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## STATEMENT

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The Industrial Commission administers the Workmen's Compensation Act, the Industrial Relations Law and the Minimum Wage and Labor Law for Women and Minors.

Under the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act there was created a State Compensation Insurance Fund, which is administered by the Industrial Commission.

The Commission is required to make annual reports to the Governor of its work in the administration of the Workmen's Compensation Act and the Industrial Relations Law for each yearly period ending December 1st, and to report biennially to the Governor and to the General Assembly (which convenes on the first Wednesday in January of each alternate year) of its work in the administration of the Minimum Wage Law.

This report covers the work of the Industrial Commission in its administration of the Workmen's Compensation Act, (including the State Compensation Insurance Fund) and the Industrial Relations Law, from December 1, 1919, to December 1, 1920, and of the Minimum Wage and Labor Law for Women and Minors, for the biennial period ending January 1, 1921.

The Industrial Commission desires to express its appreciation of the hearty co-operation of the Commissioner of Mines and the Chief Inspector of Coal Mines, in matters of inspection and reports, and for the energetic and efficient service rendered by Attorney General Victor E. Keyes, Deputy Attorney General Charles Roach and Assistant Attorney General John S. Fine, who for the past biennial period have had charge of practically all the cases in the District Courts throughout the state and in the Supreme Court, to which the Industrial Commission has been a party.

# THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION LAW

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The Compensation Act of 1919 has been found to be far superior to the previous Acts and especially in the procedure and administrative features thereof.

No compensation act can do exact justice. The character and situation of the claimants and dependents are so varied that no statute could lay down rules of sufficient detail to take care of the many peculiar situations and do justice exactly in every case. Examples of this statement could be multiplied indefinitely and for illustration we will call attention only to one or two circumstances affecting one single class of dependents, to-wit: widows. The amount of compensation that should be paid to a widow of sixty-five years of age who has passed the years of usefulness cannot be measured in the same terms as the young widow of twenty to thirty years of age in the full vigor of her mental and physical faculties. Again the widow of fifty in full health might be more vigorous physically and mentally than an invalid of twenty-five. A widow with five children of age sufficient to assist in her support can subsist nicely on an allowance upon which the widow with five small children needing her constant attention would starve. It is true that many cases appeal to the deepest sympathy of the officers administering this Act, yet they realize the impossibility of enacting any statute that will correct all such injustices. However, the Commission felt that a provision for benefits increasing within certain limits in proportion to the number of dependent children would be feasible and practicable and the Commission is willing to lend its assistance in the preparation of legislation along this line. The Commission does not feel that it should suggest increases or decreases in the amount of benefits to be paid under the law, as this is entirely a legislative question, but that it is the duty of this Commission to administer the law that is given and the recommendations made in this report by the Commission should extend entirely to matters affecting administration or procedure.

## SELF INSURANCE

Section 29 of the Colorado Workmen's Compensation Law provides that the Commission may, in its discretion upon proper showing by the employers, grant to such employers the privilege of paying compensation direct to their employees.

Most of these self-insurers are required to furnish indemnity bonds, the amounts to be determined by the number of employees.

the hazard of the risk and the amount of property of the employer in this state.

The Commission holds indemnity bonds of self-insurers in the amount of \$580,000.00. In addition to this amount there is deposited in trust under the exclusive control of the Commission, United States bonds of the par value of \$128,000.00, all held by the Commission as a guaranty of the compliance by the self-insurer with the requirements of the Compensation Act and the orders of the Commission.

Each self-insurer is required to set up reserves to cover incurred losses.

Reserves set up by self-insurers are protected by the deposit in trust, subject to the exclusive control of the Commission, United States bonds to the amount of \$532,550.00, cash \$24,106.84 and other approved securities of the par value of \$15,000.00. Reserves are computed at regular periods according to Table C of the Casualty and Actuarial Statistical Society and the Danish Survivorship Annuitants Table of the Dutch Royal Insurance Institute.

Self-insurance Permits are subject to cancellation by the Commission at any time.

## STATISTICS--WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION DEPARTMENT

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The statistical table covering this department is arranged so that yearly comparisons may be more readily made. The enactment of the new Workmen's Compensation law, which became effective May 1, 1919, shortened the disability waiting period before compensation payments became operative from two weeks to ten days. This reduction has increased the number of accident reports filed with the Industrial Commission during the current year by 2,921 as compared with those filed during 1919, even though the 1919 report includes seven months operation under the shortened waiting period.

The volume of business handled by the statistical department has steadily increased and will continue to increase for a number of years before the first cases or claims will be fully compensated and closed up. This is brought about by a clause in the law which provides that a claimant may file a claim for further disability at any time within five years from the date of his injury, and by the further fact that payments on fatal or death claims, permanent total, permanent partial and specific injury claims extend over an indefinite period of years.

During the current year a thorough study of the needs of the Statistical Department was made and adequate machinery has been ordered installed to take care of this important branch of the Commission. By means of the Hollerith system of tabulating accident statistics much valuable information which has not been available heretofore can be compiled at a minimum cost in labor and time. The data contained in all previous accident reports filed with the Commission is to be worked out at the earliest possible date, as at present it is of little use or value to the Commission in arriving at definite conclusions as to accident prevention measures, or experience rating for premiums to be charged for compensation insurance.

The work of computing reserves on future compensation liabilities for accident reports filed with the Commission; also computations in connection with lump sum settlements as granted claimants, have been greatly facilitated by the addition to the Statistical Department of an electrically driven combined adding and calculating machine.

The total number of compensation awards entered by the Industrial Commission and Referees have also been tabulated into several groups by years. By reference to this table it is to be

noted that 3,411 such awards have been entered since the Compensation law first became operative on August 1, 1915. The 1915 and 1917 Acts made no provision for a Referee, hence no compensation awards are shown as being made by the Referees during 1915-16, 1917, 1918 and the first five months of 1919. A large yearly increase is shown in the number of awards handled, especially by the Referees during 1920 as compared to the seven months' period included in 1919.

A decrease of 39, as compared to 1919, is shown in the number of lump sum settlement awards, 127 such applications having been filed and passed upon by the Commission during 1920, 82 of which were granted and 45 denied. The term "Lump Sum Settlement" should not be construed as damages for a given accident, but is purely an advance payment of compensation money previously awarded by the Commission to be paid at stated weekly or monthly periods. Such lump sum payments are granted only where the money so advanced is to be used for the best interests of the claimant, and then in conformity with Sections 82 and 55 of the Workmen's Compensation Act of 1919.

Where minors and incompetent adults are not dependent on their compensation payments for maintenance, the Commission has deemed it for the best interest of such beneficiaries to order savings accounts, drawing four per cent interest, to be opened in their individual names in banks which are under bond to the Commission. Compensation payments, as they become due and payable from the insurance carrier, are credited to these savings accounts and no withdrawals are permitted except on written order signed by the Industrial Commission.

Complete records of these transactions are kept by the Statistical Department and a careful check is maintained to see that payments are made promptly to the banks and that interest earned is credited to the accounts. Direct supervision of each account is thus maintained by the Commission until such time as a more urgent need of funds may arise to the beneficiaries.

## WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION CLAIM DEPARTMENT

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The Claim Department is charged with the detail work required in carrying out the Compensation Law of Colorado; as such it receives and files all First Reports of Accidents, Supplemental Reports, Physicians' Reports, Agreements relating to Compensation, Receipts for Compensation Payments, Claims filed for Compensation, Final Receipts on Compensation, and conducts such hearings relating to compensation claims or agreements as are required by law.

Since May 1st, 1919, all hearings are conducted by a Referee whose decision is final unless a review is sought by either party, in which case the Commission reviews the record theretofore made, and upon such review makes such further order as, in their judgment, the case may require.

Below will be found a tabulated statement of the Accidents, Claims, Agreements and Awards handled by the Department for the year beginning December 1st, 1919, and ending December 1st, 1920.

There is also included a statement, prepared by the Statistical Department, as to the Accidents, Claims, Agreements and awards for the current year beginning December 1st, 1919, and ending December 1st, 1920. A study of these figures will be instructive as to the growth of the volume of business handled by this Department, and also indicate, to some extent at least, the growth that may be expected in the future.

## WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE, PREMIUM INCOME AND LOSSES, COLORADO

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As a convenient means of determining the growth of compensation insurance business in the State of Colorado since August 1, 1915, an Exhibit of "Premium Income and Losses Incurred" has been prepared, dividing the total business written by years into three groups, namely: Stock Companies, Mutual Companies and the State Compensation Insurance Fund.

During the year 1919, the shortage of labor, the high wages demanded, curtailment of production, labor strikes and many other factors, resulted in a decrease in premium income, especially in the mining industry, a large proportion of which is insured with the State Compensation Insurance Fund.

No figures are at present available for the year 1920(\*) as the Annual Reports of the insurance carriers are not required to be filed with the Colorado Insurance Department until after January 1, 1921. However, figures for the first eleven months' business of 1920 have been included for the State Fund, which shows a material increase in the business handled by this Department of the Industrial Commission.

# STATE COMPENSATION INSURANCE FUND

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This report is a showing of the financial condition of the State Compensation Insurance Fund, at the close of the fiscal year, November 30, 1920, and a careful examination of the figures and statements will give a very clear conception of the volume of business transacted by this department and its remarkably healthy growth and expansion since its organization as the compensation insurance department of the Industrial Commission.

The Fund has declared two dividends during the past year, amounting to 15% of all premiums received from private employers. The total dividends paid to private employers to date amount to \$108,491.69, not including a dividend of \$22,698.00, which has been declared for the six months ending December 31, 1920, and is being credited on January 1st premium statements.

On account of the lower rates at which insurance in the Fund is written as compared with insurance in stock companies, the Fund has saved its policyholders more than \$125,000.00 in premiums since its organization, which, together with the dividends which have been declared, makes a total saving to policyholders in the Fund of more than a quarter of a million dollars.

These same employers would now be paying 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ % more for their insurance if they were insured in private stock companies without any increase in protection or service.

The liabilities of the Fund are computed on the "capital reserve plan," rather than on the "assessment plan," so that no dividends are paid until the full reserves for all outstanding losses have been computed and set aside as a liability. In this way, each year's premiums are made to pay all of the incurred losses sustained during the year. Thus new policyholders coming into the Fund pay for insurance covering losses incurred only during the period which their policies are in effect and are not obliged to pay for outstanding losses which have accumulated in the past, as would be the case if business were done on the assessment plan.

A dividend was also declared to School Districts equal to 50% of premiums earned during the year ending June 30, 1920.

On January 1, 1920, an entirely new system of accounts was installed and the business of the Fund placed upon a "written" basis, in accordance with the requirements of the Insurance Department, and in accordance with the usual custom of companies writing this form of insurance.

This system has proven of considerable value in the development of a financial statement as required by the Insurance Department. Its value is evident also, of course, as a means of obtaining detailed information at any time as to the amount of business written by the Fund during any period.

A loss register has also been installed. This is a series of bound volumes, in which each accident is registered in numerical order and detailed information given as to the nature of the injury, the period of disability, etc., as well as a record of each payment of compensation or medical expense. This has proven to be valuable as a permanent record of losses paid.

The Fund, in co-operation with Mr. Wm. R. Shaw, Statistician of the Commission, has devised cards for use in tabulating statistics by the Hollerith system, which is now being installed.

Every improvement in the method of handling compensation insurance business entails some additional work. There is no denying the fact, however, that no company can long remain in this business unless it keeps abreast with the approved methods of operation.

The amount of work involved in handling claims has continued to increase as evidenced by the fact that many more vouchers have been issued so far this year than were issued during the year 1919, and many more accidents reported than were reported during the year 1919. This increase in claim work is partly due to the fact that the amount of business written by the Fund in 1920 will exceed by nearly 50% the amount written during 1919. Every year, however, there must be taken care of an accumulation of open cases which have occurred during the preceding years.

The voucher and warrant system of making compensation payments is unwieldy and cumbersome, entailing an undue amount of clerical work and in many instances results in unreasonable delay in making such payments and the Commission recommends that such changes and amendments be made to the present law as will authorize the installation of a more efficient system of payment.

The law provides that the Commission shall in writing authorize and direct the State Treasurer to invest any portion of the State Compensation Insurance Fund, which in the judgment of the Commission is not needed for immediate use, and such investments are limited to warrants or bonds of the State of Colorado or of the United States of America.

Attention is directed to the large cash balance carried by the State Fund, as shown by the financial statement. It is the evident intention of the law that the assets of the Fund be kept invested in securities, designated by the Act, and such investments are made upon the authority and direction of the Industrial Commission, and the securities in which the assets of the Fund have been so invested are shown in the accompanying financial statement.

On November 30, 1920, we had cash on deposit with the State Treasurer in the amount of \$164,264.25, as shown by the attached financial statement, of which at least \$140,000.00 was available for investment, the balance of \$24,264.25 being amply sufficient for current needs.

On September 2, 1920, the Commission directed the State Treasurer, as provided by Section 141 of the Colorado Workmen's Compensation Law of 1919, to invest \$100,000.00 of the State Compensation Insurance Fund in Fourth Liberty Loan Bonds. This investment had not been made on November 30th, the date of this report.

The Liberty Bond market, during the past several months, has presented unusual opportunities for the very choicest kind of investment, both from the standpoint of security of principal and interest yield. Our cash balance brings us only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent interest, whereas, Liberty Bond investments would yield from five to six per cent, or even better. As Liberty Bond prices increase, this unprecedented opportunity to increase the average interest earnings of the Fund will be lost.

As shown by the accompanying financial statement, the assets of the Fund have now passed the million dollar mark and the business written during the current year will amount to practically half a million dollars. The business of the Fund is becoming better distributed among the various classes of industry in the state. There is probably no business in the state of the size of this organization which is as complicated or which requires the amount of specialized work upon the part of its employees. It has practically the same problems to meet as any of the great stock companies which require the employment of hundreds of persons and so far as advised is the only department of the state which comes into competition with efficiently managed private institutions of like character and its ability to hold and develop business in the face of such active competition is very clearly reflected by its remarkable growth and present financial condition and by the further fact that the State Fund is now writing more business than any other insurance carrier in the state.

This \$300,147.14 of Private Premiums represents an increase of \$92,995.65 over private business of 1919, so that the total increase in this class of business for the full year of 1920 will approximate 50% over last year's business.

"**Unpaid Premiums.**" This item includes \$3,790.51 due from private employers, all of which is less than 90 days' overdue. The balance of the \$58,926.16 is due from various Cities, Counties, Irrigation Districts and School Districts.

"**Total Assets.**" The assets of the Fund have now passed the million dollar mark, as shown by this item. When the Fund started business less than 5½ years ago with neither assets nor business on its books, many employers were skeptical of the ultimate success of such an institution. The financial position of the Fund is unassailable and it is obtaining business on the strength of the confidence which employers in the state now have in its ability to give absolute protection.

"**Special Reserve for Adjustment of Public Premiums and Dividends.**" The 1919 Act resulted in considerable adjustment of public premiums, especially School Districts, which were made retroactive to August 1st, 1915. This item of \$52,340.67 represents an estimate of the balance due policyholders on account of this adjustment, which has not as yet been completed.

"**Surplus Over All Liabilities.**" This item of \$262,382.85 represents an increase of more than \$91,000.00 over the surplus of December 31st, 1919.

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\*\*This dividend was the first declared to public employers since the Compensation Act went into effect and covered a period of three years. At that time public premiums were written at a flat rate of 1%, which made the dividend apportionment larger than would have been the case if premiums were written as at present at rates based upon the various hazards of employment. The present method became effective May 1, 1919, in accordance with the provisions of the Compensation Act of 1919.

# THE INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS LAW

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Colorado, until the National Coal Strike of 1919, was the only state in the Union that had an Industrial Relations Act or any act intended to protect the public or conciliate in the struggle between employers and employes. The State of Colorado through the prompt action of its Governor and the continued efforts of the Commission was the only state in the Union that had anything near a normal output of coal for the month of December, 1919, and the people of this state should realize that this was only possible through the administration of its Industrial Relations Law. However, that struggle and the struggles that have preceded and followed it have demonstrated many weaknesses in our law that should be remedied for the benefit both of capital and of labor and for the benefit also of the great mass of the people composing the too often indifferent public. The best laws we have are those that are the result of evolution and the Colorado law is a splendid framework upon which to build. There have been some violations of our present Act, but practically every strike that has been called in violation of our Act has been unsuccessful and we are watching now very carefully a lockout which we consider as a direct violation thereof. Either side that breaks the law not only has to contend against his adversary but also against public opinion.

Any amendments to the law should be such amendments as will make the law equally enforceable against and equally powerful to reach both employer and employe. Restrictions contained in industrial legislation that curb the activities of labor and labor unions when wages are on the increase must also be a restraining hand against the employer and capital when wages are on the decline. In the administration of the Colorado law the greatest difficulty encountered by the Commission has been the delay in obtaining judicial action. It is proper that the courts should proceed with care and caution and see that the rights of all citizens are protected. Yet the Commission feels that "due process of law" was entirely too long in becoming due when an agreed statement of facts was submitted and argued to a court of this state in the month of February and no decision was rendered by that court until the following September. The Constitution intended to guarantee to every citizen charged with crime a speedy trial and it is not fair to either the indicted defendant nor to the public that criminal matters be delayed to any such extent as mentioned. It is the contention of some of the interested parties, particularly of the labor unions, that the In-

dustrial Relations Act is unconstitutional and cannot be enforced and this attitude when coupled with the delays encountered in the courts has been a great drawback to the activities of the Commission. An honest endeavor has been made to have these presented to our Supreme Court. Some of the questions raised are now before the Supreme Court and when decided will be of general assistance not only in this state, but elsewhere.

The opinion of the Attorney General given this Commission on many occasions is to the effect that the law is constitutional and enforceable and we have proceeded accordingly.

### SUGGESTED AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the law are suggested by the Commission as follows:

The Industrial Relations Act should be amended to make it more definite and specific and to eliminate provisos that, instead of protecting certain rights, create doubt. The law should be more definite as to the manner of giving the required notice.

Inasmuch as the Commission is not a Court and a violation of the Industrial Law pending a hearing and decision by the Commission nullifies the whole intent thereof, a provision should be inserted giving the District Courts of the state jurisdiction and authority to act immediately upon the application of the Commission and require and order the contesting parties to obey the terms and mandates of the law and to keep the conditions of the industry both as to employer and employe in statu quo until a final hearing and disposition of the case by the Commission. This proceeding would require the prompt action of the Court and would not be subject to the delays encountered in attempting to enforce the criminal provisions of the law.

A strike and particularly a lock-out should be defined in broad terms to prevent evasion of the statute.

The strike of the employes of The Denver Tramway Company should be particularly mentioned. The preliminary history of the events leading up to this controversy appears in a cursory manner in the awards of the Commission.

For brevity, the different wage scales that obtained in this industry will be spoken of herein with reference to the scale paid conductors after a certain term of employment.

The War Labor Board, after a hearing, granted a wage scale of forty-eight cents per hour. A contract based upon this scale was entered into between employer and employes and contained certain provisions for arbitration and other provisions for cancellation of the contract. An arbitration was had and awarded a wage scale of fifty-eight cents per hour. The company then proceeded to a cancellation of the contract and so notified the men and this Commission and also gave notice of intention to

reduce wages to forty-eight cents per hour (the War Labor Board scale) commencing June 1st, 1920. The Commission held a hearing on this controversy and made a thorough investigation and found that the company upon a six cent street car fare could not pay more than a forty-eight cent per hour wage and that in order to continue the payment of the fifty-eight cent wage a fare of at least seven cents was necessary and emphatically recommended that the proper rate-fixing body proceed to determine and put into effect a proper street car fare.

The city administration completely ignored the recommendations of this Commission and brought suit in the District Court of Denver for the purpose of practically compelling the company to maintain service irrespective of wage cost and enjoining a reduction of wages and restraining the employes from striking.

After the entry by the Court of certain orders in said suit against the company, the employes filed notice with this Commission on July 2, 1920, of a demand for an increase in wages to seventy-five cents per hour, effective August 1, 1920.

This Commission after ascertaining that there had been no material changes of circumstances since its prior award, entered its findings upon the demands of the employes to that effect, inasmuch as a hearing under such circumstances would be a useless waste of time and money.

It was a physical impossibility for the company to pay out money it did not receive. The city authorities failed to take any steps to provide a reasonable revenue and to determine or to provide such revenues were beyond the jurisdiction of this Commission.

An appeal could not be made to the State Utilities Commission as the courts had decided that the rate fixing power of that Commission did not extend to the City of Denver.

The employes went on strike August 1, 1920. There was a complete tie-up of the street car system. Strike breakers were imported, and following attempts to operate, riots and bloodshed ensued and finally Federal troops intervened. The strike was lost.

Had the proper city authorities followed the recommendations of this Commission as to investigating, fixing and authorizing a proper street car fare the strike could undoubtedly have been avoided.

However, it can be said that the voters of Denver had their opportunity to prevent the trouble when voting upon the questions submitted to them by the Committee appointed to investigate. Attention should be called to the fact that the labor bodies of Denver refused to endorse an increase in street car fares in face of a direct appeal to them to that end by the employes of the Tramway Company. Everyone seemed to feel the need of an increase in his own wages, but refused the smallest sacrifice to aid his fellow worker.

## SUMMARY OF INDUSTRIAL CASES

During the year ending November 30, 1920, there were one hundred seven cases of industrial disputes reported to the Commission, most of which arose out of demands on the part of the employes for increases in wages. Forty of these cases were settled by or arbitrated through the Commission. Thirty-eight were settled by mutual agreement or compromise. Demands were granted in eleven cases. Demands were withdrawn in three cases. Six cases resulted in strikes, of which three were settled and three unsettled. In four cases the Commission has no record of settlement. The number of employes involved in settled strikes, 2,216; number of employes involved in unsettled strikes, 1,220; (Denver Tramway, 1,100, and two other employers, 120.) Average duration of settled strikes, twenty-four days. Average loss of time per employe in settled strikes, 15.65 days. Wage reductions made and accepted, none reported. At the date of this report, November 30, 1920, there are pending nine cases, in some of which negotiations between the parties are progressing and there are no employes on strike or lock-out at this date.

The following are industrial disputes reported to the Commission during the year ending November 30, 1920. Lack of space will not permit of more than a brief reference to each case. All industrial disputes are investigated by a member or representative of the Commission. In some cases an informal hearing is held; in some a meeting of all parties is called, to encourage negotiations looking to settlement and in some cases a formal hearing is conducted and findings and award entered:

## CHANGES IN THE COST OF LIVING, DENVER, COLORADO

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The changes in the minimum cost of living for the year ending December 1, 1920, are shown by a continuation in the statistical tables and charts as previously prepared—a complete summary of which appears in the Second Annual Report of the Industrial Commission of Colorado for the year 1918. A supplemental report covering the year December 1, 1918, to December 1, 1919, appears in the Third Annual Report of the Industrial Commission for 1919.

In the original investigation no attempt was made to collect and compile budgets of local families but a family of five was adopted as a unit for measuring costs. The number in the family and the ages of the children conform very closely to those as used by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and represents generally the average existing family in the United States. The requirements of this family were determined from a careful study of the then existing family budgets as used by other agencies in similar investigations and serves more as a convenient means of measurement than as a fair definition of the cost of living. This budget is not intended, nor should it be taken, as an ideal budget for it does not include many comforts which should be included in an ideal American Standard of Living. The tables are to be used to obtain the percentage of increase or decrease between given dates.

As stated in a former report, various budget levels or standards of living have been adopted by investigating boards throughout the country, the three principal ones being distinguished as 1., "The Pauper or Poverty Level"; 2., "The Minimum or Subsistence Level"; and 3., "The Minimum or Comfort Level." The computations covered by this investigation are on a basis of the "Minimum or Subsistence Level," and should not be confused or compared with percentages or totals which are based upon the "Minimum or Comfort Level" investigations. The standard originally adopted as of January 1, 1914, has been followed in its entirety, no change of any kind having been made in the lists, quantities or qualities used. The annual budget level has been maintained by totaling the current prices on each of the individual items composing the budget, the retail prices of which have been supplied by the same firms at weekly or monthly intervals since the investigation was first undertaken.

There are also other local factors which should be taken into consideration. All reports and investigations concede that Den-

ver is one of the cities in the United States where the purchasing power of the worker's dollar brings the largest net returns. Again, it is a well known fact that the standard of living is raised in proportion to the increase in the family income. It is believed that the war time prosperity which the nation at large has enjoyed, has had a tendency to raise the former standard of living during the past two years, not only in Denver, but the United States as a whole.

The "Comparative Yearly Totals," Table I, are more readily interpreted by graphic Chart "A," which shows the proportionate increase at semi-annual periods, while Chart "B" covers the same purpose by months on an "Index Number" basis. Food is included in Chart "B" to more readily show the relative increase of this item to the total of all items combined.

The ordinary "Arithmetic" scale has been used in preparing these graphic charts in preference to the "Logarithmic" or "Ratio" method. The "Arithmetic" scale is clearly one of fixed relations between the numbers composing it, while the "Logarithmic" or "Ratio" scale, on the contrary, has constantly changing relations between the numbers composing it, which make a thorough interpretation or understanding of changing levels rather difficult to those not familiar with this plan.

The various subdivisions of the yearly totals as shown in Table I are to be noted under their several headings in Table II, "Comparative Yearly Totals—Including Items." Using January 1, 1914, as an "Index Number of 100," the monthly variations can be more easily followed under Column X, Table II, and also in graphic Chart "B." By reference to these it will be found that the highest point reached for the total cost of living is shown during June-July, 1920. Since this date the costs of food, textiles, clothing, shoes and wearing apparel in general have declined somewhat and there is every economic indication that they will continue to decrease for an indefinite period. The price of fuel has increased while house rent appears to be stationary; very little change is to be noted in sundry items.





CHART "A"—COMPARATIVE YEARLY TOTALS—CHANGES IN
