REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the Colorado Board of Corrections:

I submit herewith a report on the conduct of the Colorado State Hospital for the biennial period ending November 30, 1924.

Nothing of note has occurred regarding the general health of the patients. A number of minor and major operations have been performed and we have continued our regular habit of making a blood Wassermann in every case. Forty-one cases were given a course of treatment with Tryparsamide obtained from the Rockefeller Foundation through the courtesy of Dr. C. S. Bluemel of Denver. Results, we regret to say, were negative. Three cases unfortunately showed marked ocular symptoms, one becoming practically blind. Twenty-two cases of epilepsy were given a course of treatment by non-specific proteid with negative results. Five cases of epilepsy were also treated by the subcutaneous use of ether, results being practically negative.

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS RECEIVED

The special appropriations granted by the Twenty-fourth General Assembly were expended as follows:

For the Purchase of the Buildings, Lands and Equipment of Woodcroft Hospital, \$200,000: This institution, purchased for the purpose of providing further accommodations for the growing population of the Colorado State Hospital, was not taken over until early in 1924 due to the fact that the former owners experienced considerable difficulty in finding a new location. However, from the time that the purchase was consummated until the property was turned over to us we received a rental of \$1,000 per month for its use. This property is not yet being used to its fullest capacity, only seventy-five patients having been transferred. This is due to the fact that the state of our finances would not warrant us in expending sufficient funds to employ the necessary help that it would have taken to have put the entire institution in operation. We have designated this addition as the Colorado State Hospital Annex.

Addition to Nurses' Home \$50,000: This appropriation covered the erection of the east wing of the nurses' home, completing this building as originally planned. This wing is a duplication of the west wing with the exception that there were arranged on each floor a suite of two rooms and bath for the use of physicians. The bowling-alleys which were planned for the basement were also installed.

For Furniture and Furnishings, \$5,000: This appropriation was expended for beds and bedding. for the replacement of wornout and broken furniture and for furniture for the east wing of the nurses' home.

For Irrigation System, Lawns and Additional Parking, \$5,000: An entirely new irrigation system, covering practically all our lawns with the exception of those east of the administration group, was installed. We also dug two wells and installed an electrically driven pump in the hopes that we might save a considerable sum of money for water for irrigation, but we regret to report that while a sufficient amount of water was obtained it soon became evident that because this water was so highly impregnated with alkali it would be impossible to use it. About three acres of new lawn were put in and quite a number of blue spruce and elm trees have been set out.

For Improvements to Farm, \$1,000: The greater portion of this appropriation was expended in the purchase of equipment for handling our milk. A milk clarifier and a cooler were installed in the milk room. A sterilizing compartment and ice box were also built in this room. The rest of the appropriation was used for the purchase of wire for fencing, for fence posts and for lumber with which a shelter shed was built. For Insurance, \$25,000: This appropriation paid the insurance premiums on policies covering the entire institution, including the annex and the farm. These policies run for three years and will all expire at the same time in 1927.

Library and Amusements, \$3,500: Of this amount practically five hundred dollars was expended for the purchase of a new moving picture machine, which was an absolute necessity. The remainder has paid for music for dances, for the services of clergymen, for phonographs and new records and the expenses incidental to moving picture shows, also for band music on the Fourth of July. A pool table was purchased for the nurses' home.

Repairs and Improvements, \$35,000: This appropriation covers all the ordinary repairs and painting for the entire institution. In addition to this the following improvements have been made:

A brick stack, at the old Pueblo Smelter, which contained some seven hundred thousand brick, was purchased for three hundred dollars and wrecked. Out of the brick obtained from this stack there were erected a machine shop at our main power plant and a boiler house at the farm, the work of erecting these two buildings being done entirely by one patient. An old building standing at our farm was moved to a new location and repaired so as to make a very comfortable residence for the dairyman. At the north end of our new barn there was built a large granary which in appearance matches the cow barn. Another old building at the farm was placed on a concrete foundation and remodeled to make sleeping quarters for the patients who work at the dairy. A new fence was erected around our entire garden, built out of old boiler tubes which were purchased from the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company. A concrete tank holding seventy-five thousand gallons was erected for the purpose of storing soft water so that we would always have an adequate supply. A considerable amount of fencing was done at the farm. A small sun parlor and sleeping porch was added to the Superintendent's cottage. About forty new window guards were installed, some on windows that were unguarded and others to replace those worn out.

STATE FAIR EXHIBITS

For the first time in the history of the institution, the State Hospital exhibited a number of animals from our herd and several horses in addition to the usual exhibit of art needlework. I am pleased to report that the following is the list of premiums received:

During this biennial period our herd has been moved to the farm and are occupying our new cow barn. For several months we have had working at the farm a group of about thirty-five men from the Colorado State Penitentiary. These men have moved approximately four thousand loads of dirt and have also done an immense amount of work in grading and cleaning up about the farm. At the main institution about ten acres of lawn, which had become overrun with dandelions, were plowed up in the fall of 1923. These lawns have been regraded and will be reseeded the coming spring.

Staff House: The same purpose for which a nurses' home was built applies to the need of a building to provide living quarters for the officials of the institution. As were the nurses, so are the officers at present, scattered about the entire institution. As has already been mentioned, nine rooms in the nurses' home are now being used for the accommodation of physicians and these rooms are needed for nurses. In the administration building the rooms used as offices are becoming so congested that it will be necessary to provide further room on the second floor, now being used as living quarters for officers. It cannot be expected that efficient officers can be obtained unless living quarters are furnished which are to some degree equal to those which these same people would occupy were they living outside the institution. A great number of institutions are furnishing their official staff, especially the medical officers, with individual cottages where they can live a normal life, and we are requesting this building for the purpose of providing suitable accommodations at as small a cost as possible that these officers may have some place to live apart from buildings in which patients are housed.

Repairs and Improvements: For the biennial period just closed there was appropriated for the purpose of repairs and improvements the sum of 35,000. This proved to be entirely inadequate and something over 15,000,00 had to be used for this purpose from our maintenance fund. For the coming period we are asking for 550,000,00. The ordinary repairs and the continual painting which is necessary to keep this institution in proper sanitary shape consumes a large proportion of our appropriation. In addition to this there are a number of changes which should be made at the annex in order that the buildings may be more suitable for the handling of a large number of patients. We sincerely trust that this full amount will be appropriated so that our entire maintenance fund may be used for its specific purpose.

Laundry Building and Equipment: Without doubt, a new laundry building is one of the most urgent needs of the institution. The present building is entirely inadequate as to size and practically all of the machinery is not only worn out but obsolete at the present time. It is our intention, if this appropriation is granted, to erect this building chiefly out of the brick obtained from the stack previously mentioned and to employ either our own labor or the assistance of the inmates from the Penitentiary for this purpose. The greater portion of the appropriation will go for new machinery. As I have said, the present machinery is obsolete and constantly needs repairs. New parts cannot be obtained from the manufacturers except that they be especially made, which makes the cost of replacement very high. The amount of the appropriation was estimated by Professor Hunter of the State University, who made an investigation of the situation. The present building is needed and will be used as a carpenter shop and paint shop.

Boiler and Stoker: If any further buildings are erected, it will be imperative that we have an additional boiler, as we are now running to the full capacity of our plant. It is our plan to install another Badenhausen boiler with Greene chain-grate stoker, a duplicate of the one installed four years ago. This is also needed because of the fact that some of our older boilers are apt to give out most any time.

Horse Barn and Improvements at Farm: This request is for the purpose of erecting, at the farm, a barn for our horses and houses for our hogs and to clear the land, which was overrun by the flood in 1921, in order that it may again be put under cultivation. In all probability, this work will be done by the use of labor from the Penitentiary.

Kitchen Equipment: This is for the purpose of replacing several worn-out steam cookers and two electric dish washers, also for the purpose of additional equipment made necessary by our growth.

Ice Plant: In asking for this appropriation we have three objects in view:

First—To double the ice-making capacity of our present plant

Second—To install a small refrigerating plant in the milk room at the farm.

Third—A small plant at the annex to refrigerate the cold storage boxes there.

Improvements to Grounds: For several years we have requested sufficient funds to complete the parking of the grounds east of the administrative group, but have never yet received an appropriation sufficient to do so. We hope that this will be granted and that this work can be completed during the coming year. What remains of the appropriation after doing this work is needed for the purchase of shrubbery for the grounds and for the erection of another greenhouse.

Furniture and Furnishings: The appropriation made two years ago for this purpose was only five thousand dollars. This sum is entirely inadequate to provide the necessary furnishings for an institution of this size. If we continue to grow, as we probably will, additional beds and bedding will have to be purchased during this period as well as additional seating capacity.

Library and Amusement: This appropriation is requested for the same purposes as it has been made in the past, namely, the furnishing of music for dances, moving picture shows and musical instruments, also books and reading matter.

Enlargement of Amusement Hall: Once more we present to you the need of this institution in the way of enlarging our amusement hall. As has been repeated so many times in former reports, this hall has a seating capacity of only about three hundred, where-

as there are probably one thousand patients who should receive the benefit of the entertainments given therein. Our present hall is not only inadequate as to seating capacity but is in nowise fitted for giving entertainments which could be provided if there was necessary scenery and proper dressing rooms.

Transportation of Patients: On our statute books we have a provision whereby the superintendent is directed to deport those cases which are committed to this institution but whose residence is in some other state than Colorado. To carry out the provisions of this act properly would use a larger sum of money than we feel should be taken from our maintenance fund, and it is for the purpose of covering this cost that the request for this appropriation is made.

Maintenance: In addition to the above requests for special appropriations the most important matter which should be brought to the attention of the General Assembly is the question of additional funds for the maintenance of this institution. The mill levy, which constitutes the sole source of income for this institution, with the exception of what is collected for the care of patients and from the sale of produce, produced the first year it was in effect the sum of \$375,890.14 and for the year ending November 30, 1924, the sum of \$412,982.09, an increase of but \$37,091.95, while during this period our population has increased almost six hundred.

As shown by our financial report, we were compelled to request the Governor that certificates of indebtedness be issued in the sum of \$16,000 to cover our deficit. Our financial report also shows that the per capita cost of the institution for the biennial period was \$197.53. Even to attempt to run the institution at this low per capita would necessitate an increase in the mill levy, but we do not desire to stop here.

It is our aim to advance the standards of this institution so that it will, to some slight degree, come up to the efficiency in other states. It is impossible for us to do the work that should be done for our insane on this per capita. The average per capita for similar institutions in the United States is something over \$300 per year. It is absolutely necessary that we have more physicians, that we have a pathologist, a resident dentist and more advantages in the way of occupational therapy in order to conduct a proper institution.

There are two ways in which additional funds may be provided:

First—By an increase in the mill levy which would give us at least \$100,000 per year above the present income.

Second—There could be entire change in the method of supporting the institution, by compelling each county to pay a sufficient amount every month for each patient committed from that county. The latter method is worthy of serious consideration, because I feel sure that not only would it provide sufficient funds but it would also tend to keep out of the institution a considerable number of patients who are not proper cases but who are sent to us because the counties fail to provide quarters for such cases at their local poor farms.

In case the mill levy is increased, this increase would not become available until late in 1926, and, therefore, in addition there should be passed a special appropriation of \$100,000 for the maintenance of this institution for the year 1925.

Legislation Needed: I would recommend that a change be made in the statutes covering the commitment of patients to this institution. In Section 549, Compiled Laws of 1921, the term "insane person" as defined by this section is altogether too broad and allows the commitment to the institution of many cases which are not proper for care nor treatment therein. This is especially true of those cases whose condition is only the result of advanced age.

I would also recommend legislation to cover the matter of the discharge of patients. Under the existing statute only those cases in which the Superintendent can certify that they have been restored to reason can be legally discharged. I would recommend that this statute be so changed as to authorize the automatic discharge of any case which has been on a probationary discharge at the end of one year and that this also apply to those cases which have escaped and have not been returned for a similar period.

Further, I would recommend legislation to the end that all judges of county courts be compelled to notify the Superintendent of the Colorado State Hospital whenever a conservator has been appointed for any case.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of our consulting staff, who have always been willing to give their services when called upon, and to the members of the Board of Corrections for their never-failing co-operation and assistance, also to all officers and employees who have loyally assisted in the work.
