Annual Report of the Broadband Fund and Broadband Deployment Board to the General Assembly

Prepaired by: Broadband Deployment Board Staff July 1, 2016

Introduction:

Pursuant to section 40-15-509.5 (9) C.R.S. the Broadband Deployment Board (Board) is required to report annually on the projects supported by the Broadband Fund including: the number of projects; the location of each project; the amount of funding received for each project; and a description of each project.

Broadband Fund Contributions:

A transfer of \$200,000 was made on March 4, 2015 from the Colorado High Cost Support Mechanism (HCSM) to the Broadband Fund for the purposes of administering the Board and Broadband Fund pursuant to C.R.S 40-15-509.5(4)(b). On April 8, 2016, the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) transferred an additional \$2,693,567 from the HCSM to the Broadband Fund. Future transfers will be determined by PUC Proceeding 16M-0268T which was opened on April 13, 2016.

Initial Grant Cycle

On April 18, 2016, the Broadband Deployment Board voted to make up to \$2,400,000 in grant funding available in the initial grant cycle. Applications for the grant cycle were accepted starting on April 20, 2016, and ending on June 30, 2016. The Board plans to hold a public meeting in late September to determine which grant applications will receive funding.

For the initial grant cycle, the Board received 14 applications requesting a total of \$9,117,813 and pledging matching funds of \$3,362,488. Below is a summary of the applications received.
