1. It is with deep regret and sorrow that this office is called upon to announce the doath of Major Maxwell W. Lordeman, Ordnance Department, State Staff, Colorado National Fuard, which occurred on April 18, 1939. Major Lordeman entered the military service as a private in Company "I", 3rd Replacement Fattalion, on August 3, 1918, and served in all non-commissioned grades until Decomber 19, 1918, on which date he was hollorably discharged from the Federal Service. On December 3, 1928, he enlisted in the Quartermaster Detachment, Colorado National Guard, and served honestly and faithfully therein until December 5, 1930, when he was commissioned Captain and placed in command of the organization. On February 1, 1933, he was transferred to the Ordnance Department, State Staff, and received his promotion to Major in the same branch on May 21, 1937, where he served until his untimuly death.

1939 -- 1940

Under the provisions of Executive Order of your Excellency, published in General Orders No. 3, this office, I assumed the duties of the office of The Adjutant General of the State of Colorado on January 11, 1939, relieving my predecessor, Major Alphonse P. Ardourel. With the exception of enormous indebtedness of the Office which was my inheritance with the position, the National Guard as a State organization, was found to be in excellent condition, well organized, and well maintained. Through the aid of your good offices and the influence of friends of the new administration the State Legislature, by almost unanimous vote, saw fit to come to the aid of the situation and placed the Military Department on a solid footing, enabling the payment of all outstanding bills and restoring confidence in business with the National Guard throughout the State

It is needless to say that after this restowal of confidence, the National Guard has, during the past two years, worked on a "pay-as-you-go" basis and, I am happy to state in this report, that today there is not an ou'standing bill against the Military Department but what is in the process of vouchering and payment.

In addition to the duties of Adjutant General, on March 15, 1939, at the request and order of the Governor I was appointed United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Colorado. My report in this latter capacity is hereto attached.

ARMORIES

During the past two years the Armories over the State have been placed in a good state of repair and stokers installed in most of them. This makes for better morale as it adds to the comfort and contentment of officers and enlisted men concerned as well as upholding the civic pride and approbation of the citizens of the community.

Upon the departure of the Infantry units for Fort Sill, Oklahoma, shortly after induction on September 16, 1940, arrangements were made with most all of the City officials where these armories were vacated, to look after these buildings until the return of the troops or further arrangements are made for their care and upkeep.

NATIONAL MATCHES

In addition to Armory Training and Field Training, mentioned above, the Colorado National Guard has each year taken advantage of additional opportunities for training by sending teams to Camp Perry, Chio, to attend the National Matches. Special Crders entitling men to attend these matches, follow:

1. The civilian Rifle Club, have likewise been sent from Colorado each year. The training, as to these teams, is believed to be of much value, not only to the Colorado National Guard but to the Civilian teams of the State and greatly encourages rifle practice by all concerned.

GREEN MOUNTAIN STRIKE

During the later part of September and early August, 1939, labor conditions in Grand County became tense and it was made to appear to the Governor that there existed in this county a state of insurrection and rebellion and that bodies of men were acting together by force detrimental to the welfare and social conditions of those counties, particularly at the Green Mountain Law, near Kremmling, Colorado. Accordingly on August 3rd Executive Order by your Excellency was published in General Order No. 22 of this office directing that the undersigned assume command of the armed forces of the State and forthwith order out such troops as were deemed necessary for right and proper protection of citizens in the affected territory. On the afternoon of August 3rd, pursuant to the above referred to Executive Order, the following named units were ordered to mobilize at their respective home stations and await for further orders:

> 45th Tank Company Co. "A" - 157th Infantry Co. "B" - 157th Infantry Headquarters Company, 3rd Bn. - 157th Infantry Battery "B" - 168th Field Artillery Eattery "C" - 168th Field Artillery Company "C" - 120th Quartermaster Regiment.

Major William F. Hunn, 168th Field Artillery, Captain George J. Williams, State Staff, Captain Roy L. Qualls, State Staff, 2nd Lieutenant Charles L. Wheaton, Service Company, 157th Infantry, and Master Sergeant Michael J. Maloney, Service Eattery, 168th Field Artillery, were ordered at the same time to report to the Adjutant General for strike duty.

These officers and the units above listed were at once placed in the field with station at Kremmling, Colorade, and at once began to disarm the citizens and laborers with a view to bringing about peace and reconciliation at the earliest practicable time. This duty . was duly accomplished without bloodshed and with the exception of minor accidents among the personnel of the National Guard, the strike was terminated by Executive order of the Governor on the 29th day of August, 1939 and same was published in General Order No. 24, this office, of that date, all officers and enlisted men being relieved and directed to return to their homes no later than August 31, 1939.

WEST POINT EXAMINATIONS

In each year covered by this report the Governor of Colorado has been authorized by the War Department to nominate one enlisted man from the Colorado National Guard to compete in the final entrance examinations for entrance to the United States Military Academy at West Foint.

These examinations have been conducted by ___ular army officers who are instructors in the Colorado National Juard, based on questions prepared by the Office of the Superintendent of Denver Public Schools.

In 1939 there were four applicants and Private First Class Donald F. McClure of 120th Observation Squadron, attained the highest rating in the preliminary examination and received the nomination of the Governor.

In 1940 there were two applicants to take the preliminary examination with the result that Private First Class Richard I. McBride, of Headquarters Battery, 168th Field Artillery, received the nomination.

COMMISSION IN THE NATIONAL GUARD OF THE UNITED STATES

The privilege afforded enlisted men of the National Guard to pursue Extension Courses in connection with their regular Armory drill and instructions has been greatly appropriated and grasped by many more than was at first anticipated. Ly completing certain of these extension courses an enlisted man may qualify himself to appear before an examining heard for a commission as Second Lieutenant, National Guard of the United States, in the branch of service in which he is a member. This, in turn, if he successfully passes the Board, makes him cualified for a commission in the active unit if and when a vacancy occurs and his active commission is asked for by his commanding officer. Whether or no he receives an active commission within a reasonable length of time after rassing the Board, he is many steps shead of other members of his unit who has not availed themselves of Extension Course work, for, if called or ordered into active Federal service, he is still qualified to accept a commission in the Federal service when and where needed. During the past two years, there have been forty of these enlisted men who have appeared hefore the Examining Boards and received their commissions in the National Guard of the United States and many of them now members of the active establishments.

SERVICE SCHOOLS

It is needless to say that members of the Colorado National Guard have been keenly interested in the educational facilities afforded by the various Service schools throughout the country. In fact, more officers and enlisted men could and would have attended,

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had the assignments to the State of Colorado been greater. At any rate, the following personnel have received details to these schools and have attended same to the benefit, not only of themselves, but to the National Guard as well.

CAMPS OF INSTRUCTION

The regular armory and field training of the Colorado National Gurad, was conducted in accordance with prescribed schedules based on instructions and training regulations of higher authority.

In 1939, the Colorado National Guard held camps at Camp George West, Golden, Colorado, for the State Staff and State Detachments 157th Infantry, 45th Tank Company, Company "C", 120th Quartermaster Regiment and 168th Field Artillery, in accordance with Special Orders Number 13, this office, dated April 20, 1930. The 24th Cavalry Divis sion (less one officer) and the 45th Division Aviation had training at Boise Parracks, Idaho. The 89th Brigade was ordered to Flagstaff, Arizona for its training. All this training was for the normal fifteen days.

Pursuant to authority contained in a letter from the War Department, Office, Chief, National Guard Bureau, dated October 14, 1939, increased training for the National Guard for an additional seven days was ordered for personnel Procurement Section, State Staff and State Staff Detachment, Quartermaster Corps, 157th Infantry, 45th Tank Company, Company "C", 120th Quartermaster Regiment, 168th Field Artillery, 24th Division Aviation. These units held their training at various stations over the State where concentration could be best accomplished and with least inconvenience to the personnel of the units concerned.

It is believed that this seven day's additional graining resulted in much good to the Colorado National Guard and prepared them for training on a higher scale for 1940, which was ordered by General Crders Number 11 this office, dated July 22, 1940, for all organizations and units in the Sabine Concentration Area (Louisiana, Texas and vicinity) from August 12 to August 24. The training received by the Colorado National Guard with higher units and more advanced instruction, proved very valuable and was appreciated by all oncerned, in spite of some minor inconveniences which should not be mentioned ja connection herowith.

REDFSIGNATION OF ORGANIZATIONS

By Paragraph 1, Special Orders Number 78, the Howitzer Company, 157th Infantry was redesignated Anti-Tank Platoon Headquarters Company, 157th Infantry, effective September 1, 1939, without change of station.

By Paragraph 8, Special Orders Number 94, Company "B", 157th Infantry was redesignated Headquarters Company (less Anti-Tank Platoon) 157th Infantry with station at Denver, Colorado and Headquarters Company (less Anti-Tank Platoon) 157th Infantry was redesignated as Company "B", 157th Infantry with station at Groeley, Colorado, oach effective as of November 1, 1939.

On March 15, 1940, by Paragraph 1, General Criters Number 5, the 120th Photo Section 24th Division Aviation was re-designated as a part of and consolidated with the 120th Observation Squadron 24th Division Aviation.

INCREASED STRENGTH OF THE NATIONAL GUARD

Under instructions from the Chief, National Guard Eureau, dated September 21, 1939, the Colorado National Guard received instruction to increase its enlisted strength by 375 men. This was published in General Orders Number 27 of September 21, 1939 and later amended by General Orders, Number 32, dated October 21, 1939.

The office work in this connection was increased materially on account of the compiling of enlistment and service records of the personnel of the Guard, to say nothing of papers coming in on account of new recruits.

The co-operation of officers and enlisted men all over the State in meeting these new requirements, is worthy of great commendation. This shows that the Colorado National Guard stands ready, at all times to meet any emergency which might arise.

INDUCTION OF NATIONAL GUARD INTO ACTIVE MILITARY SERVICE

In accordance with a letter from the Secretary of War, dated September 5, 1940, to Governor Ralph L. Carr, the 45th Division, Colorado National Guard was inducted into active military service on September 16, 1940, for one year's training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. General Orders Number 18, this office, dated September 13, 1940, covering this induction is hereto attached.

In order to strengthen the common defense, the President has thought it proper at this time to exercise in part the authority vested in him by Public Resolution Number 96, 76th Congress, approved August 27, 1940, to order from time to time any or all members and units of all reserve components of the Army of the United States into active Federal Service.

He has, accordingly, given his signature to Executive Order Number 8530, August 31, 1940, a copy of which is inclosed. In accordance therewith and as indicated in my telegram of September 3, 1940, all active elements of the following units of the National Guard of the United States of the State of Colorado, and all personnel of both the active and Inactive National Guard assigned to such units, are ordered into active service of the United States as of, and from the sixteenth day of September, nineteen hundred and forty.

"EXECTIVE ORDER

ORDERING CERTAIN UNITS AND MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL GUARD OF THE UNITED STATES INTO THE ACTIVE MILITARY SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES

By virtue of the authority conferred upon me by Public Resolution No. 96, 76th Congress, approved August 27, 1940, and the National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended (39 Stat. 166), and as Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, I hereby order into the Active military service of the United States, effective September 16, 1940, the following units and members of the National Guard of the United States to serve in the active military service of the United States for a period of twelve consecutive months, unless sooner relieved:

"UNITS.

All active elements of:

* * * * * 45th Division, less 45th Tank Company. * * * * *

"MEMBERS

All members, both active and inactive, of the units listed above.

All persons so ordered into the active military service of the United States are, from the effective date of this order, relieved from duty in the National Guard of their respective States so long as they shall remain in the active military service of the United States, and during such time shall be subject to such laws and regulations for the government of the Army of the United States as may be applicable to members of the Army where permanent retention in the active military service is not contemplated by law.

Commissioned officers and warrant officers appointed in the National Guard of the United States and commissioned or holding warrants in the Army of the United States, and affected by this order, are hereby ordered to active duty under such appointments and commissions or warrants.

All officers and warrant officers of the National Guard appointed in the National Guard, federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal recognition, and assigned to unitd ordered to active duty under this order prior to the effective date thereof, who do not hold appointments in the National Guard of the United States and commissions or warrants in the Army of

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the United States, and affected by this order, are hereby tendered such appointments in the same grade and arm or service which they respectively hold in the National Guard.

Warrant officers and enlisted men of the National Guard who hold appointments as officers in the National Guard of the United States and commissions in the Army of the United States, and are assigned to units ordered to active duty under this order prior to the effective date hereof, are hereby ordered to active military service as commissioned officers of the Army of the United States under those appointments and commissions.

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SELECTIVE SERVICE

Colorado has, for a number of years, participated in national planning in connection with the Selectibe Service program.

Beginning in September, 1934, the general effort in this direction became more specific when members of the State petachment and State Staff began to devote two drill periods each month to the study of Selective Service regulations and the development of a state plan.

Three years later in September, 1937, an additional stimulus was given when three Denver men were commissioned Selective Service specialists in the Officers Reserve Corps. These men, W. Seward Iliff, Jr., Gareth N. Brainerd, and James T. Contworth, were early recognized as cutstanding in their knowledge of the subject, and soon after the passage of the Selective Service Act of 1940 were called to duty with the National Headquarters in Washington. They devoted a great doal of time toward the instruction of National Guard officers and enlisted men. Unler them a proliminary draft of a state plan was made and restudied from time to time.

In September, 1939, certain changes were made in enlisted personnel of the detachment, and soloted men, particularly qualified for Selective Service work by reason of their training in civil life, were recruited. With the addition of these men to the detachment there began an intensive period of training. The enlisted men were enrolled in correspondence courses on the subject of Selective Service, and virtually all of them completed these courses of study.

Due to the fact that an extra camp period of one week was called for November, 1979, and a three week's camp was held in August of 1940, it was possible for the state staff and detachment to concentrate attention on re-studying and re-drafting the state plan. At the conclusion of the camp period in August, the plan was ready for use.

Over the years, the three reserve officers and members of the State Staff attended Selective Service conferences in various parts of the country, and the work of training and planning in Colorado had been carried forward to such a degree that Colorado was recognized as one of the outstanding states in Selective Service work. This opinion was justified when the state was called upon to actually put the plan in operation, and it was stated at National Headquarters that Colorado had been foremost in the execution of its duties under the Selective Service Act.

On October 1, when the Selective Service plan was put into effect, five officers of the Colorado State Staff and two Reserve Officers were called to active duty to administer the various divisions of state headquarters provided for in the state plan. Eight ospocially trained members of the State Detachment were employed as civilian Selective Service specialists attached to the various divisions of state headquarters. Subsequent to such employment, these men were discharged from the State Detachment. One active member of the detachment was assigned to duty with State Headquarters. Since October 1, the administration of Selective Service in Colorado has been carried forward by this personnel. As of November 30, 1940 the personnel and organization of Colorado State Headquarters of Selective Service was as follows:

SEPARATIONS FROM THE SERVICE

For the first year of this report, separations from the Service by resignation and otherwise, were very fow; in fact, only seven officers saw fit to tender their resignations in the year 1939, but in 1940, owing to reorganization of units and inductions into Active Military Service, many officers were accorded the privilege of tendering their resignations and, up to November 30, 1940, forty-five of them have seen fit to separate themselves from the National Guard of Colorado.

DECCRATIONS

An Act of the Colorado General Assembly approved April 13, 1931 and published in General Orders Number 18, November 16, 1931 authorizing the issuance of State Medals for Long Service, Active Service, Meritorious Conduct and Meritorious Service in the Colorado National Guard, was an Act which has amply fulfilled its title, i. e.,:

PICTCRIAL REVIEW

Early in 1939 The National Guard Association of the State sponsored the publication of a "Pictorial Review" of the National Guard of the State of Colorado, which proved to be a most excellent and beautiful book - 9 x 12 inches, containing 160 pages. In keeping with its name, pictures of the entire personnel of the Guard were made, from the Governor of the State to the newest recruit.

For one reason and another, however, the firm preparing the publication was greatly delayed in making delivery to the respective organizations.

On account of the added strength allotted to the State and additional field training ordered, many enlisted men were discharged and their places filled by new men. So, when finally the books were placed in the hands of Organization Commanders, much difficulty was had in disposing of them. Through correspondence by this office, which had anticipated such difficulty, attempt was made for another check on the number to be shipped to the respective units, but the Company felt that the responsibility was theirs and made delivery on original basis, which has proved somewhat embarrassing to all parties concerned. This office is proud of the publication in general, but feels that responsibility for unsatisfactory deliveries does not devolve upon it.

The btate of Colorado has been very fortunate in the War Department detail of Regular Army Officers and Non-Commissioned officers as instructors and Sergeant-Instructors for the troops of this State. WCRK PROJECTS ADMINISTRATICN

GRAVES REGISTRATION PROJECT

This project is sponsored by members of the various veterans organizations throughout the State and by this office.

Simply stated, the purpose of the Project is, as shown in the original Project Froposal, "To provide a complete file of the names and prepare a comprehensive record of the Graves in Colorado of deceased honorably discharged veterans, MALE and FEMALE, of the ARMY,NAVY, MARINE CORPS and other military establishments of the United States, including Confederate States of America."

This, of course means, securing such information for every United States war veteran, from the Revolutionary war up to and including those of the World war and later disturbances and involves "the inspection of every burial ground in the State of Colorado; preparation or duplication of cemetery plat maps in uniform style and checking of headstones, public burial records, service records, etc."

Permanent Files: After the field forms have been thoroughly checked, they will be transcribed to a permanent Registration Card record, of each grave of a United States veteran, showing name, address, serial number (in any), next of kin, birthdate, place, death date, place and cause, location of grave, war record, branch of service, rank, dates enlisted and discharged type of grave marker, if any, also a list of all the vetorans buried in each cemetery in the State of Colorado and a Reference Cemetery Plat showing accurate location of all veterans graves.

These Records will be housed in the Office of the Adjutant General, National Guard Armory, at Denver, Colorado and will be accessible to all interested in inspecting or referring to them.

Public Benefits: Such a complete and authentic record of Colorado's soldier dead will be a distinct public benefit. Aside from the original purpose of the registration program, which will enable the patriotic organizations within the State to properly mark the deceased veterans graves - there is an even more substantial gain which affects, directly or indirectly, all Coloradans. The Permanent Graves Registration Files, when completed, aside from a sentimental value, will have a very definite legal value in establishing claims made by widows and dependents of veterans for pensions, insurance, compensation, settlement of estates, etc.
