

PURPOSE

Opening Doors, the Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness, set a goal of ending youth homelessness by 2020. As a method to track progress towards the accomplishment of that goal, HUD announced that the 2017 PIT count would be a baseline year for measuring success. PITs are HUD-required surveys of every person experiencing homelessness conducted on one date in a HUD identified community. HUD nationally identifies communities through CoCs. Colorado, as a whole is comprised of three CoCs: Balance of the State (56 counties), Colorado Springs/El Paso (1 county) and, Metropolitan Denver Homeless Initiative (7 counties). The following map indicates which counties are covered by each CoC.



The PIT is a valuable tool that provides nationwide data on the number of people experiencing homelessness. However, like many tools used to collect data, PIT does not provide a complete picture of housing insecurity in the United States. For example, the only individuals eligible to be counted are those experiencing homelessness per HUD's definition of literal homelessness¹. In addition, as the name suggests, the count is conducted at a single point in time and not over the course of the year. This provides a snapshot. Many factors impact each community's count results, including incentives for taking surveys, having individuals experiencing homelessness assist with planning, preparation, data reporting methods, and weather. Nevertheless, this practice has been conducted since 2005 and provides comparable data. At the end of each year, HUD publishes the Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) to Congress. This document combines count data from every CoC to analyze and share homelessness trends and data from across the country.

(1) Individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, (i) Has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not meant for human habitation; (ii) Is living in a publicly or privately operated shelter. (i.e. this would not include anyone doubled up, couch surfing or currently in an institution).

In 2017, the Office of Homeless Youth Services (OHYS) and ACHY worked in conjunction with the CoCs to ensure the baseline year² data was robust, inclusive, and collected additional data about youth needs.

Because of the valuable baseline year and increased efforts in 2017, OHYS and ACHY worked to create additional questions to be added to the PIT and administered to anyone between the ages of 11 through 24 (not yet 25). The questions were created by using previous youth count surveys, Voices of Youth Count experiences, and the optional HUD created and supported additional supplemental questionnaire created for this year. Together these questions, with the HUD PIT survey questions created the PIT Youth Supplemental Report.

Challenges with the count included: McKinney Vento Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) Laws, two simultaneous but separate surveys, coordination of multiple communities and different levels of capacity, and varying definitions of homeless, especially as it concerns youth.

METHODOLOGY

OHYS and ACHY worked together to identify and craft additional questions related to needs expressed in various communities to determine what, if anything, needed to be revised to improve outcomes for youth experiencing homelessness.

Once the questions were established, OHYS connected with each CoC's leadership to coordinate outreach and engagement among community members who would administer the Youth Supplemental Count questions during the annual PIT. OHYS and ACHY also engaged youth service providers to help gather additional data on youth who may not be accessing homeless services due to eligibility, knowledge of resources, fear, age, or stigma to be sure all youth who are unstably housed were included. ACHY members helped train volunteers to conduct both the PIT count and the additional questions. All surveyors were asked to conduct both the HUD PIT survey and the Youth Supplemental Survey to anyone under the age of 25 and to send the HUD required PIT surveys to the CoC, and both the surveys to OHYS.

After the surveys were collected, the data compiled by OHYS was shared with each CoC to ensure all HUD required data collected was included in the HUD count for the valuable baseline year data.

In 2017, 21 counties in Colorado participated in the PIT Youth Supplemental Count. OHYS received 840 surveys from youth aged 11-24. The surveys were coded with either a category 1, 2, or 3.


- Category 1: All data was collected. For purposes of this survey, youth who indicated they were couch surfing are included in this group. Including this group was requested by ACHY members to tell a more complete picture of youth homelessness in Colorado.
- Category 2: Some data is missing either for age or for place slept the night of the survey. Because of the multiple counties and surveyors involved, some surveys were not collected in all cases. In some cases, OHYS received only the PIT survey; in others, OHYS received only the Youth Supplemental.

This may slightly skew the data (more information about this is included in the data type section below.)

- Category 3: Youth indicated they are living with their parents or in their own apartment on the survey.

This report includes the youth who are couch surfing. Because of this the numbers and figures represented in this report will not fully match those reported in the Annual Homeless Assessment Report for 2017 or towards the baseline for youth homelessness.



In the following analysis, we will use only surveys with a validation code of Category 1 or 2. Respondents who were validated as a Category 3 are not included, but should still be considered as youth in unstable living situations. They are not considered homeless for this data set.

Of the 840 surveys received, 511 were validated as 1s, 220 were validated as 2s, and 109 were validated as 3s. The following analysis will be conducted with 731 surveys (1s and 2s).

Reports for specific communities will only be completed on communities with ten or more completed surveys to help maintain the anonymity of the respondents.

DATA TYPES

For the following report, the number of responses per question varied. Below is a description of each survey and the type of data collected within each:

HUD-Required Survey:

The HUD-Required Survey focuses primarily on demographic information in addition to housing status. The information collected includes: gender, age, race/ethnicity, disability, and domestic violence history. The majority of youth respondents completed at least this survey. 365 respondents completed this survey only.

Youth Supplemental Survey:

The Youth Supplemental Survey was created in conjunction with OHYS and ACHY. This survey was not required, but encouraged to be administered to anyone under the age of 25. Not all participating PIT communities were able to administer both due to limitations in outreach, training and volunteer capacity. Increased outreach and coordination to incorporate the additional questions will be provided for future counts. The information collected by this survey includes: foster care experience, corrections history, age at first homelessness episode, if respondent is a parent, education and highest educational level, and if the respondent is currently earning money. 61 respondents completed this survey only.

Both Surveys:

305 respondents completed both surveys.

KEY SUMMARY IDEAS

- Permanent affordable housing is at a shortage and impacts a wide range of Coloradans, including youth. The number of surveyed youth experiencing homelessness indicates our communities could benefit from increased housing geared specifically towards youth development and stability. Data from the report can assist with funding requests, program development, needs analysis and creating a community-wide strategy towards ending homelessness for youth.
- The Youth Supplemental Count expanded the homelessness definition beyond HUD's to include youth sleeping on couches or in overcrowded situations. Even with the expanded definition, many youth experiencing homelessness still met HUD's definition of literal homeless, with the majority staying in shelters and outside. (page 7)
- Youth of color are overrepresented in the homeless youth population when compared to the general population of Colorado. (page 9)
- Youth who reported systems involvement (such as Child Welfare or Juvenile Justice) are overrepresented in the homeless youth population when compared with the general population of Colorado youth. The questions do not address whether the experiences with the systems are a result of homelessness (e.g., being arrested for an offense likely related to the homeless experience like trespassing) or if the systems involvement contributed to the experience of homelessness (i.e., it is difficult to secure an apartment with a criminal background). However, both situations may likely exist. (page 11)
- At or near age 17 is when youth are generally more likely to experience homelessness as an unaccompanied youth versus experiencing homelessness with parents or guardians. Generally, the older they are with their first experience, they may be more likely to be unaccompanied. (page 12)
- The majority of youth not currently enrolled in school (74%) have completed a basic education by either receiving a high school diploma or GED certification. (page 13)
- Of the youth who have completed a basic education, approximately half were currently employed at the time of the survey. However, youth who did not earn a high school diploma or GED certification were less likely to be employed at the time of the survey. Not having a basic education appears to be a barrier to gaining employment. Effort at local levels to increase connections to McKinney Vento Liaisons, Alternative Education Programs, or GED programs for youth experiencing homelessness may lead to increased opportunities for employment. - Within the population of youth experiencing homelessness, youth of color are significantly underrepresented in the work force even though they are overrepresented in the homelessness population. This data suggests local communities may have an impact on youth of color who are homeless by diversifying employment programming or working directly with employers on the benefits of a diverse workforce. (page 15)

GET INVOLVED




21 counties participated in the 2017 Point in Time Youth Supplemental Count.



Of Those Meeting the HUD Definition, Location Slept





HUD uses a narrow definition of homelessness (see page 2). For the purposes of the Youth Supplemental Questionnaire, the definition was broadened to capture data about individuals that are couch surfing. These youth will not be reported to HUD for the youth homelessness baseline, but still tells an important story about youth homelessness in Colorado. As a result of these two definitions, (along with other reasons described in the methodology section) these numbers will differ from the report generated by HUD.


Age by Range



Ages within the 18-24 Range



Gender Response





“Transgender” accounts for 1.1% and “Doesn’t Identify” accounts for .9%.


RACE AND ETHNICITY

Ethnicity





Youth of color are significantly overrepresented in the homeless youth population as compared to Colorado’s general population. American Indian, Black, Multiple Races, and Native Hawaiian overrepresented in this way. This is also present when looking at ethnicity with Hispanic youth overrepresented in the population of youth experiencing homelessness when compared to the overall population of Colorado.




Of those that answered yes to having a disability 67.9% met the HUD definition of literally homeless.

Mental Health includes: Bipolar Disorder, Developmental Disability, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, Substance Abuse, and broadly Mental Health Disability. 108 respondents out of 262 indicated the presence of a substance abuse issue that reached the definition of a disability.

Domestic Violence





Foster Care Involvement



In any given year, less than 1% of the youth population of the United States is in foster care. In 2015, the Adoption and Foster Care Analysis and Reporting System (AFCARS) Report (#23) from US Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Administration on Children, Youth and Families, Children’s Bureau reported 427,910 youth currently in foster care and 243,060 youth had exited during that fiscal year for a total of 670,970 youth in foster care during the 2015 FY. The overall population of the United States was 321.4 million, and youth made up about 73.6million of that. The number of youth reporting homelessness is an overrepresentation of youth with foster care experience for the general population.

Corrections Experience





Only 20 (or 11%) of the individuals with corrections experience were also parents.

Approximately 26% of youth had both experienced both kinds of systems involvement, foster care and corrections.

FIRST EXPERIENCE WITH HOMELESSNESS



The youngest respondent whose first experience with homelessness without a parent or guardian was 11 years old. This chart demonstrates the older a youth is at the first experience with homelessness the less likely they are to have been with a parent or guardian.

80% of respondents were older at time of survey than what they reported their first experience of homelessness was. Indicating either long length of homelessness or multiple episodes.





Youth Currently In School





High School Grad/GED v Drop Out






Currently Earning Money

Earning Money v Education Level





Youth of color are significantly over-represented in the youth who are not currently earning money. Approximately 73% of all respondents identified with “White” as a race, however only 11% of all people that report currently earning “no income” identified with “White” as a race.
