Sir—

I have the honor to submit the following report of the operations of this Department from December 1, 1896, to May 5, 1898. On the latter date you appointed Lewis Barnum to be Adjutant General, to fill the vacancy created by your appointment of myself as Major First Colorado Infantry, United States Volunteers.

LEADVILLE STRIKE.

See biennial report of this department for the period ending November 30, 1896.

All portions of the National Guard of Colorado were relieved from duty at Leadville, March 10, 1897, and ordered to proceed to their home stations. The total cost of this campaign to the state was \$214,185.24.

CHANGES IN ORGANIZATION OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

Up to July 12, 1897, the old organization continued. On July 12 the new law went into effect. In accordance with its provisions, a Squadron of Cavalry, a Medical Department and a Quartermaster and Commissary General's Department were organized as a part of the National Guard of Colorado. Owing to the lack of funds, no Signal Corps was organized. The fund is now in shape to do so, should my successor think it necessary.

The Retired List has not yet been completed. The system adopted in compiling this list has been to search the records of this Department for the military record of those intended to be placed thereon, to ascertain if possible their addresses, etc., and then forward such transcripts of record to them, respectively, for signatures as to correctness, etc. I would suggest to my successor to publish General Orders announcing such retired list as soon as practicable, i. e., when he thinks it is useless to wait longer for additional addresses and other information.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR.

State of Colorado,

General Orders No. 66.

I. In compliance with the order of the secretary of war, dated Washington, D. C., April 25, 1898, based upon the proclamation of the president of the United States, under date of April 22, 1898, calling for one hundred and twenty-five thousand volunteers to serve for the period of two years, unless sooner discharged, for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of a resolution passed by the congress of the United States, calling upon the government of Spain to evacuate Cuba, on account of the many outrages perpetrated on the inhabitants of that island, and the destruction of the battleship Maine, said order specifying as the quota of the state of Colorado one regiment of infantry and two troops of cavalry, the National Guard of Colorado, excepting the Chaffee Light Artillery, will be mobilized in the city of Denver on Friday, April 29, 1898, to enable the members to volunteer for muster into the service of the United States.

II. The encampment in Denver will be located northeast of City park, on the east side of Colorado boulevard, between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth avenues.

III. Upon arrival at the camp above specified, commanding officers will report with their commands to Brigadier General Irving Hale, commanding First Brigade, National Guard of Colorado.

IV. The Quartermaster's Department will furnish the necessary transportation.

V. The travel enjoined is necessary for the public service.

The above orders were carried out. The camp was named "Camp Alva Adams," in honor of yourself. With the exception of parts of two infantry companies and those which were rejected on the physical examination, all volunteered into the First Regiment Infantry, Colorado Volunteers, United States Army, subsequently ordered to San Francisco, and Troops A and B, Second United States Volunteer Cavalry, ordered to report to Colonel Torrey, Fort Russell, Wyoming.

At this date I am unable to show the cost of the Spanish-American war to the state. That will have to be taken up by General Barnum, as all the accounts have not yet been rendered nor pay rolls made out. No doubt the United States government will eventually pay all bills and pay rolls contracted on account of General Orders No. 66, this Department. I also presume the government will replace all Quartermaster and Ordnance stores it has taken from the state.

THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR.

The total expense of the mobilization of the National Guard at Denver was \$27,529.30, of which \$555.18 was paid out of the military poll fund and \$26,974.12 by vouchers for certificates of indebtedness, as shown by the insert table "A."

The above vouchers, with the exception of those in favor of Daniels & Fisher, Morey Mercantile Company, Colorado Midland Railway Company and the Midland Terminal Railway Company, were taken up by Frank Adams, J. K. Mullen, Wm. Cook Daniels and the Post Printing and Publishing Company, who advanced the cash for their payment and received certificates of indebtedness.

The \$555.18 paid out of the military poll fund, is included in the tabulated statement of expenditures from that fund. Of this amount, "Claims Collectible" to the amount of \$290.90 have been made out, which are included in the table of "Claims Collectible" shown in this report. "Claims Collectible" will be made out for the balance, \$264.20, although this expense was not allowed under the Act of congress passed July 8, 1898.

Immediately upon taking office the work of making out "Claims Collectible" against the United States government was taken up. Most of the claims were made out and sent to the auditor of the War Department during the months of May and June.

Under an Act of congress passed July 8, 1898, providing for the reimbursement of the different states and territories, a number of those claims were sent back to be re-rendered, as the Act did not provide for the payment of soldiers who failed to pass the required physical examination, or for their transportation back to the place of their enrollment.

This made a difference of \$7,974.56, as the claims, including those for transportation and pay-rolls, as originally made out, amounted to \$41,993.36, and as they now stand, after the claims for transportation and pay-rolls have been re-rendered, they amount to \$34,018.80, as shown by the insert tables "B" and "C."

It was the intention of the War Department to return, in kind, all equipments, tentage and ordnance stores which were taken from the state by the volunteers, furnished originally to the state from the annual appropriations by the War Department.

The demand by the army for tentage and ordnance stores has since been so great that it is impossible for the government to replace them. Claims must therefore be made out for the cash value of these stores. When made out, these claims will amount to about twenty thousand dollars.

SECOND CALL.

On May 25 the president issued a second call for seventy-five thousand volunteers. Under this call Colorado's quota was one Light Battery of Artillery, in addition to 330 recruits for the First Colorado Infantry, United States Volunteers.

Pursuant to this call, the following Executive Military Order was published:

July 1 Captain E. F. Willcox, the United States mustering officer, mustered the Chaffee Light Artillery into the United States service as Battery A, Colorado Volunteer Artillery, with the above commissioned officers and 106 enlisted men. The state was not asked to equip this organization in any way.

REORGANIZATION.

On account of equipping the First Regiment Infantry, Colorado Volunteers, the state was left almost without arms, equipments, tentage or uniforms, and it

has therefore been possible to re-organize the Guard only to a very small extent.

Before the first call the Guard consisted of a Medical Department, a Quartermaster and Commissary General's Department, sixteen companies of infantry, three troops of cavalry, and one light battery of artillery.

The First and Second Regiments were merged into twelve companies of infantry and the three troops of cavalry were consolidated into two troops in the volunteer organization. The battery was taken entire, all those wishing to enlist being given a chance to do so.

This left the following National Guard organizations practically intact, with the exception that a number of the men had enlisted into the various organizations that had gone out:

Company A, First Infantry, stationed at Denver.

Company A, Second Infantry, stationed at Lake City.

Company E, Second Infantry, stationed at Leadville.

Troop C, First Squadron Cavalry, stationed at Denver.

Company A, First Infantry, Denver, and A, Second Infantry, Lake City, have been fully equipped. Owing to the fact that there is no armory at Leadville under lease to the state, and there being no arms to issue, Company E, Second Infantry, at that place, has not been drilling or holding meetings.

Immediately after the cavalry had been mustered into the volunteer service those who remained in Troop B commenced the work of re-organizing, officers were elected and they have since been recruiting, so that the troop is now in very good condition.

Troop C, not having been accepted, was in good shape from the start, and has been doing all in its power to maintain the standard it formerly held.

On the completion of the armory in Boulder, which was under contract for lease to the state, a company was mustered in at that point. A majority of the members

of the old company at that place, not caring to serve in the new company, the old company was discharged and the new organization received the designation held by the old, "Company H, First Infantry."

After the battery had been mustered in, the enlisted men who remained members of the Chaffee Light Artillery continued to drill until a non-commissioned officer and soon after held an election of officers. But one man being eligible for commission he was elected second lieutenant, since which time it has been steadily drilling and increasing its membership.

Company D, First Infantry, stationed at Greeley, has been issued uniforms, but as there were no arms to issue them, they have not been able to do much toward recruiting or drilling.

On May 3 Major R. W. Corwin was appointed Surgeon General of Colorado. Since his appointment Colonel Corwin has re-organized the Medical Department as well as his limited means would permit. A Hospital Corps has been formed, with three commissioned officers and twenty-one enlisted men, who are becoming thoroughly proficient in their work.

Applications for permission to organize companies of Infantry have been received from Colorado Springs, Holyoke, Glenwood Springs, Trinidad, Florence and Canon City. A company can be mustered in at each of these places should it be seen fit to do so.

At Grand Junction a troop of cavalry is ready for muster at any time. They have their own horses and are anxious to become members of the Guard.

On November 5 you appointed Major John W. Browning Brigadier General, to command the First Brigade. On his recommendation Nathan Gregg, Jr., was appointed Assistant Adjutant General, First Brigade, and C. M. Lee was appointed Assistant Quartermaster General, First Brigade, each with the rank of Major. With this additional force of officers the work of re-organization should be greatly advanced.

ARMORIES.

The state has under lease at the present time an armory for the two troops of cavalry at 1625 Glenarm street, and an armory for infantry at Twenty-sixth and Curtis streets, Denver, and armories for infantry at Pueblo, Greeley, Boulder and Lake City.

A new armory, in which all branches of the service can be accommodated, and which will be centrally located, is very much needed in Denver. Buildings for the special purpose of armories are also much needed in Colorado Springs and Leadville.

I very urgently recommend that the state take steps toward the building of its own armories, especially in Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo and Leadville. State ownership would save a large amount of money in rents. The buildings could be built to better meet the requirements of the organizations for which they were constructed and the public ownership of such buildings would give a more general local pride and interest in the organizations occupying them.

EQUIPMENT.

As mentioned before, the outfitting of the volunteers left the supply of uniforms and equipments of all sorts very low. The arms which were left have all been issued and we have found it impossible to get such arms as we desired to issue.

The Springfield rifle could have been obtained, but it was deemed advisable by all members of the Military Board that only a modern rifle, using the government 30-calibre cartridge, should be purchased.

The War Department informed us that the government rifles could not be issued, on account of the great demand for them in the army. The Savage Arms Company could not supply us with their arm under fifteen months. The Winchester Repeating Arms Company

cannot supply us until some time after the first of the coming year, as their output is taken by the government until that time.

A few new uniforms have been purchased, but not enough to equip any new organizations. I did not deem it advisable to purchase uniforms with which to equip new companies until it was definitely known as to what time arms could be issued them.

ENCAMPMENTS.

During October and November, Company A, First Infantry, and the Chaffee Light Artillery, were given permission to hold practice marches and go into camp on different occasions, leaving the armory on Saturday evening and returning Sunday evening. They were furnished with rations, ammunition, etc., and the increased interest and attendance at drill and a great improvement in marksmanship shown by the men proved these excursions to be of great practical benefit.

If it is not possible each summer to mobilize the entire Guard at some point for encampment, an opportunity should be given each organization to make short marches from their home stations, to go into camp and hold target practice. While all of the discomforts of soldier life are not shown in this way, it gives the men an idea of what to expect in a campaign and an opportunity to familiarize themselves with camp life and camp cooking.

CONDEMNED STORES.

After the disbandment of Camp Alva Adams, a considerable amount of lumber remained on the ground, of no use to the Guard, and it was sold.

In the natural course of events a great many worn-out uniforms had accumulated at the state armory.

Pursuant to instructions, Colonel Geo. F. Gardner, Inspector General of Colorado, inspected and condemned those of them which were in the worst state of repair, and they were sold.

There yet remained at the armory a number of obsolete rifles and carbines, unfit for service, some rifle barrels minus stocks, etc., and Colonel Gardner was instructed to condemn them, which he did. They were sold, and the proceeds of these sales placed to the credit of the military poll fund, as follows:

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In addition to the recommendations I have made concerning encampments, etc., I earnestly recommend the appointment of an Inspector of Rifle Practice. This officer should be thoroughly acquainted with the modern fire-arms and ammunition, as well as competent to impart his knowledge to the men, and should receive a compensation which would allow him to devote his entire time to the instruction of the men in the practical use of their rifles and to the keeping of the records of in-door and out-door target practice.

A number of the eastern states have purchased a camp ground and rifle range in close proximity to the regular army posts. The idea is to enable the National Guard to profit by the regular army drill and discipline. I would recommend that the state purchase ground for a rifle range and for camping purposes in the neighborhood of Fort Logan.

There is considerable dissatisfaction among the volunteers from this state concerning the amount of pay

they drew from the state. The facts of the case are as follows: The work of mustering in was begun on May 1 and continued up to the ninth or tenth of May. The men were mustered in as fast as they passed the physical examination, being sworn in by squads and by twos and threes. Captain E. F. Willcox, the mustering officer, states that it is impossible to tell the exact dates upon which the men were mustered in, but that they drew their pay from the government from May 1, the date upon which their enlistment papers were dated. The enlistment papers were dated back to May 1 in the case of the First Colorado Infantry and the Volunteer Cavalry by order from the secretary of war. This Department has tried to fix the dates of the muster of the various organizations, but has found it impossible to do so. I would recommend that six days' pay, less the pay they drew from the government for the same period, be given each enlisted man of the First Colorado Infantry and the Volunteer Cavalry, excepting the 280 recruits enlisted at a later date for the First Colorado.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORTS.

Following my report are the reports of Colonel Geo. F. Gardner, Inspector General of Colorado, and Colonel R. W. Corwin, Surgeon General of Colorado, the latter including in his report the report of Major Clayton Parkhill, former Surgeon General of Colorado.

In concluding this report I desire to thank the officers who remained in the Guard for the cordial support they have given this Department in the difficult task of reorganization, and I desire especially to thank your excellency for the prompt attention which all communications from this Department have received at your hands and for your ready aid at all times.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL.

Office of Inspector General,
State of Colorado,

Denver, November 30, 1898.

To His Excellency,
The Governor and Commander-in-Chief,
Denver:

Sir—

I have the honor to herewith submit a report of the transactions of this Department from May 5, 1898, to the present date, having been appointed on the former date to fill the unexpired term of Inspector General Stewart upon his entering the United States volunteer service.

Upon assuming charge my first duty consisted in making payment to the various companies of the National Guard for service during their mobilization at Camp Alva Adams preparatory to their muster into the service of the United States, a tabulated account of which is attached.

In this connection permit me to state that the soldierly training of our National Guard since its organization has borne its legitimate fruit, giving the First Regiment, Colorado Volunteers, a standing in the service second to none.

The Colorado Squadron of the Second United States Volunteer Cavalry, composed of Troops A and B (Denver and Leadville), though not so fortunate as to be ordered from the rendezvous at Jacksonville to the front, were accounted among the efficient troops and well upheld the honor of the state.

The Chaffee Light Artillery, mustered into the volunteer service and sent to Fort Hancock, New Jersey,

and Captain Draper's company of engineers, now on duty at Honolulu, are entitled to like praise.

Other organizations tendered their service to the Commander-in-Chief and in companies and battalions, composed of ex-National Guardsmen, with officers who all had been active in the state service, held daily drills in anticipation of a second call for additional troops from Colorado. I wish to instance one regiment, called "Klee's Volunteers," of two thousand men organized in this and other cities of our state, the rolls of which are on file at the Adjutant General's office.

The militia has ever been the main reliance of our country in time of war, but at no epoch of the nation's history has this been more evident than in the war just closed.

It is the duty of the state to provide for the common defense and the states which in the past most fostered their militia organizations were enabled to furnish the government well drilled and equipped troops with the least delay.

During times of insurrection the National Guard is invaluable in the preservation and enforcement of our laws and in the protection of life and property; hence it is manifest that funds expended in maintaining and equipping the National Guard upon a liberal basis is money wisely applied.

I would recommend that as near as practicable companies be reorganized at the old stations and that the present skeleton regiments be filled up and fully armed and equipped.

Most of the states have inaugurated annual encampments for instruction of their military forces with beneficial results. This state could make no expenditure with better results than a liberal provision for its soldiery; the National Guard merits it, the stability of the republic and the safety of the people demand it; and the respect of our flag is gauged by the strength of its defenders.

A Board of Survey, convened by Special Order No. 70, dated November 12, 1897, having examined and found "obsolete, worn and unfit for service" a quantity of clothing and ordnance stores, in compliance with orders of the Military Board, I condemned the same.

In my annual tour of inspection the following companies were inspected:

Company A, Second Infantry, Lake City. This company reported with one captain and twenty-four men. Equipment consists of twenty-four Springfield rifles, caliber forty-five, and clothing for twenty-four men. Arms in good condition, clothing much worn. Instruction and military bearing good. The company roll shows a reserve of twenty men who, owing to the lack of equipment, did not appear in line.

Company H, First Infantry, Boulder. This company, under the command of Captain Safely, was mustered in per S. O. No. 66, dated September 19, 1898. They have been issued arms and equipment for forty men. The men in this company take a great deal of interest and are gaining a proficiency in military movements and sciences.

Company A, First Infantry, stationed at Denver, has been issued arms and equipments for forty-seven men. Under the command of Captain H. E. Macarey they are drilling one night each week and have target practice in addition to weekly drill one night each week. They are a fine looking body of young men and are a credit to the Guard.

Troop B, First Squadron Cavalry, stationed at Denver, Captain Zeph T. Hill commanding, had thirty-six men present or accounted for. Arms in fair condition, clothing fair but somewhat worn. This troop is fully equipped for fifty men, except horses. Military movements and soldierly bearing very fair.

Troop C, First Squadron Cavalry, under the command of Captain J. H. Brown, drill once each week. There are forty-five men carried on the roll. This troop is earnest in their work and present a fine appearance. They are always ready and subject to duty.

The Chaffee Light Artillery, Second Lieutenant George L. Greer commanding, is rapidly learning battery work. They have had opportunity for both mounted and dismounted drill, target practice and camping experience. The roll shows fifty-two men and with encouragement in new equipment this battery will be second to none in the volunteer service.

I recommend a system of reward for attendance and good conduct in the form of a badge or button for the enlisted men of each organization, which I am certain will add to the morale of the Guard.

Having been in the military service of the state for the past twenty years I take a pride in the history and

the achievements of its National Guard. In its many calls to active service it has never failed to restore order from disorder, tranquility from turbulence, safety from danger.

Allow me in conclusion to thank you for the courtesy I have at all times received at your hands, and to express my sense of appreciation of the ready aid and kindness ever extended by the Adjutant General and the members of his Department.

REPORT OF SURGEON GENERAL.

To His Excellency,
ALVA ADAMS,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief,
Denver.

Sir—

In compliance to the law I have the honor to submit the following report for the two fiscal years ending November 30, 1898.

At the time of my appointment (May 3, 1898) as Surgeon General of Colorado, I found the Medical Department of the militia of this state destitute of men and supplies. The men had just become a part of the volunteer army of the United States and the medical property had been turned over to the United States government to accompany our valiant First Colorado Volunteers to Manila.

It is with no little pride that every citizen of the state of Colorado can point to the officers, privates and equipments of the Medical Department of that regiment, when informed that probably no Volunteer Regiment of the United States went into the field as well prepared as did the First Colorado, and that its Medical Department compared favorably with any in the regular army; the credit of which is almost entirely due to the efforts of my predecessor, Major Clayton Parkhill, who resigned his position as Surgeon General of this State and accepted the position of Major and Surgeon of the First Colorado Volunteers. Following is the report of Major Parkhill from July 10, 1897, to May 1, 1898:

To the Commander-in-Chief,
National Guard of Colorado:

Sir—

I have the honor to report, that during my incumbency in the office of Surgeon General, of the National Guard covering the period from July 10, 1897, to May 1, 1898, a complete reorganization of the Medical and Hospital Corps was effected.

The Medical Corps as provided by law when filled, comprised two surgeons with the rank of major, two assistant surgeons with the rank of captain, and two assistant surgeons with the rank of first lieutenant. These officers were selected with a view to their fitness for the work. It affords me pleasure to commend them for their willingness to perform and thorough efficiency in doing all the duties assigned them. They were of great assistance to me in organizing and drilling the Hospital Corps.

The Hospital Corps consisted of three stewards and sixteen privates. The stewards were all expert druggists and the senior had spent eight years as steward in the United States army. The personnel of the privates was exceedingly high, being made up of doctors of medicine, students of medicine, professional nurses and one professional cook. The principle observed in their training was to make them soldiers and afterwards train them for their particular duties in the Hospital Corps. They were first drilled in the setting-up exercises and the school of the soldier. After proficiency was secured in that, they were drilled in litter bearing, the removal of wounded from the field without litters, first aid to the wounded and general nursing of the sick.

I cannot too highly praise the corps in general for the proficiency attained and in my service with both armies during the American-Spanish War, I saw no Hospital Corps that was its equal.

During my term as Surgeon General, medical and surgical supplies were gradually accumulated of the

finest quality and most approved pattern. At the time our troops were mustered into the United States service, we had on hand and transferred to the government full supplies both medical and surgical for a two months campaign. Much of our surgical equipment was superior to that furnished by the Medical Department of the army to the troops in the field during the war. The only essential article of equipment lacking was an ambulance. The need of one has been seriously felt in the past in our state campaigns, and I earnestly recommend the purchase of one for the use of the National Guard, in the future.

It affords me pleasure to acknowledge my indebtedness for the assistance so willingly extended to me, by that splendid officer and brave soldier, Adjt. General Moses, now Lieutenant-Colonel of our gallant First Colorado, serving in the Philippines.

The two portable houses which were purchased for hospital purposes during the Leadville campaign, were used at Camp Adams, after which many repairs were needed to make them serviceable. These repairs were ordered and the buildings put in the best possible condition.

A medical and surgical chest, of the New York pattern, has been purchased and we now have sufficient stretchers, slings, pouches, cots and other medical supplies to equip our regiment.

Major C. K. Fleming, Surgeon, is now drilling three squads of privates in Denver, and under the schooling of Captain W. H. Baker, Assistant Surgeon, we have another squad at Pueblo.

While our quota is not filled, we are well prepared to accompany one regiment into the field for active service. Following is the roster of the Medical Department.

Although we hope it may never be the sad and unfortunate duty of the State to again call men to arms, the experience of the past year has been invaluable to the soldier. The medical, as well as the other departments, know and appreciate the demands made upon it as never before comprehended. Our domestic troubles did much toward developing and fitting us for our late war, but we found when called from home, beyond the borders of our state and reach of supplies easily obtainable, that many things were to be thought of, requiring steady and careful preparation. Preparations cannot be made in a few weeks or months. Long and careful training of officers and men are required to best fit them for their duties. Much time and drill must necessarily be devoted to every department, and the Medical Department is by no means an exception.

The Spanish-American war has taught us our shortcomings. The advancement in medical and surgical sciences are quite as wonderful as in other branches of the army, and the demands upon the Medical Department are now tremendous. So great has been the progress of these sciences that the equipments of 1861 would be absolutely worthless to-day. The Medical Department is of greater importance than almost any other in the army, and more frequent and greater demands are made upon it than any other. If a gun were never fired, nor a sword drawn upon either side of opposing armies,

medical aid would be constantly sought. Its duty is not alone to administer to the sick and wounded, but also to protect the well.

I therefore cannot recommend too strongly that every effort be made to develop the Medical Department to its highest degree. That medical officers be selected with reference to special fitness for the work, that privates be chosen for their aptness for nursing, and that a detached corps of female nurses be organized and drilled for duties in the general hospitals. That a school be established and lectures regularly delivered at each state armory to officers and men for teaching preventive medicine.
