





#### REPORT OF COMMANDANT

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home, Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1913.

General John R. Hurd,

President Board of Commissioners, Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Dear Sir: As you know, I have held the position of Commandant of the Home for so short a time—less than two months—that I am unable from personal knowledge to tell of the affairs of the Home for the past year.

The reports of the Adjutant, Quartermaster, and Surgeon go into the affairs of the Home very thoroughly; all of which reports are submitted for your information.

#### IMPROVEMENTS

Within the last few months a new steam boiler has been installed in the boiler-room, of the Ideal type, and it is in reality an ideal coal-saving steam heater.

Steam heat has been installed in the vegetable cellar, as well as in the groceries department in the same building. This, I feel confident, will prove to be satisfactory, and will also save the expense of a man, at a salary of \$30 per month, to keep firesgoing in this building, for the purpose of protecting its contents from freezing, as I understand was the case last winter. There is no extra expense for heating as it is now, and no extra man is needed.

On the same line of pipe, steam heat has been extended to the hog-pens for use in cooking and preparing food for the hogs, and for scalding in the killing. The feeding of frozen feed is thus at an end. This will result in a great saving of expense in fattening hogs.

These two improvements have been made at an extra expense of \$15. The radiators and much of the pipe were on hand, not being needed elsewhere, and were made use of in this way.

#### THE DYKE

The repairs on the dyke have been completed. The work has been done in a very satisfactory manner, and would seem permanent. Beginning at the bottom of the boards, next the water, all the dirt has been cleaned away for two feet or more, and for from four to six feet at the top, filling in with layers of willows, tamping in dirt, until thoroughly filled to the top of the dyke, A spill-way has been put in, running through the dyke and emptying into the irrigating ditch. This will prevent the lake from rising so near to the top of the dyke. The pipe for this spill-way is two feet ten inches from the top.

The contract for doing the work was let to W. A. Irons at

\$500. I am confident he has made a good job of it.

#### WOMEN'S COTTAGES

It is with pleasure that I am able to inform you of the complete furnishing of the eight cottages. The money was donated for this purpose by our comrades, Ladies of the Relief Corps, Ladies of the Grand Army, and Daughters of Veterans. May God bless all who so generously and gallantly gave the funds for this glorious purpose, relieving the state of this expense! No appropriation for this purpose had been made by the legislature.

The date of the weekly inspection has been changed from Sunday to Saturday, at the same hour—8:30 a. m.

The greenhouse is conducted very satisfactorily by Mr. T. W. Collins, florist. The grounds about the Home during the summer months were very beautiful—in short, the show place of the valley.

The low ground back of the cottages is being filled with ashes and earth, so that, when spring comes again, we hope to see this disagreeable feature done away with.

The adjutant, S. H. Seckner; the quartermaster, Thomas Hull, and J. B. Allen, the engineer, I desire to mention in the most complimentary manner. All of these gentlemen have performed their several duties in a most competent and satisfactory way.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

I have the honor to make the following recommendations:

An electric-light plant should be installed at the Home. The cost of an engine and dynamo sufficient to furnish light in all the buildings and throughout the grounds—500 lights, f. o. b. Monte Vista, one direct current—I am informed, would not exceed \$1,900. Another proposition has been made to furnish this equipment for \$2,300. The wiring now installed belongs to the Home. The present plant of boilers can furnish all power necessary to run the engine and dynamo without extra expense.

The cost of electric lights for the Home for the year from December, 1912, to November, 30, 1913, has been \$1,414.46, so that the installation of this plant would practically pay for itself in two-years.

A night watchman should be provided as a safeguard against loss by fire, and possibly the death of some of the members of the Home. As it is now, there is no one to inform the occupants of a building if it should take fire during the night. They might not know of it until awakened by the fire itself, and then it might be too late for all to escape. This watchman should likewise attend to all police duties during the hours from 8 o'clock p. m. till daylight.

#### BUILDINGS

The buildings need repairing and painting inside and out. Some of them were built many years ago and must be attended to. A general overhauling is needed in the barracks, hospital, annex dining-rooms, assembly hall, and administration building especially.

I would recommend a new fire hose and two new hydrants. The hose now in use leaks in every section. We had it out for examination and test a short time ago. In case of fire the hose might fail us entirely. The hydrants should be of a type that will not freeze.

The sincere thanks of the Home are extended to the State School for Boys at Golden, which presented the caisson to be used as a hearse. This, we are informed, was built by the boys at the school. It is a credit to them, of benefit to the Home, and is appreciated very much by all the members.

With the support of the Honorable Board of Commissioners, I hope during my incumbency as Commandant to have all the comrades feel at home, to see that everything possible is done for their comfort, to promote harmony and a feeling of comradeship, to make this a true home for all those here, and to give my best efforts in its management.



#### REPORT OF SURGEON

Monte Vista, Colo., November 30, 1913.

Colonel A. W. Hogle,

Commandant Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Dear Sir: As Surgeon of the Home, I respectfully submit to you the following report. Though holding the position only since October 1, 1913, I did the work for Dr. Chisholm since August 1, 1913.

I find from the Steward's records that there have been treated in the hospital during the fiscal year 264 patients, and discharged from the hospital, as cured, 212 patients. Patients treated from the barracks numbered 4,162. There have been twenty-two deaths in the hospital during the year. Of these, four have died during my incumbercy.

Two patients during the year have become violently insane, and, not being able to take care of them here, we were forced to send them to the asylum in Pueblo.

All parts of the Home are in excellent sanitary condition. The services rendered by the Steward and his assistants have been most satisfactory. They have been ready to sacrifice their own comfort, that those suffering might be assisted.

I wish to express my most sincere thanks for the assistance rendered me by all the officers of the Home.





# Annual Report

Del Norte, Colorado, January 4, 1915.

To His Excellency

E. M. AMMONS,

Governor of Colorado, Denver, Colorado.

Sir: I have the honor to present my report as president of the Board of Commissioners of the Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home for the fiscal year closing November 30, 1914; also the reports of the Commandant, Adjutant, and other subordinate officers of the Home.

It is the opinion of the Board of Commissioners that there should be appropriated for the maintenance of the Home not less than forty thousand dollars for the year ending November 30, 1915, and forty thousand dollars for the year ending November 30, 1916, making the sum of eighty thousand dollars for the biennial term beginning December 1, 1914, and ending November 30, 1916.

There was appropriated for the last biennial period \$75,000.00, but owing to the increased cost of supplies and the probable increase of population of the Home, we think we are justified in asking an increase of \$5,000.00.

All of the buildings at the Home are in need of repairs and for particulars in regard to this matter I respectfully refer you to the report of the Commandant. We also desire to call your attention to the Surgeon's report in which he recommends an isolated building for members of the Home that are afflicted with tuberculosis.

The Board of Commissioners endorse the recommendations of the Commandant, Col. A. W. Hogle, in regard to the amounts asked for the general repairing of the buildings and the plumbing system.

In conclusion, the Board desires to say that they have found the officers of the Home efficient and capable. For a detailed statement of the finances and population of the Home we respectfully refer you to the very complete report of the Adjutant and bookkeeper, Capt. S. H. Seckner.



#### COMMANDANT'S REPORT

Monte Vista, Colorado, November 30, 1914.

Colonel John Ewing, Jr.,

President Board of Commissioners, Soldiers' and Sailors Home.

Sir: I have the honor to submit the following report of matters connected with the Home since November 30, 1913. My report for the two months previous has already been made.

First, I desire to thank most heartily his Honor, Governor Elias M. Ammons, on behalf of the Home, for his great kindness in procuring from the Del Norte Fish Hatchery, ten thousand Native trout fry through the superintendent, Mr. John P. Bengard. They arrived at Monte Vista, October 2, at 6:20 o'clock p. m., and were put into the Home lake that same evening, and in due time it is hoped that these fish may be of benefit to the Home, as a most delicious food, and provide great sport for members of the Home who enjoy fishing.

The old frame cottages have been torn down and taken away; they were a lot of fire traps, being heated with stoves, and this expense for coal is saved to the State, as well.

#### BOILERS

Two new Ideal boilers have been installed in the present boiler house. These boilers use much less coal than the old ones, say about one-third the amount. An automatic electric pump has also been installed together with electric power in the laundry.

Since the large artesian well has been piped into the reservoir it keeps the tank well supplied. The reservoir has been recovered with two-inch plank and three inches of cement; this keeps the water more pure, no dust or insects can get into it. And, again in case of fire, we are much better protected.

As you are aware we have a fire company with 600 feet of hose, two new fire hydrants have been added, 300 feet of this hose being new.

#### COMMISSARY AND CELLAR

The steam heat in the commissary and cellar gave elegant service last winter when the mercury ranged from ten to twenty-eight degrees below zero for two months steadily.

#### WOMAN'S COTTAGES

Six new cottages have been built this year and are very fine; with the eight already built gives the Home fourteen. Only eight are furnished, and these were furnished by funds donated by our own loyal friends, the department of the Grand Army, the department of the Women's Relief Corps, the Ladies of the Grand Army, the Daughters of Veterans, and Posts and Corps throughout the State. And may the Lord bless them all. It is unfortunate that there are not funds enough to furnish the six.

Each of the cottages, as you know, has a living room, bed room, one large clothes closet, bath and toilet, steam heated and electric lighted, all first-class in every particular.

#### PAINTING

The painting of the hospital and the assembly hall is a great improvement—one that was very much needed.

#### COAL BINS

Two coal bins have been built, having a capacity for storing, say six car loads of coal. As you know, we ran short on three occasions last winter; no fault of mine or the coal company—too long on the way. Strike trouble had something to do with this I presume. We hope to get these bins filled then, keep enough coming, as is needed, from day to day during the winter months.

A lot of minor improvements have been made, and a lot of changes about the Home, I think for the good and appearance generally.

The trees around the Home have been trimmed and thinned out on the west and south side of the grounds, and around the cemetery as well; this was necessary, as they were along the irrigating ditches and were very much in the way, and better for those standing.

#### ICE HOUSE

More room should be added to the ice house; the capacity is not sufficient to supply the hospital, the different kitchens and the meat shop. Ice was entirely exhausted early in October of this year.

### THE HOGS

Not only have we raised all the pork used in the Home, but have sold \$1,180 of young stock, and there is on hand at this time eighty-four head all told.

#### THE FARM

I would recommend that, when the present lease shall have expired that the Home do its own farming; enough alfalfa and

peas could be raised to care for and fatten the hogs, besides all that would be required for the dairy cattle and horses, as well as potatoes for the Home.

#### BUILDINGS

Again, I repeat that all the buildings about the Home are greatly in need of repairs, new floors in some, painting and calcimining in all; a general overhauling is needed.

The plumbing is in very bad condition, and if we get through this winter without serious trouble from these pipes we will be very fortunate. A new oven for the bakery; in fact, this department is sorely in need of many things; a mixer is needed badly.

The surgeon recommends that a building be built for tubercular patients. I would urge this also for reasons he gives in his report.

There ought to be erected one 150-ton silo for feeding the dairy cows; it would be a great saving to the State in this expense.

#### TRAM

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There should be a tram with a large ore car running from the boiler house for conveying ashes; in this way ashes can be dumped where needed to fill the low marshy ground near by.

I would call your attention to the itemized accounts or reports of the Adjutant Captain, S. H. Seckner; Lieutenant Thomas Hull, Quartermaster; the Surgeon, J. H. Moninger, and Chaplain N. H. Lee.

Mr. J. W. Smith, the baker, is an exceptionally competent man in his position.

Mrs. Miller, who is attending to the cooking for the general mess, is giving entire satisfaction, as well as Mrs. Hood, for the hospital.

Mr. Jack Allen, the engineer, is a very competent man; his hours are from very early morning until he gets through at night. He does all the repairs about the electricity used, plumbing—anything wanted it's Jack.

The steward, Mr. C. J. Klein, is a very competent man. Mrs. S. H. Seckner, the matron, is very attentive to her duties, which are many.

The florist, Mr. T. W. Collins, has done well the past year; beautifying the grounds generally depends upon him.

Quite a large per cent of the members of the Home are in the hospital; all are getting along as well as could be hoped for. From May 19 of this year to November 7, not a funeral was had in the Home cemetery. One man, a Mr. William Murry, was brought here on the morning of June 11, and died at 1 o'clock p. m. the same day. John W. Blackstone, a tubercular, who has lived two years longer than was thought possible, died in July;

his remains were shipped to Iowa for burial. The death rate is remarkably low, for so many have passed the meridian.

The personnel of the Home generally is of the best. I hope the coming legislature will provide sufficient funds to repair in every way all the buildings, as all are in need of a general overhauling, as well as for plumbing, and to furnish the women's cottages.

For repairing the buildings, as they should be, I should judge would cost \$12,000. For keeping the plumbing in condition \$2,000. Building tubercular ward, \$5,000, and for silo, \$500. Furnishing woman's cottages, \$700. Bakery and oven, \$1,500.

I desire to thank the Board of Commissioners individually and collectively for their uniform courtesy and support of my efforts as Commandant during the time of my incumbency.

Dear Sir and Brother: I herewith submit my annual report as Chaplain of the Home, for the year ending November 30, 1914:

The regular Sunday afternoon meetings have been conducted. The attendance has been good most of the year, smaller in the summer when many are away, and when it is so pleasant to sit about the grounds in the shade. I have held forty-two services—five or six funerals—have visited the Home, especially the hospital several times during the year. The music has been an important part of the Sunday afternoon services, thanks to the faithful services of Mesdames Bates, Hogle, Seckner, Barnhart, Keiry, and other ladies, and Messrs. Seckner, Klein, and others of the Home. In my absence, Dr. S. H. Moore conducted three Sunday services and one funeral; Rev. Ora Orahood and Rev. William Keiry each held one Sunday afternoon service.

#### SURGEON'S REPORT

Colonel A. W. Hogle,

Commandant Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home,

Dear Sir: I have the honor to respectfully submit the following report, for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1914:

It is with pleasure that I acknowledge the hearty support of all the officers connected with the Home. I also wish to express my thanks to the Commissioners for their valued efforts to make our Soldiers' and Sailors' Home more enjoyable by furnishing us with many articles so essential for the comfort and health of the comrades of the institution.

During the year there have been many changes in the way of help, but the work has been done efficiently, and at present our corps of assistants is the best we have ever had.

In our steward, C. J. Klein, we have a very courteous gentleman, as well as a competent pharmacist.

Our day nurses, Mr. and Mrs. Urban, are doing excellent work, taking good care of both the patients and the work. Our night nurse, Thomas Milet, while he has been with us only a short time, has already demonstrated that he is able to take care of the work in a satisfactory manner.

From the Steward's records I find there have been treated in the hospital during the fiscal year 108 patients, and discharged from the hospital as cured 52. Deceased 18, and out on furlough 2. Of the eighteen deaths one came in in the last stages of tuberculosis and died the same day. One died in the barracks of heart failure, one died in cottage of heart failure, fifteen died in hospital.

Average prescriptions, ten to fifteen a day. Treatment, three to four a day in barracks and around the Home.

We have in the Home five cases of tuberculosis, and are keeping them isolated as well as we can under the present conditions. We have them in one of the glass wards, which makes a very good place for the tubercular patients, but not at all safe for the other occupants of the hospital. Their dishes and cups are kept and washed separate from other dishes, but both of our glass wards connect directly with the other hospital wards, and make complete isolation impossible.

I would respectfully recommend that you use your best efforts to have a separate tubercular cottage built and equipped with open sleeping porches for the care of tubercular patients. While the soldiers who contracted tuberculosis during the Civil War are practically all gone, the veterans of the Spanish-American War, who contracted the disease from exposure during that war, are just now beginning to come in, and I feel confident that the numbers of these will gradually increase, for at least the next ten to fifteen years.

Such a cottage as we need for the proper care of these patients would cost not to exceed \$5,000, and I sincerely hope that you may be able to have one constructed during the next year.

My work at the Home for the past year has been very pleasant, and I wish to thank all of the officers and the help for their assistance at all times.


