Search and Rescue Fund State Fiscal Year 2015-2016 Fact Sheet



Highlights

- The Search and Rescue fund (SAR) has reimbursed \$449,166.89 for 617 missions and has granted \$1,875,136.49 via 243 awards between 2010 and 2016.
- In State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2016, CORSAR card and sticker sales generated \$74,802.89 in revenue.
- Over the same period, SAR reimbursed \$60,888.96 for 74 missions and granted \$339,124.25 via 33 awards.
- The average amount for a mission reimbursement in SFY2016 was \$801.17.
- The busiest month of SFY2016 for search and rescue missions was July.

About the Search and Rescue Fund

- SAR was created in 1987 to reimburse political subdivisions and search-and-rescue organizations for the costs incurred in conducting search and rescue operations, and to provide funding for the purchase of search-and-rescue related equipment and training.
- Funds are generated via two main sources: \$0.25 surcharges applied to hunting and fishing licenses, and boat, snowmobile, and off-highway vehicle registrations; and by sales of the CORSAR (Colorado Outdoor Recreation Search and Rescue) Cards. The one-year card costs the buyer \$3.00, with \$2.00 going directly to SAR and \$1.00 being collected by the vendor as an administration fee. The five-year card costs the buyer \$12.00, with \$9.00 going directly to SAR and \$3.00 being collected by the vendor.
