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I. INTRODUCTION

The Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority, the Water Quality Control Division and the Division of Local Government (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "State") have prepared this annual report on Colorado's Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF). The fiscal year covered is January 1, 1995, to December 31, 1995. This report is intended to describe the activity of the WPCRF for this period, address the progress made on the goals of the program and present the annual audited financial statements for fiscal year 1995.

II. HISTORY

Colorado's WPCRF Program was established by legislation in April of 1988. Also in April 1988 the Water Quality Control Commission (the "Commission") adopted Revolving Fund Regulation 5.2.0 which governs the Priority and Eligibility Lists and Administrative Procedures.

The Intended Use Plan and the state-wide priority and eligibility lists are evaluated and brought before the Commission annually. Additions and modifications to the eligibility list are adopted by the Commission by December 31 of each year and approved by the Colorado General Assembly during the subsequent legislative session prior to April 1.

Changes since 1988:

The Commission amended the regulation to include Nonpoint Source projects and other program improvements on January 3, 1989.

WPCRF Rules 5.2.0 were amended again on October 11, 1990, to reduce delays in adopting the priority and eligibility lists.

The October 17, 1991, revisions to the WPCRF Rules allow additional projects that are eligible under this program to receive funding priority. They also allow assistance to communities that qualify under pollution prevention efforts rather than limiting priorities to compliance and enforcement projects.

Proactive changes were made to the Rules in October 1992. Small communities (under 5,000 population) are eligible for WPCRF assistance with an approved feasibility study rather than an extensive facility plan. The feasibility study will still have all the necessary quirements and will help reduce costs to small communities. The Rules were also amended to include water conservation measures as an eligible item for participation in the WPCRF. Additional priority points are assigned for including water conservation measures as a part of a project.

No substantial changes were made in 1993, 1994, or 1995; however, the Commission directed staff to revisit the WPCRF Rules for possible changes to the priority point system. The Water Quality Control Division (WQCD) staff is awaiting the Clean Water Act reauthorization prior to finalizing changes to the WPCRF Rules. A critical review team will be formed to add the schanges to the WPCRF Rules targeted for completion prior to the adoption of the FY1998 Intended Use Plan.

Minor changes to the financial program were made in 1994 and 1995. The changes occurred in both the direct loan and leveraged-loan The leveraged-loan program, through the Surplus programs. Matching Account agreement, was modified in 1994 to include direct loan repayments as security for the Clean Water Bonds. Direct loan repayments are held for up to one year in the Surplus Matching Account. De-allocations from the Matching Account and State Match repayments are held in their respective accounts until September 1 when they are then transferred to the Surplus Matching Account. On September 1 of each year, the Surplus Matching Account may be used to cure any default on any Clean Water Bonds. If there are no defaults, the funds are moved to the re-loan account on September 2. By pledging the direct loan repayments, the ability to make additional loans with this money will be delayed for a short time period.

An additional minor change occurred in 1995 to provide additional security for the Clean Water Bonds. This change involved another modification to the Surplus Matching Account agreement to require funds in each Matching Account to be the greater of: (a) the amount

required to be on deposit in the Matching Account for such Bonds, or (b) maximum annual debt service due in the current year or future years on the Bonds secured by such Matching Account. By keeping the Matching Account for each borrower at the maximum annual debt service level, the WPCRF will lose some loan capacity over the last four years of each loan. The Matching Account is generally larger than the maximum annual debt service except for the last four years of each Bond issue.

The last minor change involves the Authority's policy on direct loan amounts. In late 1995 the Authority's Board reviewed the current limitation of \$500,000 for each direct loan. Although this has not been a strict policy, it has been a guideline. Since the number and size of leveraged loans are uncertain for each year; the WPCRF had at that time in excess of \$24 million of unencumbered grant awards; and there appeared to be a need for these larger loans; the Board felt it was appropriate to change the policy guideline to allow direct loans with amounts of up to \$1 million. In reviewing direct loans of this size, the Board would favorably consider a shorter loan term.

III. SUMMARY

The reporting period for this document is January 1, 1995, through December 31, 1995. The Federal grant funds available for the FY1995 loan cycle include approximately \$8,416,204 remaining from the FY1992 grant, \$15,374,601 from the FY1993 grant, \$9,536,100 from the FY1994 grant, and \$9,852,000 from the FY1995 grant that was awarded on March 22, 1995. Of these amounts, \$1,116,974 has been committed to cover administrative expenses.

The FY1995 Intended Use Plan was adopted by the Water Quality Control Commission and became effective on December 30, 1994. In that plan, projects totaling over \$53 million were identified for potential loans during FY1995.

Nine loans were executed during 1995 with a total principal amount of \$27,010,722. The communities receiving leveraged loans included: City of Brighton, City of Craig, City of Fort Morgan, City of Steamboat Springs,

Upper Eagle Valley Consolidated Sanitation District and Winter Park Water and Sanitation District. Direct loans were made to: City of Fruita, Town of Log Lane Village and Parker Water and Sanitation District.

The Clean Water Bonds issued to fund the leverage loans maintained their "AA/Aa" stings from Standard and Poor's Ratings Group and Moody's Investors Service, respectively.

IV. GOALS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The following discussion addresses the progress toward meeting the goals and accomplishments that were made a part of the WPCRF program through the FY1995 Intended Use Plan (IUP).

A. SHORT AND LONG TERM GOALS

(1) Provide maximum State assistance to governmental agencies in achieving compliance with the Federal Act.

The agencies involved in the WPCRF have diligently worked together and with other funding agencies to find the best funding sources for each individual community.

An ongoing outreach program through the Division of Local Government is assisting community officials in achieving compliance and helping them professionally manage their systems. The Division conducted six workshops throughout the State in September and October 1995 addressing current legislation, financing programs and regulatory issues. Speakers in these workshops included representatives from the Colorado Departments of Local Affairs, Natural Resources and Public Health & Environment as well as Region VIII EPA and the National Small Flows Clearinghouse. Technical assistance is also provided by the Division through site visits, a plant operator training calendar and various other publications and activities.

The incentives used for loans include direct loan interest rates at 4.5 percent and leveraged loans at 80 percent of market rate.

(2) Design the WPCRF to be as simple, efficient and flexible as possible.

The regulations are clear and the application packet includes specific instructions.

The WPCRF Handbook of Procedures was finalized and approved in June 1995. The WQCD will continuously develop the handbook to ensure that all projects meet the state and federal requirements associated with the loan program.

The operating procedures and policies are quite complex due to many federal requirements; however, the State continues to work with EPA in refining these procedures and policies.

(3) Manage WPCRF to meet current and projected water quality needs in the State of Colorado.

The program has been set up to be self perpetuating and will be leveraged to the maximum extent possible to meet the projected water quality needs of the State and to maintain financial integrity of the WPCRF.

(4) Make the WPCRF accessible to all governmental agencies of the State.

The WQCD through the Commission has developed a Priority System that requires state-wide participation.

All three agencies continue to promote the program through meetings, the media and other outreach efforts.

(5) Provide financial assistance to governmental agencies at as low a cost as possible, consistent with continued economic viability of the fund.

This is a continuing goal of the State. Greater effort has been expended to coordinate project funding from all available sources, including Community Development Block Grants, Rural Economic and Community Development and Energy Impact programs.

(6) Provide adequate technical assistance to governmental agencies for effective planning, design, financing and management of facilities to meet water quality standards. Expenses incurred in providing this assistance will be covered by the WPCRF through administrative surcharges on the loans.

Administrative fees are adequate to fund technical support to local governments. Preapplication and preplanning meetings are being scheduled with communities to assist with planning, scheduling, financing and management. Additional engineering support has been added to the program to provide technical review as well as technical assistance to small communities.

A team approach to the construction of wastewater treatment facilities is established at the onset to provide communities with all program requirements to save time, money and create the relationships necessary to facilitate the best project for the community. (See **Exhibit A**.)

(7) Maintain an adequate data management system to track and monitor all WPCRF projects and program information.

A data management system is being used to track and monitor all WPCRF projects.

(8) Ensure proper accounting, audit and fiscal procedures, conforming with generally accepted accounting principles and governmental auditing standards.

This goal is met and is substantiated by the attached audited financial statements (Attachment 4).

B. ACCOMPLISHMENTS

For the purposes of this report the State will reference the 1995 IUP, adopted by the Commission. A formal public hearing was held on October 11, 1994.

The 1995 IUP (included as **Attachment 1**) contains a list of projects that the State considered as projected commitments (**Appendix B to Attachment 1**). There were thirteen projects listed in the IUP totaling over \$53 million; nine loan agreements were executed in 1995 totaling \$27,010,722. (With Fruita's loan amendment, the total is \$26,942,157.) Details of the loans can be found later in the Project Status portion of this report.

In 1995 the Colorado Legislature, through SB95-083, created the Drinking Water Revolving Fund ("DWRF"). The program was capitalized with \$6.2 million to be transferred over a period of four years. The DWRF was created very much like the WPCRF. Projects are authorized in a similar manner, as well. The 1995 eligibility list contained 119 projects. Thirteen loan applications were reviewed and approved and five loans were executed.

During 1995 the Authority with assistance from the WQCD and the DLG initiated a survey of public drinking water infrastructure needs. The survey was intended to supplement the information from an ongoing survey being conducted by the EPA. Based on the responses of 268 entities out of 441 surveyed, including those surveyed by the EPA, the identified need was in excess of \$1.2 billion. Clearly there is a significant need for a revolving fund program to assist with the financing of drinking water infrastructure.

V. PROGRAM DETAILS

A. WPCRF FINANCIAL STATUS

The FY1995 capitalization grant was awarded on March 22, 1995. The EPA share was \$9,852,000 and the State Match was \$1,970,400 for a total of \$11,822,400. With this grant, Colorado has been awarded \$91,519,957 to date from EPA and has committed to provide a total of \$18,304,043 for State Match.

Exhibit B shows the capitalization grant payments, cumulative payments, binding commitments and percentage of binding commitments. **Exhibit C** presents a summary of project and

administrative draws against the various grants. Other financial details are available in **Attachment 4** (audited financial statements) and **Exhibit I** (Forms 269A).

Exhibit D represents the loan status of all projects as of December 31, 1995.

B. PROJECT STATUS

Exhibit E is a grants information control system (GICS) generated report showing nine loan agreements executed during the 1995 reporting period. Each project is briefly described below.

City of Brighton - A twenty-year loan in the amount of \$5,080,484 was executed on May 1, 1995. The scope of work included several projects which will be phased over a period of 2-3 years. The first phase of the project involved repairs to the City's central trunk sewer line which has been completed at a cost of \$750,299. The second phase includes the installation of a centrifuge to improve the efficiency of the bio-solids operations.

City of Craig - A twenty-year loan was executed May 1, 1995, in the amount of \$1,096,820. The project consists of the modification of the bio-solids lagoons to provide impermeable geomembrane liners and wear resistant asphalt work surfaces. The project is substantially complete, with final completion and final inspection scheduled for September 1996.

City of Fort Morgan - A twenty-year loan was executed May 1, 1995, for \$9,146,685. The project consists of a 2.25 million gallons per day (MGD) wastewater treatment plant and a two-mile interceptor sewer line. The new facility is a design/build project. Construction began on April 28, 1995, and is scheduled to be complete by February 26, 1997.

City of Fruita - Construction of the interceptor, connecting the Kings View Estate subdivision with the Fruita wastewater treatment facility, was completed in 1995. Initiation of operation of the interceptor line occurred August 16, 1995. The King View Estates' lagoons have been dewatered and will be abandoned. A twenty-year direct loan was executed on April 27, 1995, for \$224,000. Due to lower project costs than originally anticipated, the loan was amended on October 6, 1995, to reflect a principal amount of \$155,435.23.

Town of Log Lane Village - A twenty-year direct loan was executed June 1, 1995, for \$250,000. The project consists of construction of a lift station and new pipeline for transport of wastewater flows to connect to the City of Fort Morgan. The pipeline distance is approximately 1 1/4 miles. The total project cost is \$734,200. Construction began August 8, 1995, and was completed in November 1995.

Parker Water and Sanitation District - A leveraged loan was executed on August 10, 1994, for \$1,781,883. A fiveyear direct loan was executed on a March 16, 1995, for \$500,000 to cover increased costs to the project. The project included construction of an Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility (phosphorus removal and ammonia) at the south plant and construction of larger interceptors. Construction began in December 1994 and was completed in October 1995

City of Steamboat Springs - A twenty-year loan was executed May 1, 1995, in the amount of \$1,563,550. The project consists of increasing digester capacity to meet new bio-solids requirements and improving the land application system in order to increase the area under the land application. This project is more than 75% complete. Construction will resume when weather allows. Anticipated completion date is September 30, 1996.

Upper Eagle Valley Consolidated Sanitation District - A second twenty-year loan was executed May 1, 1995, in the amount of \$6,099,183. Both loans (total of \$13,468,023) will provide funding for the project that consists of a liquid treatment and odor control facility which will be constructed to provide additional organic treatment capacity and to improve the operability and maintainability of the wastewater facility. Construction began August 1995 and is approximately 25% complete.

Winter Park Water and Sanitation District - The District executed a twenty-year, \$3,050,000 loan on May 1, 1995. The District is experiencing growth and must upgrade its facility to meets its compliance schedule. This loan will fund the first part of a two-phased plan. The District has submitted a Draft 201 Facility Plan and will complete the Final Plan by February 1996. In early 1996 the District realized that the organic loading is higher than anticipated. This may necessitate a design change and result in additional costs of \$1 million.

The State received an application from the Garden Valley Water and Sanitation District for \$273,500 to fund construction of a line connecting the District's wastewater system to that of the City of Colorado Springs. After reviewing the application, DLG informed the Authority, WQCD and the District that consideration of the application should be postponed until several outstanding financial and legal matters were resolved. These matters included financial statements which did not fairly present financial condition, poor financial indicators and related party transactions. DLG has been working with the District to resolve these matters and explore more appropriate financing alternatives.

Exhibit F is a report of all projects funded to date. The report breaks out the equivalency and nonequivalency projects; gives the interest rate on each loan; shows the construction start, initiation of operation

and performance certification dates. **Exhibit G** classifies all loans by cost categories. Below is a brief summary of the current status of the active projects listed in these reports.

City of Alamosa - A fifteen-year loan in the amount of \$3,197,216 was executed on August 10, 1994. This was an equivalency project because the project included a Federal Construction Grant and a Community Development Block Grant. Construction of the regional "Bio-Lac" facility began in May 1995 and initiated operation on October 25, 1995.

Genesee Water and Sanitation District - A twenty-year loan was executed on August 10, 1994, in the amount of \$1,498,151 of which approximately \$1,197,169 has been paid as of December 31, 1995. The project consisted of improvements to the treatment plant for phosphorus removal, solids dewatering, two additional clarifiers, pumping and mechanical equipment. The project is approximately 80% complete and ahead of schedule.

City of Greeley - A twenty-year loan was executed on August 10, 1994. It has been recorded on the WPCRF's books as a loan of \$13,457,960. The principal amount in the loan agreement is \$13,337,082 due to the requirement of Greeley's City Charter prohibiting the issuance of debt at a discount. As a result, the underwriter's discount of \$120,878 could not be reflected in the loan principal. To recoup this amount, Greeley's interest rate is slightly higher and the additional interest will be used to cover the difference in principal. The project includes several upgrades to the existing facility. Construction began on October 24, 1994, and is expected to be complete by mid-September 1996.

City of Longmont - A \$3,500,000 twenty-year loan replaced a failed breakpoint chlorination nitrification system that had been funded with a federal construction grant.

Construction was completed in April 1995. Final payment and project close-out is still pending due to unresolved labor issues.

City of Ouray - A twenty-year direct loan for \$800,000 was awarded on September 17, 1992. The City was unable to certify its one-year performance in July 1995 because they are operating beyond the plant's 80% design capacity. The State is currently working with the Town to obtain performance certification.

Roxborough Park Metropolitan District - On November 18, 1994, the District received a twenty-year loan in the amount of \$600,000 to construct advanced waste water treatment facilities including a chemical phosphorous removal system, new headworks and bio-solids handling buildings, as well as an improved aeration system. The final inspection is scheduled in conjunction with the initiation of operations for the end of February 1996.

St. Mary's Glacier Water and Sanitation District - A twentyyear direct loan was issued in July 1994 in the amount of \$150,000. The District continues working on infiltration/inflow repairs to the existing sewer collection system. The repairs to date have resulted in significant reductions in the average daily flows. Construction started on October 1, 1994. Project payments of \$46,505.00 have been made to the District.

Town of Windsor - A fifteen-year loan was executed on August 10, 1994, for \$3,998,853. The project has converted the existing aerated lagoon to an activated sludge plant in order to meet ammonia standards and expand plant capacity. Construction began February 16, 1995, and is expected to be complete by June 1996.

C. COMPLIANCE WITH PROVISIONS OF GRANT/OPERATING AGREEMENT

There are many requirements in the capitalization grant/operating agreement that the State must meet to maintain the WPCRF according to EPA standards. A letter from the WQCD (Attachment 3) certifies the State has met the following requirement of the Operating Agreement's "Roles and Responsibilities of the State."

- a. Colorado has established an instrumentality of the State utilizing the specific expertise of three agencies via legislation adopted in 1988.
- b. The WQCD submitted a report to Region VIII regarding adequate 205(g) funds to closeout the grant program. The report was approved by Region VIII on November 30, 1989, and is being updated and approved annually. A detailed revision to the report was submitted to EPA on September 16, 1995.
- c. In accordance with federal regulations, state law and the WPCRF Rules, the IUP (which includes the priority and eligibility lists) is presented at a public hearing through the Commission prior to December 31 each year.

Needs assessment is continuing through the program with regular discussions between staff of the three agencies occurring during the year. The quarterly Water and Sewer Needs Committee meetings at the DLG is the most regular forum for this to take place. As in prior years the WQCD staff updated all project and cost information, and the DLG updated the user rate information on all priority list projects.

- d. ACH payment schedules are submitted to EPA Region VIII annually.
- e. The appropriate State Match is included with each capitalization grant (ACH) draw. The annual State Match contribution is verified by audit.

- f. A binding commitment (loan agreement) is made after a thorough review of the sponsor's application and financial capability. **Exhibit B** reports the binding commitment percentage to be well over 120% because of the State's leveraged-loan program.
- g. The purpose of the WPCRF program is to expend all funds in an expeditious and timely manner for the benefit of the State. This is reenforced by the WPCRF Rules.
- h. There is only one project still being tracked for the National Municipal Policy list in Colorado. The minor facility, the Town of Red Cliff, is on an enforceable compliance schedule. Representatives of the Department of Local Affairs, Rural Economic and Community Development, EPA and WQCD continually meet with Red Cliff officials to explore cost effective solutions to the Town's deficiencies.
- i. Verification of the State's compliance with project eligibility can be found in the project files.
- j. The State maintains extensive expenditure files (administrative and project) for the WPCRF. While conducting various compliance testing procedures, the auditors indicated that nothing came to their attention that caused them to believe that the Authority had not complied, in all material respects, within various provisions of laws, regulations, contracts or grants.
- k. Management of the WPCRF is monitored frequently by each of the three agencies. Improvements are continually made to the program with concurrence from EPA.
- The program's financial accounting structure is maintained by the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority. The financial statements are audited annually by an independent, outside auditor.
- m. The Colorado WPCRF Annual Report is submitted to EPA by March 31 of each year as required.

n. The State has agreed to the 8% Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal. EPA has trained the State to monitor and evaluate DBE participation of loan recipients and their contractors. The State is currently utilizing a DBE for financial printing, investment brokering services, arbitrage rebate services and underwriting. An evaluation of participation was completed on the bids for the Cities of Fort Morgan [8.6% (\$715,000) of \$8,322,000], Craig, Steamboat Springs and Fruita, Upper Eagle Valley Consolidated Sanitation District and Parker Water and Sanitation District.

Exhibit H is a report of SF334 forms that are tracked during construction. The percent of participation is documented in each project file. In addition to DBE participation, the City of Fort Morgan is using Rural Businesses in its design/build project.

- o. In accordance with the operating agreement, civil rights compliance forms are submitted to EPA for certification prior to executing loan agreements.
- p. The State's Environmental Review Process was approved by EPA and incorporated as part of the Operating Agreement on May 21, 1991. During the 1995 reporting period, the State prepared and/or published four Finding of No Significant Impact (FNSI) documents for the Cities of Craig, Steamboat Springs and Fort Morgan and the Town of Log Lane Village.

To further track projects for compliance with the Operating Agreement, the State utilizes the GICS data base.

VI. PROJECTIONS FOR 1996

A. PROJECTED LOANS

The FY1996 IUP (**Attachment 2**) includes a list of projects from the eligibility list that have or are anticipated to submit loan applications. These projects are considered the State's projected commitments for the 1996 WPCRF loan program.

B. PROPOSED PROGRAM IMPROVEMENTS AND/OR MODIFICATIONS

The 1996 IUP Short and Long Term Goals were modified slightly to reflect the current WPCRF program's needs as recommended by the Environmental Protection Agency.

The Division will form a critical review team to address revisions and major improvements in the WPCRF rules. Forecasted changes to the Clean Water Act will be considered. The project priority system will be revised at that time to include all point and non-point source projects.

Customer service will be the focus while utilizing the team approach to create an atmosphere conducive to accomplishing the best practicable project.

By State statute the Authority is prohibited from accepting applications for financial assistance after June 4, 1996, from any governmental entity which has a legal obligation to provide water at retail and which has a total demand of 2,000 acre-feet or more, unless the entity has included a copy of a water use efficiency plan adopted pursuant to section 37-60-126, C.R.S. This 1991 statute (HB-1154) was intended to encourage the larger municipal water providers to develop water conservation plans.

PURPOSE: Provide communities with the expectations of all program requirements - to save time, money, and create the relationships necessary to facilitate the best product for the community.

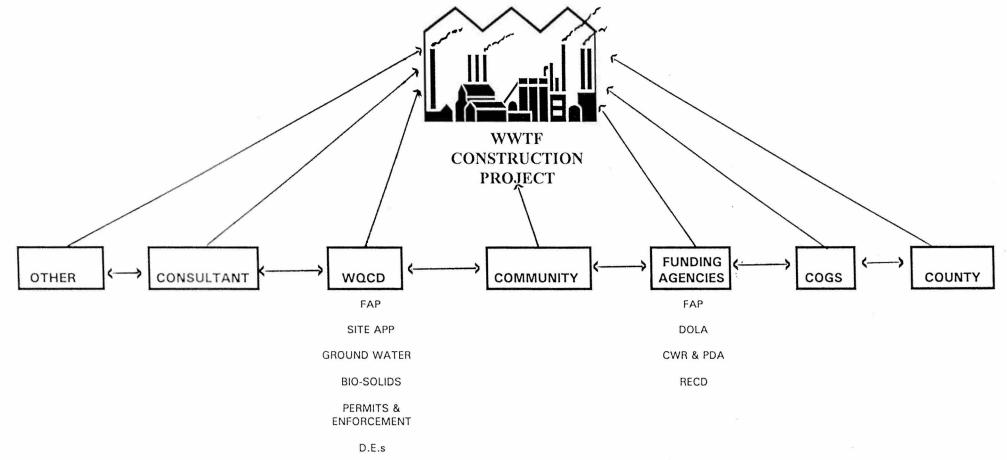

STATE OF COLORADO Intended Use Plan FY 1995

INTRODUCTION:

The State agrees to submit to EPA, as part of its annual application for a Capitalization Grant under Title VI of the Water Quality Act of 1987 (the Federal Act), an Intended Use Plan (IUP) which meets the requirements of Section 606(c) of the Federal Act and S.B. 50 (1988)

These requirements of the Act are as follows:

- A. A list of those projects for construction of publicly owned treatment works on the State's priority list developed pursuant to section 216 of this Act and a list of activities eligible for assistance under sections 319 and 320 of the Federal Act;
- B. A description of the short and long-term goals and objectives of its Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF);
- C. Information on the activities to be supported, including a description of project categories, discharge requirements under titles III and IV of the Federal Act, terms of financial assistance, and communities served;
- D. Assurances and specific proposals for meeting the requirements of paragraphs (3), (4), (5), and (6) of section 602(b) of the Federal Act; and
- E. The criteria and method established for the distribution of funds.

This IUP will serve as the planning document for explaining how the fiscal year (FY) 1992, 1993 and 1994 appropriations for the WPCRF will be used. As currently developed, the IUP identifies the specific projects and activities associated with the federal appropriation. All of the funds allotted to the State for FY93 and 94 will be made available to the WPCRF.

The State will prepare and submit a Capitalization Grant application based on the FY 1995 allotment for the WPCRF.

A. Listing of Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund Projects:

Attached to the 1995 IUP as Appendix A is the statewide project priority list showing the current construction needs for point source wastewater treatment. Also attached as Appendix A-1 is the Eligibility List with 1995 additions and modifications. The Eligibility List consists of projects from the priority list that have or will have approved facility plans or feasibility studies during the 1995 funding year. Appendix B to the IUP is a chart depicting projects that are likely to be funded during FY 1995.

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B. Short and Long-Term Goals/Objectives:

The State has the following short and long-term goals for the WPCRF:

Goal #1: Provide maximum State assistance to governmental agencies in achieving compliance with the Federal Act.

> Objective 1.A: Provide for a flexible transition from grant to loan program, to best meet the needs of the governmental agencies.

- Objective 1.B: Provide incentives to prospective applicants to accept loans in lieu of grants.
- Goal #2: Design the WPCRF to be as simple, efficient and flexible as possible.

Objective 2.A: Develop and implement WPCRF administrative rules and regulations that provide simplified application procedures.

Objective 2.B: Develop and implement standard operating procedures and policies that minimize regulations of the governmental agencies to the extent permitted by federal law.

Goal #3: Manage WPCRF to meet current and projected water quality needs in the State of Colorado.

Objective 3.A: Ensure that the WPCRF remains viable and is self perpetuating to meet the long range water quality needs of the State.

- Objective 3.B: Minimize administrative expenses associated with program management.
- Goal #4: Make the WPCRF accessible to all governmental agencies of the State.

Objective 4.A: Develop the project selection criteria which encourage maximum state-wide participation. Objective 4.B: Provide adequate publicity and promotion

of availability of WPCRF.

Goal #5: Provide financial assistance to governmental agencies at as low a cost as possible, consistent with continued economic viability of the fund.

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- Goal #6: Provide adequate technical assistance to governmental agencies for effective planning, design, financing, and management of facilities to meet water quality standards. Expenses incurred for this assistance will be provided by the administration of the WPCRF.
- Goal #7: Maintain an adequate data management system to track and monitor all WPCRF projects and program information.
- .Goal #8: Ensure proper accounting, audit and fiscal procedures, conforming with generally accepted accounting principles and governmental auditing standards, both which are implemented by the Single Audit Act of 1984.

C. Information on Activities To Be Supported:

Appendix B lists those projects targeted for funding in FY 1995 as required by Section 606(c)(3) of the Federal Act. The State intends to use an amount equal to 4% of the Capitalization Grant and to employ the reserve of 1% of the Title VI allotment, but not less that \$100,000 as provided by Section 604(b), to conduct water quality planning in accordance with Sections 205(j) and 303(e) of the Clean Water Act.

The funds will first be used to meet the demands of all facilities out of compliance and have a severity of pollution problem per WPCRF Rules 5.2.0. These projects are listed on the FY 1995 Project Priority list (Appendix A). The remaining funds will be used for other Water Quality project assistance as described in this plan.

D. <u>Assurances and Specific Proposals</u>:

The State will provide the necessary assurance and certifications as part of the Capitalization Grant Agreement. This Agreement is the official Operating Agreement between the State of Colorado and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The proposed payment schedule of eight (8) quarters using FY 1994 WPCRF funds is included in the application for the Capitalization Grant. The payment schedule identifies the anticipated amount of Federal letter of credit draw downs from the Capitalization Grant and State dollars to be deposited into the WPCRF.

Public Review and Comment:

The Commission held a formal public hearing on October 11, 1994 and continued it to November 15, 1994 at which time the State's FY 1995 IUP was adopted. The Water Quality Control Division contacted local governmental agencies on the State's Project Priority List regarding their potential for funding under the WPCRF. In April 1988, a public hearing was held to receive comments and adopt the WPCRF Rules. The Rules were amended in 1989, 1990, 1991, and 1992. Minor corrections were made to the Rules in October, 1993. The Water Quality Control Commission mailed out information on the WPCRF Rules and IUP prior to the public meeting. Each year thereafter, the IUP will be amended to include additional WPCRF projects and the Division will seek further public review and comment.

Annual Report:

Section 606(d) of the Federal Act requires that beginning the first fiscal year after receiving payments under the WPCRF the State will provide an Annual Report to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Annual Report for Colorado will be submitted to EPA within 90 days after the end of the fiscal year covered by the IUP. This report shall identify loan recipients, loan amounts and terms, similar details on other forms of financial assistance provided from WPCRF, and such other information as EPA may require.

E. <u>Criteria and Methods for Distributing Funds</u>:

The WPCRF Rules, the Project Priority List attached as Appendix A, and the Eligibility List attached as Appendix A-1 provide a clear, objective system for identifying priority of wastewater management systems. This system uses the following criteria:

- (1) Severity of Pollution
- (2) Quality of Receiving Waters
- (3) Financial Need
- (4) Regionalization
- (5) Water Conservation
- (6) Beneficial Use of Sludge

The rationale for funding projects from the WPCRF priority list in an order other than that shown shall be due to one of the following four reasons:

- (1) Governmental agencies do not wish to participate in the WPCRF or they have received funding from other sources.
- (2) Governmental agencies are not ready to proceed with the project.
- (3) Governmental agencies are not in compliance with requirements identified in 602 (b)(6) of the Federal Act.
- (4) Governmental agencies do not have the financial capability to repay a loan.

The WPCRF criteria for reviewing the financial capability of the applicant is included in the State/EPA Operating Agreement.

The State legislation S.B. 50 (1988) establishes a WPCRF as an enduring and viable fund. The WPCRF shall be maintained and be available in perpetuity for providing financial assistance as authorized and limited by the Federal Act.

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5.17.6(2) <u>STATEMENT OF BASIS, SPECIFIC STATUTORY AUTHORITY, AND PURPOSE</u> (1994 REVISIONS)

The provisions of sections 25-8-202(1)(e) and (g); 25-8-308(1)(d); 37-95-107.6(4) C.R.S., provide the specific statutory authority for adoption of the attached regulatory amendments. The Commission also adopted, in compliance with sections 24-4-103(4) C.R.S., the following statement of basis and purpose.

BASIS AND PURPOSE:

The Intended Use Plan (IUP) is presented to the Water Quality Control Commission each year for agency action and public comment. The plan describes the intent of the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF) for providing financial assistance to governmental agencies.

Attached to the 1995 IUP as Appendix A is the statewide project priority list showing the current construction needs for point source wastewater treatment. Also attached as Appendix A-1 is the 1995 Eligibility List additions and modifications. The Eligibility List consists of projects from the priority list that have or will have approved facility plans or feasibility studies during the 1995 funding year. Attachment B to the IUP is a chart depicting projects that could be funded from the WPCRF and includes their target date for a binding commitment.

The Commission held a formal public meeting on October 11, 1994 to adopt the 1995 IUP. The Environmental Protection Agency recommended several changes to the IUP prior to its formal adoption. Because of the comments, the Commission continued the hearing to November 15th. The following changes were made in conjunction with EPA's comments: Appendix B was revised to indicate binding commitments for potential projects to be funded during 1995; the explanation of all the appendices was added to the body of the IUP; Goal #8 was corrected; the first paragraph of part C was revised to clarify the administrative funds as well as the set aside for planning; the last change was to include the actual date of the public hearing for EPA. Additional comments were made regarding the goals and improvements as a planning document. These comments will be taken into consideration for the 1996 IUP.

The "Drake Facility" was added to the City of Fort Collins on the Eligibility list to clearly identify the project being funded.

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STATE OF COLORADO FY 1996 WPCRF INTENDED USE PLAN

INTRODUCTION

This Intended Use Plan (IUP) will serve as the planning document for explaining how the fiscal year (FY) 1994, 1995 and 1996 appropriations for the WPCRF will be used. As currently developed, the IUP identifies the specific projects and activities associated with the federal appropriation. All of the funds allotted to the State for FY94 and 95 will be made available to the WPCRF.

The State agrees to submit to EPA, as part of its annual application for a Capitalization Grant under Title VI of the Water Quality Act of 1987 (the Federal Act), an IUP which meets the requirements of Section 606(c) of the Federal Act and S.B. 50 (1988).

The requirements of the Act are as follows:

- A list of those projects for construction of publicly owned treatment works on the State's priority list developed pursuant to section 216 of this Act and a list of activities eligible for assistance under sections 319 and 320 of the Federal Act;
- A description of the short and long-term goals of the State's Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF);
- Information on the activities to be supported, including a description of project categories, discharge requirements under titles III and IV of the Federal Act, terms of financial assistance, and communities served; and
- The criteria and method established for the distribution of funds.

The State will prepare and submit a Capitalization Grant application based on the FY 1996 allotment for the WPCRF.

To date, the WPCRF has issued 35 loans totalling \$158,493,218. From this total, \$66,406,787 has been utilized from the federal capitalization grants; the amount of grant awards through FY1995 is \$91,519,957.

LIST OF WATER POLLUTION CONTROL REVOLVING FUND PROJECTS

Attached to the 1996 IUP as Appendix A is the statewide project priority list showing the current construction needs for point source wastewater treatment. Also attached as Appendix A-1 is the Eligibility List with 1996 additions and modifications. The Eligibility List consists of projects from the priority list that have or will have approved facility plans or feasibility studies during the 1996 funding year.

LONG TERM GOALS

The State continues to develop long term goals that will insure the integrity of the WPCRF:

1. Maintain the economic viability of the WPCRF while meeting current and projected Water Quality needs in the State of Colorado.

Ensure that the WPCRF remains viable and is self perpetuating to meet the long range water quality needs of the State.

2. Provide technical assistance to governmental agencies for facilitating effective planning, design, financing, and construction of facilities to meet water quality standards.

Customer service will be the focus while utilizing the team approach to create an atmosphere conducive to accomplishing the best practicable project.

3. Maintain compliance with Federal Law and the provisions of the State/EPA Operating Agreement.

SHORT TERM GOALS

In an effort to continually improve the WPCRF program, the State will pursue the following short term goals throughout the calendar year for 1996.

1. Improve the procedures and checklists of the Handbook of Procedures on an as needed basis.

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- 2. Initiate the process for identifying projects in the FY1997 Intended Use Plan by February, 1996.
- 3. Submit Annual Report to EPA by March 31, 1996.
- 4. Make improvements to the WPCRF Rules as appropriate. Major revisions will be made once the Clean Water Act is reauthorized.
- 5. Continue coordination with all funding agencies to complete water quality projects identified in the 1996 IUP.
- 6. Leverage funds in the WPCRF to accommodate the amount of eligible costs projected for loans in 1996 as described in Appendix B.

INFORMATION ON ACTIVITIES TO BE SUPPORTED

Appendix B to the IUP is a table depicting projects that are likely to be funded with loans from the WPCRF during FY 1996. The total estimated eligible costs for the 21 projects listed is \$46,465,000. There is over \$25,000,000 available from federal capitalization grants which will be used in part along with state match funds and leveraged funds. The federal amount does not reflect any capitalization grant that may be made for FY1996.

The State intends to use an amount equal to 4% of the Capitalization Grant for Administration of the WPCRF. Additional administrative expenses are covered by a small loan surcharge. The State will also employ the reserve of 1% (or \$100,000, whichever is greater) from the Title VI allotment as provided by Section 604(b) to conduct water quality planning.

All funding agencies meet periodically to coordinate the financial demands of facilities out of compliance and that have a severity of pollution problem per WPCRF Rules (5.2.0.). These projects are listed on the FY 1996 Project Priority list (Appendix A).

The State will provide the necessary assurance and certifications as part of the Capitalization Grant Agreement and Operating Agreement between the State of Colorado and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The proposed payment schedule using FY 1996 WPCRF funds will be included in the application for the Capitalization Grant. The payment schedule identifies the anticipated amount of EPA Automated Clearinghouse (ACH) draws from the Capitalization Grant and State dollars to be deposited into the WPCRF.

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Public Review and Comment:

The Commission held a formal public hearing on <u>October 10, 1995</u> at which time the State's FY 1996 IUP was continued to <u>November 13, 1995</u> for final adoption. The Water Quality Control Division contacted local governmental agencies on the State's Project Priority List regarding their potential for funding under the WPCRF. Each year, the IUP will be amended to include additional WPCRF projects and the Division will seek further public review and comment.

CRITERIA AND METHODS FOR DISTRIBUTING FUNDS

The WPCRF Rules (5.2.0), the IUP, the Project Priority List attached as Appendix A, and the Eligibility List attached as Appendix A-1 provide a clear, objective system for identifying priority of wastewater management systems. This system uses the following criteria:

- (1) Severity of Pollution
- (2) Quality of Receiving Waters
- (3) Financial Need
- (4) Regionalization
- (5) Water Conservation
- (6) Beneficial Use of Sludge

The rationale for funding projects from the WPCRF priority list in an order other than that shown shall be due to one of the following four reasons:

- (1) Governmental agencies do not wish to participate in the WPCRF or they have received funding from other sources.
- (2) Governmental agencies are not ready to proceed with the project.
- (3) Governmental agencies are not in compliance with requirements identified in the Federal Act.
- (4) Governmental agencies do not have the financial capability to repay a loan.

The WPCRF criteria for reviewing the financial capability of the applicant is included in the State/EPA Operating Agreement.

The State legislation S.B. 50 (1988) establishes a WPCRF as an enduring and viable fund. The WPCRF shall be maintained and be available in perpetuity for providing financial assistance as authorized and limited by the Federal Act. PGM: G8WPPLR1 10/26/95

5.17.7(2) <u>STATEMENT OF BASIS, SPECIFIC STATUTORY AUTHORITY, AND PURPOSE</u> (1995 REVISIONS)

The provisions of sections 25-8-202(1)(e) and (g); 25-8-308(1)(d); 37-95-107.6(4) C.R.S., provide the specific statutory authority for adoption of the attached regulatory amendments. The Commission also adopted, in compliance with sections 24-4-103(4) C.R.S., the following statement of basis and purpose.

BASIS AND PURPOSE:

The Intended Use Plan (IUP) is presented to the Water Quality Control Commission each year for agency action and public comment. The plan describes the intent of the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF) for providing financial assistance to governmental agencies.

Attached to the 1996 IUP as Appendix A is the statewide project priority list showing the current construction needs for point source wastewater treatment. Also attached as Appendix A-1 is the 1996 Eligibility List additions and modifications. The Eligibility List consists of projects from the priority list that have or will have approved facility plans or feasibility studies during the 1996 funding year. Attachment B to the IUP is a chart depicting projects that are expected to be funded from the WPCRF and includes their target date for a binding commitment.

The Commission held a formal public meeting on October 10, 1995 to adopt the 1996 IUP; however, three communities requested that they be added to the IUP. The communities were Idaho Springs, Lochbouie and Superior. They were added along with the City of Rifle for final approval on November 13, 1995.

The Environmental Protection Agency recommended several changes to the 1995 IUP. These recommendations have been incorporated into the 1996 IUP. The most significant changes have been made to the "goals and objectives." The long and short term goals are now separate and have been revised to reflect the current WPCRF program needs.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1995

NOTE 1) ORGANIZATION

The Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Authority (the Authority) is a political subdivision of the State of Colorado established pursuant to the Colorado Water Resources and Power Development Act, Title 37, Article 95 of the Colorado Revised Statutes, 1973, as amended.

Water Operations

The Authority was created to initiate, acquire, construct, maintain, repair and operate or cause to be operated projects for the protection, preservation, conservation, upgrading, development and utilization of the water resources of the State. The Authority is authorized to issue bonds, notes or other obligations which constitute its debt and not debt of the State of Colorado.

The primary activity of the water operations fund is to administer the Small Water Resources Projects Program (SWRP) for which the Authority is authorized to finance water resources projects of \$10 million or less. All costs of project development (except water rights acquisitions, planning and environmental mitigation and documentation) may be financed through the SWRP.

Pursuant to the SWRP, proceeds of the bonds issued by the Authority are to be used to fund loans to local governments. Each local government evidences its obligations under its loan agreement by the issuance to the Authority of a governmental agency bond which is to be secured by a pledge of a specific revenue source or by a general obligation pledge. The repayments pursuant to the loan agreements by the local governments participating in the SWRP are structured, in the aggregate, to provide amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds issued by the Authority. The SWRP debt service reserve for the bonds issued by the Authority is funded by the Authority from available monies of the Authority. The principal of and interest on the bonds issued by the Authority have been insured as to repayment to the bondholders.

Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund

The Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF) was created by State statute (CRS 37-95-107.6) in response to the mandate from the Federal Clean Water Act of 1987 (Act). The Authority was authorized statutorily to implement the revolving loan portion of the Act. The WPCRF was established for the purpose of financing loans to local governments for the construction of publicly-owned wastewater treatment projects that meet specified eligibility requirements and that are placed on a project eligibility list established in accordance with the State statute.

Pursuant to statutes, with the written consent of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, the Authority is authorized, on behalf of the State, to execute all operating agreements and capitalization grant agreements with the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Authority, the Water Quality Control Division of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment and the Division of Local Government of the Colorado Department of Local Affairs have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding under which each has agreed to assume specified responsibilities in connection with the operation of the WPCRF. The statutes also authorize the Authority to issue bonds for such purposes and to designate assets in the WPCRF that may be pledged and assigned as security for payment of such bonds.

The WPCRF is capitalized through capitalization grants awarded by the EPA. Matching funds are provided by the Authority or its borrowers. In order to receive capitalization grants, the Authority must provide matching in a ratio of \$1 of state match for every \$5 (20%) of capitalization grants. Administrative expense reimbursements funded by EPA capitalization grants are limited to a percentage (5/6th of 4%) of the capitalization grants.

The Authority issues bonds to provide loans to local governmental entities, either individually or in pools. Loans to borrowers may be provided from federal grants or from bond proceeds. The matching requirement is provided by cash contributions from borrowers or from the Authority in the form of cash.

When a loan to a local governmental entity is provided from the proceeds of bonds, the Authority allocates a portion of its federal capitalization grant to provide for a reserve. Earnings on such federal capitalization grant reserves are used to reduce the amounts payable by the borrower.

Each local government evidences its obligation to the Authority under its loan agreement by the issuance to the Authority of a governmental agency bond which is secured by a pledge of a specific revenue source or by a general obligation pledge. The repayments pursuant to the loan agreements by the local governments participating in the WPCRF are, in the aggregate: to provide amounts sufficient to repay the Authority principal and stated interest on direct loans; and to repay principal, premium (if any) and interest on the bonds issued by the Authority for the leveraged loans, including cash advances and bonds issued to provide the matching requirements.

Loans are made at or below market interest rates (at terms generally not exceeding 20 years) with principal and interest payments commencing not later than one year after completion of the borrowers' projects.

Drinking Water Revolving Fund

The Drinking Water Revolving Fund (DWRF) was created by State statute (CRS 37-95-107.8). The DWRF was established to provide assistance to governmental agencies for projects that appear on the "Drinking Water Project Eligibility List" (List). The List consists of new or existing water management facilities that extend, protect, improve, or replace domestic drinking water supplies in the State of Colorado.

Pursuant to State statutes, subject to financial analysis by the Division of Local Government in the Department of Local Affairs, the Authority is authorized to make and contract to make loans to governmental agencies to finance the cost of eligible projects that the governmental agency may lawfully undertake or acquire under State Law and for which the governmental agency is entitled by law to borrow money. The Authority may make the loans subject to terms and conditions determined by the Authority to be consistent with the purposes of the loans.

Each local governmental agency shall evidence its obligation to the Authority by issuing notes, bonds, or other obligations of the borrower that are issued to the Authority and are secured by a pledge of a specific revenue source or by a general obligation pledge. Each loan to a governmental agency and the notes, bonds, or other obligations thereby issued shall bear interest at such rate or rates per annum at or below market interest rate and shall be for such terms not to exceed twenty years after project completion.

Animas - La Plata Project

Colorado, New Mexico, the Ute Mountain Ute and Southern Ute Indian Tribes entered into a cost-sharing agreement with the Secretary of Interior to construct a dam in the Southwest part of Colorado. The Department of Interior is in the process of obtaining the applicable permits for the project.

The Authority has committed \$30 million to the project as a portion of the State's federal cost-sharing requirements. The \$30 million and any earnings from the \$30 million are to be held until \$42.4 million is available for the project, at which time additional earnings can be used for other Authority projects. As the project balance reached \$42.4 million during 1995, \$1,506,191 of additional earnings were transferred to the Proprietary Fund - Drinking Water Revolving Fund.

At December 31, 1995, the Authority had an accumulated fund balance of \$42,805,422 for this project.

Reporting Entity

The Authority follows the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) accounting pronouncements which provide guidance for determining which governmental activities, organizations and functions should be included within the financial reporting entity. GASB pronouncements set forth the financial accountability of a governmental organization's governing body as the basic criterion for including a possible component governmental organization in a primary government's legal entity. Financial accountability includes, but is not limited to, appointment of a voting majority of the organization's governing body, ability to impose its will on the organization, a potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits or burdens and fiscal dependency.

The Authority is not financially accountable for any other organization. Under current GASB pronouncements, the Authority has been determined to be a component unit of the State of Colorado (the primary government). As such, the Authority's financial statements are included in the Comprehensive Annual Financial Statements issued by the State of Colorado.

NOTE 2) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The more significant accounting policies of the Authority are described as follows:

a) Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Authority are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. Fund types used by the Authority are described below.

Proprietary Fund Types

Enterprise Funds - The accounting policies of the Enterprise Funds (Water Operations, Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund and Drinking Water Revolving Fund) conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units accounted for as a proprietary enterprise fund. The enterprise fund is used since the Authority's powers are related to those operated in a manner similar to a financing institution where net income and capital maintenance are appropriate determinations of accountability.

The Authority has elected not to apply statements issued by the Financial Accounting Standards Board after November 30, 1989. Governmental Accounting Standards Board pronouncements on accounting and financial reporting for proprietary activities are followed.

Fiduciary Fund Types

Expendable Trust Fund - The Expendable Trust Fund is used to account for assets held by the Authority in its trustee capacity (related to the Animas - La Plata Project) on the original principal and accumulated income which may be expended in the course of designated operations.

Agency Funds - Agency Funds are used to account for assets held by the Authority as an agent for local governmental units. These assets consist primarily of unspent bond proceeds restricted for future construction. Agency funds are custodial in nature and do not involve measurement of results of operations.

b) Basis of Accounting

The accrual basis of accounting is utilized in the proprietary fund types. Revenue is recognized when earned, and expenses are recognized when the liability is incurred. Expenditures for loans and advances made and for furniture and fixtures are shown as increases in assets, and redemption of bonds and notes are recorded as a reduction in liabilities. Grants are recorded as contributed capital when earned.

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed in the expendable trust fund and agency funds. Revenue is recorded when susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available. Available means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. The major source of revenue which is susceptible to accrual is investment income. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

c) Budgets

In accordance with the State Budget Law, the Authority's Board of Directors holds public hearings in the fall of each year to approve the budget and appropriate the funds for the ensuing year. The appropriation is at the total fund expenditures level and lapses at year end. The Authority's Board of Directors can modify the budget between spending categories, and the Authority's Executive Director can modify the budget within spending categories, within the total appropriation without notification. The appropriation can only be amended upon completion of notification and publication requirements.

The budget includes each fund on its basis of accounting unless otherwise indicated.

During the year ended December 31, 1995, supplementary appropriations approved by the Authority modified the Drinking Water Revolving Fund appropriation from \$-0- to \$1,270,000. Additionally, the Authority revised, but did not formally amend, the appropriations of the Water Operations Fund from \$44,966,525 to \$20,002,465 and the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund from \$78,008,000 to \$44,963,025.

Encumbrance accounting (open purchase orders, contracts in process and other commitments for the expenditures of funds in future periods) is not used by the Authority for budget or financial reporting purposes.

d) Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Authority considers cash deposits, money market mutual funds, investment pools, U.S. Government obligations, repurchase agreements and other highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

e) Furniture and Fixtures

Furniture and fixtures are recorded at cost. Depreciation expense has been computed using the straight-line method over the estimated economic useful lives.

f) Amortization

The deferred cost on bond refunding and original issue discounts are amortized using the interest method over the life of the outstanding bonds. The amortization amount is a component of interest expense, and the unamortized deferred cost and original issue discount costs are reflected as a reduction of bonds payable.

Reimbursements of original issue discount received from borrowers at closing is reflected as deferred revenue. The deferred revenue is being amortized using the interest method over the life of the loans receivable and is reflected as a component of interest income.

g) Accrual for Compensated Absences

The Authority has a policy which allows employees to accumulate unused vacation benefits up to a certain maximum number of days. Compensated absences are recognized as current salary costs as accumulated.

h) Advance

The Water Operations Fund has made advances to the WPCRF of which \$5,582,917 is outstanding as of December 31, 1995. The advance is for the purpose of financing the WPCRF's capitalization grant matching requirements and is noninterest bearing. The advance is repaid based upon a usage formula related to administrative fees collected by the WPCRF from the borrowers. \$635,025 was repaid in 1995.

i) Totals (Memorandum Only)

Total columns on the combined statements are captioned "(Memorandum Only)" because they do not represent consolidated financial information and are presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Data in these columns do not present financial position, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Interfund eliminations have not been made in the aggregation of this data.

j) Comparative Data

Comparative total data for the prior year have been presented in the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the Authority's financial position, operations and cash flows. However, comparative data have not been presented in all statements because their inclusion would make certain statements unduly complex and difficult to understand.

k) Retained Earnings

The Water Operations Fund has a retained earnings balance as of December 31, 1995, of \$32,083,203. Of this amount, \$8,500,000 has been funded to and is restricted for use as a debt service reserve for the SWRP to secure the bonds issued. As of December 31, 1995, the SWRP debt service reserve has been fully funded.

NOTE 3) CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Cash Deposits

The Colorado Public Deposit Protection Act (PDPA) requires that all units of Colorado government deposit cash in eligible public depositories. Eligibility is determined by state regulators. Amounts on deposit in excess of federal insurance levels must be collateralized. The eligible collateral is determined by the PDPA. PDPA allows the institution to create a single collateral pool for all public funds. The pool for all the uninsured public deposits as a group is to be maintained by another institution or held in trust. The market value of the collateral must be at least equal to the aggregate uninsured deposits.

The State Regulatory Commissions for banks and financial services are required by statute to monitor the naming of eligible depositories and reporting of the uninsured deposits and assets maintained in the collateral pools.

Investments

Colorado statutes specify investment instruments meeting defined rating and risk criteria in which Colorado governmental units may invest, which include:

- . Obligations of the United States and certain U.S. government agency securities
- . Certain international agency securities
- . General obligation and revenue bonds of U.S. local government entities
- . Bankers' acceptances of certain banks
- . Commercial paper
- . Written repurchase agreements collateralized by certain authorized securities
- . Certain money market funds
- . Guaranteed investment contracts
- . Local government investment pools

The Authority's investments are recorded at amortized cost and are categorized below to give an indication of the level of credit risk assumed by the Authority at year end. Category 1 includes investments that are insured or registered or for which the securities are held by the entity or its agent in the Authority's name. Category 2 includes uninsured and unregistered investments for which the securities are held by the broker's or dealer's trust department or agent in the Authority's name. Category 3 includes uninsured and unregistered investments for which the securities are held by the broker or dealer, or by its trust department or agent or agent but not in the Authority's name.

Category 3 investments include investments held by trustees pursuant to bond indentures. These investments were acquired by the trustees at the direction of the Authority. Investments of U.S. Treasury notes and bonds are held in the trustee's bank's account at the Federal Reserve in book entry form. Consequently, the trustees are considered to be the purchaser as well as the custodian of the investments.

Investments in local government investment pools or in money market mutual funds are not categorized because they are not evidenced by securities that exist in physical or book entry form.

Colorado Local Government Liquid Asset Trust (the Trust), is an investment vehicle established for local government entities in Colorado to pool surplus funds. The Trust operates similarly to a money market fund and each share is equal in value to \$1.00. The Trust offers shares in two portfolios, COLOTRUST PRIME and COLOTRUST PLUS+. Both portfolios may invest in U.S. Treasury securities and repurchase agreements collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities. COLOTRUST PLUS+ may also invest in certain obligations of U.S. government agencies, highest rated commercial paper and repurchase agreements collateralized by certain obligations of U.S. government agencies. A designated custodial bank serves as custodian for the Trust's portfolios pursuant to a custodian agreement. The custodian acts as safekeeping agent for the Trust's investment portfolios and provides services as the depository in connection with direct investments and withdrawals. The custodian's internal records segregate investments owned by the Trust. As of December 31, 1995, the Authority had \$10,100,417 invested in COLOTRUST PRIME.

As of December 31, 1995, the Authority had invested \$15,300,914 in the Pacifica Treasury Money Market Mutual Fund. The Pacifica Treasury Money Market Mutual Fund is a money market mutual fund which may invest only in obligations issued or guaranteed by the U.S. Treasury such as bills, notes, bonds and certificates of indebtedness and in notes, repurchase agreements and reverse repurchase agreements related to such U.S. Treasury obligations and STRIPS.

Scheduled maturities of the loans receivable are as follows:

The Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund direct loans receivable which had original amounts of \$5,958,844 have interest rates of 1.431% up to 5.17% and have maturity dates of 2000 to 2016. Leveraged loans receivable which had original amounts of \$152,715,810 have interest rates of 3.77% to 5.20% and have scheduled final maturity dates of 2009 to 2015.

Water Operations Fund - Small Water Resource Program loans receivable which had original amounts of \$59,830,000 have interest rates of 2.7% to 7.10% and have scheduled final maturity dates of October 2000 to October 2015.

On July 13, 1995, the Upper Eagle Regional Water Authority prepaid their 1990A and 1994B Small Water Resources Program loans from the Authority with principal outstanding of \$750,000 and \$2,000,000, respectively. Sufficient funds (\$2,845,038) were deposited into an escrow account with a trustee by Upper Eagle Regional Water Authority and invested in U.S. government securities for the purpose of paying the principal and interest of the Authority's related bonds which were defeased (see Note 5). This transaction did not result in an economic gain or loss to the Authority.

The Drinking Water Revolving Fund direct loans receivable have original amounts of 1,631,432 interest rates of 4.5% and have scheduled final maturity dates of 2015 to 2016.

All of the Authority Small Water Resources Program bonds and the Series 1989A and Series 1990A Clean Water Revenue Bonds and Series 1989A and Series 1990A State Match Revenue Bonds are insured as to payment of principal and interest by Financial Guaranty Insurance Company. The Clean Water Revenue Bonds, Series 1992A are insured as to payment of principal and interest by Financial Security Assurance, Inc.

The outstanding bonds had original principal amounts of \$66,415,000 for Small Water Resources Program, \$141,415,000 of Clean Water Revenue Bonds and \$7,040,000 of State Match Revenue Bonds for a total of \$214,870,000. The bonds are payable semiannually with interest rates ranging from 2.7% to 7.4% and serial and term principal maturities, including mandatory call provisions, through the year 2015. All of the bonds have optional call provisions with the earliest date in 1996 through 2006, generally eight years from the issue date with maximum call premiums of 2% and decreasing to no premium.

The bond resolutions authorizing the various bond issues contain general provisions and provisions related to accounting and financial operations of the Authority. Management of the Authority believes they are in substantial compliance with these provisions.

All Small Water Resources Loan repayments which were due in 1995 were received as scheduled. The Small Water Resources Projects Fund received revenue from loan repayments which were due from November 1, 1994, to October 1, 1995, of \$5,072,783. Small water resources bond payments totaling \$5,072,783 were made on May 1, 1995, and November 1, 1995.

The Authority has provided a debt service bond reserve fund at least equal to the debt service reserve requirement for the benefit of the Small Water Resources Bond Resolution. At December 31, 1995, the Small Water Resources Debt Service Reserve Fund amounted to \$8,500,000. The Authority can issue up to \$150,000,000 of Small Water Resources Revenue Bonds at the current funding level for the Small Water Debt Service Reserve Fund. At December 31, 1995, the Authority had \$53,100,000 of outstanding Small Water Resources Revenue Bonds.

NOTE 7) PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION OF COLORADO

The Authority participates in the State Division Trust Fund, a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the Public Employees' Retirement Association of Colorado (PERA). The Trust provides retirement and disability and death benefits for its members or their beneficiaries. All employees and board members are members of the Trust. Colorado State Statutes have assigned the Colorado Legislature the authority to establish benefit provisions of the trust. PERA issues a publicly available annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the Trust. A copy of PERA's annual report may be obtained by calling PERA'S Infoline at 1-800-759-PERA.

The financial statements of the Trust are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Plan member contributions are recognized in the period in which the contributions are due. Benefits and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the terms of the plan. Trust investments are presented at fair value except for short-term investments which are recorded at cost, which approximates market.

Plan members and the Authority are required to contribute at rates set by Colorado Statutes. The contribution rate for members is 8% and for the Authority is 11.6% of covered salary. The Authority's contributions to the Trust for the years ending December 31, 1995, 1994 and 1993 were \$34,910, \$29,987 and \$24,220, respectively, which was equal to the Authority's required contributions for each year.

Additionally, Trust members of the Authority may voluntarily contribute to the Voluntary Investment Program (VIP), an Internal Revenue Code Section 401(K) defined contribution plan administered by PERA. Plan participation is voluntary and contributions are separate from others made to PERA. State statutes have assigned the State Legislature the authority to establish VIP plan provisions.

The VIP is funded by voluntary member contributions of up to 18% of their covered salary. No employer contributions are required. Four employees of the Authority participate in the VIP Plan and made contributions amounting to \$16,464 during the year ended December 31,1995.

NOTE 8) COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Operating Leases

The Authority leases office facilities under an operating lease which expires on December 31, 1998. Total rental expense for the year ended December 31, 1995, was \$45,448. The future minimum annual rental commitments under this lease are as follows:

NOTE 9) TAX, SPENDING AND DEBT LIMITATIONS

In November 1992, the voters of Colorado approved Amendment 1, referred to as the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR), which adds a new Section 20 to Article X of the Colorado Constitution. TABOR contains tax, spending, revenue and debt limitations which apply to the State of Colorado and all local governments.

Enterprises, defined as government-owned businesses authorized to issue revenue bonds and receiving less than 10% of annual revenue in grants from all state and local governments combined, are excluded from the provisions of TABOR. The Authority's management believes that its operations qualify for this exclusion.

The Authority's management believes it is in compliance with the provisions of TABOR. However, TABOR is complex and subject to interpretation. Many of the provisions, including the qualification as an Enterprise, may require judicial interpretation.

NOTE 10) RISK MANAGEMENT

The Authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; thefts of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or acts of God. The Authority maintains commercial insurance for most all risks of loss. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

Our procedures were less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on these internal control structure policies and procedures. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Our consideration of the internal control structure policies and procedures used in administering federal financial assistance would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that noncompliance with laws and regulations that would be material to a federal financial assistance program may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control structure and its operations that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.
