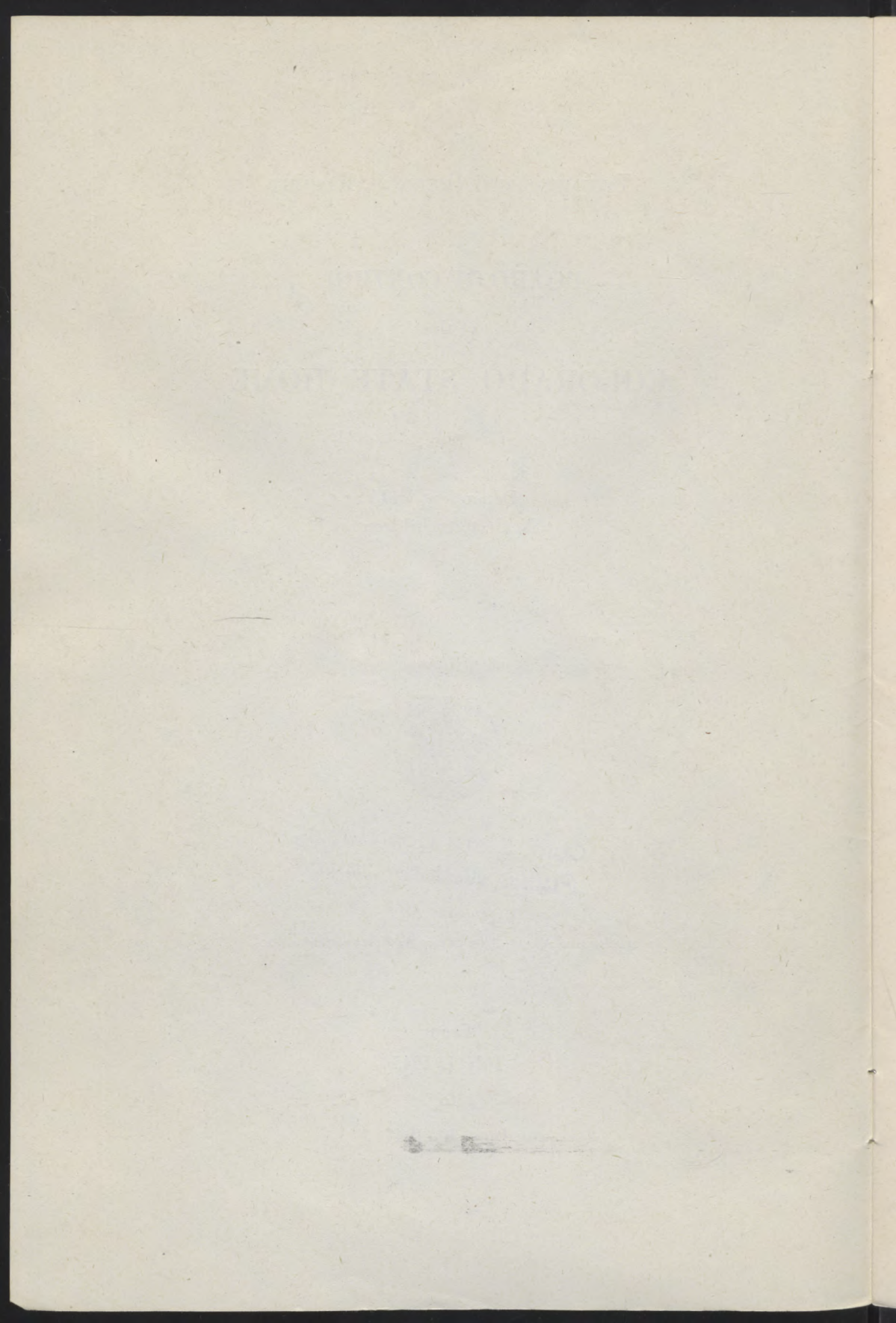

FACTS CONCERNING THE STATE HOME FOR CHILDREN

This is the only State Institution for the care of dependent, neglected and maltreated children of Colorado.

No church collections or individual contributions are solicited.

It is supported by State appropriations.

No county contributions are received.

The children are all committed by the Juvenile or County Courts of the various counties of the State.

Parents are never encouraged to part with their children.

According to Chapter 26, Session Laws of 1895, all children free from chronic or contagious disease, of sound mind and body, placeable in family homes, who are dependent upon the public for support, and who are neglected, maltreated, or in evil environment, are eligible as inmates of the State Home.

No remuneration for placing a child is permitted by the counties, or individuals who are charitably disposed.

The county pays the court cost and expense of transportation for the children to the Home.

There are desirable children now in the Home, to be placed in good families for adoption or other types of placement.

The court and other expenses for adoption papers are paid by the individuals securing them.

The State Agents receive no commission on the children received, or on those placed in private homes.

The members of the Board of Control serve without compensation.

This Board is required by law to meet four times a year; however, in this two-year period forty-three regular meetings were recorded. This does not include any special meetings.

“The said Board are hereby made the legal guardians of the persons and estates of all children admitted to said Home, pursuant to law, which guardianship shall continue during the minority of such children, except in cases where, under this act, the guardianship may be cancelled by resolution adopted by said Board.”

BIRTH CERTIFICATE

In 1943 the Colorado Legislature passed a law pertaining to Birth Certificates. This bill now enables the adopting parents to receive a birth certificate for the child, issued in their own name. The original certificate is to be sealed and filed in the Bureau of Vital Statistics, to be opened only on order of the Court. This eliminates the word illegitimate or the necessity of Certificate of Identification. In case there is no original birth certificate a letter in the form of "TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN" is issued by the Superintendent of the Colorado State Home. This letter can be used in lieu of a birth certificate and will be accepted in case of employment and school attendance. The Bureau of Vital Statistics has changed the method of obtaining a birth certificate. At the present time the Bureau requires the presentation of the adoption decree and a fee of \$1.00 in issuing a birth certificate to adoptive parents. Adoptive parents seeking birth certificates for their child should deal directly with the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State of Colorado, Denver, Colorado.

During the same legislative session, a bill created a Board of Standards of Child Care. This Board, appointed by the Governor, includes a member of the State Home Board. Mrs. Anna R. Garrey represents the Home Board at this time.

RECREATION

During this past Biennium, the activity program at the Colorado State Home has continued to broaden. The idea that is back of this program is that each child should be given as much recreational and play activity as is consistent with the facilities at hand at the Home to handle such work.

The Boy Scout Group now has enrolled in its membership about eighty-three boys, and the boys have shown marked improvement in scout advancement.

The Girl Scouts have been organized by the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Business Girls Sorority. Intermediate and Brownie troops have been uniformed, and the troop meets regularly and carries on a very fine work.

Competitive athletic teams, in all Major sports, are now functioning at the Home, and these teams are coached by Mr. Jerry Mangone, who is employed by the Elks Lodge to carry on this program.

RECREATION

Mrs. Geraldine Hertz, who is employed by the Elks and the Home carries on an active program with the younger children in group play, craft work, and social development work. This work was begun in the last Biennium, but the activities have been greatly increased, and the effectiveness of the program has produced very fine results. She works with the pre-school group of boys and girls in preparing them for first grade work.

There are now eight 4H Clubs operating at the Home. They have exhibited their work at the City and County Fair, the National Western Stock Show, and the Colorado State Fair at Pueblo, Colorado. These groups have won many blue ribbons, and have been highly commended by State Officials for the fine work that has been done.

The boys and girls have a regular moving picture show at the Gymnasium once a week.

The children have participated in the activities of the community with increasing frequency, for instance, the Radio Broadcasts over KOA and KLZ, Miss Jane Sterling's presentation of "These Kids of Ours," an NBC Broadcast over KOA from the State Home Gymnasium. Only children from the State Home were on the Broadcast.

Another honor that has come to the children of the State Home is the "Honesty Award Club" which had its origin at the Home. Rodney Poole is the boy whose honesty inspired the Central Bank and Trust Company to award certificates of merit to all boys and girls in Denver and vicinity who found money and returned it to the rightful owner. He was the Club's first president.

The children at the Home who belong to the Honesty Award Club are as follows: Rodney Poole, John Mewis, Gloria Taylor, and Anita Martinez.

The following organizations should be commended for the work at the State Home with the children: South Denver Civic Association, Elks Lodge, the Rotary Club of Denver, the Kiwanis Club of Denver, El Jebel Shrine of Denver, Denver Tramway Company, Police and Fire Departments of Denver, the Optimist Clubs of Denver, the American Legion of Denver, the Junior League of Denver, the Pi Phi Sorority, and the Epsilon Sigma Alpha Business Girls Sorority.

BUILDING PROGRAM

For a number of years the Board of Control at the State Home has had under consideration the matter of remodeling the facilities for caring for basket and crib babies. This matter finally came to the attention of the last general assembly, and \$85,000 was appropriated directly to a fund known as the Building Construction Fund for the State Home for Dependent and Neglected Children, (House Bill No. 231 by Representative Steele, Senators Fritts, Harpel and Cheever). Robert K. Fuller was employed as an architect to submit plans for a new building to house the babies.

It is contemplated by the Board of Control that this new structure will include plans for many new and approved types of nursery construction. Over all the plans will include cubicles, so that the dangers of cross-infection will be reduced to a minimum. Cubicles will be small units for housing perhaps five babies in a group. Each cubicle will be supplied with running water and temperature control, and a separate system for humidifying air. It is hoped that the building can be completed within a year after construction begins.
