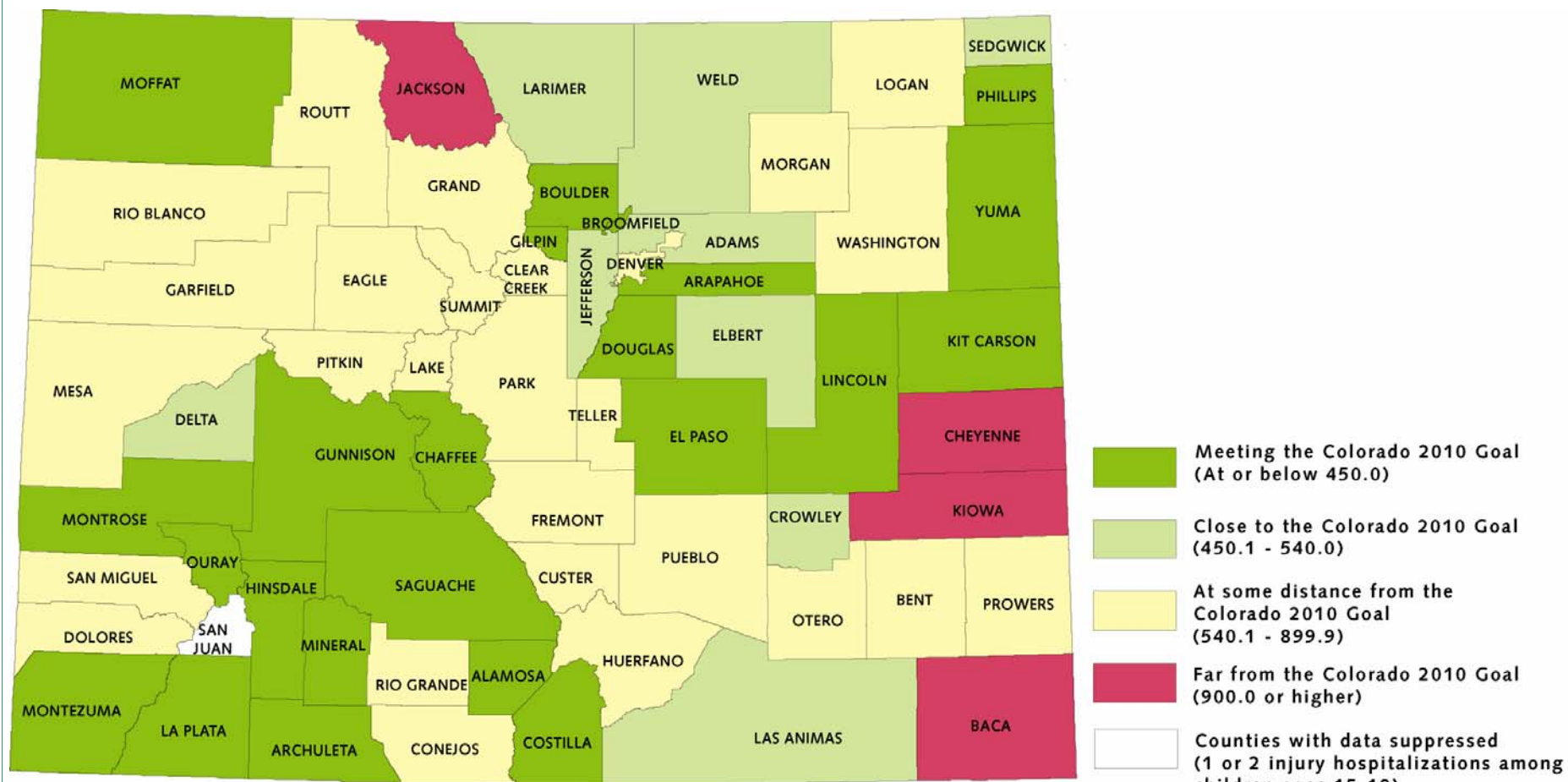


Teen Injury Hospitalizations 15-19

(Rate per 100,000)

Colorado 2010 Goal: Reduce the rate of injury hospitalization among children age 15 – 19 to 450.0 per 100,000.

The Colorado rate is 495.8 per 100,000. County rates are a five-year average (2003-2007).



Counties categorized as close to the goal are within 20 percent of the goal; counties at some distance from the goal are more than 20 percent away but less than double the goal; and counties far from the goal are at least double the desired goal.
