Search and Rescue Fund State Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Fact Sheet



Highlights

- The Search and Rescue fund (SAR) has reimbursed **\$489,898.86** for 702 missions and has granted **\$2,255,064.04** via 277 awards between 2010 and 2017.
- In State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2017, CORSAR card and sticker sales generated **\$86,061.02** in revenue.
- Over the same period, SAR reimbursed \$29,001.47 for 61 missions and granted \$379,930.55 via 34 awards.
- The average amount for a mission reimbursement in SFY2017 was \$475.43.
- The busiest month of SFY2017 for search and rescue missions was September.

About the Search and Rescue Fund

- SAR was created in 1987 to reimburse political subdivisions and search-and-rescue organizations for the costs incurred in conducting search and rescue operations, and to provide funding for the purchase of search-and-rescue related equipment and training.
- Funds are generated via two main sources: \$0.25 surcharges applied to hunting and fishing licenses, and boat, snowmobile, and off-highway vehicle registrations; and by sales of the CORSAR (Colorado Outdoor Recreation Search and Rescue) Card. The one-year card costs the buyer \$3.00, with \$2.00 going directly to SAR and \$1.00 being collected by the vendor as an administration fee. The five-year card costs the buyer \$12.00, with \$9.00 going directly to SAR and \$12.00 being collected by the vendor.
