## The Southeast Region Survey

The Summer 2005 Southeast Region Job Vacancy Survey (JVS) was conducted from July 18th through the 26th, 2005. The goal of the survey is to provide current information on the demand for workers. This information can serve as input into the decision making process for employers, job seekers, economic developers, educators, and workforce centers in the region.

Over the survey period, all large and government employers as well as a random sample of private employers with five or more employees were contacted. Employers were asked if they were actively hiring, and the number of positions


Job Vacancy Survey Regions they were seeking to fill.

The Southeast Region Job Vacancy Survey, which used to be done once a year, will now be conducted twice a year to provide frequent and timely analysis of the demand for labor. Previous surveys collected occupational and wage information. Beginning with this survey, the Job Vacancy Survey will not be reporting at this level of detail but will still give the estimate of total job vacancies in the region to the same degree of accuracy as before, only faster.

A total of 588 employers, representing 59 percent of the region's total employment responded to the survey. Of these, 125 are government agencies, 25 are large employers and 438 are small to mid-size employers. The survey has a response rate of 93 percent. The margin of sampling error for the overall vacancy estimate is plus or minus 2.7 percent or about 13 vacancies.

## Findings of the Survey:

- An estimated 504 jobs were available for hire during the survey period, up from 265 vacancies a year ago.
- Education and health services has the highest number of estimated vacancies, followed by trade, transportation, utilities and other services and leisure and hospitality.
- All groups of supersectors with the exception of information, financial activities and professional and business services report more vacancies in this survey than a year ago.
- Small to mid-size companies provide the most vacancies with 274. However, since there are more small to mid-size firms, there are actually fewer vacancies per employer than with large employers. There are nearly 6 vacancies per large private employer compared to an average of less than one vacancy per employer for both government and small to mid-size firms.

Twenty percent of surveyed employers reported at least one job vacancy.

## Estimated Vacancies by NAICS Supersectors

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) classifies organizations into different industries based upon how the organization produces goods and services. The 20 NAICS sectors have been combined into six groups of supersectors for this survey as shown in the chart on this page.

## Note:

Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining in this survey is the same as the goods-producing JVS sector in the previous surveys.

Education and health services, with nearly twice as many vacancies as in last summer's survey, leads the supersectors with 142 job openings this summer. Last year's leader in terms of job opportunities, information, financial activities and professional and business services, reports the fewest vacancies this year. All other supersector groupings have more openings this summer than last.
