FACTS CONCERNING THE STATE HOME FOR CHILDREN

This is the only state institution for the care of the dependent, neglected, and maltreated children of Colorado.

No church collections are solicited.

It is supported by state appropriations.

No county or individual contributions are received.

The children are all committed by the Juvenile or County Courts of the various counties of the state.

The county pays the court cost and expense of transportation for the children to the Home.

There are desirable children now in the Home, to be placed in good families upon adoption or special contract.

The court and other expenses for adoption papers are paid by the individuals securing them.

The State Agents receive no commission on the children received, or on those placed in private homes.

The members of the Board of Control serve without compensation.

"The said Board are hereby made the legal guardians of the persons and estates of all children admitted to said Home, pursuant to law, which guardianship shall continue during the minority of such children, except in cases where, under this act, the guardianship may be cancelled by resolution adopted by said Board." (From Section 5 of Chapter 26, Session Laws, 1895.)

For placing a child no remuneration is required or received of the counties or individuals who are charitably disposed.

Parents are not encouraged to part with their children.

According to Chapter 26, Session Law of 1895, all children free from chronic or contagious disease, who are dependent upon the public for support, and those who are neglected, maltreated, or in evil environment, are eligible as inmates of the State Home.

INCREASE IN STATIC POPULATION

Despite all efforts to keep the children placed in adoptive and free homes, and with three traveling agents working steadily, our average daily population for the biennium increased 8% over the preceding biennium, although total admittances were 11% less. This is probably due to depressed economic conditions and to the severe drought conditions in parts of Colorado during the second year of the period. Completed adoptions reached an all-time high of 464.

GIRL'S DORMITORY

A Dormitory for the use of the older girls was constructed during the Summer of 1933. This two-story, shingle roof building, with recreation room in basement, contains on each of its two floors, eighteen single rooms, a matron's room with bath, living room, dining room, kitchen, bath room and wash room.

The building was ready for occupancy on Thanksgiving Day, 1933, but the plans for having a separate self-contained unit on each floor, consisting of eighteen girls and a matron, who would prepare their own food, had to be changed on account of the large number of children in the Home. The dining rooms and kitchens are being used as dormitories, the food is being prepared in the central kitchen, and part of the recreation room in the basement used for a dining room. Since completion, the building has been accommodating sixty girls.

DAIRY

During this biennium, the dairy produced 620,575 pounds of milk (310 tons), which was consumed entirely (whole) by the children, an average consumption of 2½ pints per child per day.

It is compulsory that each child consume a pint of whole milk at morning and evening meals. Noon meal is optional.

Milk is served in bottles at the tables.

Below is copy of an Act, now known as Chapter 86, Session Laws of Colorado, 1935, which was passed by the last Legislature, and approved April 10, 1935.

This legislation was found necessary for the protection of illegitimate children who have been adopted, particularly when it is necessary on account of school regulations for them to furnish birth certificates when registering in school.

Chapter 86

CHILDREN'S BIRTH CERTIFICATES

(Senate Bill 690. By Senator Ammons and Representatives Hillman, Clennan, Childress, Nolan and Constantine.)

AN ACT

AN ACT RELATING TO BIRTH CERTIFICATES.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of Colorado:

Section 1. At the time of adoption, or at any time thereafter, the adopting parent or parents of any child, under the age of sixteen (16) years, may have a certificate of identification issued and signed by the judge of the court decreeing the adoption, which certificate shall be accepted by all school districts and school authorities in this state in lieu of a birth certificate and without further evidence of such birth certificate.

Section 2. All judges of the Juvenile Court, where such court exists, or if no Juvenile Court exists, then the county or district courts are hereby authorized to issue such certificates of identification, upon satisfactory proof of the matters contained in such certificate, and upon application made by the adopting parent or parents. The fee for the issuance of said certificate shall be fifty cents (50c).

Section 3. The certificate of identification herein provided shall be in the following form:

Section 4. Upon written request, made by the superintendent or other official of the Colorado State Home for Dependent and Neglected Children, the State Board of Health shall furnish, without cost, certified copies of birth certificates of all illegitimate children who have been legally committed to said Home.

Section 5. The General Assembly hereby finds, determines and declares this Act necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

Section 6. In the opinion of the General Assembly an emergency exists; therefore, this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
