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
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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Over the past several years, the Department of Revenue has developed an unshakable commitment to customer service. In fact, service is now an integral part of all our business planning and a basic standard by which we measure our activities. During Fiscal Year 1996-97, the department began looking for even better ways to offer the public more convenient, responsive service as well as faster, more comprehensive access to information. We were seeking new dimensions in service, and we found them.

Many of our accomplishments were built upon more effective use of technology-of cyberspace.

For example, the Motor Carrier Services Division, with support from the Joint Budget Committee and the Legislature, began replacing out-of-date computer systems at all ports of entry and building an integrated data system that will permit rapid, dependable electronic exchange of information among all the ports, as well as with other agencies and customers.

The department made considerable progress toward replacing Revenue's outdated income tax system. We reached a significant landmark in the long-term project with the completion of an essential document that spells out the 500-plus requirements for the system, as well as the technical architecture. Design is also in place, including an analysis of the processes, budget and personnel impact.

The department also anticipated the public's growing acceptance of electronic communication. A significant expansion of the information available on our Web site brought a 226 percent increase in the number of "hits" over the previous year. In addition, joint federal-state electronic filings of income tax returns grew by 18 percent and the number of accounts remitting taxes by electronic funds transfer rose by 16 percent.

In yet another dimension the Grand Junction driver's license office earned a Governor's Peak Performance Award for innovations and service enhancements.

The Department of Revenue takes pride in its drive to find new dimensions in service to the public. The prospects for future innovations promise even broader opportunities for challenge and achievement.


I am pleased to present to the Governor and the General Assembly the 56th annual report covering Department of Revenue operations and activities from July 1,1996 through June 30, 1997.

New Dimensions in Service

The Department of Revenue's business philosophy is based upon the premise that providing responsive customer service, offering convenient access to information and demonstrating innovative efficiency is essential to sustain public confidence in government. In keeping with that conviction, the department established new partnerships with our constituency, significantly widened our presence on the Internet and instituted a number of internal changes that will enhance our ability to discharge our responsibilities now and in the future. Changing demographics, coupled with rapid advances in technology, gave us exciting opportunities to explore new dimensions and challenged us to meet even higher standards of professionalism.

The new Motor Carrier Services Division (MCS) took a number of steps to enhance service through cooperation with other state agencies and the trucking industry. In association with the Colorado Department of Transportation, MCS entered into a public/private partnership to provide electronic clearance at all ports of entry. This agreement sets the stage for electronic by-pass of compliant commercial vehicles at highway speed through all Colorado ports. MCS also was instrumental in creating the first Colorado Motor Carrier Advisory Council, comprised of high-level managers from the division, CDOT, the State Patrol, Public Utilities Commission and commercial vehicle associations. The council will address operational and regulatory issues to facilitate industry compliance and speed the industry's movement of goods and services.

The department placed on the Internet information from virtually every division. As a result, customers throughout the world can within minutes obtain answers to questions, download income tax forms or communicate with us through electronic mail.

The Motor Vehicle Division initiated new opportunities for responsive customer service at driver's license offices throughout the state. Acting as self-directed teams, employees in each office were empowered to establish procedures that best suited their constituency. Modifications in the Grand Junction office brought such dramatic improvements in service the team earned the Governor's Peak Performance Award.

DIMENSIONS IN CYBERSPACE

- Income Tax Initiative personnel developed a document that details 500-plus requirements for replacing the department's 30-year-old income tax accounting system and completed the design phase which includes a detailed analysis of processes, budget and personnel impact.
- Concurrently, modification of all systems to accommodate the Year 2000 continued on schedule.
- Motor Carrier Services completed initial phases of a federally sponsored project to build integrated data systems that will offer the trucking industry electronic credentials, including registration, fuel tax requirements, PUC permits, haz/mat permits and oversized/ overweight permits.
- During the 1997 income tax season, a limited number of state employees participated in a successful test of a File-4-Me option, through which the Department computes tax liabilities and refunds for qualified taxpayers, without the need to file a return.

DIMENSIONS IN SERVICE

- Customers accessed the DOR Internet and Electronic Bulletin Board sites more than 200,000 times. Taxpayers downloaded 54,000 forms, compared to 11,500 in FY 1996.
- Since the Interactive Voice Response system became fully operational in January 1997, it has provided information to more than 158,000 callers, allowing agents to handle an increased volume of more complicated requests for assistance.
- Customers doing business in the centralized rotunda area at the DOR offices at 1881 Pierce St. now use an electronic number system that minimizes wait times for specific services.
- A new video, "Starting a Business in Colorado," gives entrepreneurs a comprehensive look at state licensing and tax requirements.
- The Colorado Racing Commission approved revised licensing categories and costs for each type of license, resulting in cost reductions to the industry for initial applications and license renewals.
- The Gaming Division developed regulations governing how gaming establishments can accept checks. Law prohibits extension of credit for gaming purposes.
- Recodification of the liquor code and pertinent regulations reduced by one-third the overall volume of liquor law in Colorado.
- Procedural consolidations reduced the volume of forms and documents required for liquor license applications.
- A new Colorado Drivers Handbook features improved design, larger print and modified layout for easier reading and comprehension.
- Taxpayer Service personnel conducted classes on philosophy and procedures of state taxation for representatives of several eastern European countries and former Soviet republics.

DIMENSIONS IN EFFICIENCY

- The Colorado Fiscal Managers Association named the Division of Gaming's accounting section as the outstanding fiscal office in state government.
- A Continuous Improvement Team produced the first updated field audit manuals in 20 years, including a clear, concise, cross referenced series of reference guides and an on-line version accessible via laptop.
- Supervisors participated in a 12-session training program covering a variety of management issues including state requirements for employee hiring and evaluation, work environment and safety and leadership.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Colorado Department of Revenue administers state sales, fuel, motor vehicle, gaming, liquor, income, racing, cigatette, severance, and estate taxes. It also oversees the collection of funds, provides licensing and enforcement of state laws and regulations as mandated by the legislature, and conducts comprehensive programs of information and education to serve the public and encourage voluntary compliance.

The following is a brief summary of some DOR activities during FY 1996-97.

SERVICE TO TAXPAYERS

The Department provides informational and tax accounting services to a growing number of individuals and businesses throughout the state. During FY 1997, DOR

- managed more than 1 million telephone calls from taxpayers regarding sales, fuel and income taxes (40 percent of which were handled through Interactive Voice Response or electronic voice mail systems).
- filled more than 139,000 forms orders
- maintained more than 179,000 active sales tax accounts
- maintained more than 133,000 active wage withholding accounts
- presented classes and seminars to more than 5,700 individuals
- distributed more than 600,000 copies of FYI information sheets regarding tax issues

- 2.1 million individual income tax returns

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

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

Alcohol & Fermented Malt Beverages: Title 12, Articles 46, 47

Beer

Imposed upon manufacturers or wholesalers of alcoholic beverages (or fermented malt beverages, i.e., beer containing 0.5 to 3.2% alcohol) that are sold, offered for sale, or used in the state.

The manufacturer or wholesaler must file a monthly return and remit the tax by the 20th day of the month subsequent to the beverage's sale or disposal during the current month.

Cigarette & Tobacco Products: Title 39, Articles 28, 28.5

Imposed upon cigarette wholesalers who sell or offer for sale cigarettes in the state; tobacco product distributors/first receivers collect and remit taxes imposed on the distribution, sale, consumption, or handling of the products.

Cigarette tax is paid by wholesalers who purchase tax stamps and affix them to the packages or who use a DOR-approved metering machine which imprints/impresses a payment stamp upon the packages. Distributors remit tax by the 10th day of the month subsequent to purchase; they receive a 4% discount from the stamp's face value for collection expense. Tobacco product distributors file quarterly returns, paying the tax by the 20th day of the month which follows the end of a quarter. Distributors deduct 3 1/3% of the tax due as payment of their expenses of collection and remission.

Estate:

Title 39, Article 23.5

Amount equal to state death tax credit allowable by federal estate tax regulations.

Imposed upon a decedent's estate when death occurred on or after January 1, 1980. When the filing of a federal estate tax return is not required, a state return is similarly not required. Colorado inheritance tax is imposed if the death occurred on or before December 31, 1979. Colorado gift tax is imposed on gratuitous property transfers that occurred on or before December 31, 1979.

Imposed upon the privilege of earning/receiving income in (or as resident of) the state. Corporations are not "residents." Individuals and fiduciaries may be residents or non-residents. Residency determines whether 100% or some lesser proportion of the entity's income is allocated to Colorado. Procedures for collections are analogous to federal procedures (e.g., withholding, estimated tax declarations, etc.). Residents are allowed credits for tax payments to other states. Return requirements are annual, in general, and are due on the 15th day of the 4th month following the tax year's close. Other requirements are imposed for withholding and estimated tax payments.

Mileage and Fuel: Title 42, Article 3 Title 39, Article 27

Passenger-mile Gasoline Special Fuel 1.0 mill/passenger/mile 22¢/gallon 20.5¢/gallon

Passenger-mile tax is imposed upon owners and operators of vehicles with a passenger-carrying capacity of 15 or more and used for the transportation of passengers for compensation. The tax is one mill for each passenger transported for a distance of one mile outside the boundaries of a city. A quarterly tax return is due on the last day of the month following the end of each guarter. Gasoline tax is imposed on licensed distributors acquiring gasoline for storage and subsequent sale based on gross gallons acquired less a 2% shrinkage allowance. Using net gallons, the tax is computed less a 1/2% allowance for collection costs. Special fuel tax is imposed on the first sale and is based on gross gallons. The tax is computed less a 1% allowance for collection costs. Both gasoline and special fuel tax are reported each month on the gasoline and special fuel distributor's monthly report, which is due on the 25th day following the end of the reporting month. Owners and operators of commercial vehicles pay the special fuel tax each quarter based on the amount of fuel used on Colorado roads. A quarterly special fuel use tax return is due only if nontaxed fuel is used on Colorado roads. The return is due the last day of the month following the end of the guarter.

Motor Vehicle Ownership Tax:

Sales tax is levied upon purchase price of retail sales of tangible personal property. Sales tax is imposed upon the purchaser of tangible personal property and collected and remitted by vendors. If no sales tax is paid, the buyer must remit use tax to DOR. Sales and use tax also applies to certain defined services (e.g., telephone service). Taxable items include lodging, restaurant food/drink sales, rental autos, and similar items. Sales tax returns are due monthly (if tax liability is \$300 or more) or quarterly (if tax liability is less than \$300). Wholesalers file annually. Vendors are given a discount of 3 1/3% of taxes due to cover collection expense.

Consumer use tax must be paid by the purchaser of goods in cases when the seller did not or could not collect sales tax (for example, purchases from an out-of-state retailer who does not collect Colorado sales tax). Use tax is deemed to be owed when the article purchased is actually used or after delivery is completed, as well as when keeping, storing, withdrawing from storage, moving, installing, or performing any other act by which control of the article is assumed by the purchaser. Retailer use tax applies to out-of-state vendors that solicit or sell tangible personal property to Colorado residents but that do not maintain a place of business in Colorado.

Sales Tax Glossary:

- Gross Sales: Total receipts for all sales and services, both taxable and nontaxable. from Colorado retail sales tax returns.
- Wholesale Sales: Sales to other licensed dealers for purpose of resale.
- **Retail Sales:** Gross sales less wholesale sales.

Total Deductions:

Sales of services or tangible personal property that are not subject to tax. The following, while not all inclusive, represent major nontaxable items: wholesale sales; interstate commerce sales; sales to governments, religious or charitable organizations; admissions; lodging over 30 days; gasoline; cigarettes; food for home consumption; prescription drugs and prosthetics; certain machinery and machine tools; livestock and livestock feed; seed; newspapers; and residential fuel used for light, heat, and power.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

Following is a list of new laws enacted by the General Assembly during its 1997 regular session that pertain to the Department of Revenue. Effective dates are listed after each summary.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE LAWS

HB 1076—Reorganizes the beer code by making similar provisions in the liquor code applicable to fermented malt beverages. Divides the liquor code into nine parts. Revises the composition and duties of the wine industry development board. 07/01/97

HB 1078—Makes it lawful for a person who is at least 21 years of age to consume malt, vinous, or spirituous liquors while aboard a charter or scenic bus or a luxury limousine. 08/06/97

HB 1222—Authorizes local licensing authorities and the state to deny issuance of a new tavern or retail liquor store license when it is determined the issuance of the license would create or add to an undue concentration of the same class of license and, as a result, require the use of additional law enforcement. 04/16/97

GASOLINE AND SPECIAL FUEL TAX LAWS

HB 1137—Prohibits a taxpayer from filing more than one claim each calendar quarter for a gasoline tax refund. Expands the time period during which a taxpayer may apply for refund from six to 12 months after the date of purchasing gasoline. 07/01/97

INCOME TAX LAWS

SB 45—For income tax years beginning on or after January 1, 1998, exempts interest and other income of a distribution from a qualified state tuition program from Colorado taxable income when the tuition program is used to meet higher education expenses of a designated beneficiary. 08/06/97

HB 1152—Beginning with the 1997 income tax year, allows a statewide credit against state income taxes of 10 percent of the total qualified investment made in a qualified school-to-career program. Excess credit may be carried forward up to five years. Repeals the existing income tax credit for investments in school-to-career programs in which students work predominately in enterprise zones. 06/03/97

HB 1260—For income tax years beginning on or after January 1, 1997 but before January 1, 2000, allows taxpayers to designate on their Colorado individual income tax return a contribution amount to the Colorado Special Olympics Fund. Such monies shall be used only for transportation, equipment, and uniforms for Participants in the special olympics program. 05/28/97

LIMITED GAMING AND LOTTERY LAWS

SB 27—Establishes the Local Government Limited Gaming Impact Fund. Specifies that a percentage of limited gaming revenues that would have gone to the general fund will be allocated to this fund. Establishes the limited gaming impact advisory committee, which will develop standards for documenting, assessing and reporting gaming impacts upon eligible local governmental entities, and make funding recommendations for projects submitted by eligible local government entities. Monies from this fund will be distributed to local governments by the Department of Local Affairs after considering recommendations of the advisory committee. 07/01/97

SB 150—Eliminates the requirement that the Division of Gaming furnish the State Treasurer with a monthly report of the Division's revenue and expenses. Provides that the Colorado Lottery Commission will no longer be required to notify the State Treasurer of the amount of money to be transferred from the Lottery Fund to the Conservation Trust Fund. 08/06/97

MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY LAWS

SB 58—Prohibits intrastate ready-mix concrete truck operators from driving for 24 hours after having been on duty for 70 hours during seven consecutive days if the employing motor carrier does not operate every day of the week or 80 hours during eight consecutive days when the employing motor carrier operates every day of the week. 04/08/97

MOTOR VEHICLE AND TRAFFIC LAWS

SB 3—Allows owners of trucks and truck tractors operating interstate or intrastate to apply to pay annual vehicle registration fees and specific ownership taxes in installments if the total annual registration fees and ownership taxes for the fleet or fleets equals \$1,000 or more. The owner must pay one-third of the total amount due for the registration and the owner must not have past due registration fees, ownership taxes or nonpayment penalties. 01/01/98

SB 35—Clarifies that the criteria for registering a motor vehicle as a collector's item is that the motor vehicle be at least 25 years old. 07/01/97

SB 36—Limits state, county and municipal governments in their use of automated vehicle identification systems (photo-radar). Prohibits the Department from assessing any points against a person's driver's license and from keeping a record of the violation if the traffic violation was detected using an automated vehicle identification system. Limits the penalties for traffic violations detected by the automated vehicle identification system to a warning mailed to the driver on the first offense of speeding less than 10 miles per hour. On a second or subsequent offense of speeding less than 10 miles per hour, maximum penalty will be \$40. 06/05/97

SB 38—Defines neighborhood electric vehicles. Exempts these vehicles from requirements of having tail lamps, multiple-beam headlights, side mirrors, slow moving vehicle emblems and mufflers. Prohibits the Department from registering or titling these vehicles until the federal Department of Transportation has adopted a federal motor vehicle safety standard for them. Prohibits use of these vehicles for use on limited access highways. 08/06/97

SB 88—Allows any person to purchase an operator's policy of liability insurance for purposes of complying with mandatory motor vehicle insurance laws. Requires the policy to contain a statement that the insurer is liable only for liability incurred while the named insured is the operator of a motor vehicle. Forbids a person with such a policy from allowing another person to operate the owner's motor vehicle. This type of policy is not available to motor vehicle dealers, lessors, manufacturers, rebuilders, distributors, fleet owners, common and contract carriers or individuals who own motor vehicles for use by employees. 08/06/97

SB 89 — Clarifies that trucks and truck tractors may be registered as collectors' items. Specifies that the annual registration fee will be \$65 for a collector's truck or truck tractor that has an empty weight of 6,001 pounds or more or a declared gross vehicle weight of 16,001 pounds or more if it is used only for non-commercial transportation and driven only to collectors' meets, parades, or exhibition tours. Creates penalties for commercial use of collector's trucks. 01/01/98

SB 108—Continues the Division of Insurance until July 1, 2002. Changes the adminstration of self-insurance of motor vehicles from the Department of Revenue to the Division of Insurance. 07/01/97

SB 135—Gives auto parts recyclers the same authority as towing carriers to collect and store abandoned motor vehicles. Defines "auto parts recycler." Specifies that an auto parts recycler need not have a license from the Public Utilities Commission to engage in those functions. 04/24/97

SB 198—Requires the annual fee for full-use dealer license plates for motorcycles be calculated by the Department based on the average of specific ownership taxes and registration fees paid for motorcycles that are seven model years old or newer. Requires that the annual fee for full use motor vehicle dealer plates and full use motorcycle dealer plates be prorated on a monthly instead of annual basis. 08/06/97

HB 1003—Directs the Department to deny issuance or renewal of a driver's license if an applicant wrote a check

with insufficient funds to pay a penalty assessment, license fee, reinstatement fee or motor vehicle record fee. Assesses a \$30 fee on returned checks. Also allows a person to obtain an ignition interlock system for a vehicle if the person has no outstanding judgments or warrants at the time of the hearing, rather than at the time of license restraint. Reduces points assessed against a driver's license if the fine and surcharge are paid on or before the date the payment is due. Eliminates the requirement for proof of financial responsibility for any person whose driver's license was revoked because the person obtained, attempted to obtain, consumed, or possessed alcoholic beverages or ethyl alcohol while the person was under age 21. 07/01/97

HB 1021—Requires the Motor Vehicle Division to suspend the requirement for proof of financial responsibility for former Colorado residents who obtain a driver's license in another state or foreign jurisdiction. Requires reinstatement of the requirement if the person applies for a new Colorado driver's license. 04/19/97

HB 1035—Specifies that the revocation of a license for a person under the age of 21 convicted of an offense related to the purchase, consumption or possession of alcohol will not begin until the Department has notified the person of the revocation. Previously, the person had to surrender the driver's license immediately to the court. 05/21/97

HB 1080—Creates a special motor vehicle license plate for recipients of the medal of honor. Authorizes any recipient of the medal of honor to apply for the plates. No fee will be charged for one set of such plates but all taxes and fees on additional plates for passenger cars, trucks or motor homes must be paid. 03/24/97

HB 1125—Makes mandatory revocation of a driver's license one of the penalties for defacing property with graffiti. Revocation will be for six months for every conviction and revocations run consecutively. Persons under age 16 with such convictions will not be eligible for a driver's license until the entire revocation period has ended, beginning with the person's 16th birthday. 07/01/97

HB 1140—Directs the Department to mail written notice to all drivers involved in a fatal motor vehicle accident that states the drivers must submit to re-examination. Reexamination is prohibited if the Department does not mail a notice to the driver within 90 days after the Department receives notice of the fatal accident. 01/01/98

HB 1142—Requires that applications for a driver's license, instruction permit, commercial driver's license or identification card must contain a statement saying the applicant understands that any vehicles owned by him/her must be registered in Colorado and the registration requirements must be completed within 30 days after becoming a Colorado resident. Failure to comply is a misdemeanor which carries a \$500 fine and civil penalty of \$500. The person continues to be liable for unpaid registration fees and ownership taxes. 08/06/97 **HB 1189**—Increases the fee for a duplicate certificate of title from \$3.50 to \$6.50. Decreases the portion of the fee credited to the state special account for distributive data processing from \$2 to \$1. Increases the portion of the fee that goes to the county clerk and recorder. 07/10/97

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HB 1190—Allows the Department to offer renewal of driver's licenses by mail subject to certain conditions. Only persons 21 years of age or older and under 66 years of age may renew by mail. Restricts renewals by mail to every other renewal period. 03/28/97

HB 1205—Requires that social security numbers of commercial driver's license applicants and applicants for professional or occupational licenses be recorded for the purposes of tracking nonpayment of child support. Under the "Colorado Child Support Enforcement Act," makes the driver's license suspension provisions permanent and authorizes the suspension of commercial driver's licenses for nonpayment of child support. Also establishes a state directory of new hires requiring employers to report all new employees on or after October 1, 1997 who are hired for 30 days or more. Information comparisons will be made with the Family Support Registry. 07/01/97

HB 1209-Establishes a computer database to help law enforcement officials verify owner compliance with motor vehicle insurance requirements. Requires a motorist insurance identification fee of not more than \$1 be paid when registering a motor vehicle. Fees are credited to a motorist insurance identification account created within the Highway Users Tax Fund. Requires the Department to contract with a designated agent by January 1, 1998, who will develop and maintain a database for purposes of monitoring compliance with insurance requirements. Requires insurers to report policyholder and uninsured motorist claim numbers to the Division of Insurance and the designated agent. The Department is required to fine insurers up to \$250 per day if the insurer fails to report required information. Allows the Department to administratively suspend driver's licenses of uninsured motorists effective not later than January 1, 1999. 07/01/97

HB 1227—Prohibits the Department from requiring a person to undergo driving skills or knowledge testing to obtain a new driver's license after the expiration of a license revocation if the revocation was imposed for a first offense of driving with excessive alcohol content. 08/06/97

HB 1233—Authorizes the Department to cancel, deny, or deny reissuance of an identification card for the following reasons: failure to give required or correct information in the application; commission of fraud in making the application; permitting an unlawful or fraudulent use of an LD. card or conviction for misuse of the card. Persons whose I.D. cards have been cancelled or denied may request a hearing. 07/01/97 **HB 1238**—Increases the surcharge imposed on any motorcycle or motorscooter registration from \$2 to \$4 to support the motorcycle operator safety training program. 07/01/97

HB 1246—Prohibits the release of any record indicating that a disabled person has obtained a distinguishing license plate or motor vehicle placard. Prohibits reproducing a driver's license or identification card for purposes of distribution, resale, reuse or manipulation of the data or images contained in licenses or cards unless authorized by the Department or by law. Violation would be a class 3 misdemeanor. 08/06/97

HB 1262—Increases the mileage at which a motor vehicle is deemed to be a used vehicle from 200 miles to 1,500 miles. 08/06/97

HB 1301—Prohibits any person under age 21 with a blood or breath alcohol content of 0.02 percent or above from driving a motor vehicle. Reduces the revocation criteria from 0.10 percent alcohol level to 0.02 percent for a person under 21 operating a motor vehicle. Reduces the revocation criteria from 0.04 percent alcohol level to 0.02 percent for a person under 21 operating a commercial motor vehicle. The driver's license or commercial motor vehicle license would be revoked for 3 months for the first offense, 6 months for a second offense and one year for a third or subsequent offense. 07/01/97

HB 1346—Authorizes the Department to sell copies of photographs, electronically stored photographs, or digitized images from driver's license records for the purpose of fraud prevention in the use of credit cards, debit cards, checks or other forms of financial transactions. Prohibits the Department from selling any photograph or image of a person whose address is required to be kept confidential because of danger of criminal harassment or bodily harm. 07/01/97

HB 1348—Directs the Department to include a confidentiality notice on any application form for a driver's license, I.D. card, motor vehicle title or motor vehicle registration. Persons applying may request that the information in their motor vehicle or driving record not be used for any purpose other than authorized by law. Prohibits the county clerk from providing records to the public if the records are available directly from the Department of Revenue. 09/01/97

SALES AND USE TAX LAWS

SB 1—Beginning July 1, 1997 and for four additional fiscal years, allocates 10 percent of sales and use taxes to the Highway Users Tax Fund (HUTF). Provides a reduction in the amount of tax credited to HUTF if there will not be enough General Fund revenue to fund expenditures up to the statutory appropriation limit after required expenditures. 07/01/97

SB 92— Expands the sales and use tax exemption for the sale and use of livestock. Defines "livestock" for purposes of the sales and use tax exemption for feed for livestock. 07/01/97

SB 217—Specifies that counties are exempt from the seven percent limitation on the total sales or use tax imposed by state, counties and municipalities when the additional sales or use tax imposed is used to fund any health service district in that county. Limits the increment of such sales/use tax to a maximum of one percent. 06/03/97

HB 1052—Authorizes lending institutions to receive notification when a borrower is delinquent in payment of sales and use tax, withholding tax, special fuels tax, gas tax or aviation fuel tax and a distraint warrant has been issued. Requires the borrower to sign a consent form for this notification. 07/01/97

MISCELLANEOUS

HB 1162—For petroleum tank definitions, eliminates the repeal dates for definitions of "British thermal unit," "gallon equivalent," "gallon diesel equivalent," "gallon gasoline equivalent," and "motor fuel." Also eliminates the repeal date for the environmental response surcharge and the repeal date for provisions specifying the method of sales of motor fuels. 03/28/97

HB 1169—Eliminates the wood smoke reduction fund and the \$1 smoke reduction fee retailers are required to collect when they sell a new wood stove, insert, or gas or electric fireplace in connection with a voluntary conversion. Monies in the wood smoke reduction fund would go to the general fund. Fees collected by retailers between January 1 and June 30, 1997 must be filed by July 20, 1997. 07/01/97

HB 1273—Creates the "Rural Transportation Authority Law" to finance, construct and operate rural transportation systems. Two or more municipalities, two or more counties, or one or more municipalities and one or more counties may create an authority. Requires voter approval prior to establishment. The authority has the power to impose an annual motor vehicle registration fee not to exceed \$10 per vehicle, and may levy a sales or use tax, or both, at a rate of not more than 4/10 of one percent. Exempts the income, revenues and bonds issued by the authority from all state taxation and assessments. 08/06/97





LIMITED STAKES GAMING

The Division of Gaming regulates limited stakes gaming in the three mountain towns of Cripple Creek. Central City, and Black Hawk. Pursuant to a constitutional amendment, passed in November of 1990, gaming became legal in licensed establishments as of October 1, 1991.

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Before any monies are distributed from the limited gaming fund, the administrative expenses of the Division of Gaming are paid, and statute requires that two months of operating expenses for the administration of gaming to be held in escrow at the end of each fiscal year. Tax revenues and fees deposited in the limited gaming fund are based on a graduated tax levied upon adjusted gross gaming proceeds, application and licensing fees, device fees, and any fines levied by the Division.

LOTTERY

Fiscal Year 1997 produced record-setting sales of \$360.8 million. Scratch games produced sales of \$212.2 million. Lotto accounted for \$125.9 million, Cash 5 produced sales of \$16.9 million, and Keno sales reached \$5.8 million.

In September 1996, the Lottery launched Cash 5, a game that has better odds of winning than Lotto and Keno. The top prize is \$20,000. Cash 5 is played by selecting five numbers from a field of 32 possible numbers, and those players matching 2, 3, 4, or 5 of the numbers drawn receive a prize.

Lottery players received \$214.5 million in prizes from all games in Fiscal Year 1997, and over \$1.6 billion since the Lottery's start-up in 1983. To date, \$840.7 million in Lottery proceeds have been returned to the state.





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RACING EVENTS

In 1996, the Racing Commission held 17 meetings. The Commission conducted a 1997 race date hearing; conducted renewal application hearings for north and south circuit greyhound race meets, one major horse track, and one fair circuit horse race meet; conducted numerous disciplinary, administrative, and appeal hearings; held rule-making hearings related to the adoption of various greyhound, horse, pari-mutuel and racing rules; and continued its official regulatory, supervisory, and enforcement control of pari-mutuel wagering.




