#### MOVEMENT OF POPULATION

During the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1951 and ending June 30, 1952, patients admitted totaled 1028; men - 595, women - 433. The patients discharged numbered 469; men - 278, women - 191. Patients who died in the hospital totaled 493; men - 266, women - 227. The number of patients who died while absent from the hospital was 14; men - 8, women - 6. The net gain in patients on the books was only 52 whereas that of patients in the hospital was 30. During the year 875 patients were paroled and 607 were returned from parole; 190 patients escaped and 129 were returned from escape.

#### GENERAL SITUATION

Two "major problems" which have confronted the hospital for many years still exist. These are: first, "overcrowding" with its many distressing complications; and second, "lack of trained personnel" so essential for the care and treatment of the mentally ill.

Problem Number One "overcrowding" will be partially solved for a temporary period when the new buildings are occupied. However, the patient population will still be greater than the rated bed capacity of the hospital. Unless additional buildings are provided to care for the ever increasing patient population "marked overcrowding" will again result.

Problem Number Two "lack of trained personnel" can only be solved when a "realistic" salary scale is adopted for all employees so that the services of competent and qualified people, both professional and non-professional, can be secured. Unless "trained personnel" can be obtained the hospital will gradually revert to its former "asylum" status and become primarily a "custodial" institution.

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#### MEDICAL REPORT

No epidemics occurred during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952 and the general health of the patient population has been good. There has been a slight increase in the number of deaths occurring within the hospital but this is due primarily to the large number of elderly people admitted. Clinics in the various medical and surgical specialties have been held daily and as a result a high standard of "medical care" has been provided for the patients. The departments of Psychiatry, Pathology, Internal Medicine, Roentgenology, Surgery, Anesthesiology and Psychology have continued to function satisfactorily during the year.

The problem of providing adequate "medical care" for the patients during the current fiscal year beginning July 1, 1952 is grave. No action has been taken towards establishing a salary schedule which might attract competent and qualified physicians to enter mental hospital work. As a result it has been impossible to obtain the services of much needed staff physicians in the various specialties. The departments of Surgery and Anesthesiology were discontinued as of July 1, 1952 and no residents are now in these specialties. The situation in other departments is precarious and the entire resident training program of the hospital is jeopardized.

#### **TEACHING ACTIVITIES**

Training programs for resident physicians have been continued in the following specialties: Psychiatry, Pathology, Internal Medicine, Radiology, Surgery and Anesthesiology. Affiliation with the University of Colorado Medical Center has been maintained with the School of Medicine for the teaching of residents and with the School of Nursing for the training of nurses in Psychiatry. Other training activities being conducted by the hospital staff are as follows: the interneship program for graduates in Dietetics; the school for

Medical Technologists; the course for X-Ray Technicians; the training of Psychiatric Aides; and the in-service training courses for attendants and other employees. The hospital is also affiliated with the Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College at Fort Collins, Colorado, with the University of Kansas at Lawrence, Kansas and with the Texas State College for Women at Denton, Texas for the training of Occupational Therapists in Psychiatry.

#### BUILDING PROGRAM

Construction work on the new buildings is practically completed and most of the equipment has either been installed or is in transit. Occupation of the buildings is anticipated before January 1, 1953 despite the fact that much work remains to be done on the utility systems. A completion date for the work on this project has not been determined but assurance has been given by the architects that this will not delay the occupation of the buildings.

#### MAINTENANCE APPROPRIATION FOR FISCAL YEAR 1951 - 1952

The maintenance appropriation of \$4,500,000 plus the tax receipts and earnings of the institution proved sufficient for the fiscal year. This was due to the fact that the new buildings could not be occupied as certain contractors had not completed their work projects.

## MAINTENANCE APPROPRIATION FOR FISCAL YEAR 1952 - 1953

It now appears that the maintenance appropriation of \$5,350,000 for the current fiscal year together with the balance in the tax fund, the tax receipts and the earnings of the hospital will be adequate. This, likewise, is due to the fact that the new buildings could not be occupied when anticipated.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

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<u>First</u>: A decision should be made at once as to the future status of this institution, i. e., shall it be conducted and operated as a "hospital" or as an "asylum".

<u>Second</u>: If it is to continue as a hospital, action should be taken immediately to provide (I) a "realistic" salary schedule for all personnel, and (II) a new receiving and hospital unit with proper facilities and equipment so necessary for the modern care and treatment of the "mentally ill".

<u>Third</u>: If it is to revert to an "asylum" the second recommendation can be disregarded entirely.
