
# The Larimer Weld Region Survey

The Spring 2006 Larimer-Weld Job Vacancy Survey (JVS) was conducted from March 24th through April 5th, 2006. The goal of the survey is to provide current information on the demand for workers. This information can serve as input into the decision making process for employers, job seekers, economic developers, educators, and workforce centers in the region.

Over the survey period, all large and government employers as well as a random sample of private employers with five or more employees were contacted. Employers were asked if they were actively hiring, and the number of positions they were seeking to fill.

The Larimer Weld Job Vacancy Survey is conducted twice a year to provide frequent and useful analysis of the demand for labor.

A total of 1,999 employers, representing 41 percent of the region's total employment responded to the survey. Of these, 125 are government agencies, 40 are large employers and 1,834 are small to mid-size employers. The survey has a response rate of 89 percent. The margin of sampling error for the overall vacancy estimate is plus or minus 0.2 percent.




Job Vacancy Survey Regions

#### Findings of the Survey:


- ♦ An estimated 4,086 jobs were available for hire during the survey period, up from the 2,894 vacancies found a year ago.
- ♦ Leisure and hospitality has the highest number of estimated vacancies (1,285), followed by trade, transportation and utilities (678) and health care and social assistance (463).
- ♦ All groups of supersectors, with the exception of professional and business services and government, have more estimated vacancies this survey than a year ago.
- ♦ Small to mid-size companies provide the most vacancies with 3,486. However, since there are more small to mid-size firms, there are actually fewer vacancies per employer compared to large companies. There are almost 8 vacancies per large private firm compared to an average of two vacancies per employer for small to mid-size firms.
- ♦ Seventeen percent of surveyed employers reported at least one job vacancy.


# Larimer Weld Employers and Employees, 2nd Quarter 2005




# Estimated Vacancies by NAICS Supersectors

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) classifies organizations into different industries based upon how the organization produces goods and services. The 20 NAICS sectors have been combined into twelve groups of supersectors for this survey as shown in the chart on this page.

Leisure and hospitality, which had the most openings last spring with 603, once again leads the supersectors this year with 1,285 estimated vacancies. Government dropped from 547 estimated vacancies in Spring 2005 to 290 this survey. The top three supersectors—leisure and hospitality, trade, transportation and utilities, and health care and social assistance—make up over 59 percent of Larimer Weld's estimated vacancies. All groups of supersectors, with the exception of professional and business services and government, have more job openings this survey compared to the last.
