STATEMENT

The within report covers briefly the work of the Industrial Commission of Colorado during the year ending November 30th, 1921, in the administration of the Workmen's Compensation Act, the Industrial Relations Act, the State Compensation Insurance Fund, and the Colorado Minimum Wage Law.

The past year has been one of unusual activity in the various departments. This is undoubtedly the natural result of the readjustment period we are passing through. Many matters are presented for the consideration of the Commission which under ordinary conditions would not be given attention, being considered too insignificant to justify any action. Constantly changing costs, the tendency toward lower wage scales and increasing unemployment brings many inquiries regarding the provisions of the Industrial Relations Law and many claims for compensation for forgotten accidents. Changes in compensation insurance rates have greatly increased during 1921, the tendency being downward. All such rates must be approved by the Commission before becoming effective. Although handicapped by lack of help in its various departments the work of the Commission is in fairly satisfactory shape at the close of the year, though its activities have been necessarily limited in many directions contemplated by the Acts.

In compiling its annual report it has been the endeavor of the Commission to include only those matters essential and to treat them as concisely as possible.

The Commission wishes to thank its employees for their unusual loyalty and willing service and to express its appreciation of the assistance and co-operation it has received from other State Offices and Departments.

The Commission recommended to the Twenty-third General Assembly a number of changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act and the Industrial Relations Act, and also recommended that provision be made for funds necessary to make the Minimum Wage Act operative.

The recommendations as to the Industrial Relations Act were embodied in an amendatory act passed by the legislature and approved April 4th, 1921.

A bill to amend the Compensation Act in accordance with the recommendations of the Commission was defeated as the result of a fight for control of the moneys in the State Compensation Fund, the present law giving the Commission the discretion of the investment of the Fund.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION LAW

Although the Twenty-third General Assembly did not enact into law any of the amendments recommended by the Industrial Commission, many of which were important to the proper administration of the Act, and were presented as the result of the Commission's experience in administration of the Act of 1919, the Commission has been able to conduct the department with fairly satisfactory results. Many of the ambiguities of the Act have been cleared by court decisions and others are in process of adjudication.

The Act as a whole is good and, no doubt, will be improved by future legislative enactments.

The only amendment to the Act passed by the last general assembly was one requiring the State Compensation Insurance Fund to pay its expenses from its interest earnings.

POLICY FORMS

Section 22 of our Act provides that the Commission may from time to time approve and prescribe a standard or universal form, as nearly as possible, for every contract or policy of insurance, endorsement, rider, letter, or other document affecting such contract for use in insuring compensation liability. Pursuant to this Statute, a standard policy for Colorado has heretofore been adopted and is now in use by all companies writing compensation insurance, with the exception of the Travelers Insurance Company and the Aetna Life Insurance Company. These two companies deny the right of the Commission to prescribe a standard form.

In those cases where the employer has effected insurance with either of the two companies above named, the Commission has withheld approval of compensation agreements and in several cases has penalized the employer as provided by law, holding that inasmuch as the policy issued did not conform to the standard policy form adopted by the Commission that such employers were, in fact, without compensation insurance.

The District Court of the City and County of Denver in one test case brought for that purpose, has ruled that the Commission has the right to prescribe the form. This case is now being taken to the Supreme Court for final decision as to the validity of this Section of the Law. Other cases will undoubtedly follow this case and will involve the question as to whether the policy forms used by these two companies are a compliance with the Law. The Supreme Court decision on these various points will be looked

forward to with more than usual interest by those interested in the Compensation Act.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE PREMIUM INCOME AND LOSSES, COLORADO.

As a convenient means of determining the growth of compensation insurance business in the State of Colorado since August 1, 1915, an Exhibit of "Premium Income and Losses Paid" has been prepared (See page 7), dividing the total business written by years into three groups, namely: Stock Companies, Mutual Companies and the State Compensation Insurance Fund.

The prosperity enjoyed during 1920, especially in Colorado, is demonstrated very forcibly by an increase of \$469,190.43 in premiums collected for Workmen's Compensation Insurance over that of 1919, over two-fifths of which gain was experienced by the State Compensation Insurance Fund. However, it will be seen that the stock and mutual companies each shared in the increased business very substantially.

The general business depression experienced during the current year in all classes of industries, more especially that of metal mining will, it is believed, cause a noticeable decrease in the premium income for 1921. No figures are at present available for 1921 (*) as the Annual Reports of the insurance carriers are not required to be filed with the Colorado Insurance Department until after January 1, 1922. However, figures for the first eleven months' business of 1921 have been included for the State Fund, which shows a material decrease in the business handled by this Department of the Industrial Commission, regardless of the fact that many new policies have been issued during this period covering several large industries throughout the state, and the further fact that the Fund still maintains its position as the leading compensation insurance carrier in the state.

SELF INSURANCE

(See Section 29, Workmen's Compensation Act.)

The Industrial Commission of Colorado may, in its discretion, grant permission to an employer to pay compensation direct to his employees in lieu of effecting insurance covering his liability under the Workmen's Compensation Act. A number of employers have been granted Self Insurance Permits, but the scheme has not become general as very few feel able to carry their own insurance. In 1918 there were 43 permits granted; in 1919, 47; in 1920, 50 and in 1921, 53. All Self Insurance Permits have been to corporations; no individuals having applied. Self Insurance Permits are granted for the fiscal year ending July 31st, midnight, and are not granted for more than one year at a time.

The terms and conditions upon which permits are granted, are based upon the nature of the business, the number of employes, the hazard of the risk, the financial standing of the employer and the amount of its property in the state.

Some Self Insurers are required to furnish surety bonds, some deposit guaranty funds and some purchase catastrophe insurance. All Self Insurers are required to set up reserves to cover incurred losses.

LUMP SUM SETTLEMENTS

The theory of Compensation is, that in event of injury or death of an employee the payments shall for a definite period replace in part the loss of income.

The law does not contemplate the payment of a gross sum as in case of life or accident insurance but sections 55 and 82 of the Workmen's Compensation Act of 1919 gives to the Commission power to grant an advance payment of part or all compensation to become due when in its opinion it is for the best interests of the claimant that such an advance or lump sum be granted.

Lump sums are granted only for specific uses; such as the purchase of a business or property through which the claimant may become self supporting. The Commission requires definite information as to the use to which a lump sum is to be put, a full description of property to be purchased and evidence of clear title.

Lump sums are not granted for investment in securities nor for the purpose of depositing in banks.

The Act provides that advance payments and lump sums shall be discounted on a basis of present worth at 4% and in some cases a further deduction for the contingencies of death and remarriage.

Lump sums are sometimes ordered payable to non-residents to enable them to return to their homes abroad. In such cases a sufficient sum is ordered advanced to cover expenses to destination and the balance forwarded upon receipt of notice of arrival.

A total of 143 lump sum applications were acted upon by the Commission during 1921, as against 127 for 1920. 73 applications were granted and 70 denied during the year.

BENEFICIARIES' TRUST DEPOSITS

In many cases compensation is awarded to minors and incompetents who are not dependent on such compensation for their maintenance. In a number of such instances the Commission has ordered payments in whole or in part, to be deposited in savings accounts in the names of the beneficiaries but subject to the exclusive control of the Commission. Such savings accounts bear interest at four per cent and are made with banks under adequate bond and can only be withdrawn on written order of the Commission.

To the end of the fiscal year November 30th, 1921, there had been opened 118 such savings bank accounts, representing 54 Compensation claims and aggregating \$24,962.74. Withdrawals are permitted only when the Commission is satisfied that such withdrawals are for the best interest of the beneficiaries.

STATE COMPENSATION INSURANCE FUND

The outstanding feature of the compensation insurance business during the past year has been a falling off in the volume of premiums written on account of the general business slump. Thus, the total amount of Workmen's Compensation premiums written in Colorado during the current year will undoubtedly be found to be several hundred thousand dollars less than for 1920.

The Fund has felt this depression with the result that, tho it has obtained even more than its share of new business, nevertheless, the volume of business written is considerably less than that written in 1920.

With reference to the new business written, it has been interesting to observe that much of this came from large industrial risks in and about Denver. Many employers, who were in the beginning skeptical as to the Fund's ability to remain in the compensation insurance business, are now becoming convinced of its financial strength, and of its ability to give complete protection and service at a considerable saving to them.

On July 1st of this year, a new Manual of classifications and rates for compensation insurance was put into effect with the approval of the Industrial Commission. The revision in rates, while resulting in increases in a few instances, has had the general effect of causing a reduction in rates in most classifications. The State Fund rates, under the new Manual, are 10% under the stock company rates, and a dividend of 15% has just been declared, effective January 1st, 1922, indicating that the Fund is still saving its assured 25% in the cost of their insurance.

A dividend was declared to School Districts equal to 100% of premiums earned during the year ending June 30th, 1921. This dividend is the result of adjustment of premiums on the basis of rates approved by the Industrial Commission in accordance with the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act of 1919. Adjustment of premium was made under all policies for the full period during which such policies had been in force. This necessitated reviewing about 1,800 policy files, covering a period in many instances extending back to August 1st, 1915. The net result of this adjustment indicated a material reduction in the level of rates for School Districts, and left a surplus in this group sufficient to pay the above mentioned dividend.

A dividend was also declared to irrigation districts equal to 30% of premiums earned during the year ending June 30th, 1921.

One very important improvement has been made during the year in the handling of claim payments. This was the adoption of a cash voucher warrant, which permits the payment of compensation without requiring the voucher to be mailed to the claimant to be signed and returned before a warrant can be issued. Under the present system the voucher is attached to the warrant and the warrant may be cashed when the attached voucher is signed and the warrant properly endorsed. This has resulted, not only in the speeding up of payments to claimants, but in a considerable saving in labor, and expense for stationery and postage.

The newspapers, for the past several months, have contained many articles regarding the shortage of cash in the State Treasury, and have linked this situation with the financial condition of the Fund. The papers have also informed the public of the legal action in the nature of mandamus proceeding brought by the Industrial Commission in the District Court, to require the State Treasurer to invest the cash assets of the State Compensation Insurance Fund in accordance with the direction of the Industrial Commission.

Inasmuch as some of the newspaper comment has been misleading, it seems advisable to briefly describe the situation.

Section 123 of the Compensation Act says:

"The Commission is hereby vested with full power, authority and jurisdiction over the State Compensation Insurance Fund and may do and perform any and all things, whether herein specifically designated or in addition thereto, which are necessary or convenient in the exercise of any power, authority or jurisdiction over said Fund in the administration thereof under the provisions of this Act, as fully and completely as the governing body of a private insurance company might or could do, subject however, to all the provisions of this Act."

Section 140 and Section 141 are as follows:

"The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of the State Compensation Insurance Fund and all disbursements therefrom shall be paid by him upon warrants of the State Auditor upon vouchers issued by the Commission and the State Auditor is hereby authorized and directed to draw warrants upon the State Compensation Insurance Fund for payment thereof, upon order of the Commission."

"The Commission shall in writing authorize and direct the State Treasurer to invest any portion of the State Compensation Insurance Fund which in the judgment of the Commission is not needed for immediate use. Said Fund, including its surplus and reserves or any portion thereof, may be invested in any warrants or bonds of the State of Colorado or of the United States of America at market price, as may be determined by the Commission. All interest earned upon such portion or portions of the Fund as may be deposited or invested shall be collected by the State Treasurer and placed to the credit of such Fund, provided, however, that none of the funds belonging to the State Compensation Insurance Fund shall be used for any other purpose whatsoever save those of said Fund. Upon the direction of the Commission, with the

approval of the State Auditing Board, the State Treasurer shall sell or dispose of such portion of the investments of said Fund at market price, as he may be directed."

The investment of Funds of a compensation insurance company should be made with two main purposes in view:

First: To keep its funds invested in high class securities which present the very greatest possible degree of safety. Practically each State in the Union has laws limiting the investments of insurance companies. The Workmen's Compensation Act of Colorado, under section 141 above, has limited the investment of the funds of the State Compensation Insurance Fund to certain definitely prescribed securities.

Second: To obtain the greatest possible return on its total assets by investing in marketable securities authorized by law up to the limit consistent with keeping a reasonable cash balance for current needs.

In accordance with its duties as administrator of the Fund and acting as the governing body of an insurance company (the State Fund is to all intents and purposes an insurance company), the Industrial Commission authorized and directed the State Treasurer on January 19th, 1921, to invest the sum of \$100,000 then in the Fund and available for investment, in United States Government 4th Liberty Loan $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ bonds; they again on May 9th, 1921, authorized and directed the State Treasurer to invest the further sum of \$100,000 then in the Fund and available for investment, in United States Government 4th Liberty Loan $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ bonds.

Looking at this situation from the standpoint of the earning capacity of the assets of the Fund as an insurance carrier: the market price of 4th $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ Liberty Bonds, on January 20th, 1921, was \$88.56. The price of 4th $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ Liberty Bonds on May 10th, 1921, was \$87.36. These bonds if purchased at the above dates would net the Fund 5.15% and 5.38% respectively, covering the period ending October 15th, 1938, a matter of more than seventeen years. At the time these investments were ordered every one interested in finance knew that Liberty Bonds were on the bargain counter and that there was no telling how long they would remain there. Not only that, but there was no other authorized investment which could be made with the cash assets of the Fund that could be compared with Liberty Bonds, both as to income yield and soundness of investment.

These two orders for the investment in Liberty Bonds have been absolutely ignored by the State Treasurer. The Treasurer took the position that the Commission had no authority to direct the investment of the State Compensation Insurance Fund and that said Fund was under his exclusive control.

This resulted in the bringing of mandamus proceedings by the Industrial Commission to determine whether the State Treasurer was legally bound to obey the provisions of the Workmen's

Compensation Act in his capacity as custodian of the State Compensation Insurance Fund. District Judge Butler has sustained the Commission and the case is now in the Supreme Court for final determination.

The question at issue is fundamental, as to whether the Industrial Commission or the State Treasurer should be permitted to administer the investments of the State Compensation Insurance Fund. The events of the past year have at least determined that the Industrial Commission is the body which has an intelligent conception of the duties of administering the finances of the Fund.

In his answer to the alternative writ requiring him to invest as directed by the Industrial Commission, the State Treasurer set up the fact that he had on or about the 25th day of June, 1921, invested \$250,000 in State Warrants of the State of Colorado at a price to net 6% interest. As a matter of fact the investment was made in Certificates of indebtedness issued in payments on contracts for the construction of the State Office Building. This answer was stricken by the Court as being irrelevant to the point at issue, but it does illustrate the inability of the State Treasurer to properly invest the assets of the State Compensation Insurance Fund. These Certificates of indebtedness are not authorized as investments by Section 141 of the Compensation Act (incidentally they have not been accepted by the Industrial Commission). Furthermore, they are short time investments. In the meantime the market price of the \$200,000 of Liberty Bonds above mentioned has increased more than \$21,500. Fourth 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ % Liberty Bonds now earn less than 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ % and the tendency of the bond market is upward.

We believe that this situation speaks for itself and while we are hopeful of obtaining a favorable decision from the Supreme Court, we feel that in case the decision should be against us, the policyholders of the Fund are entitled to legislation which will very definitely prevent the State Compensation Insurance Fund from being considered in any way as part of the funds of the State or in any other light than as the funds of an insurance company to be invested at all times with the sole purpose of obtaining the greatest income for the policyholders consistent with authorized legal investments.

Since April 1st, 1921, the State Compensation Insurance Fund, has been on a self-supporting basis, paying salaries and other expenses from the interest earned on investments. The assets of the Fund must, therefore, be made to earn the greatest possible income in order to meet the expenses of the Fund and also the obligations under long standing claims, such as permanent total disability cases, the reserve for which is computed on the basis of the present value of the outstanding payments.

The attached financial statement contains comments which we trust will explain the various items satisfactorily:

COMMENTS ON FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The items "City, County and School District Warrants" and "Registered Warrants" under "Income," "Disbursements," and "Assets," represent interest bearing warrants received from Counties, Cities, Towns and School Districts in payment of compensation premiums and held for investment by the Fund until called for payment.

The amount, \$22,434.73, under "Disbursements" and "Assets," represents State of Colorado Warrants purchased for investment in November, 1921.

under "Disbursements," of \$13,043.81, represents a period of eight months. This item for the full year should represent less than 7% of the premiums written, which is a very low expense ratio when compared with the expense ratio of the stock companies, which average 35% to 40%.

"Dividends Paid to Policyholders." This item of \$74,367.92 indicates a very real saving which the Fund is making to its assured.

"Total Admitted Assets" and "Surplus Over All Liabilities." Attention is called to these two items which represent the real strength of the Fund. The rapid growth of the assets and surplus as shown in the comparison on the next page is graphic evidence of the success of the Fund.

**This dividend was the first declared to public employers since the Compensation Act went into effect and covered a period of three years. At that time public premiums were written at a flat rate of 1%, which made the dividend apportionment larger than would have been the case if premiums were written as at present at rates based upon the various hazards of employment. The present method became effective May 1, 1919, in accordance with the provisions of the Compensation Act of 1919.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION— CLAIM DEPARTMENT

The Claim Department is charged with the detail work required in administering the Compensation Law of Colorado; as such it receives and files all reports required by the Commission, including first reports of accidents, supplemental reports, physician's reports, agreements relating to compensation, receipts for compensation payments, claims filed for compensation, final receipts for compensation, and conducts all hearings relating to compensation claims or agreements as are required by law.

Hearings upon claims are conducted by a Referee, whose decision is final unless a review is sought by either party, in which case the Commission reviews the entire record and in its discretion may take or order the taking of additional testimony, and may either affirm the finding and award of the Referee or may enter a new finding and award affirming or reversing the finding and award of the Referee in whole or in part.

The Commission may also upon its own motion, on the ground of error, mistake or change in conditions, review any award, and on such review may make an award ending, diminishing, maintaining or increasing the compensation previously awarded.

A comparison of the tabulated statement of the accidents, claims, agreements and awards handled by the Department, and amount of compensation awarded and being paid during the year beginning December 1, 1920, and ending December 1, 1921, which follows below, is instructive as to the volume of business handled by the Department.

Attention is also directed to the fact that 27 awards were entered during the year in claims where it appears that the employer was not carrying insurance as required by law. The increasing number of such claims indicates the necessity of an effort being made to require a better observance of the law as to carrying compensation insurance.

STATISTICS—WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION DEPARTMENT

A very slight decrease in the number of accident reports filed with the Commission during the year is to be noted in the Statistical Table covering this department on page 117. Considering the complete inactivity of many firms and corporations, the reduced working forces and curtailment of production of others, this decrease of only 375 accidents over the previous year would indicate a gradual increase in the volume of work to be handled by the Statistical Department. This increase will continue for a number of years before the first cases or claims will be fully compensated and closed up, on account of Section 84 of the Workmen's Compensation Law of 1919, which provides that a claimant may file a claim for further disability at any time within five years from the date of his accident; and by the further fact that payments on fatal or death claims, permanent total, permanent partial and specific injury claims extend over an indefinite period of years.

A decrease of 28 fatal accidents as compared with 1920 is to be noted, due to the fact that no serious mine disasters or explosions accompanied with any great loss of life occurred during the 12 months' period covered. This decreased death ratio by accident is also due in part to the suspension of work in many of the metal mines of this state as compared with recent years' operations.

A marked increase of injuries which became infected, or so-called "Blood Poison," is shown, due, no doubt, to negligence on the part of injured employees not seeking medical treatment immediately after the occurrence of the accident. Where possible, suitable "First Aid" kits or outfits should be maintained by the employers in convenient places to guard against this seemingly growing evil of neglecting minor injuries until blood poison becomes evident in the wound.

Injuries to female employees are diminished by 43, a total of only 141 such accidents having been reported, which is only $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of all accidents recorded with the Commission during the year.

Compensation awards entered by the Industrial Commission and Referees have been tabulated into several groups on page 118. A total of 4,905 such awards, where the payment of Workmen's Compensation benefits was involved, have been entered since this law first became effective on August 1, 1915, 1,494 of which were handled in 1921, as compared to 1,094 in 1920. The 1915 and 1917 Acts made no provision for a Referee, hence no compensation awards are shown as being entered by the Referees during 1915-16, 1917, 1918 and the first five months of 1919.

Only 138 Petitions for Rehearing, representing 12 per cent of all awards entered by the Referees for 1921, were filed with the Commission. Permission was granted for a review or rehearing of the evidence in only 44 cases, or 3.8 per cent of the total of 1,143 Referee Awards entered during the year.

More complete and detailed statistical information is now being compiled by means of the Hollerith Tabulating System, a part of which equipment has been installed and now in use. The data contained in all previous accident reports filed with the Commission since the inception of the Workmen's Compensation Law is being prepared for tabulation, as at present it is of little use or value in arriving at definite conclusions as to accident prevention measures, or experience ratings for premiums to be charged for compensation insurance. This work has been seriously handicapped by a lack of clerical assistance, and it is hoped that the Commission will be able to assign an additional clerk to this department in order that this important work may be completed at the earliest possible date and the information thus compiled printed in a separate report, or included in the next Annual Report of the Industrial Commission.

INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS LAW

At the time of the last preceding report there was pending in the Supreme Court of Colorado a case wherein was attacked the validity and constitutionality of the provisions of the Industrial Commission Law giving the Commission jurisdiction over disputes between employer and employees as to wages and hours. This case has been decided and the Law has been upheld by the Supreme Court of this State.

Since our last report the 23rd General Assembly materially amended among others, Sections 29-30-31-32-33 of the Industrial Commission Law which are the sections giving the Commission jurisdiction over industrial or labor disputes. Particular attention is called to Section 32, the provisions of which are new and at first reading seem drastic, but when it is realized that the mandatory writ therein provided for simply compels obedience to the Law and that after hearing and final award by the Commission the writ spends its force, legitimate objection cannot be voiced thereto, as the most radical adherents of either side of the industrial struggle publicly, at least, admit that the Law must be obeyed. The amendments became effective April 4, 1921, and the law abiding spirit of the citizens of Colorado is so well grounded that only once has such a writ been applied for and that in the case of the controversy between the Oakdale Coal Company and its employees at the Oakview Mine. The Commission issued an order requiring the parties to restore conditions and maintain them in statu quo. Upon the miners, under the influence of officers of the U. M. W. of A., failing to abide such order, a mandatory writ was issued by the District Court of the Third Judicial District and served upon a large number of employees and upon officers of said Union. The provisions of the writ were obeyed by both employer and employees.

Case No. 565. Wolff Mfg. Co. vs. Employees. Denver. February 23, 1921. 13 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Settled by mutual agreement.

Case No. 566. Hesperus Fuel Co. vs. Employees. Hesperus. February 24, 1921. Cause of controversy—company refused to collect union dues—men refused to work and company declined to operate. Mine was closed down.

Case No. 567. Mann-Aldrich Carriage Co. vs. Employees. Denver. February 26, 1921. 12 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission and notice withdrawn.

Case No. 568. Master Builders vs. Carpenters and Painters Unions. Greeley. February 26, 1921. 90 employees, 20 employers. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission assumed jurisdiction and held a hearing in Greeley. Award granted \$1.00 per day reduction which was accepted.

Case No. 569. Master Painters and Decorators vs. Employees. Colorado Springs. February 28, 1921. 60 employees. 5 employers. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission. Settled by mutual agreement.

Case No. 570. Kokomo-Regan Mng. & Dlg. Co. vs. Employees. Kokomo. March 1, 1921. 8 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages—compromise reduction accepted by men.

Case No. 571. Western Zinc Oxide Co. vs. Employees. Leadville. March 2, 1921. 42 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission. No protest by employees.

Case No. 572. Valley View Leasing & Mfg. Co. vs. Employees. Ophir. March 2, 1921. 20 employees, 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. No protest by employees.

Case No. 573. American Smelting & Refining Co. vs. Employees. Pueblo. March 3, 1921. 350 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated and no protest from employees.

Case No. 574. Stratton-Cripple Creek Mining and Developing Company vs. Employees. Colorado Springs. March 2, 1921. 20 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigation by Commission. Reduction accepted by employees.

Case No. 575. Granite Cutters Association vs. Employees. Denver. March 3, 1921. 85 employees. 5 employers. Notice of a change in wages. Men refused to work for part of the employers for a few days and at a conference held mutual agreement was reached and men returned to work under the same conditions that existed with the understanding that they would again take up the case after a settlement was made in the New England States where the wage was the same as in Denver, \$8.50 per day, and that if either side wished to change at that time that they would give thirty days' notice to the employer or the employees as the case may be and also to the Industrial Commission.

Case No. 576. Whittaker Paper Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 3, 1921. 100 employees. 1 employer. Protest from employees that thirty day notice was not given. Commission investigated and the employer changed effective date of reduction and gave the Commission the required thirty days' notice. The employees accepted the reduction at the expiration of the thirty days.

Case No. 577. Denver Shale Brick Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 7, 1921. 26 employees. 1 employer. Only five days' notice given to Commission. Notice of increase in the work day from eight to nine hours. Commission investigated and a mutual agreement was reached in which the employees accepted reduction in wages in lieu of the demand for an increase in hours. An agreement was signed by the employees.

Case No. 578. Whittaker Paper Company vs. Employees. Denver. February 15, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 576.)

Case No. 579. Colfax Press Brick Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 7, 1921. 20 employees. 1 employer. Complaint was made that employers were going to reduce wages without giving the required thirty days' notice. Commission investigated and called employers attention to the law. The employers changed the effective date of the reduction and posted a notice for the employees and sent a notice to the Commission. The employees accepted said reduction without further protest.

Case No. 580. Valley View Leasing and Mining Company vs. Employees. Ames, Colorado. March 7, 1921. 20 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 572.)

Case No. 581. River Smelting and Refining Company vs. Employees. Florence. March 7, 1921. 25 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Upon investigation by Commission it was found that the plant had closed and the employers claimed they were not in a position at that time to state as to when they would again resume operations.

Case No. 582. Swift and Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 8, 1921. 419 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. This was a general reduction in the packing industry throughout the United States. The thirty day notice was sent to Commission making the effective date of reduction thirty-three days later than other packing plants throughout the country. The government intervened and through the Department of Labor was successful in adjusting controversy by compromise and employees of this state accepted agreement at expiration date of notice without further protest. Said agreement expires September 15, 1921.

Case No. 583. Coffin Packing & Provision Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 8, 1921. 120 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 582.)

Case No. 584. National Biscuit Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 8, 1921. 100 employees. 1 employer. Protest was made by employees company was going to increase the day's work from eight to nine hours. Commission investigated and called their attention to the thirty day clause in the law. The company then complied with the law by posting a notice, the effective date to be thirty days later, and notified the Commission. During the thirty days the employer and the employees reached a satisfactory settlement in which they were not to work nine hours but were to finish up the work each day and providing it was necessary to work over eight hours there would be no extra charge. From experience it was cited that the longest day that had been worked for considerable time was eight hours and thirty minutes.

Case No. 585. Colorado Packing & Provision Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 8, 1921. 308 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 582.)

Case No. 586. Holly Sugar Company vs. Employees. Grand Junction. March 8, 1921. Complaint made by party not an employee as to an alleged change in working conditions. Commission investigated and employees failed and refused to endorse complaint or to make any protest.

Case No. 587. Union Rendering Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 9, 1921. 5 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigation by Commission. Employees accepted reduction without protest.

Case No. 588. Sheet Metal Furnace, Tile & Slate Construction Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 4, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated. No protest by employees.

Case No. 589. Denver Packing & Provision Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 10, 1921. 15 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 582.)

Case No. 590. K. & B. Packing Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 10, 1921. 25 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 582.)

Case No. 591. U. S. Zinc Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 11, 1921. 70 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated. Satisfactory settlement was reached between employer and employees.

Case No. 592. John Bond Tailoring Company vs. Journeymen Tailors Union. Denver. March 10, 1921. 40 employees. 1 employer. No advance notice to Commission. Information received at this office at 10 A. M. that the Union were demanding that contract be signed by noon or the employees would walk out. Commission immediately phoned business agent of said union and advised him not to pull a strike and that if he did his organization would be subject to the penalties of the law. Upon investigation it was found that he stated same to employees, but at the same time told them that if they wished to quit work that it was none of his affair. They did quit work, same being concerted action and was nothing more or less than a strike. After the employees were out approximately seven days they went back to work on the employer's terms.

Case No. 593. Pueblo Ice Company vs. Employees. Pueblo. March 16, 1921. 4 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Accepted by employees without protest.

Case No. 594. Colorado Lumber Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 16, 1921. 25 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction of wages. Investigation by Commission. No protest by employees.

Case No. 595. Denton and Crook vs. Employees. Redcliff. March 16, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. Satisfactory settlement agreed upon.

Case No. 596. Brotherhood of Bookbinders and Bindery Women vs. Employers of Book and Job Printing Offices. Denver. March 17, 1921. 100 employees. 13 employers. Notice of new wage scale and reduction of week's work from forty-eight to forty-four hours. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 597. Typographical Union No. 567 vs. Employers. Loveland. 9 employees, 3 employers. Case terminated by Commission. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 598. Denver Fire Clay Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 16, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. After investigation Commission set case for hearing on April 8. Appearance was made by representatives of employers and employees, who stated that there had been a conference held in which both parties to the controversy had decided that they could settle their differences when the manager returned to the city, but if they failed to reach a satisfactory settlement that both parties would ask this Commission to hold a hearing and they would abide by the decision. The case was continued, and it is presumed settled satisfactorily.

Case No. 599. Typographical Union No. 434 vs. Employers. Trinidad. March 18, 1921. Notice of a change in hours for a week's work from forty-eight to forty-four hours. Case terminated by Commission. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 600. Typographical Union 227 vs. Employers. Cripple Creek. 2 employees. 1 employer. Notice of change in hours from eight hours a day to seven hours and twenty minutes a day. Upon investigation it was found that there was a mistake in the notice and that the employees wanted a forty-four hour week or less. Commission terminated jurisdiction. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 601. Intermountain Light, Heat & Power Company vs. Employees. La Junta. March 19, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission. Satisfactory settlement reached.

Case No. 602. Seven Lakes Ditch Company vs. Employees. Loveland. March 19, 1921. Complaint was made of reduction in wages. Upon investigation by Commission it was found that employers had finished their work and had no employees and that another company had employed the same superintendent and that said superintendent had employed some of the men that he had on the former work, but that the wages were lower, so that there was no valid complaint and case was dismissed.

Case No. 603. City of Loveland vs. Employees. Loveland. March 19, 1921. Complaint was made at this office that employees had been reduced from \$5.00 per day to 40c per hour, or \$3.20 per day, and that previous notice of such reduction was not given. Upon investigation by Commission it was found that the city officials had not reduced the wages of their regular em-

ployees, but at a council meeting held on March 1, 1921, the council voted that for the extra help hired on the streets thereafter they would only pay 40c an hour. They also stated that this would not apply to over three men and that it was only casual employment.

Case No. 604. American Smelting & Refining Company vs. Employees. Durango. March 21, 1921. 176 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission and settled by mutual agreement.

Case No. 605. Western Electric Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 22, 1921. 80 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. On investigation by Commission it was found there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 606. Johnson Machine Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 19, 1921. 8 employees. 1 employer. Notice of a reduction in wages. No complaint from employees.

Case No. 607. Employing Plumbers vs. Employees. Colorado Springs. March 24, 1921. 52 employees. 10 employers. Notice of a reduction in wages. Settled by mutual agreement on the basis of an award made by Commission in Case No. 553.

Case No. 608. Cigar Manufacturers vs. Cigar Makers' Union No. 129. Denver. March 24, 1921. 475 employees. 2 employers. Notice of a reduction in wages. Commission set case for hearing April 19, 1921. On April 16 the Commission was presented with an agreement signed by employers and employees requesting a postponement of said hearing for sixty days, which was granted, and the case was to come on for hearing on June 20, conditions to remain the same during that time. The employees in the Cuban Cigar Factory had trouble with the foreman and a great many resigned; the employer decided to close down pending settlement, claiming that he did not have enough employees left to run his business with any satisfaction. The Solis Cigar Company laid off part of their force, claiming that the business did not warrant keeping the full force at work. The men complained to the Commission, claiming that conditions had been changed in the Solis factory. The employer in the Cuban factory also complained of the employees leaving him. The Commission decided to let the affair rest until the date of the hearing on June 20. Both sides appeared for the hearing. The employees asked the Commission to terminate jurisdiction, as they felt that if they went to a hearing that the evidence they would necessarily have to present would probably antagonize the employers and make their case more difficult to settle. The employers also asked the Commission to terminate jurisdiction, claiming that the Commission could be of no service as the employees would not accept the award and cited that on a previous date some of the international officials of the union who were at that time attending the American Federation of Labor convention in Denver had interceded for the employees and they had reached an agreement whereby the employers would select one party, the employees to select one, and the two to select a third party for the purpose of arbitration, and their decision to be binding upon both sides. When this proposition was submitted to the union for acceptance or rejection, it was almost unanimously rejected and the Commission, after said investigation, found that the controversy between the parties hereto was not a matter of public interest, and therefore terminated jurisdiction. The controversy was finally settled on or about June 29 and the men returned to work on July 5, receiving a reduction in wages of approximately \$1.00 per thousand cigars.

Reduction in wages put into effect without notice to the Commission; complaint was made by employees and Commission assumed jurisdiction. Set case for hearing and award was made by Commission that wages should not have been reduced, and the case was submitted to the Attorney General for prosecution.

Case No. 611. Longmont Farmers Milling & Elevator Company vs. Employees. Longmont. March 28, 1921. 93 employees. 15 plants. Notice of reduction in wages. Investigated by Commission. No protest from employees.

Case No. 612. Mt. States Telephone & Telegraph Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 30, 1921. 189 employees. 1 employer. Notice of a change in hours. Settlement was made by mutual agreement.

Case No. 613. Empire Coal Mining Company vs. Local Union of the United Mine Workers of America. Aguilar. March 30, 1921. 90 employees. 1 employer. Notice of a change in working conditions. The controversy was over the so-called "turn sheet" that signified the way the new employees were employed. The Commission decided that the employer was the sole judge to employ whomever he pleased, and the turn sheet was discontinued.

Case No. 614. Printing Pressmen's Union No. 48 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Denver. March 30, 1921. Notice of change in hours. Award by Commission. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 615. Colorado Milling & Elevator Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 30, 1921. 365 employees. 66 plants. Notice of a reduction in wages. Commission investigated and found no complaint made by employees.

Case No. 616. Press Assistants' Union No. 14 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Denver. March 30, 1921. Notice of reduction in hours. Award by Commission. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 617. Sunnyside Mining & Milling Company vs. Local Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers. Eureka. March 31, 1921. 55 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission assumed jurisdiction and held hearing in Silverton, granting a reduction in wages, which was accepted by employers and employees.

Case No. 618. Rocky Mountain Coal & Iron Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 31, 1921. 31 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated and found no protest from employees.

Case No. 619. Liberty Packing & Provision Company vs. Employees. Denver. March 31, 1921. 6 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated and found no protest from employees.

Case No. 620. Printing Pressmen's Union No. 163 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Pueblo. March 31, 1921. 129 employees. 53 employers. Notice of reduction in hours. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 621. Bookbinders' Union No. 157 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Pueblo. March 31, 1921. Notice of reduction in hours. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 622. Kilpatrick Baking Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 1, 1921. 15 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Letter received by Commission from both parties that a mutual agreement was reached and that the employees received a reduction of \$2.00 per week.

Case No. 623. Metropolitan Window Cleaning Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 1, 1921. 12 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Letter from secretary of union stating that settlement had been reached which was satisfactory to both employer and employees.

Case No. 624. Macklem Baking Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 1, 1921. 40 employees. 1 employer. Settled by mutual agreement and contract signed by employers and employees, a copy of which is on file with the Commission.

Case No. 625. Typographical Union No. 425 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Canon City. April 1, 1921. Notice of reduction in hours. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 626. Typographical Union No. 708 vs. Employers, Book and Job Printing Offices. Boulder. April 1, 1921. 14 employees. 4 employers. Notice of reduction in hours. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 627. Denver Typothetae Association vs. Members of the Five Printing Crafts. Denver. April 1, 1921. Notice of reduction in wages. This case was of necessity merged with the notices from the different unions of a reduction in hours in which a hearing was held and an award made. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 628. American Smelting & Refining Company vs. Employees. Cokedale. April 1, 1921. 200 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Settlement was reached by mutual agreement.

Case No. 629. Campbell-Sell Baking Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 1, 1921. 200 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Settled by mutual agreement and contract signed by employers and employees, a copy of which is on file with the Commission.

Case No. 630. Crouse-Tremaine Mines vs. Employees. Silverton. April 1, 1921. 12 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Award by Commission. (See Case No. 617.)

Case No. 631. Clark Jewelry Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 2, 1921. 16 employees. 1 employer. Complaint was made at this office that wages had been reduced without notice to the Commission. The case was investigated by the Commission and a mutual agreement was reached and signed by both employer and employees and a copy of same is on file with the Commission.

Case No. 632. Loveland Reporter vs. Employees. Loveland. April 4, 1921. 9 employees. 3 employers. Notice from employees of a reduction in hours and a notice from the employer of a reduction in wages. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 633. Hamlet Mining Company vs. Employees. Silverton. April 7, 1921. 12 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Award by Commission. (See Case No. 617.)

Case No. 634. American Smelting & Refining Company. San Juan. April 8, 1921. 40 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. After investigation case was terminated by Commission. Strike resulted. The mine remained closed for about 6 months and an agreement was entered into between the company and former employees and the mine was reopened.

Case No. 635. American Smelting & Refining Company vs. Employees. Yak Mines. Leadville. April 11, 1921. 44 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Case investigated by Commission and found no protest by employees.

Case No. 636. Denver Union Stockyards vs. Employees. Denver. April 11, 1921. 70 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. (See Case No. 582.)

Case No. 637. Brighton Building Contractors vs. Building Trades Unions. Brighton. February 26, 1921. 40 employees. 6 employers. Complaint received at this office from employees that employers had made a reduction in wages and there was no notice given to the Commission. After investigation, the Commission assumed jurisdiction and set the case for hearing. Award was made granting reduction, which was accepted by both employers and employees.

Case No. 638. McKinney Clothing Company vs. Employees. Durango. April 13, 1921. 11 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Ten per cent reduction was mutually agreed upon.

Case No. 639. Sweeney Electrical Company vs. Employees. Denver. April 15, 1921. 58 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission held a conference and mutual agreement was reached.

Case No. 640. Sunshine Coal Company vs. Employees. Durango. April 15, 1921. 3 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Commission investigated and found that a satisfactory settlement had been made.

Case No. 641. Typographical Union No. 586 vs. Employees. Greeley. April 15, 1921. 15 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in hours. Case terminated by Commission on basis of award made in similar case in Denver. (See Case No. 558.)

Case No. 642. Master Plumbers Association vs. Plumbers and Steam Fitters Union. Pueblo. April 26, 1921. 25 employees. 7 employers. Notice of reduction in wages. Upon investigation by Commission the employers claimed that they did not have business enough in sight to warrant a hearing by the Commission and the employees were bound that they would not grant any reduction, and at the expiration of the thirty-day notice, the men went on strike, which was but a few days before the flood in Pueblo. When the flood came on, the men immediately returned to work and the employers paid the old scale, saying they would take the matter of a reduction in wages up at a later date.

Case No. 643. Stevens-Barr Timber & Lumber Company vs. Employees. Fraser. April 4, 1921. Complaint was made at this office that a reduction in wages was put into effect and there was no notice given to the Commission. Upon investigation it was found that the plant was closed and there were no employees with the exception of a watchman.

Case No. 644. Book Cliff Coal Company vs. Employees. Grand Junction. May 7, 1921. 8 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. After investigation by Commission and receiving satisfactory information, the case was terminated.

Case No. 645. Loop Market Company vs. Employees. Denver. May 9, 1921. 12 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. After investigation it was found there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 646. Griffin Wheel Company vs. Employees. Denver. May 12, 1921. 128 employees. 1 employer. Notice of a reduction in wages. After investigation the Commission found there was no protest from employees.

Case No. 647. Park Tunnel, Mining & Milling Company vs. Employees. Aspen. May 13, 1921. 10 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. After receiving satisfactory information, the Commission terminated jurisdiction.

Case No. 648. United States Gypsum Company vs. Employees. Loveland. May 16, 1921. 27 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. Employees were notified but did not make any complaint.

Case No. 649. Empire Coal Company vs. Local Union No. 59 of the United Mine Workers of America. Aguilar. May 17, 1921. 85 employees. 1 employer. Complaint was made at this office that employees had gone on strike. Commission sent investigator to Aguilar and he was successful in getting the men to call a meeting, and upon investigation we found that two men who had been given new place in mine had complained that they were not able to make wages, and that upon making said complaint to the union they went out on strike to force the company to either give the men a different place to work or to make up in pay what they lost on account of what they claimed to be a narrow room neck. The investigator was successful in getting the men to return to work with the promise that he would recommend to the Commission upon his return that a hearing be held and its findings and award entered. The Commission set the case for hearing and the evidence was so conflicting that the State Coal Mine Inspector was asked by members of the Commission to go to the mine and measure the room neck and upon his report the Commission made its award, which was accepted by both employer and employees.

Case No. 650. Bridge and Iron Workers vs. Master Builders. Denver. May 23, 1921. This case arose out of a former hearing of the building trades. During that hearing the committee from the union and the committee from the employers entered into an agreement and presented same to the Commission, in which there was to be a reduction in wages from \$9.25 per day to \$8.00 per day. Some time after this settlement the officers of the union again took the matter up with the employers, calling their attention to their reduction being more in proportion to the reductions made with other crafts. The employers admitted same and by mutual agreement increased their wage 25c per day.

Case No. 651. Don Hogan vs. Employees. Denver. May 24, 1921. 20 employees. 1 employer. Notice of a reduction in wages. Upon investigation by Commission it was found that there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 652. Calumet Coal Mining Company vs. Employees. Durango. May 18, 1921. 70 employees. 1 employer. Members of the Commission were in Durango on Commission business when they were notified that the men at this mine had gone on strike. Upon investigation it was found that the men went on strike because they claimed the company had sold coal to the smelter owned and operated by the American Smelting & Refining Company, and as there was a strike on at the coal mine owned by the American Smelting & Refining Company, the men were unwilling to mine coal for the benefit of this company, which they claimed had been unfair to members of its organization. The Commission was unable to get the men to return to work and the matter was submitted to the District Attorney for prosecution. Members of the Commission returned to Denver, leaving the secretary of the Commission, who is an attorney, at Durango for the purpose of assisting the District Attorney. The officials of the union were called into a conference by the District Attorney and then proceeded to the mine, talked to the employees, and the strike was called off and all the men returned to work. No court proceedings were instituted.

Case No. 693. Du Pont Powder Works vs. Employees. Louviers. August 24, 1921. 77 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. On investigation by Commission it was found there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 694. Burns Theater vs. Employees. Colorado Springs. August 24, 1921. 14 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages and new contract. The employer put change into effect twelve days after the notice was received by Commission. Case was set for hearing and a decrease granted, the employer to pay the old scale up to the date of the award. The employees refused to accept the award of Commission and a compromise figure was decided upon, employees receiving a smaller reduction than the award of the Commission.

Case No. 695. Nevin Candy Company vs. Employees. Denver. August 26, 1921. 40 employees. 1 employer. Notice of increase in hours. Upon investigation by Commission it was found there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 696. Colorado Fuel & Iron Company vs. Employees. Kebler. August 24, 1921. 50 employees. 1 employer. Letter was received that this mine had been closed down for several weeks and that an agreement was reached between former employees living in the camp and the employer, in which the company was to reopen the mine at a reduced scale. The force increased from day to day until a reduction was made in other Colorado Fuel & Iron Company's mines and a strike occurred in several of the mines, resulting in the men at this mine also going out on strike.

Case No. 705. Pikes Peak Consolidated Fuel Company vs. Employees. Colorado Springs. September 15, 1921. 90 employees. 1 employer. See Case No. 704, as both mines are owned and operated by the same company.

Case No. 706. Colorado Fuel & Iron Company vs. Employees in several of its mines in Trinidad and Walsenburg districts. September 1, 1921. 2,274 employees. 1 employer. The company entered into an agreement with its employees in several of its mines whereby the employees agreed, by signing petitions, and through their representative under their Industrial Representation Plan, to a reduction in wages to the 1917-1919 scale. There was no notice served upon the Commission. A controversy arose and a great many of the employees went out on strike. Upon this information, the Commission started investigation by sending a representative into the coal fields, and after receiving information from said representative each day for about a week the Commission assumed jurisdiction and set the case for hearing at the County Court House at Walsenburg. On September 10th the Commission issued an interlocutory order, ordering the company and the employees to return to the wages and working conditions in effect previous to September 1st until the Commission could make a thorough investigation and decision in said controversy. This order was complied with by both parties. The Commission issued its final order and decision on November 4th, which in substance said that the company had an agreement with their employees through their representatives under the Industrial Representation Plan, such award permitting the company to put into effect a reduction, and also releasing the employees to accept or reject said reduction. The company on November 17th, after posting notices at the mines affected by said award, did put into effect the wage scale in effect in 1917 to 1919. A strike was called in said mines and in all other mines owned and operated by the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company where there was no reduction put into effect, and at the time of printing this report there was approximately a normal force of men back to work at the reduced scale in the Walsenburg and Trinidad districts, and the mines in Crested Butte and Canon City had been closed down by the company after the employees were on strike three days, complying with their Industrial Plan whereby an employee remaining away from work three consecutive days is considered automatically not to be an employee of the company.

Case No. 716. American Brake Shoe & Foundry Company vs. Employees. Denver. October 3, 1921. 16 employees. 1 employer. Notice of reduction in wages. After investigation it was found there was no protest by employees.

Case No. 718. Oakdale Coal Company vs. Employees. Oakview. October 1, 1921. 200 employees. 1 employer. Protest was received from officials of the United Mine Workers of America that the employer was discriminating against members of the union and unless it stopped a strike would be called. A strike was called and approximately all the men went out on strike. The Commission set the case for hearing and entered an order for the men to return to work. The employees did not obey the order of the Commission, making it necessary to apply to the court for a mandatory writ, which was issued and with which the employees complied. After taking evidence, it was found there were only two employees involved, and although it was shown that there was some unfriendly feeling between the superintendent and the union, there was no actual discrimination, and good cause was shown for the discharge of said employees and it was so awarded.

CHANGES IN THE COST OF LIVING DENVER, COLORADO

In the original investigation no attempt was made to collect and compile budgets of local families but a family of five was adopted as a unit for measuring costs. The number in the family and the ages of the children conform very closely to those as used by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and represents generally the average existing family in the United States. The requirements of this family were determined from a careful study of the then existing family budgets as used by other agencies in similar investigations and serves more as a convenient means of measurement than as a fair definition of the cost of living. This budget is not intended, nor should it be taken, as an ideal budget for it does not include many comforts which should be included in an ideal American Standard of living.

As stated in former reports, various budget levels or standards of living have been adopted by investigating boards throughout the country, the three principal ones being distinguished as 1, "The Pauper or Poverty Level"; 2, "The Minimum or Subsistence Level"; and 3, "The Minimum or Comfort Level." The computations covered by this investigation are on a basis of the "Minimum or Subsistence Level," and should not be confused or compared with percentages or totals which are based upon the "Minimum or Comfort Level" investigations.

Tables based upon fluctuations in wholesale prices, (the index numbers furnished by Bradstreet or Dun), or the index numbers of retail food prices or other commodities taken by themselves, are not comparable with results obtained in this report, nor do they offer a reliable indication of changes in the cost of living. It is believed the only accurate method of measuring the various changes in the total cost of living is one which is based on retail prices, weighted according to the actual quality and quantity consumption or usage adopted in the family budget.

While it is conceded that standards of living have, in many instances, changed during and since the war, it should also be recognized that any comparison of changes in the cost of living from one date to another should be based upon identical lists and proportions at all times. The budget standard originally adopted as of January 1, 1914, has been followed in its entirety, no change of any kind having been made in the lists, quantities or qualities used.

The index level has been maintained by totaling the current prices of the individual items composing the budget, the retail

prices of which have been furnished by the same firms at weekly or monthly intervals since the investigation was first undertaken. Such changes in commodity prices as have occurred during the year ending December 1, 1921, are shown by a continuation in the statistical tables and charts hereto appended. These tables and charts are to be used in arriving at the percentage increase or decrease between given dates.

The "Comparative Yearly Totals," Table I, are more readily interpreted by graphic Chart "A," which shows the proportionate increase at semi-annual periods, while Chart "B" covers the same purpose by months on an "Index Number" basis. Food is included in Chart "B" to more readily show the relative increase of this item to the total of all items combined.

The ordinary "Arithmetic" scale has been used in preparing these graphic charts in preference to the "Logarithmic" or "Ratio" method. The "Arithmetic" scale is clearly one of fixed relations between the numbers composing it, while the "Logarithmic" or "Ratio" scale, on the contrary, has constantly changing relations between the numbers composing it, which make a thorough interpretation or understanding of changing levels rather difficult to those not familiar with this plan.

The various subdivisions of the yearly totals as shown in Table I are to be noted under their several headings in Table II. "Comparative Yearly Totals—Including Items." Using January 1, 1914, as an "Index Number of 100," the monthly variations can be more easily followed under Column X, Table II, and also in graphic Chart "B." By reference to these it will be found that the highest point reached for the total cost of living is shown during June-July, 1920, since which date there has been a steady decline in foods, clothing, fuel, etc., until June 1, 1921, when the index number for the total cost of living stood at 54.7 per cent above pre-war levels of 1914. A slight upward trend is to be observed from June 1, 1921, to December 1, 1921, the end of our fiscal year, when 56.4 per cent is registered.

It is to be noted that the prices of those items which were first to rise were also the first to fall. While the cost of living has declined somewhat, the marked wholesale price reduction appears to have benefited the retail stores rather than the consuming public in general.

Real estate operators, with but few exceptions, are of the opinion that the general tendency of rents is to remain at their present level for several years, such new dwellings and apartments as are erected being only sufficient in number to accommodate the fast growing population of Denver.

Generally speaking, it is believed from present economic indications, that the index level of 56.4 per cent over pre-war conditions will prevail, with slight fluctuations, for some months.

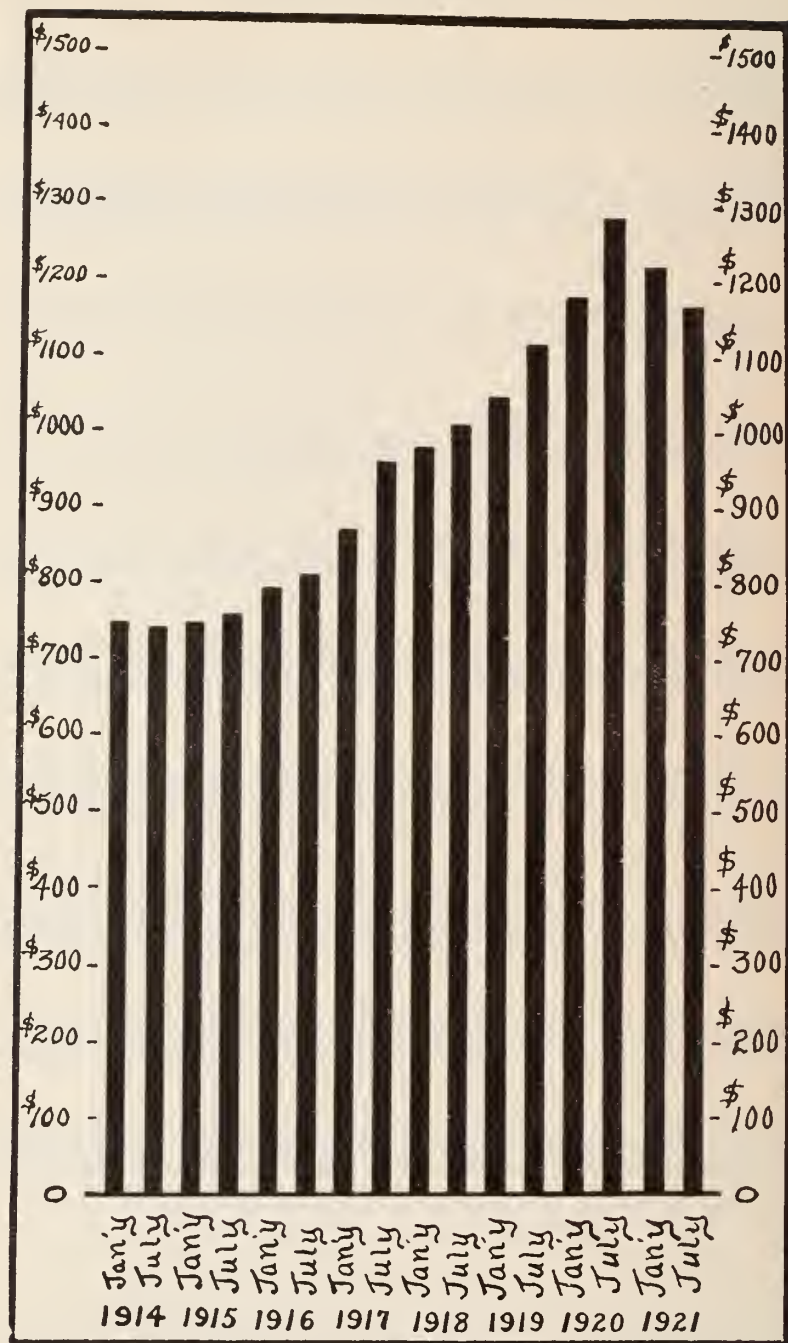
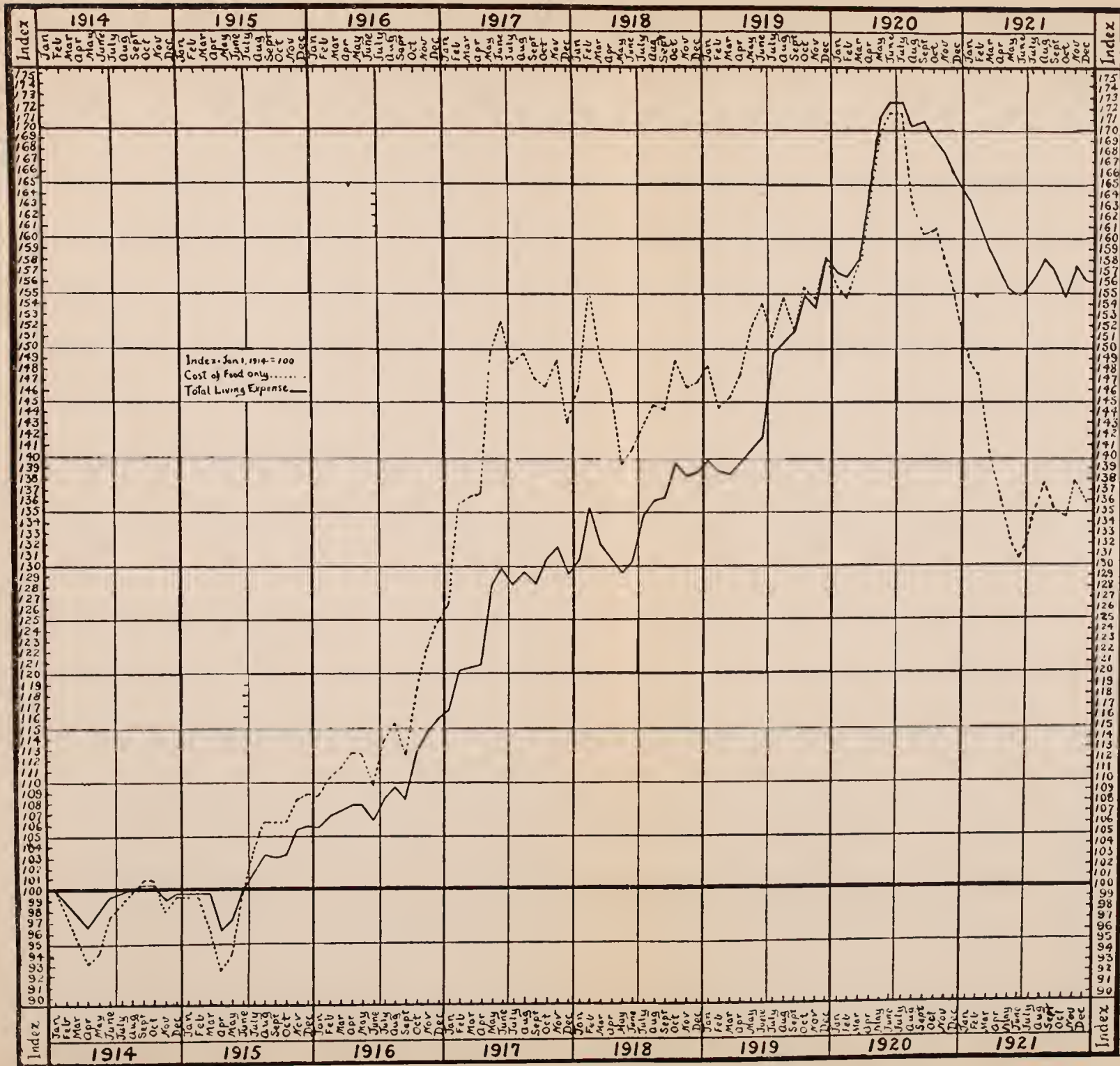


CHART "A"—COMPARATIVE YEARLY TOTALS—CHANGES
IN COST OF LIVING—DENVER, COLO.

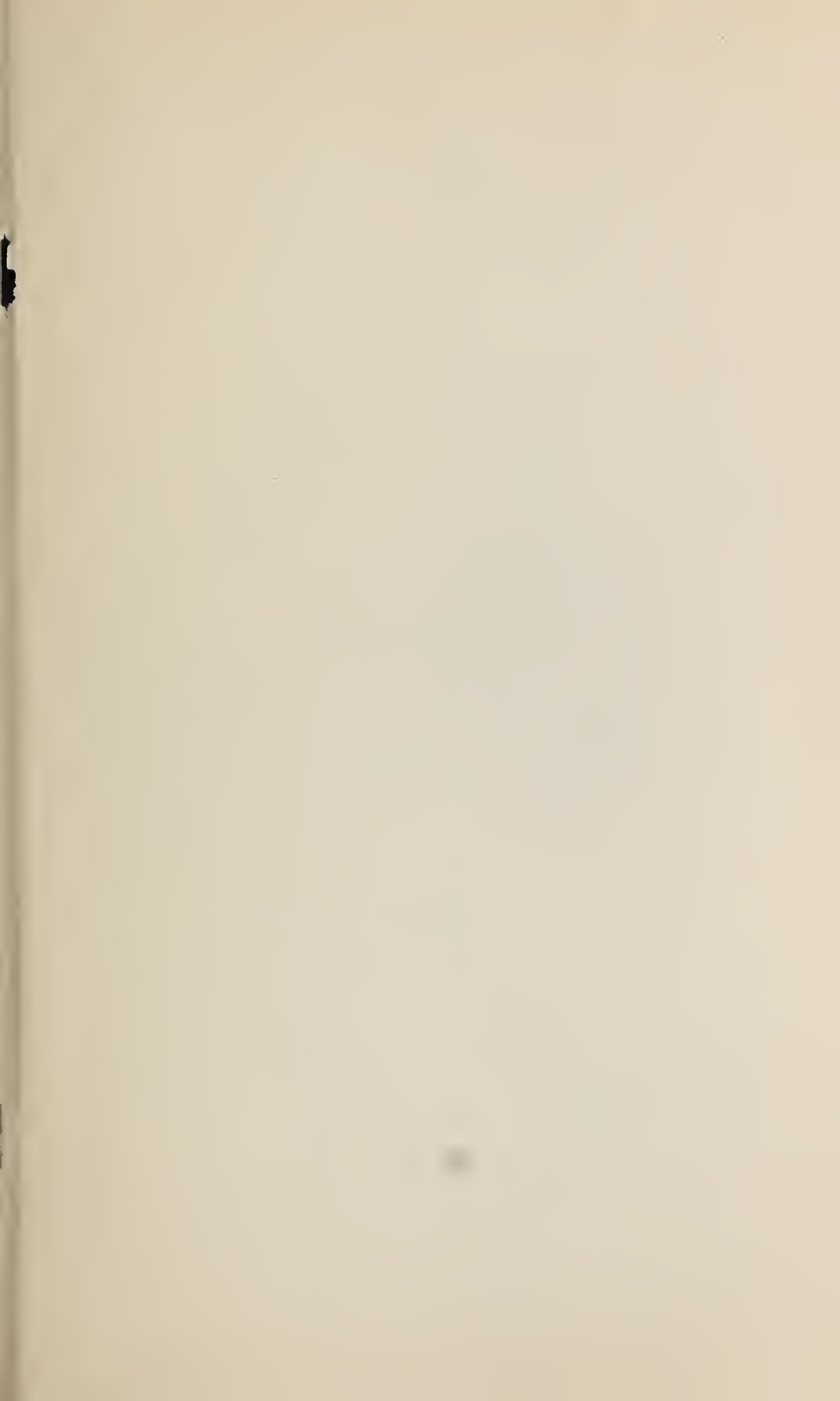
CHART "B"—COMPARATIVE YEARLY TOTALS BY INDEX NUMBER.



COLORADO MINIMUM WAGE LAW FOR WOMEN AND MINORS

In its Fourth Report, covering the year ending November 30, 1920, the Industrial Commission recommended to the Legislature that an adequate appropriation be made to permit the Commission to put the Minimum Wage Law into effective operation. The Act as passed provided a secretary, but made no provision for other employes or expenses and no provision has since been made, although the recommendations of the Commission were approved by the Budget Commissioner. The department will be unable to do any effective work until proper provision is made for its necessary expenses.

The Minimum Wage Secretary has been used effectively in work of the Commission which otherwise would have required the employment of additional help.





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
