

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Colorado State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home

Rocky Ford, Colorado, December 31, 1923.

To the Honorable William E. Sweet, Governor, Denver, Colorado.

Sir:

I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the Board of Commissioners of the State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home for the year ending November 30, 1923.

For full, concise tabulated statement which will furnish you with the manner in which the Home has been managed the past fiscal year, permit me to refer you to the reports of the Adjutant, Quarter Master, and Surgeon, which reports are submitted with this report. These several tabulated statements will furnish you the data and information required by the law to be given in this report, namely, an account of the work performed, of all moneys received from all sources, detail account of all money expended in the maintenance of the Home in all respects; the names, places of birth, age and full record of services in the army, navy or marines, of all persons admitted to said Home, and upon each person upon whose record any dependent may be admitted; last places of residence of every such person admitted; all deaths, discharges, and removals from Home, with the causes thereof, and the names of all persons making donations to the Home, with description of the same.

On the second page of the Adjutant report will be found the amount of money appropriated by the last General Assembly for the maintenance of the Home, which was \$160,000. And the several vouchers representing the disbursements from that fund showing a balance on November 30, the end of the fiscal year, of \$81,980.50. The amount received from the Government of the United States including the balance on hand at the end of the last fiscal year, was \$13,205.02. The disbursements from this fund were \$12,638.32, leaving a balance in this fund of \$566.70.

On page 3 of said report the amount of the Contingent Fund was \$34,775.04 after deducting disbursements, leaving a balance of \$2,512.36. I think it can be inferred on examination of these reports, and the balance as shown yet remaining in the said sev-

eral funds, that the Home can be maintained to the end of this fiscal year with the funds remaining on hand. Said report shows on same page that there has been appropriated \$5,000 for general repair fund. There has been expended \$2,031.64, leaving a balance in said fund of \$2,968.36.

On page 4 will be found the appropriation of \$2,000 for the Lake Fund or a fund intended to protect the dike and roadway at the north end of the Lake that is a charge on the Home. There has only been expended \$368.56 that has been used to strengthen the approaches from the Lake until sufficient funds are appropriated to complete this work, the early completion of which is very important in order to protect the grade of the public highway.

The larger part of the laundry fund, eistern fund, hospital repair fund, sewer fund, boiler repair fund, and land fund has been expended as shown by the Adjutant's report, in the improvement and repairs that were necessary, all of which have been judiciously expended and have been of great benefit to the Home. The hospital has been improved by converting the West Wing, which was a large hall, into several rooms, thus enlarging the capacity of the hospital to a considerable degree, all of which have been suitably equipped and properly furnished for the use of the sick. The sanitary condition of the hospital has also been greatly improved and the hospital now is in about as good a condition as it can be made, and will serve the purpose for a short time, but a modern up-to-date hospital should be built and equipped for use of the Home at a very early date.

The extra cistern built will more than double the water capacity in case of fire and thus be a greater means of protection to the property of the State. The efficiency of the laundry has been greatly improved with funds appropriated. Some new improved machinery was installed, resulting in greater efficiency and speed in the work. The Land Fund was used in the purchase of the 160 acres of land joining the Home which was greatly needed for pasture for the cows and livestock owned by the State at the Home; besides part of this tract of land is good agricultural land, capable of producing heavy crops of potatoes, beans, peas, and alfalfa. Besides there is located on it a very large potato cellar that can be utilized by the Home for storing potatoes and other vegetables, or it may be rented for a good price. Forty acres of land donated to the State at the time the Home was located at Monte Vista, situated some two miles from the Home property, has been improved, leveled, and crops can now be grown on it which will bring a handsome income, while heretofore nothing has been received from it.

The herd of Hereford cows is one of the best in the State and furnishes all the milk and cream necessary for use at the Home. The hogs have been doing well, from which quite a portion of the meat used at the Home is furnished after some hogs have been sold. Our livestock is under the supervision of a good vet-

erinary surgeon. And so far as the livestock and the farming activities of the Home are concerned, great improvement has

been made the past year.

The barracks have been repaired and improved, the cottages also, where repairs were needed, and the Veterans and their wives are as well cared for, if not better, than in any other Soldiers' and Sailors' Home in the country. Colonel Hogle, the Commandant, the Adjutant, Mr. Sweeney, and the other officers and assistants in the Home have all been faithful and diligent and it is to them that the credit is due for the great efficiency to which the Home has reached. I desire to make special mention of the efficient services and assistance of Commissioner Decker, who resides at Monte Vista, has rendered to the Commandant by his special interest and services pertaining to the care of livestock and farming activities. Also Mrs. Julia E. Killam, who resides in Denver, has spent much time in looking after matters in Denver pertaining to the business of the Home in a most efficient manner.

The several members of the Board of Commissioners have each taken a special interest in performing their duties and in assisting in bringing the Home to the splendid condition in which harmony has at all times prevailed in the Board and almost every question and business transaction after due consideration had been agreed upon by unanimous vote.

The members of the Board of Commissioners, the Commandant, and other officers of the Home all feel very grateful to you as Governor, who during the session of the last General Assembly gave your approval and support to the passage and adoption of the several appropriations for the support and improvement of

In the past year the Board of Commissioners has suffered a loss of two of its members. First in the month of January, 1923, S. J. Capps was an Acting Commissioner by reason of his holding the office of Department Commander of the G. A. R. Later in the year Captain Thomas P. Boutwell of Denver. Both of these men had been loyal, patriotic soldiers of our nation, one a Civil War Veteran, the other a Spanish War Soldier. Both were capable and competent Commissioners and performed their duties as such loyally and faithfully for the best interest of the State and Nation.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

To the Honorable William E. Sweet, Governor of the State of Colorado.

Sir:

Pursuant to the statute of the state, I hereby tender to you, as President of the Board of Commissioners of the State Soldiers' and Sailors' Home for the past fiscal year, a report. The data from which this report is made up consists of reports to me by Colonel A. W. Hogle, Commandant; E. B. J. Sweeney, Adjutant; Wm. J. Conlin, Quartermaster, and Dr. Charles L. Orr. Surgeon. These just came to me last week. I will not attempt at this time to extend my report so as to include extracts and figures from the several reports above mentioned, but will submit to you all of said reports in order that you may be able to make such examination of them as you deem necessary and acquaint yourself with the facts contained therein. The outstanding feature of this last year of the management of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home has been that of excellent management, not only of the financial matters connected with the support of the Home but with the management, control and operation of the farm and the live stock belonging to the State at the Home. The reports show that in every branch of the business connected with the Home, there has been the greatest efficiency and the best results obtained of any year.

We are raising now more potatoes than we need to use at the Home, and have some to sell. We are raising a large part of the hay that we feed to the stock and after next year there will be an increase in acreage of the hay, having reclaimed forty acres belonging to the Home and sowed it to alfalfa, which will give the Home as much hay as would be needed. The Holstein cows and calves are among the best, if not the best in the state. They have been exhibited in two fairs last year, and received premiums for their superior grade and quality.

The cow barns have been greatly improved, and cork floors have been put in so as to protect cows from suffering injuries from slipping and falling on the floor, by which means valuable calves are lost.

The hogs are of excellent stock, from which we produce a good share of the pork that is used at the Home and sell quite a few on foot. There has been much improvement to the buildings and structures at the Home proper. The pressed brick cottages erected some years ago by Commandant Conkie on made land, the walls having cracked on account of the subsiding soil, have been repaired and improved. A number of garages have been built on the Home grounds for the use of some of the old comrades, who pay rent to the Home for their use, which in a short time will cover expense of their erection. There has been improvement by new machinery put in the laundry, some of the steam pipes under the ground have been covered with asbestos which will greatly reduce loss of steam and heat, thereby escaping from the pipe and passing through the ground. A new large cistern has been installed and connected with the old cistern so water amply sufficient for use in case of fire will always be at hand. Grave stones in the cemetery have been reset in a line and much improvement in that particular has been made to this part of the Home.

The dike passing along the north side of the lake is still out of repair. The waves of the water and high wind from the south being driven upon the land makes it necessary to have it Posts have here-to-fore been used, heavy boards, planks and wire have been put up to protect the dike from this influence, and some of the posts have rotted and given away, and there should be a permanent wall made along that side of the dike, which would obviate further yearly expense. An appropriation made for this purpose by the last legislature was entirely insufficient to complete it, and we have in our budget asked the Legislature to give us an additional appropriation in order that we may complete this important improvement. The 160 acres purchased by the appropriation made at the last legislature, which adjoins the Home tract of land, is a very great benefit to the state in that it gives us additional land upon which to raise crops; and a very large potato bin has been constructed in the ground, capable of holding thousands of bushels, and also acres of pasture for our herd of cows. There has been no disturbance or dissatisfaction or insubordination developed this year, and the administration has been fortunate in having a year devoid of these recurring troubles. You will notice by the report that for the first time in many years the appropriation made for the support of the Home has been ample to maintain it, and there is no deficiency which would require a short appropriation to pay.

I want to specially make mention of the officers in charge of the Home. Col. A. W. Hogle, Commandant, has conducted affairs to the satisfaction of the Board of Commissioners, and Major Decker, Commissioner, who resides at Monte Vista, has taken special interest in the farm and stock problems, and being an experienced veterinary has rendered most excellent service and saved the state considerable expense on account of his experience, attention and energy in that direction. Adjutant Sweeney has always been so efficient and satisfactory to everybody connected with the Home that special mention of him is hardly necessary. His books, his papers, and reports are the best evidence of his fitness for the place he occupies. Quartermaster Conlin has also shown much tact in that branch of the work and the Surgeon has faithfully discharged his duties to the Home in the special and efficient care of the sick and afflicted under his charge, all of which has contributed to the success of the year's operation and control of this important state institution.

As President of the Board of Commissioners, having been a member of the Board now for over four years at this time, and a member of the Board in 1912 and 1913, and being able to contrast conditions of the Home now as to what it was in 1912 and 1913, I want to assure you, Governor, there has been a wonderful improvement in all branches, and that the old veterans of our wars and their widows who are being cared for are favored by being inmates of this Home, it being one of the best state Soldiers' and Sailors' Homes in our country, which is attested by the report of the Government officers who recently inspected it.

I should ask an apology for the lateness in making and presenting this report to your Excellency, but as before mentioned, the data came to me late and other important matters including a short spell of sickness have been the cause of the delay.

Sir:

I have the honor to submit a report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1924, together with the reports of the Adjutant, Quartermaster and Surgeon.

From the report of the Adjutant you can readily see that the affairs of the Home have been conducted in such a manner that the Institution has succeeded in closing its business for the biennial period of 1923-1924 without the necessity of resorting to any Certificate of Indebtedness.

The purchase of the 160 acres of land by the last Legislature have given the Home a much needed pasturage for the Dairy Herd. Until this was done, the Home was without pasture. This land has been fenced and cross fenced and is now in first class condition for the pasturing of the cattle; and by the way the Home Dairy Herd is one of the best in the State. It is composed of Holsteins, many of them registered.

The pipes running from the heating plant to all the buildings have been taken up and recovered; we found quite a number of these pipes that had never been covered, quite a number were lying loose in the ground and were full of holes, caused by rust and alkali; in place of them, new pipes were installed.

Some of the buildings erected during the period 1918-1920, required extensive repairing; this has been done.

The Dyke has given a lot of trouble and worry. The piling is rotting badly. A cement retaining wall should be built; anything else is a waste of money.

The Dyke may break some of these days, unless put in good condition, and if a break should occur, it might cause a lot of damage to farmers east of the Home, and possibly, the State a number of law suits.

I would most earnestly recommend that a new and modern hospital be built; the present building is one of the first erected in the Home and is not modern, nor can it be made into a modern hospital. The demands upon the Home to care for the Comrades is growing and will continue to do so; and the present hospital will not be able to meet these demands. When these are added to by the Veterans of the Spanish-American War and the World War, it can be seen more forcibly why a new hospital is so urgently recommended by me.

Now as to the use of the old building; at present we are compelled for want of room to locate some of the Widows applying for admission on the upper floor of the Administration Building, and at the altitude of the Home this is too much of a climb for the dear old ladies who should be on the ground floor, therefore, I would recommend that the old hospital building be remodeled into quarters for the Widows. The added room which that building would give to us would enable us to be in a position to care for these ladies as they would apply, and we would not have to notify them that while they are eligible, for lack of quarters that they have been put on the waiting list. At present there are quite a number on this list and we have no room for them.

All of the buildings of the Home must be repaired and painted, there is no economy in letting these buildings "run down as it were" for the want of care.

And again at least four four-room cottages should be built for the use of employes who have families.

This is quite a problem getting married men with families as we have no place to house them. This class is more to be depended upon for any length of time than unmarried men.

I would like to call your attention in closing to the death rate of the Home as given on the comparative statement of population in the report of the Adjutant. The number of deaths occuring in 1923 were 25; and in the year just closed 17, considering that the Members of the Home are a year older than in 1923, and the mortality rate therefore should be higher, it speaks for the care given to the Members and also causes me to again urge the need of a new and modern hospital.

COLORADO STATE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' HOME REPORT OF THE SURGEON

Monte Vista, Colorado. November 30, 1924.

Col. A. W. Hogle, Commandant, Colorado Soldiers' and Sailors' Home.

Sir:

I have the honor to submit the following report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1924.

The records show that during the year sixty-five cases were hospitalized; there was an average of twenty-five males in the wards all the time and an average of eight females.

Barrack Calls-Daily average, two.

Cottage Calls-Daily average, one.

Dispensary Calls—Daily average, twelve.

Hospital Calls—Daily average, ten.

Deaths: Ten in the Hospital.

One in the Del Norte, Colorado Hospital.

One in quarters. Four on furlough. One killed by bull.

Total number of deaths; seventeen.

We believe that the best attention and nursing is being given to the hospitalized members under the present conditions. We have at present a capable corps of nurses and an adequate drug supply. The need of a new modern hospital is perfectly evident. More room, more conveniences, more up to date equipment. Look forward to what is absolutely needed in this regard.

The problem of caring for mental cases, border-line types, so called because they are not insane enough to be committed but so demented as to require special attention, is very perplexing. A special ward will be needed with proper facilities for handling such cases.

It militates against the comfort and the peace of mind of older members who require quiet and serene environment.
