Sir: I have the honor to submit my annual report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1919, together with the reports of the officers of the Home covering the same period, and I respectfully call your Excellency's attention to these various reports, as they cover in a complete manner the entire business and financial condition of the Home.

The Staley and Steele Bills, passed by the Twenty-second General Assembly, admitting Indian War soldiers and Civil War widows, failed to carry an appropriation to maintain these worthy people. These very liberal admission laws, combined with increased cost of supplies and labor and reduction of our regular appropriation, as more fully set forth in the Commandant's report, will leave this institution without funds to meet current expenses during the last few months of the present biennial period.

More new buildings have been constructed and other needed improvements made during the last three years than had been done in fifteen prior to that time. The necessary improvements could not be made before because of lack of adequate appropriations, and I respectfully recommend that larger appropriations be allowed in the future for the construction of buildings, as the disabled soldiers of the World War and the Civil War widows will demand double our housing accommodations in the near future.

By the election of Comrade C. M. Bills as Commander of the Department of Colorado and Wyoming, Grand Army of the Republic, Comrade Bills fills the position on the Board of Commissioners made vacant by the retirement of Commissioner Asa Curl.

At the Board meeting of April last the election of officers changed the position of the Commissioners, as shown below, and the personnel of the management of the Home now stands as follows:

Since the last annual report our Quartermaster, Comrade Thomas Hull, died and Comrade Brasier Hunt was appointed to the position of Quartermaster. Robert A. Staley, Chaplain, resigned and D. E. Nourse was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Through the untiring efforts of Commandant Conkie the National Government has established the Homelake postoffice at the Home. The postal service rendered is a great convenience and is highly appreciated by the entire membership of the Home.

The death rate has been lower during the last year than in 1918, as shown in the Adjutant's report. This speaks well for the care taken of the inmates by the officers of the Home.

By close observation during my many official visits to the Home, I found the officers on all occasions exerting themselves to serve the inmates as they should be served and make that institution a pleasant place to live in, and to each of the officers the Board of Commissioners are indebted for loyal support and co-operation.

COMMANDANT'S REPORT

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home,
Homelake, Colo., Nov. 30, 1919.

Hon. W. H. McDonald,
President Board of Commissioners.

Dear Sir: I herewith submit my annual report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1919; also the annual reports of the staff officers covering the same period.

I respectfully refer the Board to the Adjutant's very complete report, covering the financial condition and giving many interesting statistics in reference to the Home. I will also call your attention to the Quartermaster's report, covering subsistence, stock, farm, clothing, etc., as I wish to confine my report more especially to the future needs of the Home.

FARM AND STOCK

We need an appropriation to improve the farm. We should fence, level and drain the farm so as to reclaim about eighteen acres of low land on the southwest part of the farm. This land is well worth reclaiming, as we have enough water shares in the Lariat ditch to bring this tract under cultivation.

Our potato and pea crop was larger than last year, and we will have plenty of potatoes for table use and for seed. The pea crop amounted to fifteen tons and twenty acres of alfalfa returned thirty tons of hay. Deducting the alfalfa acreage, we have only twenty-five acres for cultivation.

We have forty acres of land located about three miles east of the Home farm. This tract should be sold, as we have no water rights to irrigate this forty; hence it is of small value to the Home and has a tendency to mislead parties who read our inventory reports showing the size and productive possibilities of our farm.

We had, not long since, one hundred forty pigs, large and small, but are not prepared to profitably care for this number, so we sold fifty shoats. Besides killing a number for home consumption, we received \$2,567.00 for pigs since last March and have about eighty-five on hand.

Our dairy herd has been greatly improved and increased by the purchase of five heifers and one bull. These animals are from the celebrated Woodcroft-Wolhurst herd, and are full-blood, high-grade, registered Holstein stock.

We need more substantial farm buildings and new feed racks to properly care for our stock, and if it is the intention of the

Commissioners to continue in the registered stock business to any extent, I would recommend the purchase or lease of pasture land.

OLD BUILDINGS, HOSPITAL, HEALTH, ETC.

Many of the old buildings are still in need of repair, especially are the kitchens and dining rooms needing enlarging and should have new equipment installed.

Our hospital needs enlarging and should be provided with a modern diet kitchen and a competent diet cook to properly prepare food for the sick. More baths and other equipments are needed to make this an up-to-date hospital. This department is filled to capacity and, owing to the fact that many of our Civil War veterans have passed life's eightieth mile stone, hospital cases are increasing to the extent that our present accommodations are too limited to meet requirements. However, I am pleased to note that, considering our population of nearly two hundred inmates and the lack of modern hospital accommodations, the health of our people has been fairly good and our death rate low, as shown by the Surgeon's report.

VALUED OFFICER REMOVED BY DEATH

During the past year the Home lost one of its most efficient and popular officers. I refer to our late Quartermaster, Comrade Thomas Hull, who was not only a first-class officer, but was held in the highest esteem by his fellow officers and by the entire population of the Home. His untimely removal from our midst is deeply mourned by all his comrades and friends.

NEW BUILDINGS AND OTHER IMPROVEMENTS

The new buildings under construction, consisting of two brick cottages of four apartments each, a public comfort station, an ice house with meat and milk rooms combined, concrete coal bins, help's quarters and machinery room have been delayed far beyond the contract limit, caused by shortage of material, slow freight delivery and high cost of labor. We hope to complete these buildings during the next thirty days, weather conditions being favorable.

The new pumps and steam boiler are being installed and the capacity of the water tank has been sufficiently increased to furnish an abundance of water for lawn and domestic purposes.

Building and furnishing quarters for the help, in addition to the hospital improvements being made, will more than exhaust our building appropriation, leaving us short of funds to complete the work planned for the present biennial period.

Many of these improvements were tied up by the Appropriations Committee of the Twenty-second General Assembly reducing the appropriation asked for. This reduction will cause a large deficit to be provided by the next General Assembly, besides keeping many worthy comrades and their dependent wives from entering

the Home until money can be secured to construct buildings to house and maintain these deserving applicants who are still on the waiting list.

The state should provide a large building fund to be set aside to construct and furnish a modern fire-proof building to house and maintain the widows who are applying for admission under the Steele bill. We also need more liberal appropriations to increase the size of our hospital, improve the grounds, fill the mosquito swamp and clean Sherman Lake. The swamp and lake improvements are sanitary measures of great importance to the inmates of this institution.

ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT

This institution should have an independent electric light plant of sufficient capacity to carry at least double the present voltage, and the cottages should be wired for heating and cooking purposes by running a large and separate wire for this purpose, so that aged and feeble women could prepare light meals during severe weather.

Our electric light bills reach about two thousand dollars per annum. The plant would cost not to exceed seven thousand dollars, and the amount we pay The Colorado Power Company for light would meet the cost of installing and maintaining an independent plant in less than five years. An independent plant would be a great convenience to the inmates and a good business proposition from a financial standpoint.

THE GROUNDS AND DRIVES

The grounds have been neglected in the past, owing to a lack of funds for upkeep. The grounds and streets should be brought to grade and cement walks laid to the dining rooms. The lawns should be plowed up, dressed and re-seeded. About three hundred young shade trees should be planted to replace the old cottonwood trees that are fast decaying. All fruit and shade trees should be pruned and trimmed. We should enter the grounds by a new central driveway directly in front of the Administration Building. The Home grounds are needing immediate attention, they being in a rundown condition. New fences and gates should be placed so as to inclose the grounds. These improvements would beautify the Home, add to the comfort of the inmates and greatly enhance the value of the property.

LAKE AND SWAMP IMPROVEMENTS

I wish to especially call the attention of the Commissioners to the unsightly swamp and the stagnant lake which mar the beauty of the Home and are a menace to the health of the members.

We should make a strong effort to secure an adequate appropriation to remedy this unsanitary condition by draining, cleaning

and deepening the lake, using the earth removed therefrom to fill the unhealthy swamp, which at present is merely a breeding place for mosquitoes and malaria, thus reclaiming this valuable tract for garden or building purposes.

To control the flow of water in and out of the lake we must construct substantial concrete spillways with double-screened inlet and outlet gates to keep out carp and other undesirable fish. We could then stock the lake with first-class fish and soon reduce our meat bills nearly fifty per cent, which, at the present high prices, amount to over seven thousand dollars per annum. We should also construct a concrete retaining wall along the west shore of the lake, fronting the new cottages. This retaining wall, when filled to grade, will increase the width of the driveway, which, with ornamental shade trees and well kept lawns along this driveway, would greatly improve the appearance of the lake front and the new residence section. To complete these improvements, we must drill one or two artesian wells to increase the flow of fresh water in the lake. These wells will be needed in the near future to increase the domestic water supply.

The improvements suggested above would greatly enhance the value of this property, besides providing a healthier and more attractive home for the veterans and, as a sanitary and financial measure, it would be of immense value to this institution.

THE CHAPEL

The chapel is used as an assembly hall for various entertainments, such as camp fires, picture shows, Grand Army meetings and regular religious services. The hall is used some four times each week. It seats about two hundred people. It should have new seats and the platform should be enlarged. The present chairs are old and of the light, folding design and very uncomfortable for aged people. The room is well heated, lighted and ventilated, but the entrance is very poorly arranged and in a dilapidated condition. We should construct a vestibule entrance and install opera chairs or first-class substantial seats.

These improvements will cost about fifteen hundred dollars and should be made as soon as funds are available for the purpose.

THE LIBRARY

The library should be refurnished and the old rocking chairs replaced by new ones. The old rockers might be placed in the barracks, where even such as those are badly needed. We should furnish new reading tables and make this room more comfortable and inviting, and we should encourage the donation of magazines, papers and books.

THE HOSPITAL DINING ROOM

New dining room chairs are very much needed in the hospital dining room and I would suggest that the Board purchase as much

of the above-described furniture in the not very distant future, using the money that may remain in the furniture funds for this purpose.

THE CEMETERY

There are about five hundred people buried in the Home cemetery and there remains very little vacant space for additional graves. We should provide for the enlargement of this last resting place of our comrades by extending the present fence to the extreme north line of our land. This will require additional fencing, grading, walks, driveways, and planting ornamental shade trees.

The Joe Hooker Post, Grand Army of the Republic, attends to decorating and flagging each grave, besides holding services on each Memorial Day. Headstones for the graves are furnished by the National Government and placed by the Home.

These improvements can be made as needed and at a slight cost.

FINANCES

The Appropriations Committee divided our biennial allowance into many different funds, besides reducing several of the special funds below the amount required to complete the improvements as specified. This reduction compelled us to draw largely on the maintenance fund to construct concrete coal bins and to purchase a motor truck with which to deliver our coal and supplies. We also drew on the maintenance fund to purchase six head of registered Holstein stock, and we will have to make further drafts on this fund to meet the payments on the public comfort station, unless some of the special funds can be transferred for this purpose.

The maintenance fund must also bear all the cost of maintaining the women inmates, as the United States Government makes no allowance for their support. This places the entire cost of maintaining these on the state; therefore we should be very careful to keep well within the law in admitting women, as this item helps to increase our per capita cost, which amounted to \$557.88 for 1919, an increase of nearly fifty per cent over the year 1917.

The last General Assembly deducted forty-five thousand dollars from our original maintenance and improvement appropriation bills. This reduction will tie up many of the needed improvements planned for the present biennial period, besides causing a large deficit to be provided for by the next General Assembly. This reduction will also keep out of the Home many deserving and needy applicants until the next Assembly can provide funds to house and maintain them. A transfer of the special funds are inadequate to complete the improvements as specified.

FUTURE NEEDS OF THE HOME

The Colorado State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home was established by act of the Colorado General Assembly, March 15, 1889.

The laws enacted by the Legislature since the establishment of the Home for the admission of inmates have been more than liberal, so that our muster roll contains the names of soldiers who served in the Mexican War, Civil War, Spanish-American War, Indian Wars, World War, besides Confederate veterans and wives and widows of Civil War veterans. There is no other institution, state or national, that has such liberal admission laws as above recited. Yet, through some oversight, the state in the past has neglected to provide sufficient funds to properly house and maintain these deserving applicants, and for the reason that these liberal admission laws failed to carry adequate appropriations in the past for the proper maintenance of this Home, and feeling confident that this will become in the near future one of the largest and, certainly, one of the most useful institutions in the State of Colorado, I therefore earnestly request the honorable Board of Commissioners to make greater efforts in the future to secure larger appropriations to properly house and maintain the worthy applicants who, in their declining years, seek the shelter of this Home.

Dear Sir: I have the honor to submit my report as Surgeon of the Home for the year ending November 30, 1919.

The Hospital Steward's records show that there were ninety-five male patients in the hospital for treatment, of whom twenty-five were discharged as cured. Eleven female patients were treated in the hospital and returned to cottages.

Number of deaths in Home, twenty-eight.

Number that died in hospital, twenty-five.

Number that died in cottages, one.

Surgeon's calls to the barracks and cottages averaged two per day.

Prescriptions filled at dispensary averaged ten per day.

The Steward, Emmett Fitzsimmons, is doing excellent work. The nurses also are doing good work, being ready and willing at all times to comfort those who are suffering.

Thanking the Board of Commissioners, the officers of the Home and the hospital employees for their sincere co-operation.

Sir: I have the honor to submit my annual report of the Colorado State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1920, together with the reports of the officers of the Home for the same period.

By his election as Commander of the Department of Colorado and Wyoming, Grand Army of the Republic, Comrade Marshall S. Crawford became a member of the Board of Commissioners of this Home, taking the place made vacant by the retirement of Comrade C. M. Bills.

The death of Comrade H. S. Vaughn leaves a vacancy on the Board of Commissioners not yet filled by the Governor.

Rev. A. C. V. Skinner was appointed as Chaplain to fill the vacancy made vacant by the resignation of Chaplain David E. Nourse.

The vacancy made by the resignation of Dr. Z. T. Crawley was filled by the appointment of Dr. H. O. Dodge as resident Surgeon.

As will be noted in the Commandant's Report, we are needing larger appropriations than heretofore allowed by the General Assembly, as it is the desire of the Board to remodel many old buildings and construct a large, modern Women's Building, and if funds are provided we intend to replace the old plumbing and overhaul the old steam heating plant.

We still lack housing accommodation to care for worthy veterans and their dependent wives. We have fifty or more beds vacant in the hospital and barracks, a number of which are held for inmates out on furlough.

There have been more modern buildings constructed and other needed improvements made in this institution during the past four years, under the present Board of Commissioners, than has been made in the previous sixteen years, as shown by the published reports of the officers of the Home.

In conclusion, I am more than pleased to commend the Board of Commissioners and their efficient staff for the manner in which they have conducted the business affairs of the Home.

COMMANDANT'S REPORT

Soldiers' and Sailors' Home,
Homelake, Colo., Nov. 30, 1920.

Dear Sir: In submitting my annual report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1920, I wish to especially mention therein the improvements completed during the last biennium, and will also recommend some of the improvements needed during the coming biennial period, and will, therefore, respectfully refer the Board to the complete reports of the staff officers of the Home, which cover in detail the finances and other interesting statistics of this institution.

IMPROVEMENTS

The Twenty-second General Assembly appropriated twenty thousand dollars to construct family cottages and seven thousand five hundred dollars was appropriated to furnish said cottages and office building. It also appropriated four thousand six hundred dollars to remodel and repair old buildings, three thousand dollars to construct a new public comfort station, four thousand five hundred dollars to build an ice house with meat and milk rooms, and fourteen thousand two hundred dollars to install new steam boiler, enlarge water tank, drill artesian wells, and make other improvements provided for in the special appropriation bill.

The Board also authorized the Commandant to construct cement wall and walks on lake front. These improvements were greatly needed and should have been finished earlier in the season, but the Board decided that coal bins were of greater importance so as to secure our winter coal supply, and Contractor B. W. Berry was induced by the Commissioners to transfer his material and men from the work of the cement wall and place his full force on the construction of the coal storage bins. This change delayed the work on the wall and walks until late in the fall, but all the cement work was finished and paid for within the fiscal year.

IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED

We constructed more new buildings, made more repairs and finished and equipped more new and old buildings in the past three years than has been done since the Home was established, yet many

more repairs and replacements are needed to bring this seemingly neglected institution up to date. The steam heating plant needs a complete overhauling and all the old steam pipes must be replaced with new material. All old plumbing should be replaced with new fixtures and properly ventilated to accord with state plumbing regulations. The old buildings should all be rewired for electricity to comply with the underwriters' rules and regulations. All the old work above described has been condemned by the state inspectors and should be repaired or replaced as soon as funds can be made available for such purposes.

If the Twenty-third General Assembly provides funds for these improvements and for the construction of an eighty-thousand dollar woman's building, the ensuing biennium will be the most important period in the history of this Home.

We expected to construct more cottages to house and maintain the families and widows on the waiting list, but the Twenty-second General Assembly cut our special appropriation bills down twenty-one thousand dollars, thus the special funds allowed for these improvements were insufficient to complete the buildings as planned and the Commissioners were compelled to draw about three thousand dollars from the maintenance fund to finish the public comfort station and two thousand dollars to construct concrete coal bins of sufficient capacity to store ten cars of coal.

These improvements, including the rebuilding of the Administration Building, which was partially destroyed by fire, cost over sixty thousand dollars. The plans and specifications for the work above described were furnished by the Commandant, free of architectural fees, thus saving the state over six thousand dollars.

The Twenty-second General Assembly also reduced our supply and maintenance appropriation bill twenty-four thousand dollars. This amount, however, was replaced to the credit of this fund by the state issuing certificates of indebtedness, which supplied the deficit and carried the institution through the biennial period.

SUPPLIES

At the November, 1920, meeting of the Commissioners, all proposals for supplies were rejected, except that of the Morey Mercantile Company for groceries, which was accepted. This placed the institution on the open market for nearly all supplies, and the Commandant was instructed to purchase for cash, at lowest market quotations. This seems to have worked well in the face of falling prices, as we have bought supplies up to date far below the bids rejected. While all funds during the last biennial period have been disbursed as directed by the Board, yet it is not always a safe plan to place a state institution on the open market for the purchase of supplies by its officers.

AGE OF CIVIL WAR VETERANS AND PER CAPITA COST

The Civil War inmates average over seventy-seven years of age. The per capita cost of maintaining the Home during 1919 was

\$557.88, and \$533.38 in 1920. The cost for maintenance will gradually increase as the inmates grow more infirm with age and become hospital cases and the cost of caring for hospital patients is more than double the amount needed to care for inmates in the barracks.

The government allowance should be increased to at least \$150.00 per capita per annum. This would still leave the state's cost per capita nearly \$400.00 per annum.

THE STEELE BILL ADMITTING WIDOWS

We can never pay the debt of gratitude we owe the veterans of our wars, but the generous State of Colorado should liberally provide for the care of their widows.

The Steele Bill, admitting to this Home widows of Civil War veterans, failed to carry an appropriation to house and maintain these deserving applicants, and there are now over forty on the waiting list that we cannot admit until accommodation is provided for them. I will again appeal to the generous State of Colorado to grant more liberal appropriations to properly house and maintain the worthy and deserving widows who are seeking the shelter of this Home.

Therefore, to make the Steele Bill operative, we are asking the Twenty-third General Assembly to appropriate eighty thousand dollars to construct a modern woman's building, and fifteen thousand dollars to furnish and equip the same. We are also asking the Legislature for eighteen thousand dollars to enlarge and remodel the hospital building. This is an improvement greatly needed, as the aged Civil War inmates need better medical care than we can provide with our present hospital equipment. Should the Twenty-third General Assembly allow these building appropriations, I would respectfully recommend that the Board construct the proposed buildings of cut stone, and fireproof materials should be used in their construction, as the state is expected to erect substantial buildings to meet the wishes of the taxpayers.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We should have the admission laws revised and liberalized so as to admit World War veterans and, perhaps, National Guards of Colorado, and the law should cover the admission of invalids to the hospital; also a more intelligent and liberal law admitting widows, as the Steele law is not satisfactory.

I would urge the passage of a law bonding all officers or others who receive trust funds from members of the Home, and would also recommend the enactment of laws requiring the Commandant to pass a rigid business examination, and that his salary and term of service be fixed by law and kept entirely free from political interference. As this institution disburses over ten thousand dollars per month, this regulation would encourage better service and avoid friction.

I would again suggest that the Board of Commissioners urge the passage of a bill, during the coming session of the General Assembly, authorizing the Board to sell the detached forty acres of land and use the money to secure, by purchase or lease, a stock pasture joining the Home property.

There are many other business suggestions that might be included in this report, but will conclude by recommending that the State Assembly provide a special cash fund for the care of the grounds and the construction of adequate housing accommodations for new inmates, as may be determined by the Governor and the Board of Commissioners.

I have drafted several bills covering most of the above suggestions and will have them regularly introduced in the Assembly.

Of those remaining in hospital at this date, two may sufficiently recover to return to barracks. The remaining twenty-five are hopeless invalids.

I took over the work of Resident Surgeon on the 16th day of July, 1920, since which time I have made 483 cottage calls, 32 barracks calls, attended to 615 dispensary calls, and ordered 1,523 prescriptions.

The hospital interior needs nearly complete reconstruction. There is no room that can be properly sterilized, or used for operations. There should be installed on the grounds a sterilizer for soiled bedding. Many other improvements may be made, such as a diet kitchen, suitable storage rooms, etc.
