Dear Sir;

I herewith submit my report as Division Engineer of Irrigation Division Wo. 2, for the year of 1956.

This has been another very dry year in both precipitation and stream flow over the entire Division. Precipitation at Pueblo being only 6.38 inches, or about one-half of the average. At Las Animas 11.15 inches against and average of about 12 inches, which near average flow helped the lower river to some extent. There were no general rains covering the entire Division. Two rains covering fairly large areas caused some run-off below Pueblo to help for short periods. There were no rains above to raise the river to unusual heights at Pueblo.

Ditch diversion dams washed out in the 1955 floods were all replaced and in operating condition during the entire season; the cost being near one million dollars.

Storage in reservoirs was limited to trans-mountain diversions, there being no storage from natural flow except in John Martin reservoir which caught some water on two occassions from rains, mostly in the Purgatory drainage. John Martin Reservoir entered the season April 1st, with 44,144 acre feet in storage. Releases were started April 2, and reservoir was emptied April 30th. There were some small flash floods through the dam up to July 19, none of the water of which reached the State Line. On July 19,

there was found to be water for storage and gates were closed.

This water lasted until July 30th with soem additions accuring during the period. Again on Aug. 19, gates were closed for storage and on Aug. 22, report there were about 17,300 acre feet in storage. This lasted until Sept. 2, when the reservoir was found to be dry. Decrees were administered the rest of the fall as if no reservoir had been constructed. During November the Colorado Ditches demanded the river flow up to 100 second feet for domestic purposes in accordance with Article 5A of the Compact. Therefore, no storage was accomplished.

A committee of 6 including myself, was appointed by General Kramer at the meeting of the Arkansas River Compact on Oct. 26, to work out a closer capacity table in the lower reaches for future releases, as the table which was in use during the last year was in considerable error. Water being in storage to the extent of about 1500 acre feet when table indicates reservoir to be dry. At a meeting of this committee Nov. 14, a proceedure was worked out whereby a closer approximation of the time can be predicted when reservoir will be emptied and controls shifted to the State Engineer.

Law suits of only a minor nature have been instituted this year. The Beaver Park injunction suit remains in the same status as last year, nothing having been done regarding it.

Cooperation by the water users and Commissioners has been fine during this trying period and no serious controversy has arisen.

Irrigated acreage has been reduced to 489,711 for the entire division from the 507,470 acres irrigated last year, due to the increasing shortage of water. Last year 1,483,500 acre feet of water was used and only 1,196,192 was available and used this year.

This is 2.44 acre feet of water diverted per acre of ground irrigated.

Trans-macuntain water diverted from Western Slope amounted to 46,235 acre feet which is about 3,000 acre feet more than a year ago. This increase due probably to better attention. Diversions were shut down on Aug. 11th, for Western Slope ditches and not resumed until Oct. 25th.

With the exception of John Martin there was no storage in reservoirs for irrigation purposes during the year and they are at a very low level, only a little better than 1954. The carry over being only 38,018 acre feet for irrigation use.

Crop production was curtailed and water used for the more valuable crops. Beet production was down in tonage but up in sugar content so that the monetary return was about equalized.

Wells and stock ponds continue being built at an increasing pace and are cutting into the stream flow more with each one.

Decreed water, as such, is on the way out unless a curb put on these installations.

Tabulations are attached showing the Trans-Mountain diversions, reservoir contents each month and water used on acreage for each district.
