## The Eastern Region Survey

The Summer 2005 Eastern Region Job Vacancy Survey (JVS) was conducted from July 8th through the 25th, 2005. The goal of the survey is to provide current information on the demand for workers. This information can serve as input into the decision making process for employers, job seekers, economic developers, educators, and workforce centers in the region.

Over the survey period, all large and government employers as well as a random sample of private employers with five or more employees were contacted. Employers were asked if they were actively hiring, and the number of positions


Job Vacancy Survey Regions they were seeking to fill.

The Eastern Region Job Vacancy Survey, which used to be done once a year, will now be conducted twice a year to provide frequent and timely analysis of the demand for labor. Previous surveys collected occupational and wage information. Beginning with this survey, the Job Vacancy Survey will not be reporting at this level of detail but will still give the estimate of total job vacancies in the region to the same degree of accuracy as before, only faster

A total of 799 employers, representing 56 percent of the region's total employment responded to the survey. Of these, 153 are government agencies, 36 are large employers and 610 are small to mid-size employers. The survey has a response rate of 92 percent. The margin of sampling error for the overall vacancy estimate is plus or minus 2.3 percent or about 9 vacancies.

## Findings of the Survey:

- An estimated 394 jobs were available for hire during the survey period, up from 249 vacancies a year ago.
- Government has the highest number of estimated vacancies (92), followed by construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining (81). Trade, transportation, utilities and other services follows with 76 .
- All groups of supersectors report more vacancies in this survey than a year ago.
- Small to mid-size companies provide the most vacancies with 186. However, since there are more small to mid-size firms, there are actually fewer vacancies per employer compared to large employers. There are more than 3 vacancies per large private employer compared to an average of less than one vacancy per employer for both government and small to mid-size firms.

Twelve percent of surveyed employers reported at least one job vacancy.

different industries based upon how the organization produces goods and services. The 20 NAICS sectors have been combined into six groups of supersectors for this survey as shown in the chart on this page.

## Note:

Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining in this survey is the same as the goods-producing JVS sector in the previous surveys.

Government offers the most job vacancies this survey period. Last summer the goodsproducing JVS sector (construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining) provided the most job opportunities, followed by trade, transportation, utilities and other services and government. All groups of supersectors report more vacancies this survey than in the last.
