MOVEMENT OF POPULATION

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1956, 1286 patients (794 male and 492 female) were admitted. Patients discharged totaled 645 (448 males and 197 females) while 603 patients (310 males and 293 females) died in the hospital. Eleven patients (9 men and 2 women) who were still on the books died while absent from the hospital. The net gain in patients on the books was 37; whereas, there was a net loss of 162 patients in the hospital at the end of the period. 1670 patients (724 males and 946 females) were paroled during the year; whereas, 1234 (507 males and 727 females) were returned. In addition 2092 patients (911 males and 1181 females) were granted trial visits, of whom 2048 (888 males and 1160 females) were returned. 220 patients (187 males and 33 females) escaped from the hospital, and 169 patients (149 males and 20 females) were returned from escape. 5558 patients (2873 males and 2685 females) were in residence at the hospital on June 30, 1956, and 10 male patients were still being held for safe keeping at the Colorado State Penitentiary, Canon City, Colorado.

MEDICAL REPORT

Despite the fact that the hospital has continued to be "under-staffed" and "over-crowded" the general health of the patients has been good and no epidemics have developed during the past fiscal year. The medical and surgical care for the patients has been improved by the addition of local and out of town specialists to the attending staff. Unfortunately, it has not been possible to obtain such help in psychiatry

as there is a shortage of psychiatrists in the community, as well as throughout the state. Consequently the need for staff psychiatrists becomes more and more acute.

Towards the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1954, the use of the new tranquilizing "drugs" was begun. Preliminary results appeared so promising that a more extensive use seemed indicated. The drugs used were Chlorpromazine and the Rauwolfia alkaloids. At the end of the fiscal year 1956, approximately 2400 patients had received, or were receiving, these drugs. As a result there has been a marked change in the atmosphere of the hospital. Many patients have been relieved of their distressing symptoms with a decline in restraint, electro-shock, insulin, and hydrotherapy. There is less destruction of property and fewer injuries. There is more opportunity and need for personal contact by competent psychiatrists and psychiatric nursing personnel. There is increasing need for occupational and recreational therapists, and properly staffed social service and rehabilitation departments. Increasing numbers of patients are leaving the hospital, and for the first time in the history of the hospital the census has declined in spite of a slowly increasing rate of admissions.

In summation - with more patients accessible to psychotherapy and other types of treatment, the need for more highly trained personnel becomes a must if the institution is to function as a mental hospital.

NEEDS OF THE HOSPITAL

As has been stated, for many years the Colorado State Hospital has been "under-staffed" and "over-crowded". These conditions still exist and will continue until such time as the legislature acts to relieve them. The only solution to the problem of "under-staffing" is a "realistic" salary scale which will attract and retain trained professional personnel. The last legislature at least made an effort to relieve "over-crowding" by approving a five-year building program, to be financed by a mill levy, but it now appears that this will be insufficient to provide adequate facilities needed by the hospital.

TEACHING ACTIVITIES

Numerous training programs are in operation throughout the hospital, both on the professional and non-professional levels. The affiliation with the University of Colorado Medical Center in Denver has been continued with both the School of Medicine for the training of resident physicians, and with the School of Nursing for the training of nurses in Psychiatry.

The hospital is fully accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, and the residency training programs in Psychiatry, Internal Medicine, Surgery and Pathology have been approved by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association, as well as by the Specialty Boards. These programs have also been approved

by the United States Department of State for training of foreign students under the Exchange-Visitor Program; the hospital number being P-1304. Non-approved residency programs are conducted in Roentgenology and Anesthesiology.

Affiliations are maintained with the Presbyterian Hospital and St. Joseph Hospital in Denver, Colorado and with the Corwin Hospital and Parkview Episcopal Hospital in Pueblo, Colorado, so that residents become familiar with the practice of medicine in private general hospitals. Teaching activities are performed by members of the Colorado State Hospital Staff, by physicians from the University of Colorado Medical Center, and by other qualified physicians from Pueblo, Colorado Springs, and Denver.

The hospital maintains a School of Medical Technologists, which is approved by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, and an Internship program for graduate Dietitians, which is approved by the American Dietetic Association. A training program for Psychiatric Aides is also conducted by the hospital. The hospital is affiliated with the Pueblo College in Pueblo, Western State College in Gunnison, Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College at Fort Collins, University of Kansas at Lawrence, Kansas, University of Minnesota at Minneapolis, Minnesota, and with various hospitals in the western states for the training of medical technologists, x-ray technicians, occupational therapists, and psychiatric nurses.

In the Occupational Therapy Department classes are held for patients who had not completed the grade or high school work prior to their admission to the hospital, and certificates are granted when the courses are satisfactorily completed. Special training courses have been provided for many patients through the cooperation of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the State Board for Vocational Rehabilitation.

CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

No new buildings have been constructed during the past fiscal year, but the contracts for expanding and reconditioning the central heating plant and for the replacing of roofs on twenty-three buildings have been completed. Plans are being prepared for new buildings authorized under the new five-year mill levy building program.

MAINTENANCE APPROPRIATION FOR FISCAL YEAR 1955-1956

Due to the fact that the income from earnings of the hospital increased beyond expectations, the appropriation of \$4,900,000 from the General Fund was adequate, and no deficit occurred.

MAINTENANCE APPROPRIATION FOR
FISCAL YEAR 1956-1957

The appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1956 is \$4,600,000 plus the tax receipts and earnings of the hospital. Due to these facts: first - the employees were placed on a five-day week; and, second - there was a salary increase granted all employees, except physicians, the amount appropriated will be insufficient, and a deficit will occur at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1957.
