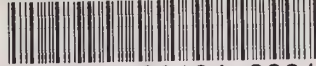

Dear Sir:

In compliance with the requirements of Section 45 of Chapter 134, Colorado Statutes Annotated, 1935 (Sec. 112-3-2, Colo. Rev. Stat., 1953), we hand you herewith a report of the State Board of Land Commissioners for the biennial period ended June 30, 1954. Included are tables showing the lands belonging to the various funds of the State, lands sold, acreage leased, and all money received.

The grand total receipts from all sources amounted to \$5,714,053—a record high and 27 percent greater than the immediately preceding period. This gain is attributable principally to the increase in the Mineral Department receipts from oil leasing and production.

Collections for the Mineral Department now exceed the receipts from surface rentals for grazing and farming purposes, in spite of an increase in the latter during the period. The receipts from royalties for oil produced on State lands during the last three months of this biennium were approximately equal to the total receipts from that source for the entire 1950-52 biennium. On July 1, 1952, there were nine producing wells on State land; on June 30, 1954, there were forty-three. Everything points to the increasing importance of this source of revenue. From the administrative point of view, this has created and will continue to create new problems; those problems, in my opinion, the Board is successfully solving.

Uranium leasing is a new activity; at the close of this period there were 34,500 acres under lease, and, while there is as yet no production on State lands, the revenue from rentals alone now nearly equals, and probably will soon far exceed, the present revenue from coal leases.

ADMINISTRATION OF FOREST FIRE PREVENTION AND SUPPRESSION PROGRAM ON STATE AND PRIVATELY-OWNED FOREST AND WATERSHED LANDS.

Biennial Ending June 30, 1954

The State Board of Land Commissioners acting through its office of state forester, conducts a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression program, cooperating under Section 2 of the federal Clarke-McNary law that is designed to protect the forest and watershed lands of the state.

The program is planned for execution at the county level. The State Board of Land Commissioners, after careful survey by experienced technical advisors, originates a fire plan for each county designed to apply to the conditions in that county and conducts for each county an educational and training program in the technique of forest fire prevention and suppression. The counties participate in the Clarke-McNary program by agreement with the State Board of Land Commissioners on a voluntary basis.

In addition to the above technical services the counties receive direct benefits. These benefits are in proportion to their respective efforts in carrying out the plan. Reimbursement to counties being distributed through the State Board of Land Commissioners are from monies derived from the federal government as its portion of assistance rendered to the State under Section 2 of the Clarke-McNary Act. The monies so distributed to counties are not monies appropriated by our state legislature for fire prevention and suppression purposes but are taken from federal reimbursements based on the state's over-all expenditures in the fire prevention and suppression program.

STATE BOARD OF LAND COMMISSIONERS
OFFICE OF STATE FORESTERADMINISTRATION OF CHRISTMAS TREE CUTTING PROGRAM ON
STATE AND PRIVATELY-OWNED PROPERTY

The Office of the State Forester conducted a Christmas Tree Inspection program. (Due to lack of sufficient funds with which to carry on the Christmas Tree Program the State Board of Land Commissioners withdrew from Christmas tree activities immediately after the 1952 Christmas tree season).

The purpose of this program was to protect private and state lands from damage due to poor cutting practices during the Christmas tree harvest.

During the 1952 season cutting areas were inspected by Office of the State Forester's personnel and the U. S. Forest Service personnel cooperating.

Each area received three inspections: The first was to determine if the stand of trees was dense enough to warrant cutting; the second was to see that instructions were understood and carried out; and the third inspection was to see that the area was cleaned up to issue tags for the trees cut.

Primarily, these instructions were as follows:

1. Christmas trees shall be cut only from over-crowded timber stands needing thinning. In the thinning process the operator shall leave a stand of healthy trees spaced about 8' to 10' apart.
2. The entire tree shall be felled, leaving ground space for young, healthy, fast growing trees.
3. Brush shall be lopped and scattered so as to lie flat on the ground to reduce fire hazard.
4. Stumps shall be left 8" in height or less on the high ground side.
5. Christmas trees shall not be taken by topping standing trees.
6. Boughs cut for decorative purposes shall not be removed from a standing tree to a greater height than one-third of the total height of the tree, starting from ground level.

FOREST INSECTS

During the Biennium, a Forest Entomologist, operating from the State Forester's office assisted private land owners of the state in the control of insects on private land, as well as cooperating with the U. S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine. Extensive surveys to determine the amount of infestation in forested areas were made throughout the state.

As a result of these surveys, two projects were carried out which are worthy of mention. These projects were handled and financed cooperatively by the land owners, the State Forest Service, the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, and the United States Forest Service.

In the Ute Pass area, west of Colorado Springs, is a district of highly concentrated use with comparatively small land ownership pattern, giving the trees an added value for scenic and protective purposes. Here a total of 796 trees were treated on property belonging to several hundred different owners.

The second control project was carried on in the Denver Mountain Parks area west of Denver, under the same conditions and circumstances as mentioned above. In this area, 123 trees were treated on 62 parcels of land, all under different ownership. Both of these infestations were the Black Hills Beetle, "Dendroctonus ponderosae," in Ponderosa Pine type.

Insect control men from the State Forester's office have worked cooperatively with all agencies in order to make sure that the forest and watershed lands under all types of ownership are assured of adequate protection from insects. Since insects recognize no ownership boundaries, cooperative effort is a necessity to preserve the protective benefits of forests, including watershed protection, grazing, growth of lumber, scenic and recreation values.

BIENNIAL REPORT

Period: July 1, 1952–June 30, 1954

During this period 156,102 pieces of fire prevention literature were distributed through the county sheriffs, schools, service clubs, etc.

Also, 475 films were shown to schools, clubs, lodges, etc., and a great number of these showings was done by the forestry personnel, with talks on conservation in many cases.
