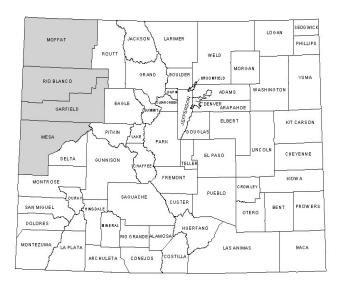

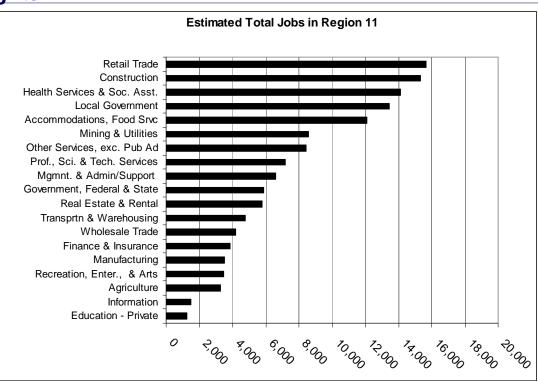

Economic Highlights

Jobs

The region had 138,886 jobs in 2009. The largest portion of these were in retail trade (15,663 jobs, 11.3 percent), construction (15.319, 11.0 percent), health services and social assistance (14,102, 10.2 percent), local government (13,442, 9.7 percent), and accommodations and food services (12,081, 8.7 percent).

Jobs grew an average of 1.9 percent annually from 2001 to 2009 and dropped 7.4 percent (-11150 jobs) from 2008 to 2009. Construction decreased by 4,196 jobs (-21.5 percent), followed by 1,922 jobs lost in mining and utilities (-18.3 percent) and 1,500 retail jobs lost (-8.7 percent). Local government added 419 jobs (3.2 percent), as did federal and state government (168 jobs, 2.9 percent) and health services and social assistance (133 jobs, 1.0 percent

From 2001 to 2008, per capita personal income increased 5.1 percent per year while that of the nation increased at an annual rate of 3.2 percent. Thus, the region's ratio (of per capita income) to that of the nation increased from 0.898 to 0.984 during the eight-year period. Of the personal income of the region in 2008, 68.8 percent was from earnings, 4.9 percent from retirement and disability payments, 4.7 percent from Medicare, Medicaid and Veteran's benefits, and 19.3 percent from dividends, interest and rent.

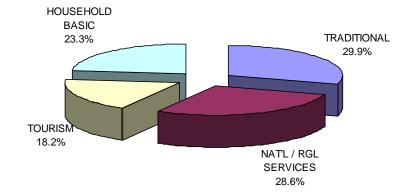
Base Analysis

NORTHWEST COLORADO - REGION 11

ECONOMIC BASE (JOBS), 2009

The economic base is very diversified. Traditional base sectors include strong agribusiness in Moffat and Rio Blanco counties, major mining activities and Federal and state government presence in all counties except Routt, and a significant manufacturing sector in Mesa. Mesa County also provides business and professional services to the wider region while a number of the counties provide construction services outside their boundaries. Tourism constitutes 48.9 percent of the base in Routt County and is significant in Garfield (19.9 percent), Rio Blanco (15.1 percent) and Mesa (9.4 percent) Counties as well. Retirees constitute 16.2 percent of Mesa County's economic base and 13.2 percent of the overall region.

Population Highlights

Forecasts

From 2010 to 2015 the region's economy is expected to grow 18,494 total jobs at an annual average rate of 2.5 percent. Over this time 11,137 direct basic jobs should be created. From 2015 to 2025 total job growth should slightly accelerate to 2.6 percent annually. The growth in the short term is led by **National and Regional Services** followed by **Tourism**. Job growth after 2015 will be driven by significant increases in jobs related to income -- from Social Security and pensions -- and savings of **retirees**, the **investment income and wealth** of others as the rate of increase in the number of retirees increases as well.

The population of the region in 2009 was 250,293. This represents a strong annual increase of 2.8 percent since 2000. The region has grown steadily since 2000, with the growth of energy-related activities in the area and growth of tourism-related activities, and second homes in Routt and other counties. Garfield (3.0 percent annual growth rate), Mesa (2.6 percent), and

Routt (2.2 percent) counties have grown at particularly high rates since 2000.

Of the region's 250,293 people, 5,631 live in group quarters, and the remaining 244,662 in households. The region averages 2.51 persons per household (occupied housing units) with Garfield County having a higher ratio (of 2.66) relative to other counties in the region. The region's 13.32 percent vacancy rate includes a significant number of houses - in Routt, especially – used for seasonal recreation purposes.

The region is expected to continue to grow strongly in the next twenty years with continued development of the health services related industries. In addition, the region has a very strong destination tourist industry and an attraction to second homes. Lastly, the region will see strong increases in retirees as its own baby-boomers retire and as others in the state are attracted to the region's amenities, low cost of living and rural life style.

The median age of the region on July 1, 2009 was 35.6 as compared to the state's median age of 35.1. This is mainly due to slightly larger proportions of the population in the older age groups – 38.5 percent over 45 for the region versus 36.2 percent for the state. The median age of the region is expected to increase to 36.0 by 2030 with an increased proportion of working age adults while that of the state is expected to rise to 36.6 with the aging of the baby boomers.

Forecasts

Integrating the Economic and Population Forecasts by way of Analysis of the Labor Market The separate forecasts of the economy (jobs) and the population are *integrated* -- or made consistent with each other -- by way of an analysis of the labor market. The analysis reviews whether the population forecast in the demographic models and the workforce they are expected to provide (supply) will be sufficient (or too great) to meet the demands of the economy. If not, the population forecast – migration – may have to be adjusted so that the jobs supplied by the population is more in line with the jobs

forecast.

Working from the bottom of the upper table, labor force participation rates are applied to noninstitutional populations over 16 - by age and gender to produce a forecast of the labor force for an existing or projected population. When the forecasted number unemployed persons are subtracted from the labor force, a forecast of the number of employed persons results. This num-

ber + the number of 2nd and 3rd jobs supplied by multiple job holders + those provided by commuters living outside the region - those who will work outside equals the number of jobs supplied by the population.

Note that the number of jobs supplied by the population and their rates of growth are not the same as the growth (rates) of the population. Hence this analysis is essential to establishing an appropriate relationship between jobs and population.

Changes in the overall or total labor force participation rate(s) (LFPR) are really a function of changes LFPR by age and gender and changes in the relative proportions in each. In general, LFPR for each age-gender group are expected to rise slightly to 2025. Those of women - especially those in upper age groups -are expected to increase more substantially, as the result of greater women's participation in younger age groups in past decades. Changes in the overall or total LFPR of a region, if it's declining, are due to increases in the number of people in younger or older age groups where participation rates are expected to remain relatively low.

The forecasting worksheets attempt to integrate and / or reconcile the economic forecast of total jobs with the population forecast. The rates of growth of these two key variables can differ somewhat because of changes in the labor market, i.e., labor force participation rates, unemployment rates, multiple job holding, and/or commuting. For example, between 2010 and 2015 job growth in the region is expected to be 2.5 percent per year while population growth will be 2.2 percent.
