

FEMA Awards Colorado Major Disaster Declaration: President Obama issued a major disaster declaration for the State of Colorado on July 16, 2015. The declaration triggers the release of Federal funds to help our Colorado communities recover from the Severe Storms, Tornadoes, Flooding, Landslides, and Mudslides that occurred May 4 to June 16, 2015. The current declaration includes 11 counties: Baca, Elbert, El Paso, Fremont, Logan, Morgan, Pueblo, Saguache, Sedgwick, Washington and Yuma. The State has been awarded the Public Assistance and the Hazard Mitigation grant programs. The Public Assistance program is for emergency work and the repair or replacement of disaster-damaged facilities. The Hazard Mitigation program provides assistance for actions taken to prevent or reduce long-term risk to life and property from natural hazards. The Colorado DHSEM continues to work to conduct damage assessments in other areas of the state impacted by the spring storms.



- Disaster Case Management Program (DCMP)
 - Last week, State Voluntary Agency Liaison (VAL) Robyn Knappe and Disaster Case Management (DCM) Program Manager Chuck Sullivan attended the Boulder County Long Term Flood Recovery Group's (LTFRG) Coordinating Committee meeting. Regular committee reports and updates on staffing, finances, and buyout activity were followed by a broad discussion on transition planning. The discussion focused the planned closure of the LTFRG in December, the subsequent handling of open client cases, document storage requirements and final program reporting for the LTRG. Transition planning was also the focus of a meeting that Robyn Knappe and Chuck Sullivan had with Catholic Charities Emergency Assistance and Disaster Recovery Manager, Diane Elio, on July 23, 2015. Catholic Charities is the State's FEMA sub-grantee providing case management to flood survivors in Boulder, Weld and the eight Balance of State counties. Along with county long term recovery groups and other community organizations, they are a key partner in planning for office closures and the transitioning of open cases to other entities when the DCMP grant ends. A similar planning meeting with Lutheran Family Services, the sub-grantee for Larimer County, was held in early July. In the coming months, the DCMP team will continue to work these organizations, FEMA and local communities to ensure a successful program closure.
 - A Psychological First Aid: Helping Others in Times of Stress training will be help on Tuesday, August 4, 2015 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Medical Center of the Rockies, 2500 Rocky Mountain Avenue, Loveland, Colorado 80538. This training will help you to better recognize and manage the basic symptoms of psychological distress. You will also learn the psychological first aid tools to bolster individuals' functioning during times of extreme stress.


Program Update

The State is currently working four disasters that involve HMGP funding: DR-4067, DR-4133, DR-4134 and DR-4145

 A total of 98 HMGP applications have been submitted to FEMA for formal review. FEMA is working on reviewing the applications and providing the State with a FEMA request for information (RFI). The State is then forwarding the FEMA RFI to the sub-applicant and assisting them with questions and helping guide them through the RFI process. A breakdown of projects by disaster is shown below:

- FEMA RFI response is mandatory. Once a FEMA RFI is distributed, sub-applicants are highly advised to provide their FEMA RFI response to the state within twenty calendar days of receipt. This will allow for state review and comment prior to FEMA submission. Failure to provide responses to the state within the twenty day period will result in responses being sent to FEMA without review. Response to a FEMA RFI is mandatory within thirty days. Failure to respond to a FEMA RFI within this deadline will result in project removal from the HMGP. Projects can only be reinstated in the HMGP through an extended appeal process.
- The State has suspended all regular HMGP Conference Calls including 5%, Generator, Wildfire, and general information calls. Due to the different stages and timelines for the many project types, individual coordination is a more appropriate and effective use of time. Pertinent or general project information will be communicated via email or phone call as necessary.



 FEMA continues to review project applications. Only eleven projects remain in the initial FEMA review queue. Many projects have been awarded and many projects have been issued a FEMA Request for Information, which requires the sub-grantee to provide clarification to FEMA. The State is working to assist the sub-grantee through the RFI process.

- The Mitigation Team has reviewed all Notice of Intent (NOI) submitted for the FY15 Hazard Mitigation Assistance Guidance grants, including the Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program (PDM) and Flood Mitigation Assistance Program (FMA) by the June 12, 2015 deadline. Mitigation staff has contacted all eligibility applicants and AmecFoster-Wheeler will be providing individual application support and development to submit formal applications to FEMA. Further information about PDM and FMA can be found on the <u>DHSEM Grant Programs website</u>.
- Mitigation staff conducted a kickoff meeting with Clear Creek County for an approved wildfire mitigation project under HMGP DR-4145. The Hazardous Fuels Reduction (HFR) project help reduce wildfire risk for a community of residential properties in Clear Creek County.
- Mitigation staff and FEMA conducted site visits with the City of Longmont and the City of Fort Collins for flood mitigation projects submitted under HMGP DR-4145. The site visits were necessary to assist in FEMA Environmental & Historic Preservation (EHP) determinations.

Program Update	

In the last week, ten requests for reimbursements (RFRs) were submitted, and twelve RFRs have been
recommended for payment. The total amount of RFRs is now at 1,226 of which 832 are recommended for
payment and 191 were returned to the sub-grantees for additional information. The remaining 203 are in
progress. The total amount requested is \$148.65 million, and \$130.8 million is considered initially eligible.

\$92.15 million has been recommended for payment, \$18.85 million has been returned to sub-grantees for additional information, and \$19.8 million is still in progress.

- Three requests for scope changes were submitted in the last week, and two were completed or deferred to closeout. The total amount of scope change requests is now 336 of which 234 are completed or deferred to closeout, and 53 were returned to the sub-grantees for additional information. The remaining 49 are in progress.
- Payments have been updated in the EMGrantsPRO system. The system shows that 90 payments have been made in the last week for total of \$5,160,929.90 including federal and state share. These payments were sent out as they were completed over the last four weeks.



 - On July 22, 2015, The State Voluntary Agency Liaison, Robyn Knappe, attended the COVOAD Emotional and Spiritual Care Committee (ESCC) meeting. The group, chaired by Don Falvey of United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), continued to build the Emotional and Spiritual Care Provider Program. After discussing curriculum and credentialing, the committee decided it was time to move forward and begin discussing the mobilization process for Emotional and Spiritual Care Providers. The next ESCC Meeting will be August 17, 2015. ESCC plans to have reports from the Curriculum and Credentialing Committees, updates from ESCC members who will be attending the National Disaster Spiritual Care Summit in Chicago, a focused discussion on program mobilization and goals for the Emotional and Spiritual Care Provider Program.



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
