Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, Monte Vista, Colo., December 1, 1907.

To His Excellency,

HON. HENRY A. BUCHTEL, Governor of Colorado, Denver, Colorado.

Sir-I have the honor to submit herewith my report as President of the Board of Commissioners of the Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1907, together with the reports of the officers of the Home for the same period. I especially call your attention to the statistics contained in these reports, as they show some very encouraging features in the financial and governmental management of the Home as compared with other years.

The Board, as organized, consists of

The liberal appropriations of the last legislature have enabled your Board to provide a menu which I believe to be unexcelled by any Soldiers' Home in the country, and to furnish a better quality of clothing than heretofore, and to give many comforts and luxuries to these aged veterans which no previous administration has furnished.

Your Board, during the year, has completed a large additional ward to the hospital, with additional baths and water closets having tiled flooring and wainscoting. We have increased the hospital dining room by adding about one third to its former capacity, and built a steam laundry and installed in it a complete set of machinery capable of doing the laundry work of the institution for years to come. We have erected a large two-story central section to the green-house, which, in addition to being a thing of beauty, will amply furnish the Home with flowers for funerals and decorative purposes and early

vegetables for the tables and early plants for the Home gardens. These improvements are of stone, and of a very permanent character. After paying for these buildings and the entire support of the Home for the year we have left of the legislative appropriation for 1908 \$32,000 for maintenance, \$3,000 for improvement of lake dyke, \$3,000 for cottages, and a government fund of \$15,216.07. With this government fund we are proposing to erect a two-story stone building, the first story to be used for baths, wash-rooms and water-closets, and a library room. The second floor will be a ward-room to accommodate twenty men. We already have the plans and specifications for this building, and expect to have it completed early next summer.

The cemetery has been greatly improved with grass plats, flower beds and a large stone morgue, erected contiguous to the entrance gate. All these, with numerous minor improvements, have greatly added to the attractiveness and comfortableness of the Home and have made it a resting place for the veterans of the Civil war, of which the patriotic citizens of Colorado may well be proud.

During the year the government of the Home has been mild and paternal, yet firm and successful. Only four dishonorable discharges have been made during the year, and these for the most flagrant and open disobedience of our printed rules. Each one of the discharges has had the unanimous and hearty approval of the Board of Commissioners.

Your Board has had the hearty co-operation of all the officers of the Home, in a wise and economical use of the public funds, and we challenge the closest inspection of the expenditures of the year.

I think I voice the unanimous opinion of all careful observers who have made themselves familiar with the workings of the Home for the year just closing, when I say it has, taken all in all, been the most successful year in the history of the institution.

For these good results the Board feels greatly indebted to Your Excellency for your intelligent and unceasing interest in the Home; your wise and prompt counsel; and for your heroic defense in emergencies which threatened to greatly injure the usefulness of the institution.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMANDER.

Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1907.

Hon. L. H. Cheney,

President Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the report of my very efficient staff officers covering the fiscal year ending November 30, 1907.

These reports, if carefully studied by your Board, will give you a very clear understanding of the workings of this institution for the year, and leave but little for me to add by way of

explanation.

I beg, however, to call your attention to a few facts as embodied in the reports of past years, which will give a comprehensive view of the workings of the Home over a long period, and will enable you to judge of its progress and determine whether or not it is accomplishing the patriotic and beneficient purposes contemplated by its founders.

### INCREASING MEMBERSHIP.

While the records of the Home for the first ten years are incomplete, the following figures will show that the membership is steadily increasing, notwithstanding the increase in the death rate, due to the average great age of the men:

#### KINDLY DISCIPLINE.

During the year just closed, with a membership of 256, I have discharged, for cause, only four members, or one and a half per cent. of the total membership, and during the last three years I have so discharged sixteen members, or an average per year of two and three-tenths per cent. of the total membership. This is a lower record than any of the State Homes whose reports I have examined; some of them having so discharged ten per cent. of the membership. In this Home under a previous management, in 1897, this class of discharges amounted to nine per cent. of the membership, and during three years of the same administration, this class of discharges amounted to six per cent. per annum of the total membership.

The lock-up provided for confining disorderly members and which was formerly used very frequently, sometimes having two inmates at a time in it, I have not used for nearly two years.

Several of the members who have been discharged for drunkenness and bad behavior have been re-admitted and are now among the best and most orderly men of the Home. While this is not in any sense a reformatory, I have the greatest satisfaction of knowing that a number of the men have been helped into a more sober and a decidedly better kind of life through the influences which have surrounded them here.

#### COST OF MAINTENANCE.

The following figures show the cost of maintenance for the last five years:

The marked saving during the last four years is in sharp contrast with 1903, the last year of my predecessor's administration, especially if you remember the cost of wages, provisions, clothing and other supplies have been steadily advancing; and also if you add to this the further fact that the tables have been better supplied, and the men more neatly clothed, and made more comfortable with steam heat, electric lights and other modern conveniences, all calling for quite an extra large force of employes and other expenditures.

#### AN INEBRIATE WARD.

I am profoundly convinced from the experience of the last four years that in many cases the habitual use of intoxicants

becomes a disease and should be treated as such. Since I assumed command of this Home eight members have practically committed suicide through the alcohol route. Six of these have died away from the Home while on furlough. The patients of this class are among the biggest and best-hearted of our inmates. They are generally quiet and orderly, but when the paroxysm for drink comes, it seems irresistable and they go out for a debauch, and if they come back at all, come with delirium tremens, or in a terribly used-up condition, from which it takes weeks and sometimes months to recover. It would be a wise charity if these men could be kept in an inebriate ward, under special rules and treatment, instead of being sent out into the world to be robbed of their money and practically murdered by the whisky seller. I most earnestly call your attention to this matter, and urge that an inebriate ward be established, and special care and treatment be given to this class of patients, and special rules be adopted for their management and control.

#### OUTSIDE INTERFERENCES.

I call your attention to the frequent interferences in the management of the Home, during the year, by outside parties who seem to have formed a political combine to control the offices and dictate the policy which shall govern the institution. The law specifically states that your Board "shall have sole care, control and direction of the affairs of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, and shall be accountable directly to the Governor."

This quotation from the statutes clearly shows that the Governor is the only person authorized by law to interfere with your management. Under his general direction you have sole authority. The political combination above referred to has undertaken to make it appear that you are responsible to them instead of the Governor, and that the Commander of the Home instead of enforcing your rules and regulations is bound by some superior obligation to obey the orders of this secret conclave, which arrogates to itself the guardianship of the old soldiers in this institution, which the taxpayers of the State are so generously supporting.

You very readily see how it adds to the difficulty of maintaining order and preserving proper discipline among 250 men, when outside secret organizations with ramifications all over the State encourage disobediance, violation of your rules and an open disregard of the solemn oath which each of these men took as a condition of membership in the Home.

I most earnestly urge as a vital step in the successful management of this institution, that in every proper way, you discourage this outside meddlesome interference which has so disturbed the peace and quietness of the Home during the year just closed.

I desire, in closing this report, to express to you and to the members of your Board, my sincere thanks for the hearty support you have given my administration at all times. I also wish to especially commend the present officers of the Home, who are serving under me, for the intelligence and fidelity with which each has discharged the duties of his office. With such able and faithful assistants my arduous duties have been greatly lightened and the pleasures of our Home life greatly increased.

Dear Sir—As Surgeon of the Home, I submit the following report for the fiscal year:

I wish to express my thanks to the Commissioners for filling the many long-felt wants in the Hospital department of our Home. The new addition about to be completed will probably furnish us room enough for some time to come, and the many things in the way of utensils, such as the portable bath tub, etc., will enhance the comfort of our sick ones.


The work done by the Hospital Steward and his assistants is very worthy of commendation, for in no time during the history of the Home has there been as efficient services rendered to those unfortunate enough to be sick.

During the year I have made daily visits to the Home, except when I have been away, and then I had the services of a competent man to take my place.

A large number of the deceased entered the Home and came directly to the Hospital. As each year advances a greater percentage of those entering the Home will be Hospital patients, and necessarily our death rate must be larger.

There have been several operated upon for opening abcesses, one cataract, stenosis of the lachrimal duct, hydrocele, and one trephining operation.

During the past year there have been twenty-four hundred prescriptions issued from our drug department, and over seventeen hundred men have reported to sick call. Something over one hundred and sixty have been admitted to the Hospital for treatment, and about one hundred and twenty discharged as cured, improved, or to go on furlough.

Several cases of insanity have been treated during the past year, and at all times we have several cases of senile dementia.

All parts of the Hospital and convalescent wards are in a thoroughly sanitary condition, as well as every part of the grounds and barracks. The food as it has been served up to patients during the past few months has been especially satisfactory.

With the extra amount of room that will soon be at our disposal, and the very efficient services of our nurses, the sick will be made much more comfortable and their chances of getting well will be much greater.

I wish to express my sincere gratitude for the co-operation and help I have received from all connected with the Hospital during the past year.

#### REPORT OF THE CHAPLAIN.

Commander, C. S. Aldrich,

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Sir—I have the honor to submit my report to close of the fiscal year of 1907.

Following the time-honored custom of conducting services each week on Sunday, I have preached 43 times. I have also preached at 23 funeral occasions. Three times was the funeral occasion more sad than usual. Twice two old soldiers were buried at one time, and at another three were laid to rest together. Besides the services on Sabbath at the Chapel, I have visited the Hospital each Sabbath, speaking a word to each man and conducting a religious service of reading the Scriptures and prayer; 42 such services were held. The address on the Fourth of July and also on Flag Day fell to my lot, which service I performed. The total services conducted and addresses made for the year is 109. Other ministers from town have addressed the old soldiers 6 times—twice at funeral occasions, and at regular Sunday services four times. On three occasions, for various reasons, there has been no service on Sunday.

The religious services at the home bring much into the lives of many of the men, and from kindly expressions given are much appreciated. The attendance at these services is good, all things considered. The services are quiet and orderly, carrying a devotional spirit. There is a strict attention and a responsiveness to the word as it is preached. I think the office of Chaplain affords opportunity for doing good and trust, under God, the labors may be of eternal blessing to many of the hearts that listen

The bound volume in the bookcases aggregate 360 in good condition. These works consist of history, biography, travels and fiction, and represent some of the best writers of the past and present day.

Books on the open shelves consist of Encyclopedia Britannica, 24 volumes, congressional, executive and miscellaneous reports, 110 volumes; governmental documentary works, 113 volumes; official records of the armies and navies of the Union and Confederacy during the Civil War, in duplicate, one set being bound in cloth boards and one unbound, 147 volumes. There are, in addition to the foregoing enumerated books, a large number of paper-bound books and magazines, such as novels, novelettes, etc.

The grand total of all classes of books and magazines in our library aggregate 1,620.

In October of this year the idea was conceived to secure the aid of The Colorado Traveling Library Commission to obtain an additional supply of interesting and fresh reading matter. This was carried out through the President of the Commission, Mrs. A. M. Wells. Two boxes of books were sent and were added to the library. These books have given general satisfaction. The men have been delighted with the new reading matter, and the books have been in constant circulation.

These boxes of books are kept for from three to six months, and then boxes of fresh reading matter supplied in their places. Receiving books in this way adds greatly to the library, but nothing to the expense, only requiring a little more care on the part of the Librarian.







Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith my report, as required by law, for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1908, together with the reports of Commander C. S. Aldrich, Adjutant Dan W. Brown, Quartermaster Leroy Beard, Surgeon C. W. Russell and Chaplain Samuel H. Moore, from all of which you will be able to glean a thorough knowledge of the conduct of the Home during the period covered by these reports.

The present Board is constituted as follows:

Rev. F. W. Bretnall resigned as Chaplain of the Home September 1, 1908, and Dr. Samuel H. Moore was appointed in his place October 1, 1908. September 30, 1908, E. W. Garretson suddenly resigned as Adjutant of the Home. Application was made to the Board of Civil Service Commissioners for some one to fill the vacancy. There being no available list, on recommendation of this Board, Dan W. Brown, of Pueblo, was appointed under rule VII, paragraph 1, of the Civil Service rules, provisionally, pending the result of competative examinations held November 5, 1908. As the result of this examination Brasier Hunt, of Denver, was certified to your Board as No. 1 in standing, and in compliance with the law was appointed Adjutant and Bookkeeper of the Home, his appointment to take effect December 15, 1908.

We have had completed during the year the improvements on the Hospital addition, the Laundry and Greenhouse. A stone Bathhouse and Amusement Hall and three brick Cottages are nearly completed. The lake dike improvement has been completed, as far as the appropriation would admit. A new 100 horse-power boiler has been added in the power house for use in case of emergency.

We shall need appropriations for the Home for the biennial period, December 1, 1908, to November 30, 1910, inclusive, for improvements, \$12,500.00; and for maintenance, \$70,000.00, or \$35,000.00 for each year. We shall deem it necessary to ask the incoming Legislature for an emergency appropriation of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to provide for maintenance and repairs during the months of January, February and March, 1909, until the regular appropriation becomes available. This \$5,000.00 emergency appropriation can be deducted from the appropriation of the first year, leaving \$30,000.00 in the general appropriation for 1909, and \$35,000.00 for the year 1910, making the total for the biennial period \$70,000.00.

I was appointed by your Board to superintend the erection of the new buildings and improvements, which I have done.

The management of the Home under the present corps of officers has been very satisfactory to your Board, and we have heard very little complaint from the members of the Home during the year.

#### COMMANDER'S REPORT.

Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, November 30, 1908.

President L. H. Cheney, Soldiers' and Sailors' Home Commission.

Dear Sir—As required by law, I herewith transmit the reports of Adjutant Dan W. Brown, Quartermaster Leroy Beard, Surgeon C. W. Russell, Chaplain Samuel H. Moore, D. D., and Librarian J. M. Babcock. These reports, to which I invite the careful attention of your Board, cover in detail the work of the different departments of the Home for the fiscal year.

#### INCREASE OF MEMBERSHIP.

You will notice that the total membership on the last day of the year was 245, as against 239 last year, and the average daily attendance for the year has been 168, as against 157 last year. This average attendance is the largest of any year in the history of the Home.

## COST OF MAINTENANCE.

The total cost of maintenance and repairs has been \$41,796.38, or on the basis of total membership, \$170.00 per capita, as against \$173.00 last year, and \$226.00 during the last year of Colonel Shaw's administration. Considering the steady increase in wages and the cost of subsistence and clothing, and the large additional increase of the salary list, made necessary by the hospital addition, power house, steam laundry and green houses, and the extra cost of electric light and steam heating, I feel sure your Board will regard this as a good financial showing for the year.

#### DISCIPLINE.

The discipline of the Home through the year has continued to be mild and paternal, and only three discharges for violation of rules have occurred. Two of these discharged members have been reinstated on pledges not to repeat the offenses. The lock-up has not been used by me for confinement purposes during the year.

#### PENSION MONEY.

The new law of congress which prohibits any portion of a soldier's pension from being taken for the support of the Home, or controlled by any officer of the Home, has been fully complied with.

#### REPEAL PENSION STATUTE.

I call your attention to the necessity of securing the repeal of section 6041 of the revised statutes by the next Legislature in order to avoid the risk of losing the government appropriation made for the maintenance of the soldiers in this Home.

#### PENSIONS OF MEMBERS.


While the \$25,000.00 of pension money annually distributed to members of this Home in many cases proves an injury to the members, and is a serious hindrance in maintaining good order and discipline, in many other cases it is carefully saved or sent to dependent families and relatives, and is a great help and blessing.

#### NEEDED APPROPRIATIONS.

The membership of the Home is steadily increasing, especially in the Hospital department. For the next biennial period we must have \$48,000,00 per year for maintenance and repairs. Of this amount the receipts from the general government will

be about \$16,000.00, leaving \$32,000.00 per year to be provided by the State Legislature.

#### HOME NEEDS.

Besides maintenance and repairs we are much in need of a large vegetable cellar; a covered carryall with side seats and rear entrance, to hold 14 persons, to be especially used for convalescent and crippled members who can not be properly accommodated in present convevances: a hearse for funerals, and about 300 yards of cement sidewalk to complete the present system. These necessary improvements will cost about \$3,000.00, for which the Legislature should be asked to make a special appropriation, in addition to such appropriation as your Board may deem necessary to improve the low grounds north of the Home and complete the lake dike, and the boulevard drive around the lake, and border it with trees.

I desire to especially commend the present officers of the Home for the loyal support they have given me in the arduous work of the year. To this support I, in a great measure, attribute the marked success of the year's work in all departments of the Home management.


#### TREATMENT OF INEBRIATE MEMBERS.

I desire again to call the attention of your Board to the necessity of adopting some special rules for the treatment and care of the class of members of the Home which may properly be termed "confirmed inebriates." Another year's experience has confirmed me in the opinions regarding this class which I expressed in my last annual report, and to which I invite your careful consideration. I there said: "Since I assumed command of the Home eight members have practically committed suicide by the alcohol route. Six of these died away from the Home while on furlough. The members in this class are usually among the biggest and best-hearted of our membership, but when the paroxysm for drink comes on it seems irresistable and they go out for a debauch, and if they come back alive often come with delirium tremens, or in a terribly used-up condition, from which it takes weeks and sometimes months to recover. It would be a wise charity if these men could be kept in a ward by themselves, under special rules and medical treatment, instead of being allowed to go out into the world to be robbed of their money and practically murdered by the whiskey sellers."

This method of segregation of these men into a ward by themselves is not designed as a punishment, but for convenience of control and medical treatment. Certainly modern methods of humane treatment should do something for these men, who are among our best-hearted members, as they were among the bravest soldiers in the Civil War. To leave them unaided to suffer and go to premature death without earnest efforts to help them is, in my judgment, as great a crime as it would be to leave them to die of malaria or vellow fever without effort to suppress the conditions which allow the spread of these deadly diseases.

#### REPORT OF SURGEON.

Monte Vista, November 20, 1908.

Commander C. S. Aldrich.

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Sir—As Surgeon of the Home. I submit the following report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1908.

The Hospital department was never before in such excellent condition. The help has been very efficient, and since the establishment of the office of Matron, the linens and Hospital utensils have been kept in excellent condition. The dining room service has been especially good since the enlargement of this room. With the completion of the west ward and new bath room much has been added to the convenience and comfort of the members.

Our stock of drugs if much larger than at any time in the previous history of the Hospital: additional Hospital furniture, such as bed-side tables, have been added from time to time, making our equipment very complete.

The work done by the Steward and his assistants has been of the highest order, and at no time during the history of the Home have we had such efficient service in the hospital.

During the year I have made daily visits to the Home, or had a competent physician make them for me. Since my report of a year ago, eighteen deaths have occurred at the Home. The names, dates and causes are given in the report of the Adjutant.

Several operations have been performed during the past year, which, with one exception, have been followed by complete recoveries. During the year over 2,600 prescriptions have been filled from our drug department; 1,800 have reported to Surgeon's call. One hundred and forty-nine have been admitted to the hospital for treatment, seventy-nine have been discharged and eighteen have died.

There are at present fifty in the hospital; among them are a number of partially demented, several hemiplegias, and others who are unable to get about. All parts of the Hospital and convalescent ward are in excellent condition, as well as every part of the grounds and barracks.

With the extra amount of room which we have at our disposal, and the efficient service of our nurses, the chances for a longer life, as well as comfortably passing the last days, are


greatly increased.

I wish to express my sincere thanks for the co-operation and help I have received from all of the officials and others connected with the Hospital and Home during the year.

There is, in addition to the above, a large number of paperbound novels and novelettes to which the members have free access on the open shelves, and which are well patronized daily: The grand total of all books and magazines aggregate 1,603. The records show that during the year there have been loans of books and magazines, 1,109.

Through the kind interest of the Colorado Federation of Women's Clubs we have, in addition to the Library of the Home, the benefit of two cases of their Traveling Library, which are exchanged every three months. These libraries are well patronized, the exchanges amounting to an average of ten books per day for the three months during which they remain at the Home.




