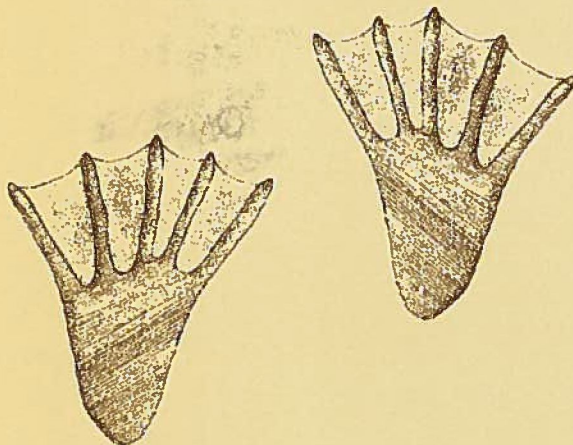
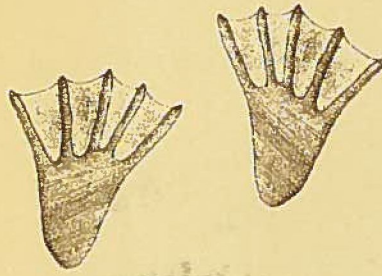
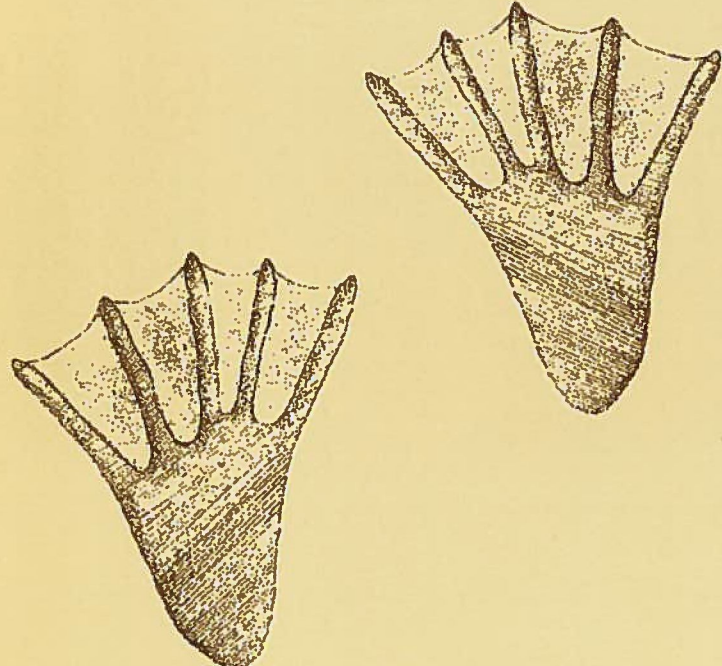

A Letter from the Director



On behalf of the Colorado Lottery, a division of the Colorado Department of Revenue, I am pleased to present the calendar year 2004 annual review. And yes, the Colorado Lottery is "on the right track" in our efforts to maximize revenues, provide new and exciting games, and maintain our commitment to customer service and efficient operations.

Through hard work and dedication, the Lottery was able to set new sales records in 2004, while at the same time identifying efficiencies that allowed us to return additional dollars to our proceeds recipients.

The Lottery celebrated yet another successful year with sales over \$408 million, breaking the previous calendar year record of \$398 million in 2002. The Scratch product line once again led the way in setting the new sales record. In 2004, the Lottery sold more than \$274 million in Scratch tickets.

In addition, the Colorado Lottery began implementation of an entirely new computer game system and introduced state-of-the-art Scratch game vending machines. These changes will provide the opportunity for players to purchase a greater variety of our products in a more timely fashion.

And while we are pleased with these results, we have not forgotten about our long-term goals. In 2005, the Lottery will continue to be "on the right track" when our new system becomes functional at more than 2,800 retail locations statewide. We will also utilize new and efficient ways to market our products. At this time, the Colorado Lottery's Web site is one of the most popular sites in the state. We will build on that trend by providing our players with the ability to receive information in a timelier manner, increase the number of interactive promotional opportunities and use the member database in our research efforts.

And of course, we will always focus on our top priority—to generate proceeds to help preserve the environment and enhance our communities. The Colorado Lottery will continue to be your ticket to a more beautiful Colorado.

Significant Events

in 2004

- The Colorado Lottery ended fiscal year 2004 by setting an all-time Scratch sales record of \$260.9 million.
- Proceeds recipients received more than \$104 million during fiscal year 2004. This was the second-highest proceeds distribution in the Lottery's 22-year history.
- In August 2004, the Colorado Lottery introduced its first ever second-chance Internet promotion. Players who purchased a \$2 Coral Cash ticket could enter their non-winning tickets into a drawing through the Lottery's Web site, www.coloradolottery.com.
- In 2004, the Colorado Lottery moved to a 16-Scratch game strategy that provided players with a greater variety of games.
- The Colorado Lottery introduced new state-of-the-art Scratch ticket vending machines at retailers across the state. These new machines offer touch-screen technology, and the ability to sell up to 20 different games at a time.
- The Colorado Lottery's Web site continues to rank in the top ten most popular sites in Colorado. In 2004, the Lottery signed up more than 25,000 members to the MyLottery database. Advances in technology have made it possible for members to receive Lottery information via their cell phones, pagers or personal organizers.
- Starburst Awards were presented to a dozen parks and recreation projects in 2004. The Starburst program recognizes excellence in the use of Lottery proceeds. The top winners in 2004 were the City of Fort Morgan for the "Everybody Plays" renovation of the playground in City Park, and for the city's new inline skate center; the Estes Valley Recreation and Park District claimed the award for the Stanley Park Skating Project, the Town of Evans for the Game Factor Skate Park at Prairie View Park, and the City of Colorado Springs for the purchase of the Red Rock Canyon Open Space.

Lottery dollars through Great Outdoors Colorado help support efforts to recover and reintroduce threatened and endangered wildlife species such as the boreal toad, a rare alpine amphibian listed as endangered by the State of Colorado.



- In January 2004, Peggy Gordon became the ninth director of the Colorado Lottery.
- To increase jackpot awareness, the Lottery placed 20 Powerball jackpot billboards in strategic locations across the state. The signs helped the Lottery sell more than \$85 million in Powerball tickets in fiscal year 2004.

Looking Ahead to 2005

- The Colorado Lottery will undergo a major computer conversion in 2005. Changes will include new, state-of-the-art terminals that produce Powerball, Lotto and Cash 5 tickets in a more timely manner, and ticket checkers where players can scan tickets to see if they are winners.
- The Lottery will introduce six Scratch advertising campaigns in 2005. These campaigns will roll out every other month, and focus on Scratch family of games such as the Luck, Gems and Slots themes.



The Colorado Division of Wildlife uses Lottery funds to protect high priority habitats including Circle Ranch in the Laramie Foothills. Great Outdoors Colorado provided a grant of \$3.1 million in Lottery funds to acquire 6100 acres that have been added to the Cherokee State Wildlife Area. The project preserves an important wildlife migration corridor in northern Colorado, provides big game with prime wintering grounds, and increases hunting, fishing and wildlife watching opportunities.

- The Lottery will continue to make its Web site more informative, convenient and entertaining.
- A Lottery-industry-first will occur in early spring, when the Colorado Lottery teams up with Lucas Films to introduce a Star Wars™ Scratch game. These tickets will feature 12 different scenes from various Star Wars movies, and will launch just prior to the sixth, and final episode in the Star Wars saga.

1982 • In 1982, the General Assembly approves a bill implementing a state-supervised lottery. The bill created the Colorado Lottery as a division of the Department of Revenue, with a director appointed by the Executive Director of the Department of Revenue.

1983 • In 1983, the Colorado Lottery begins on January 24 with gala kick-off celebrations in Pueblo, Denver, Fort Collins and Grand Junction.

1983 • On September 1, 1983, the Lottery makes its first proceeds distribution of \$41.7 million.

1989 • On January 24, 1989, the Lottery celebrates its sixth anniversary by launching Lotto.

1991 • The Colorado Lottery sells its one-billionth ticket on February 13, 1991.

1992 • On March 5, 1992, the Lottery awards the largest Lotto jackpot in Colorado history. Kim Walker, of Boulder, wins \$27 million, becoming the 100th Lotto millionaire.

JL Ranch has been preserved and will eventually be home to El Paso County's first state park with the help of \$8.83 million in Lottery funding through a Great Outdoors Colorado Legacy grant. At 1,680 acres, it is one of the largest remaining tracts of open space in the Colorado Springs area. A wealth of wildlife including bear, mountain lion, deer, fox and many bird species are on the property, which lies at the base of Cheyenne Mountain.



The Aspen Valley Land Trust used \$500,000 in Lottery funds—a grant from Great Outdoors Colorado—to acquire a conservation easement over the 115-acre Rock Bottom Ranch in Eagle and Garfield counties. The property contains habitat for four heron rookeries, wild turkeys, wintering bald eagles, numerous waterfowl, bobcat, and beaver.

1998 • In 1998, the Colorado Lottery surpasses the \$1 billion mark in proceeds returned to the state.

1999 • In 1999, the Lottery introduces a new corporate slogan—"the Colorado Lottery, your ticket to a more beautiful Colorado."

2000 • In November 2000, the Lottery was honored with a 2000 Diversity Leaders Award from the Minority and Women's Chambers' Coalition. The distinction was presented in recognition of the Lottery's effective integration of diversity into its corporate culture, and for exhibiting inclusive behavior in all program areas.

2000 • Colorado voters approve Referendum E on November 7, 2000, allowing the Colorado Lottery to participate in multi-state lottery games. Multi-state games are offered by more than one state, combining their prize pools to create more attractive jackpot amounts. After extensive research, the Lottery determined Powerball was the best alternative for the Colorado Lottery, players and proceeds recipients.

2001 • In February 2001, the Lottery adds two additional drawings to Cash 5, bringing the total number of drawings to six nights a week. The addition of these drawings helped push Cash 5 sales near \$17 million for fiscal year 2001.

2001 • The Colorado Lottery introduces the mega-jackpot game Powerball on August 2, 2001. The game is introduced to players at more than 2,500 retail locations, with Lottery representatives participating in more than 70 promotions statewide.

2003 • In December of 2003, Department of Revenue Executive Director M. Michael Cooke announces Peggy Gordon to serve as Director of the Colorado Lottery.

Corporate Responsibility

As a division of the Colorado Department of Revenue, the Lottery realizes its obligations to players extend beyond creating new games and generating revenue for the state. For most people, Lottery tickets are a form of entertainment, but for some, playing the Lottery can be a problem.

The Lottery implements programs and policies to address problem gambling. Since 1998, the Lottery has promoted the "Play Responsibly" campaign urging consumers to play responsibly. The brochure also provides information on how to seek help for gambling-related problems.

The Lottery continues to be active in problem gambling organizations, including the Problem Gambling Coalition of Colorado, to accomplish its corporate responsibility goals.



The Division of Wildlife is developing wildlife viewing opportunities at 39 state parks, using Lottery funds through Great Outdoors Colorado to build informational kiosks, observation decks and viewing blinds, and exhibits in visitor centers.

Funding of Lottery Operations

The Lottery, by statute, is designated as an enterprise fund. As such, the agency receives no tax money from the state General Fund for its operations. Instead, the Lottery is self-supporting. The state Legislature approves the Lottery budget each year as part of the State Budget Bill.

Perhaps the most important feature of the Lottery's status as an enterprise fund is that the Lottery, along with the revenue it generates for its recipients, exists outside of the revenue limitations set by the Tabor Amendment (Amendment 1) approved by voters in November 1992. Because of this enterprise fund status, local and state agencies that receive Lottery proceeds can use these dollars to enhance their parks and recreation programs and facilities beyond the budget restrictions of the amendment.

The Colorado Lottery's diversity policies embrace a spirit of openness and inclusiveness. In order to maintain a connection with the people it serves, the Lottery is involved with special events that specifically celebrate diversity. The Lottery has served economically, ethnically and culturally diverse communities across Colorado, through the return of more than one and a half billion dollars in proceeds. These funds have been used to create neighborhood and regional parks, recreation centers, open space and trails, and other public amenities.

Business Partners

The Lottery relies on an extensive network of retailers to sell Lottery products. Lottery retailers can be found in communities across the state, and include grocery outlets, convenience stores, and individually owned businesses. Retailers receive a commission for every ticket they sell, which is another impact the Lottery has on local economies. In 2004, Lottery retailers, approximately 2,800 statewide, earned \$30.9 million.

Cashing In

One of the most visible components of the Lottery is its winners. Lottery games are designed to offer a variety of different prize amounts. For example, many Lottery Scratch games have prizes that will change your day (\$50, \$100, \$1,000), while Cash 5 has a top prize that can change your year (\$20,000). The Lottery's jackpot games, Powerball and Lotto, have multi-million dollar prizes that could change your life. In 2004, 13 lucky players had a life-changing event occur when they won more than \$1 million playing Lotto.

In 2004, prizes paid to Lottery winners totaled \$246 million, bringing total prizes paid since the Lottery's inception to over \$2.5 billion.

Who Plays the Lottery?

The Lottery regularly conducts demographic studies through independent research firms. The most recent of these was May 2004. Research has shown the average Lottery player is a reflection of the average Colorado resident.

Approval

The Colorado Lottery realizes that its corporate image and favorability are a key component to the organization's success. Therefore, the Howell Research Group conducted a statewide image survey in May 2004. The objective of the survey was to assess the awareness and image of the Colorado Lottery as an organization and its contribution to the state of Colorado.

Colorado residents have expressed strong support for the Colorado Lottery and the purposes for which it was established in every survey since 1991. Favorable attitudes toward the Colorado Lottery are found among all demographic segments and geographic locations. In the 2004 survey, 84 percent of those surveyed indicated they were in favor of the Colorado Lottery.

Scratch

In 2004, the Colorado Lottery's Scratch product set new calendar year sales records, generating **\$274.6 million**. The Lottery introduced a wide variety of new games ranging in price from \$1 to \$10. At any one time, players could choose from an assortment of 16 different games.

A total of 42 new Scratch games were introduced in 2004. A few examples include *Lucky Dog*, *7-11-21*, *\$50 Fever*, *Deep Sea Riches*, *Hot 100s*, *Bah Humbucks*, and *Seasonal Crossword*.

In 2004, the Lottery continued to utilize a new Scratch distribution plan that relied on courier delivery of tickets. This new method ensures that all Lottery retailers receive new games, simultaneously. The courier delivery system allows retailers to anticipate when they will receive new games resulting in more efficient inventory control. As a result of the new system, Lottery sales representatives are able to spend more time marketing new products, and informing retailers and players about the latest Lottery games.

Similar to 2003, the Lottery's advertising campaigns combined multiple games with similar themes, extending the resources of its marketing budget. This approach allowed numerous games to receive the benefits of advertising visibility with the same amount of marketing dollars previously allocated to a single game.

Powerball

The popularity of Powerball remained strong in 2004 with the help of several jackpots that exceeded the \$100 million level. In addition to the high jackpots, the fact that funds from Powerball stay in Colorado to help parks, recreation and other environmental projects makes the game popular among players.

Proceeds

Every year thousands of projects are made possible with funds generated from the Colorado Lottery. To date, more than **\$1.5 billion** has been generated for parks, recreation, open space and environmental projects. In 2004, the four funds that received Lottery proceeds were:

Conservation Trust Fund

Local parks and recreation providers—towns, cities, counties and special districts—receive money from this fund based on population. More than **\$40.9 million** was distributed through the Conservation Trust Fund in calendar year 2004 for open space and land acquisitions, equipment purchases, facility development, park maintenance, and renovation or restoration of local facilities.

Colorado Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation

Colorado's 40 state parks use Lottery money for open space and land acquisitions, trail system construction and maintenance, equipment and facility purchases, and maintenance and renovation of state parks facilities. Approximately **\$10.1 million** was distributed to Colorado State Parks in 2004.

Powerball drawings are held on Wednesday and Saturday evenings at 8:59 pm. Players choose five numbers from a field of 53 and one number, the Powerball, from a field of 42. The jackpot, which starts at \$10 million, is awarded for matching all six numbers.

Players can also choose the PowerPlay feature for an additional \$1. PowerPlay drawings are conducted prior to the Powerball drawing, when a number between two and five is chosen. Players with the PowerPlay option that win any prize (except the jackpot) have that prize multiplied by the number drawn.

Powerball sales were **\$80.4 million** in calendar year 2004, an increase of approximately \$2 million when compared to 2003 sales.

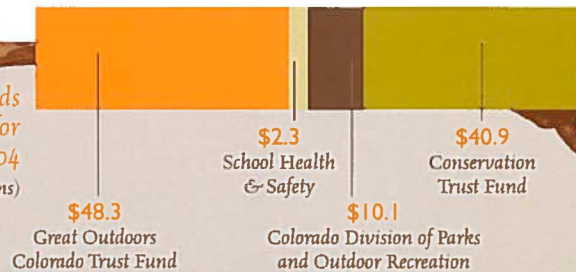
Lotto

Lotto is played by selecting six numbers from a field of 42. Players who match 3, 4, 5 or 6 of 6 numbers win a prize. Lotto is a high jackpot game, and players who match all 6 numbers win at least a million dollar prize. Lotto jackpots start at \$1 million and increase every drawing when no one matches all six numbers. Since the game was introduced in 1989, nearly 400 players have won a Lotto jackpot. Lotto sales were **\$38.7 million** in calendar year 2004.

Cash 5

Introduced in 1996, Cash 5 plays like Lotto, yet offers better odds of winning. Cash 5 sales were **\$14.9 million** in calendar year 2004, the highest they have been in the past seven years. Players select five numbers from a field of 32 possible numbers. If a player matches 2, 3, 4 or 5 of 5 numbers, they win a prize. Drawings are held six nights a week, every night except Sunday. The top prize in the game is \$20,000.

Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund (GOCO)

Established in 1992, this fund includes environmental programs, improvements to parks and recreation facilities, wildlife preservation, and acquiring open space. More than **\$48.3 million** was distributed to Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO) in calendar year 2004.

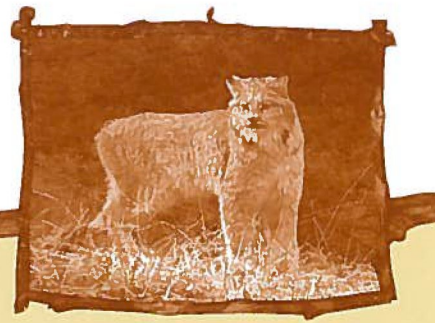
School Health and Safety

The passing of Referendum E (which allows the Lottery to participate in multi-state games such as Powerball) changed the current proceeds distribution formula. The Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund receives up to 50 percent of Lottery proceeds, however, this fund is capped at \$35 million (in 1992 dollars) according to the consumer price index. Under the new legislation, spillover from the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund, which was formerly designated to the General Fund, will be used to address health and safety issues in public schools. In 2004, more than **\$2.3 million** has been distributed for School Health and Safety.

Quality of Life

For the past 22 years, Colorado Lottery proceeds have been used to enhance the quality of life throughout the state. Through proceeds raised by the Lottery, thousands of parks and recreation projects have become a reality, including trails, campgrounds, park facilities, and recreational centers. In addition, Lottery proceeds have funded everything from conservation buffers around parks and communities, to open space acquisition, to the recovery of threatened or endangered species.

Lottery proceeds through Great Outdoors Colorado continue to assist in the recovery of lynx in the state. Seven new lynx kittens were found in southwestern Colorado last May.
