## The Eastern Region Survey

The Winter 2006 Eastern Region Job Vacancy Survey (JVS) was conducted from March 9th through the 17th, 2006. The goal of the survey is to provide current information on the demand for workers. This information can serve as input into the decision making process for employers, job seekers, economic developers, educators, and workforce centers in the region.

Over the survey period, all large and government employers as well as a random sample of private employers with five or more employees were contacted. Employers were asked if they were actively hiring, and the number of positions


Job Vacancy Survey Regions they were seeking to fill. The Eastern Region Job Vacancy Survey is conducted twice a year to provide frequent and useful analysis of the demand for labor. This is the first time the Eastern Region survey has been done in winter.

A total of 849 employers, representing 52 percent of the region's total employment responded to the survey. Of these, 119 are government agencies, 37 are large employers and 693 are small to mid-size employers. The survey has a response rate of 80 percent. The margin of sampling error for the overall vacancy estimate is plus or minus 0.09 percent.

## Findings of the Survey:

- An estimated 1,047 jobs were available for hire during the survey period, the most openings this region has had since the survey began in fall 2001.
- Trade, transportation, utilities and other services has the highest number of estimated vacancies (288), followed by education and health services (193) and leisure and hospitality (188).
- All groups of supersectors report more vacancies in this survey than in the last Eastern Region survey conducted in summer 2005.
- Small to mid-size companies provide the most vacancies with 668. However, since there are more small to mid-size firms, there are actually fewer vacancies per employer compared to large employers. There are more than 7 vacancies per large private company compared to an average of one vacancy per employer for small to mid-size firms.

Twenty-two percent of surveyed employers reported at least one job vacancy.

## Estimated Vacancies by NAICS Supersectors

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) classifies organizations into different industries based upon how the organization produces goods and services. The 20 NAICS sectors have been combined into six groups of supersectors for this survey as shown in the chart on this page.

## Note:

Construction, manufacturing, natural resources and mining in this survey is the same as the goods-producing JVS sector in the previous surveys.

The top three supersectors in terms of estimated vacancies-trade, transportation, utilities \& other services, education \& health services and leisure \& hospitality - make up $64 \%$ of the Eastern Region's job openings. This is the first Eastern Region Job Vacancy Survey to be done in the winter, but all supersectors report more vacancies this survey than in the last survey conducted for the region in summer 2005.
