
## The San Luis Valley Region Survey

The Summer 2005 San Luis Valley Job Vacancy Survey (JVS) was conducted from September 12th through the 23rd, 2005. The goal of the survey is to provide current information on the demand for workers. This information can serve as input into the decision making process for employers, job seekers, economic developers, educators, and workforce centers in the region.

Over the survey period, all large and government employers as well as a random sample of private employers with five or more employees were contacted. Employers were asked if they were actively hiring, and the number of positions they were seeking to fill.

The San Luis Valley Job Vacancy Survey, which used to be done once a year, will now be conducted twice a year to provide frequent and timely analysis of the demand for labor. Previous surveys collected occupational and wage information. Beginning with this survey, the Job Vacancy Survey will not be reporting at this level of detail but will still give the estimate of total job vacancies in the region to the same degree of accuracy as before, only faster.

A total of 433 employers, representing 53 percent of the region's total employment responded to the survey. Of these, 87 are government agencies, 13 are large employers and 333 are small to mid-size employers. The survey has a response rate of 82 percent. The margin of sampling error for the overall vacancy estimate is plus or minus 10 percent or about 34 vacancies.




Job Vacancy Survey Regions

### Findings of the Survey:


- ♦ An estimated 328 jobs were available for hire during the survey period, up from 97 vacancies a year ago. This is the highest number of vacancies for the region since the survey began.
- ♦ Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining has the highest number of estimated vacancies (115), followed by education and health services (75).
- ♦ All groups of supersectors report more vacancies in this survey than a year ago.
- ♦ Small to mid-size companies provide the most vacancies with 243. However, since there are more small to mid-size firms, there are actually fewer vacancies per employer compared to large employers. There are more than 3 vacancies per large private employer compared to an average of less than one vacancy per employer for both government and small to mid-size firms.
- ♦ Sixteen percent of surveyed employers reported at least one job vacancy.

## San Luis Valley Region Employers and Employees, 3rd Quarter 2004




## Estimated Vacancies by NAICS Supersectors

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) classifies organizations into different industries based upon how the organization produces goods and services. The 20 NAICS sectors have been combined into six groups of supersectors for this survey as shown in the chart on this page.


#### Note:

Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining in this survey is the same as the goods-producing JVS sector in the previous surveys.

Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining, which reported the fewest vacancies in last year's survey, offers the most openings this year. Last survey education and health services supplied the most job opportunities. Despite falling to second in terms of estimated vacancies, that supersector still provides double the openings this survey as last. All groups of supersectors report more vacancies this year compared to the last.
