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Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 April 2025 Monthly Summary

Detention

- April 2025 statewide monthly detention Average Daily Population (ADP) was 177.4, a 4.5% increase compared to March (169.9). Year-to-date (YTD), detention ADP was 177.9, a 7% decrease from April 2025 (191.2).
 - The maximum count for April 2025 was 192, or 89.3% of the 215-bed capacity limit. The Maximum YTD count as of April 2025 was 211, which occurred in July.
- YTD ADP indicates that four (18.2%) of 22 Judicial Districts (JDs) operated at, or over capacity in April^{1,2}:
 - Southern Region: 4th JD (115.2%; Cap: 27)
 - Western Region: 6th JD (107%; Cap. 2), 14th JD (110.5%; Cap. 2), 22nd JD (111%; Cap. 2)
- There were 204 youth admitted to detention in April, an 6% decrease compared to March (217). YTD, there were 2,177 youth admitted to detention, a 10.9% decrease compared to April 2024 (2,443).
- Detention Youth Centers continue to experience capacity strain statewide. When examined by maximum daily count data, all four Regions (100%), and all 22 Judicial Districts (100%) have operated at or above 100% capacity this Fiscal Year.
- On average, youth released this FY have experienced a Detention Length of Stay of 25.2 days, which is 2.2 days longer compared to April 2024 (23 days).

Commitment

- April 2025 statewide monthly commitment ADP was 253.3, a 0.1% decrease when compared to March (253.6). YTD, commitment ADP was 268.9, a 2% increase from April 2024 (263.5).
- State Secure YSCs have operated at 83.7% of capacity through April, unchanged compared to April 2024 (83.7%). YTD, all youth centers with a commitment allocation^{3,4} operated within capacity.
- 88% of the YTD commitment ADP resides within State Secure YSCs (assessment 5%, treatment 83%).
- In April 2024, Staff Supervised ADP was 17.9, and Community Residential ADP was 9.8. This FY, the YTD Staff Supervised ADP was 17.9 (unchanged), and Community Residential ADP was 11.2 (14.3% increase).
- There were 20 new commitments in April, a 53.8% increase compared to March (13). YTD, there were 160 new commitments, a 1.3% increase compared to April 2024 (158).
- On average, youth discharged this FY have experienced a Residential Length of Service (LOS) of 16.2 months, or 3.1 months shorter than April 2024 (19.3 months).
 - o YTD, State Secure LOS was 14.0 months, 3.1 months shorter when compared to April 2024 (17.1 months).

Parole

- April 2025 statewide monthly parole ADP was 108.9, a 6.4% decrease from March (116.3). YTD, parole ADP was 106.3, a 7.7% increase from April 2024 (98.7).
- There were 9 parole intakes in April, a 43.8% decrease from March (16). YTD, there were 152 parole intakes, a 12.6% increase from April 2024 (135).
- Fifteen (15) youth discharged in April, a 31.8% decrease from March (22). YTD, 154 youth discharged, a 6.1% decrease compared to April 2024 (164).
- On average, youth discharged this FY have experienced a Parole LOS of 6.7 months, which is roughly 6.1 days shorter when compared to April 2024 (6.9 months).








