

The preceding tables show the movement of population in the Colorado State Hospital for each year of the biennium. It will be noted there is a marked difference in the number of patients admit-

ted during the first and second years of the period. This is due, in part, to the fact that the hospital was elosed to the reception of new patients from May 1, 1933, to August 17, 1933, inclusive. Beeause of the failure of the Twenty-ninth General Assembly to make any provision for additional buildings at this institution during its regular session his Excellency, Governor Ed C. Johnson, issued the following Executive Order to the superintendent. "Because of the inhuman overerowded conditions at your institution, you are hereby directed to accept no more patients from any county until the General Assembly provides decent facilities for their care. Given under my hand and the Executive Seal this First day of May, A. D. 1933." This Order was rescinded on August 17th after the Twenty-ninth General Assembly in Extraordinary Session had passed a bill making an appropriation of \$300,000.00 for a building program. Despite the fact no patients were received for over three and one-half months, ten hundred and fifty-two were admitted during the biennium, the greatest number for any similar period in the history of the hospital. Four hundred and fifty-five patients died and three hundred and thirty-one were discharged, of whom fifty-four were either transferred to other hospitals or deported to the states or countries in which they had established legal residences prior to being admitted to this institution. Three thousand six hundred and seventy-one patients were cared for during the first year of the biennium and three thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight the second year, while the total number remaining at the end of the period was three thousand four hundred and fifty. The net gain for the biennium was two hundred and sixty-six.

#### NEEDS OF THE COLORADO STATE HOSPITAL

Even a cursory review of the biennial reports submitted to the various Legislatures since the institution was established reveals two very important faets which must always be remembered when eonsidering the needs of the Colorado State Hospital. First, it is evident that the hospital has never been adequate to properly care for its population. Overerowding has always existed and treatment facilities requested twenty and thirty years ago have never been provided. Second, it is obvious that the institution is constantly growing as each year the number of patients eared for and resident in the hospital is greater than that of the previous year. Bearing in mind these two faets the needs of the Colorado State Hospital will be briefly summarized under four main elassifications. First. additional facilities are necessary for the care and treatment of patients. Second, more accommodations are required to house em-Third, the eapaeity of each department in the utility plovees. group must be increased. Fourth, an ample allowanee should be allotted for the upkcep of the existing hospital plant and equipment so that necessary repairs, replacements and improvements ean be made.

Buildings for patients. Each year the population of the hospital increases, therefore every biennium additional buildings must be erected to provide proper housing accommodations and to prevent overcrowding with its resultant evils. It is proposed to complete the unit of cottages now started for female patients and to construct at least one building to care for aged and infirm men.

Building for criminal insane. Adequate facilities have never been available in the institution for segregation and the proper custodial care of the criminal insane. A building should now be constructed and equipped for the sole purpose of confining this class of patients.

To complete, furnish and equip buildings, etc. In order to complete the buildings now under construction two bridges, a system of water mains and a branch tunnel are required. Furniture and furnishings will be needed for the wards and various types of equipment and fixtures must be installed in the dining-room and kitchen.

Development and improvement of new grounds. Grading, fencing, landscaping, lighting, sidewalks, curbs and gutters, roads, lawns, trees, shrubs and a sprinkling system are needed to develop and improve the new grounds.

*Nurses' home.* As the population of the hospital increases the number of employees required naturally becomes greater. In order to provide additional living quarters it is now proposed to complete the nurses' home, one wing of which was built in 1932.

*Remodeling of female center building.* The larger part of this building was erected over forty years ago consequently the repairs and improvements needed are so extensive that complete remodeling appears advisable.

Sprinkler system. Seven of the existing dormitory buildings are not of fireproof construction. Should a fire of any consequence occur in one or more of them the lives of many patients and employees might be lost. To prevent the possibility of such a disaster all these buildings should be equipped with automatic sprinkler systems.

Addition to laundry building and equipment. It is obvious that as the population of the hospital increases the demands placed upon the laundry become greater. An addition to the building and more equipment must be provided.

Addition to heating plant and equipment. As new buildings are added to the institution the capacity of the heating plant must be enlarged. It is now proposed to increase the size of the boiler house and to install additional equipment.

*Electrical power plant and distributional system.* The present generators are unable to produce sufficient electricity to supply the entire hospital, therefore a new power plant and distributional system should be installed.

Amusement hall. Each year the need of an adequate amusement hall to provide proper recreational facilities for the patients becomes more urgent, therefore an appropriation to erect a building for this purpose is again requested.

Ice plant and equipment. For several years the ice plant has been unable to supply the needs of the hospital. A modern refrigerating plant should now be constructed and equipped with adequate facilities for cold storage and the production of ice.

*Insurance.* In May, 1935, the premiums become due on the fire insurance policies covering the hospital and its equipment, therefore an appropriation to pay these is requested.

*Power elevators.* In order to prevent the constant occurrence of accidents involving both patients and employees it is proposed to

replace some of the hand operated food conveyors with electric power elevators equipped with modern safety devices.

Pumping plant and water lines. Several years ago a number of shallow wells were sunk on the hospital property and a plentiful supply of hard water suitable for irrigation and waste purposes was obtained. In order to utilize this water for irrigating the grounds a pumping plant and pipe lines must be installed.

*Kitchen equipment.* This type of equipment is subjected to constant and hard usage, therefore replacements are frequently necessary while various types of fixtures, utensils and appliances will be needed to equip the proposed new kitchens.

Bakery equipment. The Twenty-eighth General Assembly made an appropriation of ten thousand dollars for an addition to the bakery and equipment but on Mareh 6, 1933, upon receipt of an Executive Order from the Governor, approximately seven thousand dollars of this amount was turned back to the State Treasurer. Additional equipment is now needed for the bakery so an appropriation for this purpose is again requested.

*Furniture and furnishings.* Furniture and furnishings will be needed to equip the proposed new buildings as well as to replace that which has been destroyed by patients.

Automobiles and trucks. With the acquisition of more land it becomes necessary to increase the automotive equipment of the institution. It is estimated that an automobile, a heavy duty truck, a light truck, a tractor and at least two more dump trucks will be needed during the coming biennium.

*Central storeroom.* In an institution of this size all materials and supplies should be kept in a central storeroom under the direct supervision of one employee so that a constant and accurate check could be had at all times of the stock on hand. Maintenance costs could thus be reduced and the losses from theft and deterioration would be almost eliminated.

Addition to dairy barn and equipment. The size of the dairy herd is gradually being enlarged, therefore additional barn space is required to care for the increased number of eows. For hygienie and sanitary reasons electrical milking equipment and the apparatus needed to pasteurize milk should be installed.

Dormitory building at farm. The building at the farm in which patients are housed is an old dwelling constructed of adobe and briek. Extensive repairs are urgently needed but the type of eonstruction is such that remodeling is not advisable, therefore a new dormitory building should be erected.

Dining-room and kitchen for annex. The facilities for the preparation and service of food at the annex have never been satisfactory nor adequate. General repairs must soon be made to the kitchen and the dining-rooms. It is proposed, therefore, to erect a building in which the necessary facilities can be located and to remodel the present kitchen and dining-rooms to give additional housing accommodations for patients.

*Heating plant and equipment for annex.* The cost of heating the buildings at the annex increases each winter due to the fact that the present equipment is practically worn ont and ean no longer be operated economically. In order to reduce maintenance costs a new and modern heating plant should be installed.

Changing channel of Fountain River. Each summer flood waters of the Fountain River approach nearer the state property at the annex. Unless the channel of the river is changed it is only a question of time before one or more of the buildings and possibly the entire property will have to be abandoned.

General repairs and improvements. In order to reduce maintenance costs on buildings and equipment constant repairs, replacements and improvements must be made. This institution represents an investment of approximately three million dollars by the state of Colorado, therefore a reasonable amount of money should be appropriated every biennium for the repair and improvement of the property.

Maintenance. For the past six years the annual income received by the Colorado State Hospital from taxes has steadly decreased. Each year the receipts from the mill levy have been less than those of the previous year. It is evident that this decrease will prevail during the next biennium as the total valuation of property in the state is gradually being reduced. According to present estimates, therefore, an appropriation of one million dollars for maintenance will be needed during the fiseal period from July 1, 1935, to June 30, 1937.

#### SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS RECEIVED

Land and Buildings, \$300,000.00. During the first Special Session of the Twenty-ninth General Assembly an appropriation was made for the purchase of land and the construction of buildings. Two hundred and forty acres adjoining the main hospital on the north were purchased for \$17,500.00. The Executive Council then secured the services of five architectural firms to prepare plans for the proposed buildings. Arrangements were made with the Public Works Administration to secure federal aid in the payment of construction costs and a grant of \$115,500.00 was allowed. Six buildings consisting of a kitchen and dining-hall with eafeteria facilities and five dormitories for ambulatory patients are now being creeted. All the buildings are of fireproof construction and will accommodate approximately five hundred patients.

Maintenance, \$738,000.00. It is now estimated that unless some emergency arises the appropriation for maintenance will be sufficient to conduct the hospital without a deficit until the end of the present fiseal period. C. W. A. and F. E. R. A. Projects. Immediately following the inception of the C. W. A. program several projects for work at this institution were outlined and prepared. The necessary approval was obtained and in December, 1933, two projects were started. For some time four hundred and seventy-two men were employed throughout the hospital and on the grounds doing various types of common, semi-skilled, skilled and professional labor. When the C. W. A. terminated arrangements were made to continue the projects under the rules and regulations of the F. E. R. A. and at this time work is still in progress. General repairs and extensive improvements which could not otherwise have been made throughout the institution were accomplished. A detailed list of the many jobs will be found in Table No. 8 of the report of the steward.

#### Medical Report

Although the hospital has been more overcrowded during the past biennium than ever before the general health of the patients has been good with the exception of an outbreak of epidemic meningitis which occurred in the first few months of the period. Ten cases developed, nine male patients and one male employee being affected. The clinical diagnosis was confirmed by laboratory methods in each instance except one. Despite carly and active specific treatment seven deaths resulted. Careful study failed to reveal the source of the infection. All known preventative measures were used to avoid the occurrence of an extensive epidemic and this no doubt accounts for the fact that so few cases developed in the overcrowded wards. It might be of interest to know that the dormitory building in which the first case appeared and where four more occurred was originally constructed to accommodate seventy patients but one hundred and thirty-eight were being housed therein.

Improvements have been constantly made in the medical service. The clinical and pathological laboratory has been completely equipped. A modern pressure sterilizing unit was installed adjacent to the operating room. Needed instruments and other minor equipment have been provided for the surgical department. Additional changes to make the system of records concerning patients more complete were made in the medical offices and on the wards. The need of frequent consultations, laboratory studies and X-ray examinations as an aid to accurate diagnosis has been stressed. Vaccination against typhoid fever and smallpox has been a routine procedure. Specific treatment for all patients with acute or chronic diseases has been continued. Typhoid vaccine has been used in addition to malaria to produce pyrexia in cases of neurosyphilis. The existing equipment for hydrotherapy, occupational therapy and physiotherapy, although receiving constant usage, has been entirely inadequate to meet the demands of the institution. Modern facilities for all types of treatment necessary in a mental hospital should now be provided.

#### Official Changes

On February 8, 1933, Mr. Thomas A. Duke of Pueblo, President of the Colorado Board of Corrections, resigned and on the same date Mr. James P. McInroy of Denver was appointed by His Excellency, Governor Ed C. Johnson, to temporarily fill the vacancy. On February 23, 1933, the Governor appointed Mr. W. T. Mathis of Pueblo as a permanent member of the Board and on March 22, 1933, Mr. McInroy resigned. In accordance with section 38 of the Administrative Code Bill the Colorado Board of Corrections was abolished on June 30, 1933. On July 14, 1933, in accordance with section 10 of the above Act Dr. F. A. Forney of Colorado Springs, Mrs. Debora Mumper of Greeley and Rev. John R. Mulroy of Denver were appointed by the Governor as the Board of Visitors. Dr. Forney was reappointed to the Board on June 25, 1934.

On December 19, 1933, construction of a chicken ranch was started under a Civil Works Administration Project. A twenty-acre plot of land located at Twenty-fourth and High streets was fenced and graded. The following buildings were constructed: Ten laying houses, 24 ft. by 80 ft., with a capacity of 600 laying hens each; three brooder houses, 20 ft. by 22 ft.; one feed house, 24 ft. by 40 ft., and one five-room employee's residence. The total cost to the Colorado State Hospital for buildings, fences and permanent equipment was \$9,439.78. During the months of February, March and April, 1934, 15,000 Single Comb White Leghorn baby chickens were purchased. Egg production began June 18, 1934.
