

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
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annual report of the executive director

Ouring the past four years, the Department of Revenue has created an environment that fosters mutual respect, cooperation and an uncompromising commitment to excellence. That willingness to work hard together benefits all our customers — the residents of Colorado.

With the principles of sound business management firmly established as the basis of our operations, the Department in Fiscal Year 1991-92 began to focus on refinements that improve service, contain costs and improve efficiency. Many of our accomplishments can be attributed to the Department's Memorandum of Understanding with the General Assembly. This MOU allowed creation of a reinvestment reserve through which savings could be carried from year to year to invest in high-cost projects that could not be purchased in a single budget year. Thanks to this reinvestment flexibility, a highly skilled team of DOR employees was able to complete the foundation for a much-needed new Revenue Accounting System in-house, at considerable savings over comparable projects in other states, and without any supplemental allocations from the legislature.



Recognizing the rapid changes in modern business transactions, the Department also began to explore new technologies that we feel will become standards of communications and data transmission by the next century. The Department of Revenue intends to be in the forefront in adapting these technologies to improve internal operations and our service to the taxpayers of Colorado. We plan to be leaders in teamwork and technology.

I am pleased to present to the Governor and the General Assembly this 51st annual report, covering Department of Revenue operations and achievements from July 1, 1991 through June 30, 1992, in accordance with C.R.S. 24-35-102(3).

Major policy decisions, long-range planning goals and reinvestment priorities are reached by the Department of Revenue's Board of Directors, comprised of the Director, Deputy Director and eight division directors. Through this cooperative administrative process, the Department can draw upon the individual skills and knowledge of each member to set a course of excellence for the future of the entire department.

teamwork - the key to success

Using sound, basic business practices and the budgeting flexibility allowed under the Memorandum of Understanding, DOR in four years has realized more than \$6 million in savings and reinvestment — \$2.2 million returned to the state's General Fund and \$3.8 million used for reinvestment. And, the Department has been able to absorb mandated budget cuts without layoffs.

These accomplishments require high levels of professionalism, energy and imagination. The essential ingredient, however, has been teamwork. Without the willingness of all staff members to work closely together, to share ideas and expertise unselfishly for a common goal, projects of merit could not be realized.

During FY 1991-92, teamwork made things happen in virtually every area of operations.

- Teams of staff members pooled their knowledge to put in place all the essential components of the complex Division of Gaming: policies, procedures, licensing, enforcement, data processing, liquor investigations and field audits. The same concept of pooling knowledge will be used as the Department assumes management responsibility for the Division of Racing Activities.
- Other teams of talented users, programmers and analysts, with reinvestment money, completed the long-anticipated framework for the new revenue accounting system (RAS) that already affects most major accounting functions. Over three years, the Department reinvested nearly \$3 million of its own resources to complete the project at no extra cost to the taxpayers. Another team has already begun enhancements that

will improve income tax accounting. Since the successful in-house creation of RAS was announced, the Department has received inquiries from 10 other states on how we accomplished this feat.

- Renewed commitments to Total Quality Management led to the formation of Continuous Improvement Project teams in every division. These groups are studying facets of the organization ranging from staffing to phone service.
- To enhance customer service, a new Regional Service Center that brings together several major departmental functions in one centralized facility was opened in Colorado Springs.

- To form new networks of communication and foster voluntary compliance with state laws, DOR increased dramatically its information and outreach efforts. These efforts include joint pilot projects with cities and counties, wider circulation for Department publications, creation and distribution of 125 separate FYI information sheets dealing with specific tax issues, and increased numbers of classes, training sessions and seminars for the general public and professionals.
- Teamwork led to the smooth implementation of the Commercial Driver's License program well ahead of federally mandated deadlines.

Cooperation has meant success for the Department in the past and will be a source of strength in the future. Shared knowledge and talent will be tomorrow's way of doing business.

technology - business of the future

phenomenal burst of technological advancements in electronics, communication and information exchange has brought unprecedented opportunities to improve and simplify business practices. To remain competitive, the most sophisticated companies have already learned to embrace these new technologies.

Recognizing the importance of these advancements, the Department of Revenue in FY 1991-92 began to explore ways to adapt technology to benefit taxpayers, enhance customer service and streamline the collection and reporting processes.

- Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) was offered as a convenient alternative method of paying withholding taxes. While some initial obstacles were encountered, by the end of the fiscal year, more than 13,000 EFT accounts had been opened and are functioning smoothly. The Department anticipates that more taxpayers will come to appreciate the convenience and accuracy of EFT and this method of filing will gain wide acceptance.
- Electronic Data Interchange (EDI) allows the rapid exchange of data between computers, without repetitive input. DOR has completed plans to implement EDI, first testing the system in cooperation with select volunteer companies that already have EDI capability.
- Interactive Voice Response (IVR) would greatly expand the Department's capability to respond to taxpayer telephone calls. In 1991-92, the Customer Service Section handled more than one million calls, an increase of 16.5% over the previous year. Through IVR, taxpayers can obtain basic information on their accounts (e.g., refund status) without having to talk to a tax examiner. The Department is currently analyzing costs of various IVR systems.
- InTouch Colorado will bring information about government services literally to the fingertips of Coloradans through a network of conveniently located kiosks that can be accessed at any time. A computer screen will incorporate text, full-motion video, graphics and audio a package that leads the user to the desired information. DOR has taken the lead in this inter-departmental project and plans to test the first kiosk in mid-1993.
- The Lottery, now in its tenth year, introduced Keno as a companion to Lotto and began to develop barcoded Scratch tickets that will simplify accounting and payment procedures.



New high-speed laser printer saves time and money, improves efficiency and turnaround time.

- The Motor Vehicle Division began offering access to driver records in several offices throughout the state. This new service has proved convenient and extremely popular with motorists who previously had to come to Denver or order the records by mail.
- A new laser printer dramatically lowered printing and forms costs, reduced small forms inventory, improved printing quality and shortened production time.

To keep pace with growing demands for service and to use our resources wisely, the Department continues to explore every new innovation. Our business will be to look to the future.







Fiscal Years 85-92




SOURCES AND DISPOSITION OF MAJOR TAXES

SOURCES AND DISPOSITION OF MAJOR TAXES


Mileage/Fuel Taxes (dollars in millions)

Income Taxes (dollars in millions)




SOURCES AND DISPOSITION OF MAJOR TAXES



Imposed upon manufacturers or first receivers of alcoholic (or fermented malt beverages, i.e., beer containing 0.5 to 3.2 percent alcohol) beverages that are sold, offered for sale, or used in the state.

The manufacturer or first receiver must file a monthly return and remit the tax by the 20th day of the subsequent month for alcoholic and/orfermented malt beverages manufactured, received, sold, or disposed during the current month.

Cigarette & Tobacco Products: Title 39, Articles 28, 28.5

Imposed upon cigarette wholesalers who sell or offer for sale cigarettes in the state; to bacco product distributors/first receivers collect and remit taxes imposed on the distribution, sale, consumption, or handling of the products.

Cigarette tax is paid by purchase of tax stamps by wholesalers who affix them to the packages or who use DOR-approved metering machines to imprint or impress a payment stamp on the packages. Distributors remit tax by 10th day of the month following purchase; they receive a 4% discount from the stamp's face value for collection expense. Tobacco products distributors file quarterly returns, paying the tax by the 20th day of the month following the end of the quarter; distributors deduct 3 1/3% of the tax due to cover their expense of collection and remission.

Title 39, Article 23.5

Amount equal to state death tax credit allowed by federal estate tax regulations.

Imposed on a decedent's estate when death occurred on or after January 1, 1980.

When the filing of a federal estate tax return is not required, a state return is similarly not required. Colorado inheritance tax is imposed on the right to receive property by descent or testamentary gift from a decedent's estate. The Colorado gift tax is imposed on gratuitous property transfers that occured on or before December 31, 1979.

Income:

Title 39, Article 22

Individuals, Fiduciaries

5% of Colorado taxable income

5% of 1st \$50,000 of taxable income; 5.2% of the remainder for tax years beginning on or after July 1, 1991. 5.1% for tax years beginning

Colorado taxable income is Federal taxable income with Colorado modifications of treatment.

Imposed upon the privilege of earning/receiving income in (or as resident of) the state. Corporations are not "residents". Individuals and fiduciaries may be residents or non-residents. Residency determines whether 100% or less of the entity's income is allocated to Colorado.

Procedures for collections are analogous to Federal procedures (e.g., withholding, estimated tax declarations, etc.). Residents are allowed credits for tax payments to other states. Return requirements are annual, in general, and are due by the 15th day of the 4th month following the tax year's close. Other requirements are imposed for withholding and estimated tax payments.

Passenger-mile tax is imposed upon owners/operators of vehicles used to transport passengers for compensation. Gasoline tax is imposed on distributors/first receivers of gas; the base is gross gallonage received. Special fuel distributors remit returns based on gallons sold in the state or used on the public highways of the state.

Owner/operators of relevant passenger vehicles must file quarterly returns, paying the tax by the 25th day of the month following the end of the quarter. Gasoline/special fuel distributors file monthly and pay tax by the 25th day of the month following fuel receipt. Gasoline distributors remit the tax minus a 21/2% deduction for collection/administrative costs; special fuel distributors receive a 1% deduction to cover the cost of collection.

Local taxes are additional.

Sales tax is levied upon purchase price of all sales of tangible personal property at retail. Imposed on the purchaser, the vendor collects and remits. If no sales tax is paid, the buyer must remit use tax to DOR. Sales and use tax also applies to certain services(e.g. telephone service, some gas/electric service). In the case of tourism tax, imposition/collectionremission is as above. Taxable items include ski lift/admission tickets, lodging services, certain food/drink sales, rental automobiles and similar items.

Sales tax returns are due monthly (if tax liability is \$300 or more) or quarterly (if tax liability is less than \$ 300 on a monthly basis). Wholesale vendors of taxable property file annually. Vendors are allowed a discount of 31/3% of tax due to cover collection expense. Tourism tax vendors must file quarterly and pay tax by the 25th day of the month following the end of the quarter.

Producers/interest holders must file annually and pay tax by the 15th day of the fourth month after the tax year close, excepting molybdenum interests/producers who file and pay on a quarterly basis. Witholding/special return requirements apply to operators/ first purchasers (who disburse interest/royalty payments).

legislative digest

Following is a brief description of legislative initiatives approved in the second regular session of the 58th Colorado General Assembly. These particular changes impact programs administered by the Colorado Department of Revenue. Effective dates appear in parentheses.

ADMINISTRATION

HB 1088

Quarterly Reports to Controller: Requires each department to submit a report of financial information to the controller within 30 days after the end of each quarter. (3/04/92)

SB 79

Financial Reports to State Controller: Requires all departments to submit analyses of costs, revenues, fund balances, and performance indicators for all programs. (4/16/92)

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LAWS

SB 72

Change in Alcohol License Codes: Allows licensed drinking establishments to file for temporary liquor licenses. These temporary licenses allow businesses to conduct normal business operations for a period of up to 90 days after the establishment's retail malt beverage license has expired. (6/01/92)

SB 185

Retail Gaming Tavern Liquor Licenses: Establishes the retail gaming tavern license, a new class of liquor license, for gaming establishments. Prohibits persons with ownership interests in retail gaming taverns from owning interests in establishments that are licensed with different types of liquor licenses. An individual may have ownership interests in up to 3 retail gaming taverns. (5/20/92)

ESTATE TAX LAWS

HB 1210

Estate Tax Changes: Modifies Colorado estate tax laws to more closely parallel federal estate tax terminology and laws. (7/01/92)

GAMING/RACING LAWS

HB 1037

Simulcast Facilities: Adds simulcast facilities to the statutory definition and description of a racetrack. Simulcast facilities are those in which races are televised for the purpose of pari-mutuel wagering. Such facilities do not need to obtain racetrack class liquor licenses if they hold valid licenses for selling alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises. (3/20/92)

HB 1206

Division of Racing Integrated into Department of Revenue: Transfers the Division of Racing and the Colorado Racing Commission from the Department of Regulatory Agencies to the Department of Revenue. Increases the number of commissioners from 3 to 5 and limits the number of consecutive terms that can be served by the commissioners. Requires the state attorney general to provide legal services to the division and commission. Increases the number of persons on the advisory committee from 7 to 9. (6/06/92)

SCR 3

Vote by Affected Localities on Limited Gaming: Prohibits the operation of gaming establishments in any city, town, or unincorporated portion of a county prior to the approval of such activities by a majority of the voters in the affected area. If denied by the voters, the question may not be submitted again until 4 years after the election in which the question was submitted. (5/06/92)

INCOME TAX LAWS

HB 1026

Enterprise Zone Employee Credit: Non-Refundability and Carryforwards: Commencing with tax years beginning on or after January 1, 1993, refunds for new business facility employees will no longer be available to taxpayers whose businesses are located in enterprize zones. Instead that amount may be carried forward and used as a credit against the taxpayer's income tax liability for up to five subsequent years. (Income tax years beginning on or after January 1, 1993)

HB 1145

Protection of Pensioner's Income from Garnishment by Other States: Prohibits the seizure of the property of Colorado residents for non-payment of another state's taxes on pension income. (6/06/92)

HB 1191

Income Tax Credits: Allows an income tax credit for the conversion of cars/trucks to the use of clean-burning alternative fuels. The vehicle must be converted within 120 days of its delivery to the taxpayer and is limited to 50 vehicles per taxable year. The credit is limited to 5% of the purchase price of the vehicle providing that amount does not exceed 50% of the actual cost of the conversion or of the cost of the car manufacturers' fuel system option. The credit may be carried over for three years. For tax years commencing July 1, 1992 and ending June 30, 1994 the credit is available only to taxpayers whose converted vehicles are used in connection with a business. Beginning with tax years commencing July 1, 1994 and ending June 30, 1998, the credit is no longer restricted according to the use of the converted vehicle.

Commencing in tax years beginning on or after January 1, 1992, an income tax credit is allowed to businesses engaged in operating a licensed child care center or family care home equal to 20% of their annual investment in tangible personal property used in the facility. Beginning July 1, 1992, a similar credit is allowed to businesses that provide to their employees on-site child care facilities. Such businesses are allowed an income tax credit equal to 10% of their annual investment in tangible personal property used in the child care facility. (Applicability based on type of credit--see each credit for specific dates)

HB 1263

S-Corporation Income Tax Codes: Adopts income tax codes for S-corporations that provide for the uniform income tax treatment of such corporations among states. Considers an individual's pro-rata share of S-corporation income tax payments to other states as an actual payment to the other state. Requires S-corporations to disclose the name, address, and social security number or federal employer identification number of the shareholder, and the income distributed to them so that the state may properly determine individual liabilities. Allows the corporation to file returns on behalf of shareholders. Requires S-corporations either to file income tax payments on behalf of non-resident clients or to file with the State, agreements with its non-resident shareholders delineating their avowal to comply with state rules. (1/01/92)

HB 1270

Real Estate Sales by Non-Residents Subject to Income Tax Withholding: Charges those responsible for the closing and settlement services on real estate transactions involving non-resident sellers and in which the sales price exceeds \$100,000, to withhold the lesser of 2% of the sales price or the net proceeds of the sale. That amount would be earmarked to satisfy any potential income tax liability that the seller may incur. (7/01/92-applies to real estate transfers occurring on or after January 1, 1993)

HB 1278

Non-Deductibility of Expenditures to Discriminatory Country Clubs: Requires that federal income tax deductions of expenses incurred at or to a club that restricts membership based on discriminatory practices be added back as a source of taxable income in the calculation of Colorado taxable income. Requires such discriminatory clubs to disclose, on their receipts to customers, that expenditures at or to the club are non-deductible for state income tax purposes. (Applies to receipts furnished on or after July 1, 1992 and applies to income tax years on or after January 1, 1992)

HB 1344

State Income Tax Deduction Addback for School Finance: Requires federal income tax deductions for the payment of state income taxes be added back as a source of taxable income in calculating Colorado taxable income. The maximum amount of the deduction that could be added back as a taxable source of income is that amount that would reduce the federal itemized amount to the standard deduction. (5/28/92)

SB 159

Electronic Funds Transfer of Withholding Payments: Changes the threshold amount at which employers are required to remit withheld taxes by electronic fund transfer. Previously the annual withholding amount was \$11,000, this bill changes that amount to \$50,000. Removes the Department's ability to mandate that employers file annual employee withholding information on magnetic tape. (5/27/92)

MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS

HB 1015

Addition of Steroids to the List of Universal Controlled Substances: Adds to the list of Class III controlled substances, anabolic steroids. Any person caught in the unlawful manufacturing, dispensing, sale, or possession of the steroids is subject to a class 3 or class 4 felony. The Department revokes drivers licenses of individuals convicted of a drug felony offense. (7/01/92)

HB 1019

Interstate Commercial Vehicle Classification Changes: Clarifies current statutes with regards to the classification and subsequent taxation of vehicles registered under the International Registration Plan (IRP). (4/10/92)

HB 1042

Use of Manufacturers' License Plates: Allows manufacturers, manufacturer's representatives, and/or those authorized by such persons to use vehicles bearing manufacturers' plates for private purposes. Restricts the type of vehicles that may be registered at the discounted rate and that may bear manufacturers' plates. (3/24/92)



HB 1073

Acceleration of Driver's License Revocation: Requires, upon conviction of an offense for which a driver's license is stautorily revoked, the immediate surrender of the driver's license. The license must be revoked at the time of conviction although there is a contingency plan for persons not immediately in possession of their licenses. Persons who otherwise fail to surrender their driver's licenses will be guilty of a class 2 misdemeanor traffic offense. Also clarifies the type of licenses that must be surrendered upon conviction of a traffic offense. (7/01/92)

HB 1085

License Plates for Honorably-Discharged Veterans: Allows for the creation of a new license plate style for honorably-discharged veterans. (1/01/93)

HB 1154

Late Payments of Penalty Assessments for Motor Vehicle Infractions: Allows the Motor Vehicle division to accept, up to 20 days after they're due, late payments for penalty assessments. (7/01/92)

HB1178

Registration Surcharges on New Motor Vehicles with Air Conditioners: Imposes a \$2 surcharge on the sale of new motor vehicles sold in Colorado that are equipped with an air conditioner. Surcharge revenues will be deposited in the Ozone Protection fund. (1/01/93)

HB 1352

Registration of State-Owned Vehicles: Eliminates the exemption of state-owned vehicles from registration. (1/01/93)

SB 17

Consumer Protection Concerning the Guarantee of Credit Approval by Car Salespersons: Includes the following as deceptive trade practices: guaranteeing to a customer the approval of their credit/loan before it has actually been approved; the sale of a motor vehicle, accepted as a trade-in, prior to the approval of the credit or loan of the vehicle's former owner; failure to return the collateral or down-payment on a vehicle when the customer is required to return the vehicle due to the denial of credit, after being guaranteed credit approval. Bars motor vehicle dealers from keeping a purchaser's down-payment or collateral as rent on a vehicle if the dealer guarantees financing, releases the motor vehicle to the customer prior to actual approval of the customer's credit, and the credit approval fails to materialize. (4/29/92)

SB 22

Technology for Identifying Insurance Coverage from Driver's Licenses: Calls for the department and the commissioner of insurance to study the technology that would enable the identification of adequate insurance coverage on a driver's license or similar type of identification card. (6/03/92)

SB 82

Licensing of Branches of Commercial Driving Schools: Requires each branch of commercial driving schools to acquire its own license for operation. (7/01/92)

SB88

Dealer Board Review and Changes: Eliminates the requirement that motor vehicle auctioneers be licensed. Changes the name of the motor vehicle dealer licensing board to the motor vehicle dealer board. Changes the composition of the board, decreasing by one the number of licensed motor vehicle dealers and increasing the number of members representing the public at large by one. Gives the board the authority to issue subpoenas and to delegate such authority to the Department. (7/01/92)

SR 138

Physical Inspection of Motor Vehicles: Requires the Department to promulgate regulations requiring the physical inspection of certain motor vehicles to verify specific information pertaining to the taxable value of the vehicle. (7/01/92)

SB 153

Use of Optical Imaging Technology by County Clerks: Allows county clerks to preserve records lawfully filed with the clerk as optical images. Standards for the provision, quality, supervision, and access to records preserved on microfiche apply to the optical imaging records as well. (3/25/92)

SALES/USE TAX LAWS

HB 1248

Wholesale Sales--the Sale of Materials Used in the Printing Process: Includes under the definition of "wholesale sale", as it relates to state sales tax statutes, the sale of all materials used in the preparation of printing when that printed product is sold at retail to a customer accepting delivery within the state. (5/27/92)

HB 1249

Exemption of Railroad Capital Equipment from the State Sales/Use Tax: Exempts from the state sales/use tax the sale or use of locomotives, freight cars, railroad work equipment, or other railroad rolling stock, and exempts those items to be affixed or attached as a component part of such equipment. (7/01/92)

SB 107

Expanding the RTD Territory: Increases the area of the RTD district to include the Arapahoe Park race track. (7/01/92)

MISCELLANEOUS

HB 1134

Underground Petroleum Storage Tank Fund Changes: Changes the threshold amounts under which environmental surcharge fees per tank truckload would increase or decrease. Increases from \$1.5 million to \$3 million the minimum level in the fund at which the surcharge increases to \$50. Increases from \$4 million to \$10 million the level at which the surcharge would revert to \$25. (3/06/92)

HB 1305

Limit on the Amount of Purchase Rebate That May Be Offered for the Conversion of Motor Vehicles to the Use of Alternative Fuels: Limits the amount of the rebate that may be offered for the conversion of motor vehicles to the use of alternative fuels to 50% of the cost of the vehicle conversion or of the cost of an original equipment manufacturers' fuel system option. Adds sulfurfree diesel fuel derived from natural gas as an acceptable alternative fuel. (7/01/92)

HB 1321

Woodstove Surcharge: Imposes a \$1 surcharge on new wood stoves, inserts, or gas or electric fireplaces sold on or after July 1, 1992. Requires the Department to track the number of conversions to cleaner burning devices. Restricts the installation of any new or remodeled fireplace to a gas appliance, electric device, or a fireplace insert that meets standards developed by the commission. Charges the lead air quality planning agency for the Denver metropolitan area to promote the voluntary conversion of conventional fireplaces or fireplace inserts and to develop a contingency plan if their conversion goals aren't met. Possible contingencies include issuing a limited number of burning permits; imposing fees for burning wood; mandating the conversion of fireplace or woodstoves to cleaner burning devices upon the sale of a dwelling unit; and/or removing the exemption of woodburning devices that are used as primary heat sources from no-burn days. (5/27/92)

SB 39

Lease Exemptions from Department of Revenue Tax Liens: Eliminates the requirement to record or file with the Department, the leasing of personal property to other businesses. A copy of the lease must be provided to the Department in order to qualify the property for exemption from a lien for state excise, withholding, sales, use, gasoline, and special fuel taxes levied on the business to which the property is leased. (4/16/92)

SB 137

Woodstove Regulations: Requires that any fireplace or woodstove installed after January 1, 1993 must be a gas appliance, electric device, or a fireplace insert or woodstove that meets the clean-burning standards established by the air quality control commission. Any modification to a fireplace or woodstove after that date must also be of the type stated above. Requires municipal and county governments to enact building codes that require that any fireplaces installed after January 1, 1993 be one of the four devices listed above. (5/27/92)





DISTRIBUTION OF NET CIGARETTE TAX COLLECTIONS 1/







The Division of Gaming regulates limited stakes gaming in the three mountain towns of Cripple Creek, Central City and Black Hawk. Pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment, passed in November of 1990, gaming became legal in licensed establishments on October 1, 1991.

Before any monies are distributed from the Limited Gaming Fund, the administrative expenses of the Divison of Gaming must be paid and the law requires two months of operating expenses for the administration of Gaming to be held in escrow at the end of the fiscal year. The Division operates on the revenue generated from the gaming tax, application and license fees and any fines levied by the Division.



Fiscal year 1991-92 was the tenth year of operation for the Colorado Lottery. In addition to Lotto and Scratch games, a new On-Line Keno game began on September 16, 1991.

Ticket sales for the year reached a record \$239.2 million in FY 1992 with \$58.8 million from Scratch games, \$166.5 million from Lotto and \$13.9 million from Keno. These sales allowed fund recipients to share in the distribution of \$76.0 million in Lottery proceeds.





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SALES AND USE TAX GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Gross Sales: Total receipts for all sales and services, both taxable and nontaxable, from Colorado retail sales tax returns.

Wholesale Sales: Sales to other licensed dealers for purpose of resale.

Retail Sales: Gross sales less wholesale sales.

Total Deductions: Sales of services or tangible personal property that are not subject to tax. The following, while not all


inclusive, represent major nontaxable items: wholesale sales; interstate commerce sales; sales to governments, religious or charitable organizations; admissions; lodgings over 30 days; gasoline; cigarettes; food for off-premises consumption; prescription drugs and prosthetics; certain machinery and machine tools; certain livestock and livestock feed; seed; newspapers; and residential fuel used for light, heat, and power.

Net Taxable Sales: Gross sales less total deductions.

Filing Requirement: Returns are due monthly if sales tax liability is \$300 or more per month. If sales tax liability is under \$300

per month, returns are due quarterly. Wholesale businesses only may file annual returns.

COLORADO NET SALES TAX COLLECTIONS Fiscal Years 1982 to 1992






