of Brighton, Colorado, in 1901. Given to the Society by Mr. W. G. Workman, of Denver.

A stone implement, the use of which has not yet been determined, found by the donor about five miles east of Platteville, Colorado, in 1911. Given to the Society by Mr. W. G. Workman, of Denver.

An agate arrow-head, found by the donor about five miles east of Platteville, Colorado, in 1911. Given to the Society by Mr. W. G. Workman, of Denver.

A stone axe, grooved for attaching a handle, found by the donor near the city of Davenport, Iowa, in 1910. Given to the Society by Cedric Kaub, of Denver.

Of the 355 historical pictures—of persons, of places, and of things—acquired during the biennial term, 283 were placed in frames and added to the Society's public exhibits. Forty-five of these pictures are photographic enlargements from photographs made in the "Cliff Dweller" section of our State; and moreover, fourteen exceptionally-large photographs of views in the same section, and which long had been in the Society's collections, were framed. One hundred and seventeen of the photographs of Indians and of photographic enlargements from photographs of subjects relating to them that were acquired during the term were put into frames; and sixty-one of such pictures, which were accessions in previous terms, also were framed. The remainder of the pictures acquired in the term and framed are photographic enlargements from photographs of persons, of places, and of things; and besides these, twenty-four others previously accessioned also were framed.

Furthermore, a revision was made of a considerable number of the Society's historical pictures that had been framed in former times. In this there were some repairs; many additions, by hand-lettering, to the historical information which these exhibits had borne; and the replacement of faded typewritten labels by hand-lettered forms.

We have no means of determining day by day the number of persons who visit the State Museum Building; but it is probable that the total of visitors during the year 1916 exceeded more than 100,000.

The series of lectures, in the assembly room, on historical and on scientific subjects, established by the Society in the second year of the biennial term as a permanent part of its activities, have been very popular; and in several instances the attendance was greater than the assembly room could accommodate.
