1. In accordance with the requirements of Section 42, Act of the General Assembly of the State of Colorado, Approved April 7, 1921, there is submitted herewith the Report of The Adjutant General of Colorado for the biennial period ending November 30, 1936.

BIENVIAL REPORT of the ADJUTANT GENERAL, STATE OF COLORIDO,

November 30, 1936.

In presenting this report I would be remiss in my duties did I not point out the critical financial situation which confronts the Military Department of the State of Colorado, through changing conditions within the State and changing policies of the War Department.

As you know, the Department is sup orted entirely from a levy of :07 of a mill, based upon the assessed valuation of the real prope ty within the State. For several years this valuation has been constantly decreasing and within the past two years, by legislative action and by vote of the people, revenues which would normally be ours have been removed.

Until 1935 the National Guard of Colorado was virtually static and it was possible, through economy, to make the decreasing revenues meet the necessary demands. Two years ago, however, the War Department entered on a program of modernization and motorization which immediately placed an additional burden on the revenues of the State Military Department.

In 1936 the State received the first increase in National Guard personnel since 1933, making it necessary for the State to house and maintain two additional units allotted to Colorado Springs and Golden. A similar increase is scheduled for the hear future and it would seem to be the policy of the President and the Congress to grant further increases during the next two-year period! Numerous communities have already petitioned for National Guard units, but unless additional revenue is forthcoming it will be impossible for the State to activate them and live up to its contract with the War Department which specifies proper housing and protection for troops and their equipment. Attention is called to the fact that the Federal Government spends approximately three dollars for each dollar expended by the State of Colorado for support of the National Guard within this State. A complete financial statement is a part of this Report.

#### LEGISLATIVE REQUESTS.

During the past year the Military Department took advantage of a fortitudinous circumstance which enabled it to acquire a much-needed Denver armory by disposing of a tract of ground no longer suitable for military purposes and by assuming an indebtedness of #85,000.00 in rent certificates bearing 4½ per cent interest. These certificates are payable at the rate of \$6,000.00 per year. It is requested that a legislative appropriation be made to free the Department from this annual expenditure. If this is done the Department will be able to take care of its regular maintenance requirements and probable increase in personnel without additional revenue.

Through co-operation with the Federal Government and the City of Denver the Department was able during the past year to begin construction of a new hangar at Denver Municipal airport. State committeeits for the project amount to slightly under \$13,000,00, while the still uncompleted hangar and headquarters building of the most modern, fireproof construction, represents to-day a capital assett to the State in excess of \$90,000,00. It is requested that an appropriation be made to repay the Military Department for the construction expenditures from its mill levy fund and to set up a second project, with Public Works Administration co-operation, to complete the building by the installation of necessary utilities.

#### CAMP FACILITIES.

The 168th Field Artillery is seriously hampered in its annual field training by lack of a firing range. For the past two years the regiment has used a large tract of State school land between Pueblo and Colorado Springs for its annual maneuvers. While the terrain is suitable for artillery firing there are no camp facilities. It is recommended that a permanent artillery range be a cquired, either by purchase or long-time lease. If this is done, there is a likelihood that

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War Department Funds will be available for the installation of minimum camp facilities (water, kitchens and warehouse). The present camp site at Camp George West is adequate for the activities of the present strength of the Colorado National Guard, with the exception of the aforementioned artill ry firing. This camp has been greatly improved during the past two years through the medium of War Department and Federal Thergency Relief funds.

### ARIORIES

All but three of the Hational Guard units of the State are now housed in State-owned buildings, as compared with four two years for State armories should be constructed as soin as funds are available at Longmont, Rocky Ford and Colorado Springs, and plans should be made for acquiring armory facilities in other communities as soon as additional units are activated.

#### REVENUES.

In order that the steady decrease of income from the .07 mill levy allowed the Military Department may be more fully realized, the following graphic table is inserted in this Report and shows the income annually for the past ten years:

The above capital investment represents an outly totaling 3107,286.74.

At Camp George West expenditures of VPL, funds to the amount of 192,270.00 have been approved, of which 55,347.00 have been expended to date. State Hilitary Funds to the extent of 5,540.00 have been expended on these projects to date.

#### STRENGTH OF THE NATIONAL GUARD IN COLORADO,

The excellent morale and efficiency of the National Guard in past years is still maintained.

By the acquisition of additional Field Artillery troops to the State, our allotted strength now is 173 officers, 1 warrant officer and 1775 enlisted men, making a total of 1949.

The actual strength on November 30, 1936, is 157 officers, 1 warrant officer, and 1680 enlisted men, a total of 1857.

These consist of the 157th Infantry, the 168th Field Artillery (truck-drawn) regiments, 45th Division Aviation, 45th Tank Compañy, 'State Staff and State Detachment, Quartermaster Corps, Headquarters 89th Brigade, and detachments of Headquarters 24th Cavalry Division and 45th Division.

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#### A RONAUTICS COMMISSION.

The Administrative Code of 1933 placed the duties of the former State: Aéronautics Commission in the Office of the Adjutant General. Due to the fact that no appropriation for this activity has been made, the Adjutant General has made no attempt to carry out the inspection features of the Aeronautics Control statute. The only activity along this line has been the setting upof a State-wide Airmarking Project in connection with the Works Progress Administration. This project has not yet been completed but proper signs have been finished up in good order in the followin communities:

### District No. 2.

Adams City, Aurora, Bennett, Brook Forest, Byers, Camp George West, Gentral City, Deertrail, Eastlake, Edgewater, Empire, Evergreen, Georgetown, Golden, Littleton, Strasburg and Matkins.

#### District No. 4.

Aguilar, Boone, Branson, Kim, Iascar Siding, Ia Junta, Ia Veta, Iudlow, Ordway, Pueblo, Segundo, Swink, Trinidad, Walsenburg (two), and Weston.

It is recommended that a small appropriation be made to carry out the requirements of the aeronautics inspections under the Adjutant General, or, that a new Aeronautics Code be set up by the Legislature.

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#### STRVICE SCHOOLS.

That members of the National Guard are highly interested in acquiring a knowledge of military subjects to the limit of existing possibilities is demonstrated by the fact that during the past two years the following-named persons, ten in number, have availed themselves of the opportunity to attend Service Schools:

Harrison W. Wellman, Jr., Air Corps Technical School. Master Sergeant Harold Castetter, Air Corps Technical School. Master Sergeant Byron T. Palmer, Field Artillery School. Tech. Sergeant Stanley Williamson, Infantry School. 1st Sgt. Henry C. Briggs, Infantry (Tank) School.

This training is all afforded the National Guardsmen at Federal expense with no obligation to the State of Colorado. All personnel have returned to duty at their home stations highly peased with the instructions obtained, and ready and willing to impart their new knowledge to others.

#### ACTIVE DUTY OF MATIOTAL GUARD TROOPS.

Upon the instructions contained in an Executive Order of the Governor, dated April 18, 1936, and published in General Orders of this office, ten officers and fifty-eight enlisted men of various units, mainly those unemployed, were called to active duty to petrol the southern border of Colorado to prevent the entry of aliens and indigent persons which was resulting in social disorder and disturbance among the citizenry and making it impossible for worthy persons to obtain employment. These troops were sent into the field on April 19th and recalled by order of the Governor on April 29, 1936.

#### REGULAR ARMY INSTRUCTORS and SERGTANT-INSTRUCTORS.

The Military Department considers itself very fortunate in having detailed to it by the War Department such a splendid corps of instructors who are ever watchful and diligent in coordinating the work of the respective organizations with that of the Regular Army. Their interest in social and commercial activities throughout the State, as well as those of the Military, has brought them before the public interest a way that the majority of people have a better understanding of the National Guard, **its duties**, its usefulness and general benefits to the State. This report would be incomplete without a listing of these officers and non-commissioned officers which is as follows:
