



Department of Public Safety Q2 FY2021 Performance Evaluation (January 2021)

Wildly Important Goals

The Department of Public Safety has identified several wildly important goals (WIGs) for FY 2020-21 and beyond. For this performance evaluation, the Department has updated progress on the initiatives identified in the FY 2020-21 Performance Plan that capture the Department's WIGs, and reflect the overall direction as identified by Department leadership. The updates reflect data as of October 1, 2020.

WIG 1 – Reduce the number of CSP-investigated fatal and injury crashes from 3,888 in 2019 to 3,693 (-5%) by June 30, 2021, and to 3,304 (-15%) by June 30, 2023.

Traffic safety on Colorado highways is the top priority of the Colorado State Patrol (CSP). The CSP strives to improve traffic safety and protect lives by developing intelligence-led strategies, identifying local-specific challenges and developing needs-based responses, deploying high-visibility and strict enforcement strategies, and educating the community about highway safety.

WIG 2 – Increase the number of firefighters trained on the mobile live fire training unit each year from 892 to 1,400 by June 30, 2021, and to 1,600 by June 30, 2023, for firefighters in Colorado.

Colorado's geographic diversity and reliance on volunteer fire departments makes the ability to bring training to firefighters an important aspect of maintaining a well equipped fire service. As the lead state fire agency, the Division of Fire Prevention and Control is responsible for training and certifying firefighters across the state. Over the past several years, DFPC has acquired two mobile live fire training units through the FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant. These units prove an opportunity for firefighters to train to national standards and to experience live fire in a training environment prior to fighting a structure fire on the job.

WIG 3 – Increase the number of Cold Case homicides reviewed and/or investigated by the CBI from 10 to 15 by June 30, 2021, and to 30 by June 30, 2023, by providing investigative and forensic support to law enforcement and by incorporating emerging technology.

The CBI is committed to assisting families in their quest for justice regarding cold cases in Colorado. In addition to assigning cold case investigations to CBI agents as an extra duty as part of their existing caseloads, CBI Forensic Services is on the forefront of emerging technology in addressing these complex crimes. The team recently purchased Next Generation Sequencing equipment, which is used in the genetic genealogy process. With equipment validations expected by January 2021, the CBI will be able to perform this important testing in-house instead of referring this casework to private laboratories. CBI investigative analysts constantly work to develop leads whether through genealogical lineage or traditional methods for CBI agents to investigate. As always, CBI investigative analysts are coordinating with victims' families to host events and provide resources to help them navigate these life-changing situations.

WIG 4 – Colorado School Safety Resource Center (CSSRC) training staff will work with school districts to provide exercise design and implementation support to increase the number of districts with exercised emergency operations plans from 34% to 95% by June 30, 2021.

A safe and secure learning environment provides the cornerstone for a successful education. Schools in Colorado have worked tirelessly to continue to improve the safety of students, staff, and visitors. Many schools have well-exercised emergency plans, however, some schools may need additional support to create and drill plans. The Colorado School Safety Resource Center will work with school districts to increase the number of schools with an exercised emergency operations plan.

-Earlier in 2020, CBI Forensic Services purchased Next Generation Sequencing equipment, which is used in the genetic genealogy testing process. In the final quarter of 2020, CBI Forensic Services began equipment validations, which will enable forensic scientists to perform this important testing in-house instead of referring this casework to private laboratories. CBI investigative analysts continued to work to develop leads whether through genealogical lineage or traditional methods for CBI agents to investigate. As always, CBI investigative analysts are coordinating with victims’ families to host events and provide resources to help them navigate these life-changing situations. The National Day of Remembrance event (held in September 2020) is another example of this. Although a virtual event because of COVID, members of the CBI recognized and honored homicide victims, and offered support to their families.
