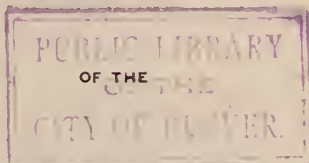

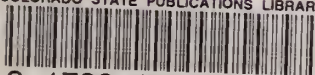

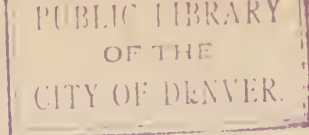

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

OF THE

COLORADO STATE PENITENTIARY.

Canon City, Colorado, November 30, 1900.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY,

CHARLES S. THOMAS,

GOVERNOR OF COLORADO.

Sir—The Board of Commissioners of the Colorado State Penitentiary beg leave to submit the following report, covering the transactions for the two years ending November 30, 1900.

The warden's (C. P. Hoyt), physician's and chaplain's reports, which are hereto attached and made a part of this report, contain a full statement of all the details, as provided by the statutes, and for that reason the same are omitted from our report.

We have drawn vouchers on the state treasurer for the necessary running expenses of the term, amounting to \$221,798.89. This is in excess of the amount appropriated by the last legislature, \$170,000, to the amount of \$51,798.89. We received from the cash earnings of the prison \$26,935.69. An itemized statement of receipts and expenditures will be found in warden's report.

We, therefore, estimate the amount necessary for our support for the next two years, commencing December 1,

1900, and ending November 30, 1902, inclusive, and for needed improvements, as follows:

The employment of convict labor during the last two years has been upon the farms leased by the commissioners, in burning of lime, making brick, cutting of stone and extending the prison walls. The work upon the farms is not remunerative, and would not have been continued but for the sake of giving employment to the prisoners. Owing to the opposition of labor, our brick and stone industries are no longer profitable, and the only industry now carried on by the prison force from which we can hope to realize any profit is from the lime kilns, and we are meeting with such competition from the outside that in the near future we cannot look to this industry for any revenue, and this state of affairs brings us to the all-important subject of prison labor.

All surplus labor could be employed inside the walls in such branches of industry, and the manufacture of such articles as would produce the least possible competition with free labor, and we would suggest that such industries as the manufacture of bottles and window glass, or a plant for the manufacture of hollow ware is practicable, and could be put into successful operation at a small expense to the state, and would greatly increase our earnings and tend to better discipline and reformation of the prisoners. The labor outside the prison walls requires an increased force of guards, a large per cent. of which labor does not in any way contribute to the maintenance of the prison, and it becomes a serious subject as to the taxation necessary to keep up the institution under the present system, without income. It is grossly unjust to the taxpayers to require them to pay costs of maintaining our prisoners in idleness, or, what amounts to the same thing, working them at unremunerative labor. It is

impossible to keep prisoners in a healthy mental and physical condition without steady employment, and it would not only be for the benefit of the state, but for the welfare of the prisoner, that we believe shop labor should be introduced.

We trust that your Honor will make such recommendations to the incoming legislature as will insure the payment of the outstanding deficiency vouchers.

We renew our former recommendation for the purchase of coal lands near the Penitentiary, for the use of the state, from which all state institutions could be supplied with coal, as the item of fuel is growing with all of our institutions and will soon be an additional burden to the taxpayer.

We close this report by thanking your excellency for the interest manifested in the welfare of this institution, and for the valuable advice and assistance rendered in conducting its affairs.

I would call the attention of the board to the crowded condition of the prison, there being 514 prisoners in confinement and only 444 cells for their use, many of the cells having two inmates, which, for the maintaining of perfect discipline, should not be. However, as will be seen by the following report, the discipline has been remarkable during the last term. I account for this in no other way except that the prisoners have been kept busy at work in the quarries, on the lime kilns and on the farms, and from the fact that they have been well fed. I have always maintained that a full stomach was a great promoter of good discipline, and that plenty of employment was absolutely necessary. The report will show that our punishments have been few. As I am a believer in corporal punishment, that method has been used with but few exceptions. When a prisoner is received here he is given a "Privilege Ticket," which permits him to write and receive letters, to wear his hair and beard, also the using of tobacco. Where the rules have been broken by some slight offense these privileges are taken from him, which has the desired effect. We only use corporal punishment in cases where it is absolutely necessary that the prisoner should be called to a sudden halt. I have not used the "ball and chain" nor

the "stringing up" processes at all, and the dungeon only in rare cases and where the offense was of an extremely vicious nature, as I believe that the dungeon and starvation are the most cruel of all punishments, and it is always with reluctance that I resort to this mode.

I consider this a good showing, from the fact that we have handled 1,012 prisoners, and only 161 have been reported and disciplined.

A penitentiary can not be successfully managed by love or by a club. A medium can be established between sympathy and severity, and will meet with better success. Kindness with firmness should be the governing principle. Prisoners should be taught that never is punishment meted out for the sake of punishing, but as a correction for violating the rules, and great care should be exercised that no innocent person suffers punishment. The dispositions of prisoners vary, and good judgment should be exercised in dealing out punishments. Excessive punishments should be avoided except in extreme cases, but justice should be done at all times.

During my term there has been but one case requiring the most severe punishment. I refer to the murder of William C. Rooney, captain of the night watch. It was participated in by four prisoners, who at that time made their escape. One was lynched by citizens, two were recaptured and returned to the Penitentiary, and one is still at large. The two who were returned were punished by the dungeon treatment for the period of ninety-six days.

PRISON EARNINGS.

The Penitentiary earnings for the term just closed are, in the aggregate, \$26,935.69, as will be seen by table No. 1, appended hereto. This amount consists of cash earnings, and does not include labor done by the Penitentiary on its own account in making improvements, etc. The principal source of revenue to the Penitentiary for this term has been the lime kilns, which alone have produced lime to the value of \$16,421.78. The next source of revenue is credited to maintenance, and covers sundry sales, principally for board of United States prisoners. The stone and clay quarries amount to \$2,135.93; the gardens and ranches, \$1,258.08. These farming lands are all leased, and have produced an abundance of grain, vegetables and fruit, such as corn, oats, beets, parsnips, beans, carrots, turnips, onions, lettuce, celery, spinach, and in fact all vegetables, except potatoes (which can not be

grown in this locality); and apples we have had in abundance. We have fed them to the prisoners in the way of sauce, which has obviated the necessity of purchasing dried fruits, which has been the custom heretofore. We have now on hand for use for the coming winter large quantities of beets, carrots, beans, onions, etc., which will materially reduce the cost of subsistence in the future.

HABITUAL CRIMINALS.

Elsewhere in this report will be seen a statement of the known recidivists received at this institution during the term just ended. They represent 18 per cent. of all prisoners received. I have always maintained that there should be a law enacted whereby repeaters, or criminals who continually and wilfully break the law, should receive for the second offense double sentence, and for the third the life penalty. Such a law, I believe, would have immediate results, and this class of offenders, when traveling through our state, would not be tempted to remain with us, and those now here would either reform or leave. While this might not bring about a decrease in crime, yet the influence could not be otherwise than for the good of society. Recidivists seem especially fortunate in receiving light sentences. They are perfectly at home in the court room, and are more or less conversant with the law, and are enabled thereby to take advantage of any technicality that may enable them to obtain a minimum sentence.

IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS.

As will be seen from table No. 4, there has been expended during the two years just ended the sum of \$16,484.17. This amount appears large, but when the condition of this institution, both internal and external, as found in April, 1899, is taken into consideration, it would seem to be only a reasonable amount. Time and space forbid a detailed statement of the condition of the buildings, sewer, water works and steam plant. Apparently nothing had been done for years to keep them in repair. Almost every roof on the premises was leaking, conductors gone, chimneys tumbling down, steam pipes throughout the institution were rusted and worn out so that it was impossible to get heat, sewer pipes were broken and leaking, permitting the escape of sewer gas. The interior of the prison was badly in need of paint, the water supply was wholly inadequate to the needs of the institution

and the quality bad. The bake ovens were cracked and out of repair, several hundred window lights were gone, the horse barn old and falling down, the hog pens were in such condition that it necessitated their removal to new ground. The steam and heat boilers had to be reset and repaired, and the whole plant practically rebuilt. As stated above, only a general idea can be given of the necessities requiring the outlay of the above amount, but enough has been cited to give a general idea of the condition and improvements. All the above enumerated requirements, by your direction, have been attended to in a substantial and economical manner. All this, and more, has been done, and to-day the institution is in first class order and a credit to the state, with possible exceptions of portions of the underground pipes of the sewer, water and heating plants, which were not replaced owing to the fact that there was no available appropriation for improvements, and only such repairs were made as were absolutely imperative to maintain this institution and make it sanitary, healthful and habitable.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

NEW WALL—We are now building a new wall on the east of the prison, of which there has been completed 576 feet. This wall will add to the present enclosure about 20 acres, of which we are in great need, as at present we are badly crowded for space within the walls. To date we have put in this wall 12,380 feet of pitch faced ashler and 2,772 perch of rubble rock. The new tower on the corner has been raised to the height of twenty feet, requiring 1,056 square feet of ashler and 300 perch of rubble rock.

WALL—WOMEN'S PRISON—Has been raised nine feet, with five buttresses nineteen feet high, built from the ground up, to strengthen the old wall, which was considered too light to stand the weight to be added, requiring 2,420 square feet of cut ashler and 212 perch of rubble rock.

DITCH—This ditch was established before the prison was located, and passes through the prison yard. The company owning it decided to widen and increase the capacity of the ditch. This necessitated the excavating of 1,200 yards of earth and rock. The ditch has been walled, requiring 1,570 feet of cut ashler and 1,500 perch of rubble rock and 230 feet of 6x16-inch coping.

LIME KILNS—Twelve in number, have been re-lined from top to bottom. In doing this work was used 100 loads of boulders, 2,800 fire brick and 50,000 common brick.

FLOORS—The convicts' kitchen, wash house, boiler house, meat shop and soap house have been reflagged, using 4,604 square feet of cut flagging; also floors of eighty-three cells in No. 2 cell house were relaid with new flagging, they being badly worn.

WATER WORKS—A ditch was taken out about a mile west of the prison, tapping the Arkansas river about nine feet below the river bed, requiring the excavating of 1,280 cubic yards of earth, and the same amount of filling, using 640 perch of rubble rock and 1,400 square feet of flagging for cover. After leaving this blind ditch, the water is conveyed to the prison in 10-inch water pipe, of which 1,300 feet have been used, and 500 feet of 10-inch sewer pipe taken up and relaid.

NEW BOILER HOUSE—Has been built adjoining the pump house. This was done because heretofore the steam to run

the pumps came from the main boiler plant, a distance of some three hundred feet, which caused a loss of steam, and, consequently, a waste of fuel. There was used in this building 966 square feet of cut ashler, 232 perch of rubble rock, 11,000 common brick, 700 fire brick and 138 feet of ornamental stone cornice work.

BOILERS.—Three boilers have been reset in the old boiler house, using 53,000 common brick and 3,000 fire brick. This was imperative, as the boilers had to be repaired, which made it necessary to tear them out. The boiler house and dynamo room have undergone a course of general repair, such as new roofs, painting, new floors and new steam pipes.

NEW STONE QUARRY.—A stone quarry has been opened up so that we are in shape to furnish any amount of rock that may be required. In doing this 2,000 feet of road had to be built to reach the same.

WOMEN'S PRISON.—This has been thoroughly repaired by 400 yards of plastering, two new smoke flues, each forty-five feet high, and painting and calsomining from top to bottom.

CONVICT LABOR.

It is essential that convicts confined in prisons should have work. There is very little disposition upon the part of the convict to avoid work. They are sentenced here to hard labor, and to carry out the orders of the court and the law I have endeavored to keep all able-bodied prisoners from being idle; however, the bulk of the labor performed has not been remunerative.

We started out in the spring of 1899 with prospects for a good trade in brick, having an order for 4,000,000 to start with. After making 350,000 so many objections were raised against this line of work that we were forced to discontinue it. If I could have gone on with this work there would have been no deficiency for this biennial period.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I herewith submit an estimate of the appropriations needed for the ensuing term, as follows:

CELL HOUSE.—There should be a new cell house built on a modern plan for the confinement of our insane prisoners and the feeble-minded, as it is very dangerous to have this class of prisoners mingling with the general prison population. There should also be an annex to this building to be used for hospital purposes, as the hospital we now have is not safe for the treatment of the more desperate, who might feign sickness for the purpose of having an opportunity to escape, as it is on the second floor, and during this administration two of the inmates made their escape from the building by going through the roof, but were detected and returned to their cells.

WASHING MACHINERY AND BATHS.—We should have washing machinery, as the way we are now doing the work wears out the clothes, and a washing plant would soon pay for itself in the saving it would make on the wear and tear of the clothing. The old cast iron bath tubs are in bad condition. They should be replaced by shower baths, which are much more cleanly and are now in use in almost all public institutions.

IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS.—Such as iron pipe, ice house, a cow barn, paint, window glass, etc.

LIME KILNS AND QUARRIES.—Tools, such as shovels, picks, wheelbarrows, hammers, etc.

GUNS AND AMMUNITION.—Our guns are old and out of repair, and should be replaced as soon as possible by new modern guns, all of the same caliber, as it is dangerous to have guns of a different caliber in a place of this kind.

LAND.—Unless there is some work furnished for the prisoners within the walls, there should be either farming or coal lands purchased, so as to provide work for the inmates, as it is merciless and cruel to keep prisoners in idleness, and then it is best for the prisoners and justice to the taxpayers

that convicts be required to earn their own living, or come as near as possible to that point.

MAINTENANCE OF PRISON.

For information as to the cost for the past term I would call your attention to table No. 4, appended hereto, which gives all disbursements and distributions in detail.

PAROLING OF PRISONERS.

August 3, 1899, the following law went into effect:

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

Section 1. When a convict is sentenced to the State Penitentiary, otherwise than for life, for an offense or crime committed after the passage of this act, the court imposing the sentence shall not fix a definite term of imprisonment, but shall establish a maximum and minimum term for which said convict may be held in said prison. The maximum term shall not be longer than the longest term fixed by law for the punishment of the offense of which he was convicted, and the minimum term shall not be shorter than the shortest term fixed by law for the punishment of the offense of which he was convicted.

Sec. 2. If, through oversight or otherwise, any person be sentenced to imprisonment in the said State Penitentiary for a definite period of time other than for life, said sentence shall not for that reason be void, but the prisoner so sentenced shall be entitled to the benefit and subject to the liabilities of this Act, in the same manner, and to the same extent, as if the sentence had been in the terms required in section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall have authority, under such rules and regulations as he may prescribe, to issue a parole or permit to go at large to any convict who now is, or hereafter may be, imprisoned in the said Penitentiary under a sentence other than a life sentence, who may have served the minimum term pronounced by the trial court, or, in the absence of such minimum term pronounced by the court, the minimum term provided by law for the crime for which he was convicted, provided that any convict who shall make an assault with any deadly weapon upon an officer, employe or other convict of said Penitentiary shall not be eligible to parole under this Act.

Sec. 4. Every such convict, while on parole, shall remain in the legal custody, and under the control of the Commissioners of the Penitentiary, and shall at all times be subject to such rules and regulations as they may prescribe, and shall be subject at any time to be taken back within the enclosure of the Penitentiary from which he was permitted to go at large for any reason which may be satisfactory to the Commissioners and at their sole discretion; and upon the request of the Commissioners the Governor may order said paroled convict to be returned to the Penitentiary. Full power to retake and return any such paroled convict to the

penitentiary from which he was permitted to go at large is hereby expressly conferred upon the Governor, whose written order, when duly signed and attested by the Seal of the State of Colorado, shall be a sufficient warrant authorizing all officers named therein to return to actual custody in the penitentiary from which he was permitted to go at large any paroled convict, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers to execute said order the same as an ordinary criminal process.

Sec. 5. The paroled convict who may, upon the order of the Governor, be returned to the penitentiary, shall be retained therein according to the terms of his original sentence, and in computing the period of his confinement the time between his release upon said permit and his return to said penitentiary shall not be taken to be any part of the term of the sentence.

Sec. 6. This Act shall not be construed in any sense to operate as a discharge of any convict paroled under its provisions, but simply a permit to any such convict to go without the enclosure of the penitentiary, and if, while so at large he shall so behave and conduct himself as not to incur his reincarceration, then he shall be deemed to be still serving out the sentence imposed upon him by the court and shall be entitled to good time the same as if he had not been paroled. But if the said paroled prisoner shall be returned to the said penitentiary, as hereinbefore provided, then he shall serve out his original sentence, as provided in section 5 of this Act.

Under this act we have paroled 83 prisoners, 27 of whom have lived up to their parole agreements until the actual expiration of their sentences and were discharged, 15 have violated their parole agreement, 5 of whom have been returned to the prison, the other 10 are at large and we have advertised them by circular asking for their arrest so that we might return them to the prison; 68 have kept their parole agreement and are regularly reporting as the law directs. This gives us 81.9 per cent. who have kept within the law. It is but fair to say that some of those who have lived up to their parole agreement until their sentence actually expired have committed crimes and are now serving terms in other prisons, but taking it all in all I think we have made a fair showing under the parole law.

LIFE TIMERS.

I wish to call your attention to the number of prisoners serving life sentences in this penitentiary. As you will see from table No. 32, there are 54, 11 of whom have been received during this biennial period, and 12 received during the years 1897 and 1898. If this continues there should be a prison built especially for life prisoners, as it is very difficult,

especially in the crowded condition that we are, to handle this class of prisoners with those who are serving a medium sentence.

INSANE PRISONERS.

We now have five prisoners who have been adjudged insane, two of whom are life timers and two are sentenced for thirty years. We have been unable to transfer them to the asylum for the insane on account of its crowded condition, and also from the fact that the asylum has no facilities for handling patients of this character, as they would be sure to make their escape. Hence it is very essential, as I have stated in my previous remarks, that we have a cell building here for the detention of prisoners of this class, as we are endangering the lives of the officers and prisoners of this institution by having them in the prison proper.

ESCAPES.

Our escapes have been quite numerous, as will be seen from table No. 34. It has been necessary in carrying on our farms and gardens, also the state road work, to take large numbers of convicts to a great distance from the prison, and as our farms and gardens are considerably removed from each other, we could not afford to keep gun guards over all the prisoners worked outside the walls, as before mentioned. Most of these escapes have been made by prisoners working all the way from four to twelve miles from the prison. The table shows that there are nine prisoners who succeeded in making their escape, the remainder having been returned. I also call your attention to table No. 36, showing the escapes from this prison during the past twenty-nine years.

There will always be escapes from this prison under the existing conditions, viz.: There is no work provided for them inside the prison walls, and, as I said before, they should have work, and if they are to be worked on the farms this land should belong to the state, and suitable quarters in the way of stockades should be provided, so that the prisoners could be held on the grounds. This would be much more economical, as much time is lost in taking the prisoners to and from their work.

Charles Fernow, 4164, escaped from one of the ranches on July 26, 1899. A stranger, armed with a rifle, rode up to the fence, and Fernow, who was plowing, unhooked a horse from his team, joined the stranger and rode off.

Arthur West, 4505, and Frank Lewis, 3102, escaped on September 13, 1899, while engaged in hauling wood a distance of ten miles from the prison.

J. K. Stratton, 2825, escaped during the night of October 10, 1899, from the hose house. Upon my assuming charge of the prison Mike Ryan and J. K. Stratton had charge of the fire apparatus in the hose house, and were considered trusty prisoners. Ryan slept in the hose house and Stratton in his cell. When Ryan was paroled, and pending a decision upon the parole of Stratton, I permitted Stratton to sleep at the hose house. Upon the discovery of his escape an inquiry was made by me, and subsequently a formal investigation was held by you.

C. E. Wagoner, 4580; Thomas Reynolds, 3883; Kid Wallace, 3855, and Antone Wood, 3199, escaped from the guard's kitchen, assaulted and killed W. C. Rooney, night captain, and escaped over the walls on the night of January 22, 1900. Mention is made elsewhere of this case.

F. D. Gibson, 4247, escaped April 20, 1900, while working on a fence two miles from the prison.

Ed Cooper, 3981, escaped June 1, 1900, while working on a ranch four miles from the prison.

George Brooks, 4508, escaped June 5, 1900, from the state road gang about seven miles from the prison.

Ed Irving, 4744, a life timer, escaped from the library on Sunday, July 22, 1900. This was a mysterious case, and I do not know how it was accomplished, but have concluded that he went out with citizens attending chapel that morning. Although two old and reliable officers were in charge of the gate through which the citizens passed, he may have passed these officers if he was disguised in citizen's clothing, especially if they were not paying strict attention to the people passing.

DEATH OF OFFICERS.

On the night of June 27, 1899, Thomas Tobin, a guard, was shot by a sheriff's posse searching for an escaped convict, resulting in his death at the prison, July 4, 1899. Tobin and Rooney were out in search of the convict and were guarding bridge No. 3 on the D. & R. G. railway seven miles east of Florence, when the sheriff's posse, likewise on the hunt, by mistake fired upon the two guards, resulting in the wounding and subsequent death of Tobin, a most efficient guard.

The lamentable murder of William C. Rooney, night captain, by four escaping convicts on the night of January 22, 1900, was the result of disobedience of orders by the chief engineer. Four convicts, Thomas Reynolds, 3883; Kid Wallace, 3855; C. E. Wagoner, 4580, and Antone Wood, 3199, had been taken from their cells, contrary to explicit orders, to make urgent repairs on the boilers. They were taken to the guard's kitchen at 10 o'clock for supper, and while Captain Rooney was conducting them back to their work these four prisoners assaulted Captain Rooney and stabbed him, causing almost instant death, and then made their escape over the northeast wall. At this time officers on guard towers Nos. 2 and 3 were proven flagrantly remiss in their duties in permitting the prisoners to scale the walls near their towers without making any attempt to check their escape. Wood and Wallace were captured and returned to the prison. Reynolds was later captured, but was taken from the officers by unknown persons and lynched. Wagoner is still at liberty, for whom a standing reward of \$250 is offered.

CONCLUSION.

You are referred to the reports of the chaplain and physician as to the work accomplished in their departments.

I desire to thank all who have assisted me in my work here. My thanks are especially due to Governor Thomas for his advice and courtesies, which he has at all times extended.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

Canon City, Colorado, December 1, 1900.

To the Honorable Board of Penitentiary Commissioners:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of the medical department of the Penitentiary for the past two years—five months of this term was under the care of another physician. I have made monthly reports to you as required by the rules, and the tables herewith is a summary of said reports.

Upon taking charge as prison physician, May 1, 1899, I made a careful inspection of the entire prison. I found the sanitary condition not satisfactory. The whole prison needed renovating; every department required immediate attention, and my recommendations were at once carried out by the warden.

The water furnished the prison was very bad, and before the extensive improvements necessary to furnish pure water could be made, several prisoners contracted typhoid fever, but for more than a year, since the prison has had pure water, there has not been a single case of typhoid fever. I would also make note of the unusual success we have had in the treatment of wounds. In addition to the men admitted to the hospital, we have treated numerous cases of mashed fingers and small wounds, yet among them all, there has not been a single case of suppuration or sepsis. I attribute this success to the care in antiseptic precautions and to the general good sanitation.

The prison now contains fifty-four life men and forty-three other prisoners, who, after deducting good time, will remain in the prison eight years or more from this date. Most of these men have no money; all their necessary wants are supplied, except the care of the teeth, and some of them

are forced to lose their teeth, that might be saved by a dentist. I would respectfully recommend that a dentist be employed to care for the teeth of these long-term prisoners.

I would also recommend that the old, rusty iron bath tubs be removed and that shower bath be introduced. The food furnished the prisoners is wholesome, as shown by the general health of the prisoners.

I have been careful to keep down expenses, but there should be some surgical appliances purchased. This will increase the expenses of the new year.

The hospital is now located upon the second floor, and the odors from the kitchen and dining room—from natural draught—permeate the hospital. It is also difficult to carry the severely sick or injured up the narrow stairs to the hospital, and there is no way to keep safely a dangerous prisoner who may not be very sick; and, further, there are now, and always have been, a few prisoners here, officially declared insane, that the authorities at the insane asylum could not receive because the asylum is overcrowded. This class of prisoners are now, and have always been, confined in cells and cannot be properly cared for. To improve these conditions, I would respectfully recommend the erection of separate buildings for the sick and insane.

All my requests and recommendations to the warden have been promptly honored, and I thank him and all the officers for courteous treatment.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Penitentiary Commissioners:

Gentlemen—The present chaplain succeeded the Rev. R. W. Barnes by appointment of Governor C. S. Thomas, April 5, 1900, consequently this field is new to him. His work is practically the same as that of any other pastor, with the addition of the superintendency of the school and library. The regular services are at 9:30 every Sunday morning, when the chaplain preaches. Father Marcellus conducts a Catholic service at that hour on the first Sunday of each month. The chapel services are well attended. Last winter the chaplain began an afternoon service for Bible study and song. While not so largely attended as the morning service, it would average 125 to 150. A number of visiting clergymen have preached for us during the term. Many fine singers have also assisted. A most interesting occasion was the visit and address to the prisoners of Mrs. Maud Ballington Booth, March 25, 1900. A very fruitful work is the religious conversation of the chaplain with the prisoners as he visits them systematically from cell to cell. Quite a large number of men have begun the Christian life since their entrance into prison. A life prisoner was baptized this summer, after it was ascertained that his life was held in great respect by his fellow prisoners.

Entertainments have been given in the chapel on holidays. They consisted of shows by the prisoners and musical and dramatic entertainments by outside talent. Grateful mention is made of the hearty co-operation in the services and entertainments of many people of Canon City and other towns in the state, often at great sacrifice and expense.

LIBRARY.

Of the new books added many are scientific, literary and historical works of great value. School books are no longer counted among the library books, but are kept in the school department. This reduces the number of library books by over 300. The list of retired books was further enlarged by taking from the shelves a large number of ancient Sunday school books in which the good all die young and are therefore unsuitable for prison circulation.

The percentage of fiction read is large, reaching 70 per cent. in the summer time, but it is high grade fiction, and a good many prisoners read more solid books. Warden Hoyt has added a very useful feature to this department. It is the circulation of the leading periodicals among prisoners requesting them. The number of men using them is very large. The book binding department, besides doing our own repair work, rebound a large lot of books for the Canon City library.

SCHOOL.

During the present term the school was changed from night to afternoon. Eight teachers assist the chaplain, and besides instruction in the chapel, regular studies are carried on by many in the English branches, in their cells. The daily average attendance is over 96 per cent. The interest is good and progress excellent. This is especially true of some old men who might be thought to be past learning.

STATISTICS.

I have given attention to criminals themselves rather than to books about them. As a result some statistics gathered may be helpful to others. Take, for example, the religious statistics furnished by the chaplain elsewhere in the prison reports. Of the 514 prisoners now here, 166 are of Catholic parentage, 328 of Protestant and 17 of no Christian parentage. The large proportion of Catholic prisoners is accounted for by the addition to foreign-born Catholic crim-

inals of the forty Mexican prisoners who are almost without exception of that faith. While 65 per cent. profess to Christian parentage, and only 3 per cent. to no Christian parentage, it is instructive as showing that church membership of parents does not deter from crime, nor take the place of home training, and individual piety. The home is the weak spot, or rather the lack of it; $46\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the prisoners left home before they were sixteen. The percentage of single men also is large.

Divorce plays no important part in their parental homes, but it is a marked feature of their own married life.

Out of 681 prisoners, 285, or $41\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. were married, 39 were widowers and 62 were divorced, making 73 per cent. single men over against only 27 per cent. with homes of their own. In this connection the age of the prisoner may be considered. Scientific men tell us that habits are fixed at the age of 30 years. Taking the number of prisoners at the reformatory under 30 and adding them to those here, 30 years of age or under, we have $55\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. over 30, or a little over half of the prisoners under 30 when incarcerated. In 1890 the percentage stood 68 per cent. 30 or under, showing a decrease of 13 per cent. This means an improved condition in their homes or in the habits of the young men themselves, within the last decade.

The chaplain can usually get a more frank statement from the men concerning their use of liquor than they will give when they have just arrived and are asked whether they are temperate or intemperate.

In private conversation with the men I find that 60 per cent. are here through drink, directly or indirectly, in the face of a larger percentage often given in statements by lecturers outside.

I am gratified to note that the above percentage agrees with that of Chaplain L. J. Hall, who spent twelve years in this office.

His report for 1890 gives 63 per cent. It is gratifying also to note a small decrease in the percentage of the intemperate.

The sober truth is bad enough that over half of the men, by their own admission, are here through liquor.

Sad as this is, it is an encouragement to know that criminal heredity is not as great a cause of crime as drink and roving habits; 88 per cent. of the men use tobacco.

Is crime in our state on the increase or decrease? In 1890 the population of this state was 412,198. Number of prisoners received for the term ending December 1, 1890, was 565. In 1900 the population is 539,700. Number of prisoners received during the term ending December 1, 1900, was 422. The figures are not at hand for Buena Vista Reformatory for this term, but last term it was 259, and the few prisoners more or less this term would not affect the proportion to any appreciable degree. Adding this number to the 422 received here, we have the following proportions, viz.: One prisoner received in 1890 to every 729 of the population. One prisoner to every 791 of the population in 1900.

RECOMMENDATION.

The only recommendation that I would make may be said to be outside the chaplain's department, yet affecting the welfare of the prisoners as it does, attention should be called to it.

I refer to the parole system. Under the parole law a man may be paroled, but it is not obligatory. The universal understanding of prisoners coming here is that if their prison record is good, they will be paroled when their minimum term is served.

They say that the judges tell them, when giving minimum and maximum sentences, that if they are good in prison, they will be paroled at the expiration of the minimum.

Allowance being made for the stupidity of some prisoners, the very general understanding given above seems to indicate that the judges so construe the intent of the law.

When the prisoner gets here he finds that in order to secure a parole he must have outside friends, money to buy clothes and his railroad ticket, and give a guarantee of work awaiting him.

The penniless and friendless man does not stand an equal show with his more fortunate, but often less deserving, neighbor.

Another change that seems to me desirable in the rules is that feature refusing parole to the man serving a second term.

A prejudice naturally exists against recidivists, but there is a great difference in repeaters.

The habitual criminal is known to the officers and his return is expected. There are others, however, who yield again to temptation through drink, or adverse circumstances, and some who are convicted upon slight evidence because they are ex-convicts.

The sentence given the repeater is often very severe and at times seemingly out of all proportion to the offense.

Let him be punished, but if the reformation of the man is the great object, let him not come into prison hardened by a hopelessly long sentence, but let him maintain his manhood through the inspiration of hope.

Prison officials, as a rule, distinguish between the two kinds of repeaters referred to.

In conclusion, my hearty thanks are given to your honorable body, to Warden Hoyt, and to all the prison officials for the co-operation and courtesy extended to me in my work.

His sudden and shocking death was not only a profound loss to this institution, but was most deeply felt by the entire community as well.
