

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
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

Golden, Colorado, December 10, 1903.

To His Excellency,

JAMES H. PEABODY,

Governor of the State of Colorado, Denver, Colorado.

Sir—Pursuant to the requirements of law, I have the honor, herewith, to present my annual report, as President of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission, for the fiscal year, closing November 30, 1903, together with the reports of the subordinate officers of the home, which are attached hereto.

The changes which have occurred in the Board of Commissioners during the past fiscal year are as follows: The term of the late President of the Board, Mr. H. V. Smith, expired on the 3d of April, 1903. Mr. L. H. Cheney, of Monte Vista, was appointed to the vacancy. The term of General J. W. Huff, of Victor, ex-officio member of the Board under the law, as commander of the department of Colorado and Wyoming, Grand Army of the Republic, ceased upon the election of General H. S. Vaughn, of Denver, as such department commander, who assumed the duties of a member of the commission at the meeting of the Board, at the Home, on the 23d day of July, 1903.

The Board is now constituted as follows:

President, George West, of Golden. Vice-President, R. J. McNutt, of Eureka. Secretary, L. H. Cheney, of Monte Vista. Treasurer, H. S. Vaughn, of Denver.

E. L. Foster, M. D. Surgeon. Charles Rehm, Hospital Steward. J. H. Madden, Orderly Sergeant. At a regular Board meeting, held on the 29th of May, 1903, Commander John H. Shaw, who had faithfully served in that important and onerous position for four years, intimated to the Board that the state of his health would not justify him in retaining the office longer than the coming fall; whereupon an election was held for the choice of his successor, and Captain C. S. Aldrich, of Monte Vista, was unanimously chosen as commander, to assume the duties of the office on the first day of September, 1903.

At a regular meeting of the Board, held on the 4th of April, 1903, E. L. Foster, M. D., of Monte Vista, was unanimously elected to the position of Surgeon of the Home, for the term of one year, to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Dr. R. W. Cary, M. D.

The last General Assembly made ample appropriation for maintenance of the Home for the current biennial period and liberal provision for improvements, to wit: \$50,000.00 for maintenance and \$10,000.00 for improvements, but the uncertainty surrounding the financial condition of the State treasury caused much anxiety on the part of the Board of Commissioners, as the institution had, up to this year, been held as being in the third class for the distribution of monies appropriated by the General Assembly. Our Board held that this decision was an erroneous one, as the members of the Home ought to be classed as involuntary wards of the State from their lack of resources, sickness and the like, and that after once becoming members of the Home, they could not go and come of their own volition.

When we were informed by the honorable Auditor of State that the funds of the State would not admit disbursements to institutions of the third class, in company with General H. S. Vaughn, of our Board, I had the pleasure of appearing before your excellency to lay the matter before you, and I am happy to say that both your excellency and Attorney General Miller took the broader view of the subject and sustained us in our contention. Upon our request Attorney General Miller rendered an opinion upon the question for the guidance of the Auditor of State, who promptly and gladly placed the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home among the second class institutions, thus relieving us of any further anxiety as to a lack of means for maintenance at present.

The appropriation for improvements is not as yet available, but we earnestly hope that it will be at our disposal shortly, to be expended in making accommodations for the increasing mem-

bership.

The attention of your excellency is respectfully directed to suggestions contained in the report of Commander Aldrich, herewith attached. With this appropriation, besides providing much needed additional room for the growing number of members, the Board hopes to spare some of it for the improving of the Home lake, which continues to be a menace to the health of the occupants of the Home and also to the whole neighborhood.

It is with great pleasure that I am able to report that all work done by the Board of Commissioners has been done in the utmost harmony, the members vieing with each other in the interest of economy and for the best interests of the Home and its membership. In this direction we have been most ably and unselfishly aided at all times by the late Commander, John H. Shaw, by the present Commander, C. S. Aldrich, and by our very efficient and painstaking Adjutant and Bookkeeper, Captain Samuel West. The latter named gentleman, who has occupied this most important and responsible position for five and a half years, has made his services indispensable.

REPORT OF THE COMMANDER.

Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1903.

President George West,

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission.

Dear Sir—Having but recently assumed command of this Home, I can not, of my own knowledge, give any summary of the work done during the year for which this report is made, but refer you to the reports of your Adjutant, Quartermaster and Surgeon, which I have the honor herewith to transmit, and which fully set forth the essential features of the year's work.

So far as my knowledge goes all departments of the Home work have been carefully and judiciously managed during the

entire year.

Since September 1 a number of old structures, consisting of temporary sheds, chicken houses and hog pens, located near the hospital buildings, have been torn down, and more substantial and commodious buildings, for the same purposes, erected farther away.

The furnaces in the cottage and hospital have been reset and repaired, the cottage sewer relaid and the cottage porches

remodeled.

A fire brigade has been organized, and the entire group of Home buildings equipped with Swan's chemical fire extinguishers, and 400 feet of fire hose purchased, so that reasonable protection against fire is now furnished for all the departments of this institution.

Anticipating a coal famine, a supply of coal and wood sufficient to last until March 1 was put in early, at low prices.

There has also been purchased full winter stocks of clothing, groceries, provisions, flour, feed and hay, which were bought early

and at low figures.

An additional supply of water for fire and household purposes is being provided by the erection of an outside tower and water tank, and the installation of a large hydraulic ram, by which both tanks will be supplied for ordinary use, enabling us to dispense with the steam pump, except in the event of a fire, or the stoppage of the ram for repairs.

The low ground north of the Home buildings has been surveyed for drainage, and tile purchased, so that this swampy piece of land will be reclaimed in the spring.

A contract has been let to the Monte Vista Electric and Gas Company to furnish the Home with electric lights. The poles are already set and wired, and it is expected that, with the beginning of the new year, the entire group of Home buildings and the contiguous grounds will be lighted with electricity.

There has been a notable increase of population in the Home since September 1, the aggregate membership now reaching 191, the largest number ever reported, and there is a strong pressure

for the admission of many more.

Considering the age of the membership, the health conditions are remarkably good. There has been no epidemic of any kind during the year. The records show an average of only twenty-one

in the hospital since September 1.

The inauguration of a weekly roll call and inspection, Wednesday afternoons, followed by outdoor sports and games, and concluding with the ceremonial lowering of the flag, has imparted a military flavor to the life of the Home, and has resulted in a marked improvement in the personal appearance of the membership and in the discipline of the Home.

After carefully studying the situation here for three months, I am convinced that the most pressing need of the institution now is more commodious buildings for administrative purposes. I have never known a State institution of as much importance as this with such poor facilities for doing the administrative work.

A building, providing convenient and commodious offices for the Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster on the first floor, and living rooms for the Adjutant's family on the second floor, is, I am convinced, the most pressing need of this institution at present.

Such building should be of stone, constructed on carefully considered architectural plans, so as to harmonize with the pres-

ent permanent structures.

I also urge, as of next importance, a two-story wing on the north side of the main building, similar to the west wing. This would allow the vacating of the west wing of the hospital for ward purposes, and permit its use for additional hospital facilities, which are very much needed. This addition would give a large amount of room for our increasing population.

I can not close this report without expressing my admiration for the zealous and efficient work of the Board of Commissioners and the heartiness with which they push forward every measure calculated to promote the comfort and welfare of the membership

of the Home.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON.

Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1904.

General George West.

President Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission.

Dear Sir—I have the honor, herewith, to present to you the following report, as Surgeon of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home,

for the fiscal year ending this day.

I took charge of the hospital April 5, 1903. At that date there were 180 members on the roll of the Home, and thirty-one patients in the hospital. I made daily visits, prescribing for from twenty-five to thirty-five patients during this month. No deaths occurred, although there was one patient hopelessly sick. During May we had an epidemic of colds and la grippe, and there were many sick. I made daily visits, as well as a number of extra ones, prescribing, on an average for thirty-five patients daily. On the 14th of May James Smith, who had been brought in a few days previously, hopelessly sick, died of acute myelitis, aged sixty-six years. On the 17th of May Edward Jones (colored), to whom I referred as a hopeless case, died of cirrhosis of the liver, aged sixty-six years. On May 2 Robert Purvis, aged seventy-three years, died of gastro-enteritis, following a complication of diseases. Again, on the 27th of May, Alphonso H. Lawrence died suddenly, of apoplexy, this being his second attack, aged eightyfour years. The month was notable for its mortality, being the greatest during the year.

During June we still had a great deal of sickness. I made daily visits, and some extras, prescribing for about fifteen patients. On June 7 David McCulloch died from senile pneumonia, following a cerebral hemorrhage, aged sixty-nine years. On June 22d Ludwig A. Schaarwachter died, having been found in a comatose condition upon trying to awake him for breakfast. He never regained consciousness, and died twenty-four hours later, from cerebral hemorrhage, aged sixty years. On June 25 Harvey W. Green died from typhoid fever, after an illness of six

weeks, aged sixty-two years.

During July quite a number of the members went away on furloughs. Those remaining had fairly good health. I made daily visits, prescribing for about ten each day. No deaths during July. On July 7, with the assistance of Dr. R. W. Cary, I operated on the leg of Conrad Loesch, removing from the bone a great

deal of necrosed matter. At the present he is greatly improved, so much so that he can now go around the grounds, with the aid of crutches.

During August the health remained fairly good, aside from bowel troubles. I made daily visits and prescribed for about fifteen patients each day. There were no deaths in August.

During the first part of September the bowel troubles continued; due, no doubt, to the unsanitary conditions to the north of the hospital, to which the attention of the Commissioners, who were in session at that time, was called. On September 6 Enoch Fruit died of senile pneumonia, aged eighty-one years, the sickness lasting only three days. On September 8 Allen Downs (colored) was found dead in his chair, death having occurred from chronic heart trouble, of several years' standing. I made daily visits during September, and prescribed for about ten patients each visit.

Owing to the changes and thorough cleaning up of the hospital, which has been done as rapidly as practicable over a period of some months, the general health has improved and things have been going nicely for some time.

During October I made daily visits, excepting on Sundays, prescribing for about fifteen patients at each visit. These were mostly chronic cases from the quarters, the hospital having fairly good health. There were no deaths in October.

Through the month of November, owing to a good many colds, I have prescribed for more patients than during October. On the 1st of the month I operated for a case of hydrocele, and the patient is cured. I have made daily visits, and at this time the health is better than at any time since I have taken charge, which I attribute to the sanitary conditions and the cleanliness in which the hospital is kept, and also to the culinary conditions.

I would here offer a suggestion to the Commissioners, which I think could be readily carried out, and which would certainly be a great benefit to the hospital. As it now is, we have no place where we can isolate a very sick man, no place for a surgical case, and no place to put a patient when he becomes delirious. By making a few changes in the west ward, formerly the convalescent ward, these inconvenient conditions can be easily remedied.





Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission, Office of the President, Golden, Colo., December 10, 1904.

To His Excellency,

James H. Peabody,

Governor of the State of Colorado, Denver, Colorado.

Sir—I have the honor to herewith submit my report, as required by law, for the fiscal year, ending November 30, 1904, together with the reports of Commander C. S. Aldrich, Adjutant Samuel West, Surgeon Edwin E. Whedon and Quartermaster Leroy Beard. From all of which you will be able to glean a thorough knowledge of the conduct of the Home during the period covered by this report.

The present Board is constituted as follows: President, George West, of Golden; Vice-President, R. J. McNutt, of Eureka; Secretary, L. H. Cheney, of Monte Vista; Treasurer, T. J. Downen, of Pueblo, ex-officio member of the Board by virtue of his election as Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The terms of office of George West and R. J. McNutt, as Commissioners, will expire in April, 1905, they having been ap-

pointed by Governor Orman in 1901.

The law constituting the incumbent of the office of Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, ex-officio, a member of this Commission, seems to be a wise one, and one that should be retained upon the statute books. During my term of service upon the Board it has been my privilege to be associated with four of these gentlemen, to wit, General L. E. Sherman, of Colorado Springs; General J. W. Huff, of Victor; General H. S. Vaughn, of Denver, and the present incumbent, General T. J. Downen, of Pueblo, and it is but justice to inform

you that their services upon the Board have been invaluable; always displaying the greatest interest in the affairs of the Home and always giving their aid and advice for its welfare and betterment.

On the 14th of last May Dr. E. L. Foster suddenly resigned his position as Surgeon of the Home, on account of the removal of his residence from Monte Vista. Under the authority of the Board of Commissioners, Secretary L. H. Cheney at once appointed Dr. Edwin E. Whedon, of Monte Vista, to fill the vacancy until a meeting of the Board could be had, and at a regular meeting of the Board, held on the 4th day of August, 1904, Dr. Whedon was unanimously elected as Surgeon of the Home until the regular meeting of the Board in April, 1905. I am pleased to be able to say that Dr. Whedon has so far filled the position of Home Surgeon with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of the Board.

I have much satisfaction in assuring your Excellency that the able and conscientious service rendered by Captain C. S. Aldrich during his incumbency of the office is good evidence that no mistake was made in the choice of a Commander, of which fact I informed you in my last annual report. Combining firmness with kindness and good judgment in this trying position, he has succeeded in preserving discipline and good feeling among the members of the Home, and, by exercising strict economy in all branches of the business of the Home, has aided the Board materially in its efforts to keep the expenditures within the appropriations.

Before leaving this subject I desire to express my gratitude for and unqualified approval of the invaluable services of Captain Samuel West, who, for the past six and a half years, has filled the offices of Adjutant and Bookkeeper of the Home. His arduous duties are always performed in a most careful and conscientious manner. He is thoroughly in accord with Commander Aldrich in his endeavors for good government and economy.

In July of 1904, having received assurances from the State Treasurer and Auditor of State that the appropriation of \$10,000 granted by the last Legislature, for permanent improvements, would be made available, work was commenced upon a two story and a half stone building, of 67 feet by 41 feet dimensions. For more particular description of the same I beg to refer you to the accompanying report of Commander Aldrich.

Our plans for general expenditures and improvements contemplated the full use of the appropriations granted for this biennial period, which were \$25,000 for each of the fiscal years of 1903 and 1904, and \$10,000 for improvements; but I regret to say that out of the total \$60,000 appropriated we have only been able to obtain \$49,702.44, making a shortage of \$10,297.56 from what we had planned to expend for our urgent needs. In regard to the details of these financial matters I would again respectfully refer you to the accompanying report of Commander

Aldrich, and especially to his plea for the early passage of a deficiency and emergency bill by the coming General Assembly.

The laws of Colorado at the present time make no provision for the support of the wives and families of indigent soldiers of the Civil War, and the subject has been discussed from time to time by the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission. I earnestly hope that as soon as the finances of the State will admit, provision may be made for the support of wives and widows of honorably discharged soldiers and sailors of the late war of the rebellion who were married, say not later than the year 1890, and also of regularly enlisted army nurses. This could be effected by the adoption of a cottage system at the present Home, at Monte Vista, or, preferably, by establishing a separate Home at a point nearer the larger settlements. Such a Home could be run at a minimum cost, and the same Board of Commissioners could govern it, and but few citizen employes would be required.

In submitting this report I have purposely refrained from going into details, as I believe all points are covered by the re-

ports of the officers herewith submitted.

Thanking you, my dear sir, for the many acts of courtesy extended to me and for your helpful advice and suggestions from time to time during the two years of service under your administration, I have the honor to subscribe myself,

COMMANDER'S REPORT.

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1904.

General George West.

President Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission, Golden, Colorado.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the reports of the several officers of the Home, for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1904. These reports cover the details of the work of the year so completely that it is only necessary for me to make a few general statements and suggestions.

IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year an additional outside water tank has been erected, to give more complete fire protection. Four hundred feet of fire hose and a hose cart have been purchased, and a large water ram installed for pumping purposes. A broad porch has been erected around the south front of the main quarters. This adds greatly to the comfort of the members, as well as to the architectural appearance of the building. Electric lights have been installed in all the buildings, and four arc lights so placed as to light every part of the grounds, as occasion may require. A dairy barn has been built, and a dairy of twelve cows installed. This furnishes the Home with pure milk at a net saving of \$1,000 per year under what was formerly paid. A new two and one-half story stone building, dimensions 41x67 feet, has been erected, at a cost of about \$12,000. This building, on the first floor, gives convenient offices and store rooms for all the administrative work of the Home, also a suite of rooms for the Commissioners. On the second floor are convenient living rooms, for the Adjutant and his family, and three small ward rooms. On the third floor is a large, airy, well-lighted ward room, that will accommodate twenty-five members. Altogether, this new building, with the old rooms vacated as offices, will accommodate about fifty additional members, and will be ample for the needs of the Home for several years. This building is provided with convenient bath rooms and water closets, and is heated with hot air, from two basement furnaces. It has an attractive porch on each of the four sides, and is a beautiful structure. Considering its cost and adaptation to

our needs, it challenges comparison with any public building in Colorado.

HOSPITAL.

The increasing age of the old soldiers is making increasing demands on our hospital facilities, and renders it imperative that better care and more intelligent nursing be given the sick than was afforded when the old soldiers themselves were the only nurses employed. To meet this demand a trained hospital steward and an assistant, both from the New York State Home, have been employed during most of the year, with marked improvement in the care of the patients. And, although the number of sick treated has increased considerably, the death rate of the year has been only 80 per cent. of the year previous.

DISCIPLINE.

The discipline of the Home has greatly improved during the year. Not having room for all who press for admission, it has been my policy to drop from the rolls members who wilfully violate the rules laid down by your Board, and to give their places to new and more worthy men. This method of eliminating the wilfully bad has had a marked effect upon the good order and discipline of the Home, and makes it much more really a home than it was a year ago.

PRESSING NEEDS.

The pressing needs of the Home now are, enlarged dining room facilities, a better system of heating and ventilating the hospital, drainage of the low lands contiguous to the Home buildings, and improvement of the lake and lake frontage. These improvements will, at a low figure, cost \$10,000, and should be provided for by the next legislative appropriation.

FINANCES.

I regret to report that we close the year with a debt of \$5,569.97, and with no funds for maintenance, until the next legislative appropriations have become available. This unfortunate condition arises from the fact that \$10,297.58 of our last biennial appropriations, for improvements and maintenance, has been withheld from us and now, by law, is covered back into the State treasury. If our credit is to be maintained, and the old soldiers fed, clothed and kept warm during the coming months of December, January and February, manifestly, a deficiency bill must be passed early in the next session, to give us what we were not allowed to draw of our last appropriations.

THE NEXT BIENNIAL PERIOD.

Late congressional legislation has prohibited the use, by the states, of pension money to pay for the clothing of pensioners.

This has forced the free issue of clothing to pensioners as well as to non-pensioners, and will increase our clothing bill about \$3,000 per year.

The increasing age of the members is rapidly rendering them incapable of labor, either in the hospital, or in the various positions about the Home, thus making it necessary to employ citizens' help, at a greater cost than has heretofore been paid.

The substitution of electricity for coal oil has increased our lighting expense considerably.

The increase of membership will considerably increase the cost of maintenance during the next biennial period.

All of these conditions force the conclusion that we shall need at least \$30,000 per year for maintenance during the next two years, if the Home is to be made a real home for our veteran soldiers.

In conclusion, I desire to report that I have had during the year the most loyal and hearty support of all the officers of the Home, and that our relations in the administrative work has been most cordial.

Thanking you and the Commission, of which you are President, for your zealous and efficient work for the Home, and for your uniform kindness and courtesy to me, both personally and officially,

SURGEON'S REPORT.

Monte Vista, Colorado, November 30, 1904.

George West, Esq.,

President Board of Commissioners:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report as Surgeon to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, for the period from May 14, 1904, to November 30, 1904.

During that time I have made daily visits to the Home, with few exceptions. Several extra and night calls have also been made when my services were required.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I commend the management, from Commander Aldrich down, for the co-operation which I have received at all times.

The general condition of the membership of the Home is excellent. The hospital is in sad need of a hot water heating plant, as the present heating system gives off more bad vapors and smoke than heat.

I have operated several cases at my private hospital without cost to the soldiers or the State, because there is no operating room at the Home. This is another sad need. Think of a hospital without an operating room.

There have been seven deaths during my term of office. For the list of same, see report of Adjutant Samuel West. One was a suicide and two others were brought here dying.

The day has arrived when the medical department is one of the most important of the Home, so far as the comfort and health of the members is concerned. I believe it is the duty of the State of Colorado to make the declining years of the old soldiers and sailors as comfortable as possible, and I stand willing, at any time, to do all in my power for their comfort and health.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Commander C. S. Aldrich,
Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Dear Sir—I have the honor of presenting the following report as Chaplain. This is the first time in the thirteen years during which I have served in this capacity that I have been requested to make a report. One reason of this, no doubt, was that for ten years it was a voluntary service as a comrade, on account of my being chaplain of Joe Hooker Post. The Board of Commissioners on March, 1897, appointed me as Chaplain, but named no duty and specified no salary, yet at every call to service I answered "yes," and with my other ministerial duties as a home missionary pastor it was a pleasure to give a service on Sunday once every month for about six years, when place could be had, and upon relinquishing part of my pastoral engagements gave a service twice every month besides officiating at the burial of fellow comrades. as called upon; and these calls up to date number 152, of which 28 have been within the past two years. It has always been a privilege, as well as a duty, to conduct these services. As Chaplain I have always been treated most courteously by the different administrations, and, so far as I know, welcomed by the comrades. I can mention with pleasure the helpfulness and co-operation rendered by our worthy Adjutant, Capt. Samuel West, and some comrades gifted with musical talent willing to serve. The former commander, Col. French, and family, and Mrs. Shaw, were ever willing hearted in doing good, and at present yourself and your worthy family render a constant help in maintaining a weekly service. The past two and a half years the Chaplain has been paid a small amount as salary and has tried to earn it by seeing that a service is provided on each Sunday afternoon. In this I have been very greatly assisted by the pastors of the different churches of Monte Vista taking their turn as invited. Such help is appreciated and fruitful of good to those in attendance. It has been my custom to visit the sick in the hospital about once each week, and when request is made at any opportune time. The Home has not only been a place where the sick and worn out comrade has found care, food, raiment and friendly help, but where to some has come the prospect of faith, hope and love connecting the soul with the heavenly home and the better life, making it a home indeed, the sum and substance of a Christian civilization.

There is no claim greater than that for moral and spiritual help and I feel that the great State of Colorado can not afford to do less than provide adequate soul food for its veteran defenders. From the Chaplain's standpoint there has been during the past two years an increasing show of good order and manly self respect among the comrades. The higher the ideal the higher the attainment. I have seen the day of small things here and did not despise it. In the better equipment of assembly hall or chapel, and increased accomodations in all the departments of the Home, I rejoice, and I believe that under the management of a wise and experienced Board of Commissioners and a firm and kind executive, the Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home now stands well toward the front rank among State homes.


