

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COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

OFFICE OF BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS,
COLORADO STATE PENITENTIARY,
CAÑON CITY, Nov 30th, 1880. }

To His Excellency, F. W. PITKIN, Governor of Colorado:

SIR—In compliance with paragraph 2,042 of General Laws of Colorado, the Board of Commissioners in charge of the State Penitentiary at Cañon City, have the honor to submit the following: The official reports of the warden and physician, transmitted herewith, furnish in detail the information called for by said paragraph of the General Laws.

These reports were carefully prepared from the records of the Penitentiary, and show in detail every transaction of the institution for the two years ending November 30th, 1880:

PROPERTY ON HAND.

The property on hand November 30th, 1880, as shown by an inventory and appraisal made by the warden upon that date, was as follows: Furniture, tools, and implements, clothing, food, etc., was valued at \$22,226.83. Of that amount only \$4,249.65 can be regarded as working capital, the balance (\$17,977.18) being furniture, tools, implements, bedding and fixtures connected with the institution. The inventory and appraisement made November 30th, 1878, amounted in value to \$11,421.49, showing a gain during the two years, between that date and November 30th, 1880, of \$10,805.34.

WORK OF THE TERM.

The prisoners have been constantly employed during

the term. Forty men have worked during the whole term for the Colorado Boot & Shoe Company, and from November 1879 to July 1880, the number working for said company was somewhat larger, a portion of the time being nearly seventy. The balance of the men have been employed upon improvements and enlargements to the institution. The earnings of the institution for the term, exclusive of improvements, has been \$22,023.05, of which amount \$20,471.34 has been paid into the State Treasury and the balance, \$1,551.71, is due on individual accounts. The value of improvements resulting from the labor of the convicts is estimated at \$32,631.23, as will be seen in detail by reference to the warden's report.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE.

The Warden's Report shows in detail the nature and extent of the improvements. It is only necessary for us to say that every improvement made during the term by Warden Megrue and his deputy, M. Dueber, has been of the most permanent character. The shoe shop and cell house are most excellent buildings, well adapted to the uses for which they were intended. A contract has been made with the Cañon City Water Company for a supply of good water, which will be a great convenience and add to the sanitary condition of the institution. A boiler has been procured for heating the cell buildings, which are now so large that they cannot well be heated by stoves. The steam is also to be utilized in the culinary department.

IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED.

The rapid increase of the inmates of the institution imperatively demands a constant expansion of the institution to meet the demand for room. There are now two hundred and twenty-six convicts, being eighty more than at the commencement of the term. Sixty-six convicts have been received during the three months ending November 30th, 1880. The rapid increase in the population of the State, and particularly the large increase in population at mining towns in various parts of the State, lead us to expect that

during the ensuing term the number will be very much larger than at present, and preparations for their accommodation and employment must be begun at once. When the new cell house, now nearly completed, is finished, there will be two hundred and ten cells for the accommodation of two hundred and twenty-six convicts. In order to attain the best discipline in the institution but one convict should occupy a cell, and the greater the number of inmates of the institution the greater the necessity for strict discipline. It therefore appears to be necessary that the construction of another cell house should be commenced immediately. The dining-room is too small for the present demand, and another should be provided. There is also need for a hospital.

PURCHASE OF LAND.

The stone and lime quarries in the rear of the Penitentiary grounds are of great value to the institution, not only for the stone and lime for improvements to the institution, but as affording profitable employment for quite a good share of the convict labor. Those quarries belong to the Colorado Improvement Company. We have entered into an agreement with said Company for the purchase of about twelve acres of land for \$2,500. A portion of that land lies on the east side of the Penitentiary grounds, and will be needed whenever the expansion of the institution shall have outgrown the present enclosure, as in that direction only can an enlargement be made; the balance of the twelve acres includes the whole of the lime quarry, and a portion of the stone quarry. The State owns about seven acres of land lying in the bottom, (across the street from the Penitentiary grounds), which cannot be utilized by the institution, and we have agreed with said Company to trade that land, acre for acre, for the portion of the stone quarry not included in the twelve acres before mentioned. We would ask for an appropriation to make the above mentioned purchase, and authority to make the above mentioned trade.

Colorado does not afford the same opportunities for contracting its convict labor to manufacturers as most of the other States of the Union. If the above purchase and trade be made, the State will possess the means by which much of its convict labor can be employed with profit. Stone can be gotten out for building purposes, lime burnt, and the lime rock shipped to mining camps to be used in the smelters for a flux. There is now a good market for those things, and no doubt there will be a constantly increasing demand for them. We consider it to be of the utmost importance that the State secure the land referred to.

The law provides that each convict, when discharged from the Penitentiary, shall be paid \$10. We find that there are many objections to that method. Very many of them, by drunkenness, or other means, spend every cent the first day they are out, and thus they become a burden upon the people of Cañon City, many of them resorting to larceny. We would recommend that the law be so changed that discharged convicts shall receive transportation to the place from which they were sent to the Penitentiary, or to any other place of equal distance.

The report of the Physician shows that but three convicts have died from disease during the past two years. We deem that that record is as good, or better, than that of any like institution in the Union, and that it speaks well for the Physician and the general sanitary condition of the institution.

As a matter of justice to the officers of the Penitentiary, we desire to state that although we have given the convicts an opportunity for making complaints, as provided by law, no convict has ever made a complaint of having received any ill-treatment from any officer of the institution.

To Warden Megrue and Deputy Warden Dueber is due great credit for the efficiency with which they have conducted every department of the institution.

Thanking your Excellency for your co-operation and interest in our work, and the interests and welfare of the institution, this report is respectfully submitted.

The average cost per day of each prisoner, including salaries of warden, deputy warden, guards and all other expenses, except improvements and repairs, for the two years previous, was 70 12-100.

I am satisfied it will decrease in proportion as the number of inmates increases.

By examination you will see the actual cost of food per man, per day, has been 20 16-100, by comparison with eastern prisons, you will see that it costs from one-quarter to one-half more here than there; the comparison will also show that the cost of food is from 25 per cent. to 200 per cent. more here than there.

The Colorado Boot and Shoe Manufacturing Company, for a time, worked as many as seventy men, but are now working but forty men, the minimum number of their contract.

We have purchased and paid for all the material necessary to complete the extension of the east wing, and will soon have 120 cells ready for occupancy in the addition; the same is true of the office in the front wall.

We have fully completed the shoe shop, 36x150 feet, three stories high, all of which we asked an appropriation for, in our last report. In addition to what we asked an appropriation for, we have bought and paid for a boiler and the necessary pipe and fittings for heating the prison, office, and doing the cooking of the institution at a cost of \$3,000.

We have also bought of the Water Company a sufficient amount of mains, and laid the same (at a cost of \$800), to supply the institution with water; we have done work for the Company to pay for the mains and our water rent for one year (\$400).

Our present dining-room is entirely inadequate to accommodate our present number of prisoners, and, as they will continue to increase, I would recommend that you ask for an appropriation to construct the main building, to be used at present as dining-room, chapel, office, and sleeping apartment for guards, to be constructed in such a manner that it can afterwards be converted into a cell house, 44x185 feet. The material to be purchased for the same will cost \$8,000; also, for \$2,500, to pay for additional grounds negotiated for with the Colorado Coal & Iron Company.

The probable average number of prisoners during the next two years will not be less than 250, at a cost, per man, the same as the last two years. An appropriation of \$117,500 will be required for their maintenance.

The probable earnings for the next two years will be \$30,000. Actual appropriation required \$98,000.

By referring to table you will see we have not exhausted the appropriation, having on hand \$582 19-100.

In closing my report, and at the same time retiring from my position as warden, I desire to express my gratitude to the board for their uniform kindness and never failing efforts to assist me in discharging the duties of my office; our relations will ever be a pleasant recollection to me.

I wish to express my appreciation of the deputy warden, Mr. M. Dueber, who has served so efficiently and faithfully with me, during my entire administration of nearly four years.

I appreciate, and gratefully remember, the prompt and faithful manner in which the guards have performed their duties.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

COLORADO STATE PENITENTIARY,
CAÑON CITY, November 30th, 1880. }

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners Colorado State Penitentiary:

GENTLEMEN: According to the statutory requirements, the time having arrived for the biennial report, I have the honor to submit the following report of the medical department of this institution for the two years ending November 30th, 1880:

It affords me pleasure to say that the health of the inmates of the prison during the past two years has been unusually good, the type of the prevailing diseases having been mild, though many who come into the Penitentiary are broken down with excesses, a large number of them being found to be suffering from syphilis in its various stages. This, of all the chronic forms of disease with which we have to deal in prison, is the most common, and, as experience has shown in every walk in life, is at times very obstinate and difficult to thoroughly eradicate from the system. Great attention has been paid to ventilation, cleanliness, and all the means which in any way tend to the promoting of the health of the prisoners, and every endeavor has been made to improve the sanitary condition of the prison.

A reference to the mortuary statement submitted herewith will show the number of deaths during the period covered by this report, and the causes of the same.

Taking into consideration the facts that many wounds and injuries occur, and that a great number of the prisoners having led lives of dissipation and exposure, come here with broken down constitutions, we think that the above statement speaks well for the general management of the prison.

Three patients have been sent to the State Insane Asylum during the past two years.

In conclusion, I would say that it has been my aim throughout to study both efficiency and economy in the administration of the department of the prison intrusted to my care.


